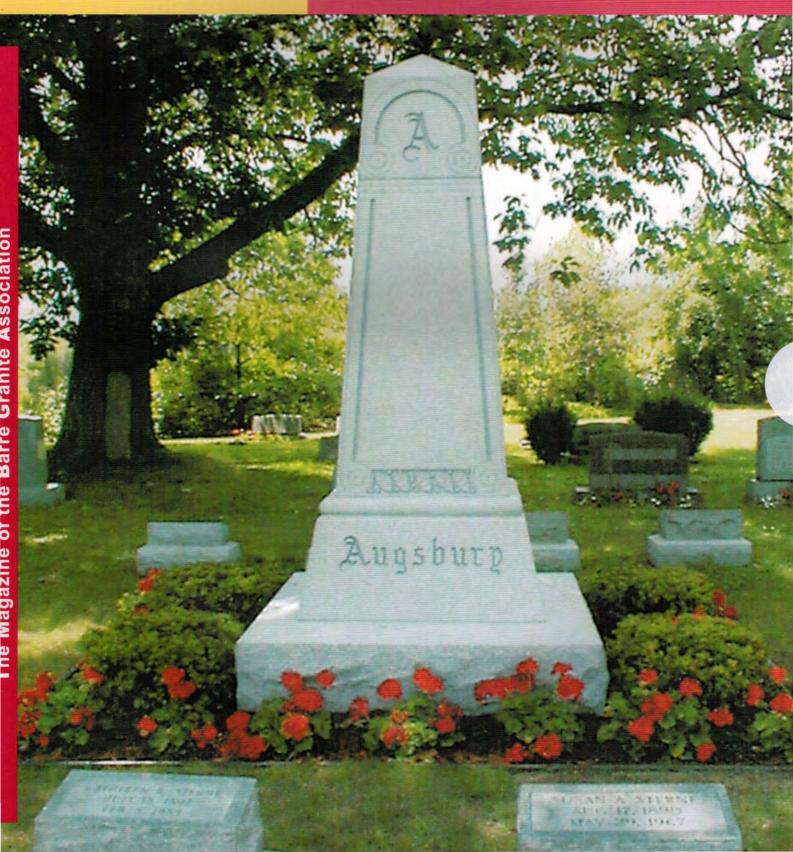

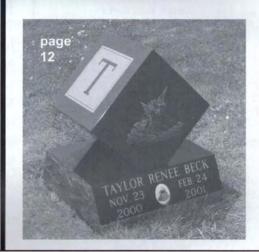

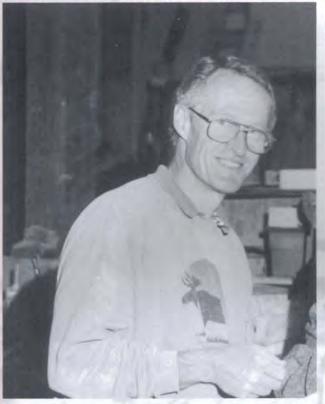

THE GRANITE GUY

Education and training is the bedrock of any growing industry.

Be it computers, medicine, or even granite, the more skilled the labor force, the more successful the industry.

In the world of granite we are surrounded by skilled and experienced tradespeople. Carvers, sandblasters, etchers, draftspeople, innumerable men and women who turn an inert chunk of rock into a timeless work of art. But where once a child would follow in the professional footsteps of his father, the challenges we face in the 21st century are infusing our industry with new talent, skills, and yet another generation.

In Barre we are fortunate to have an educational resource to address these challenges. Gary Goodwin is the Granite Guy and has spent the past three years operating his own technical training center. He has been teaching sandblasting, stone cutting, finish work, free-form sculpture, stone polishing, and other techniques for over 20 years and in the granite business nearly all his life. In his words he has "an incurable disease called granite passion," and loves what he does. He feels that to help the industry thrive we need more education and a better understanding of how rock becomes its intended form. "A number of young workers don't know the basics of how to do carving or sandblasting, and try to rush through the process. You don't achieve a quality product if you don't learn from the ground up, and that takes time and lots of practice." A sentiment echoed by many seasoned tradespeople.

The Granite Guy's classes are small and intensive,

usually only two or three students. Classes run eight hours a day for five days for an introductory class and the same for the advanced session. Prior experience is not necessary, and by the conclusion of the advanced session participants will be ready to begin working in a plant having a strong hands-on knowledge of what is involved in sandblasting, stone cutting, and polishing. "I have had all kinds of people come here for training, from folks who want to pursue carving as a hobby, industry professionals, to one guy who had a particularly stressful job and wanted a vacation away from it all to work with his hands. While being in the trade is helpful, it is in no way a requirement to take any one of our introductory courses," noted Gary.

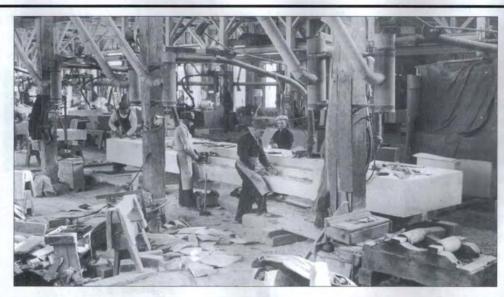
Businesses looking to train employees, people in the industry, to the man off the street, all have a place at the Granite Guy Technical Training Center. For more infor-

Polonia Completes Major Historical Restoration

olonia Development & Preservation Services Co., under the guidance of Gerardo Sanchez, recently completed a major historic restoration in Newburgh, New York. This district covers a one square mile area along the Hudson River. It is the largest historic district in the state of New York, containing more than 2400 architecturally significant buildings. Many of

these structures, like Captain Henry "Bully" Robinson's Mausoleum in the Old Town Cemetery (1713), are being restored to the splendor and beauty of their glorious past.

mausoleum was designed in 1853 by
Andrew Jackson Davis
(the father of American
Architecture and the
founder of the American Institute of Architects), and it is the only

monument in the world

that consists of a pyramid erected atop a mastaba.

Captain Robinson died on March 9, 1866, aged 83

years and 10 months. Legend has it that "Bully" was always promising his wife a mansion facing the Hudson River, which turned out to be the famous mausoleum. There were no surviving children, and it is believed that the family became extinct with the passing of other distant relatives.

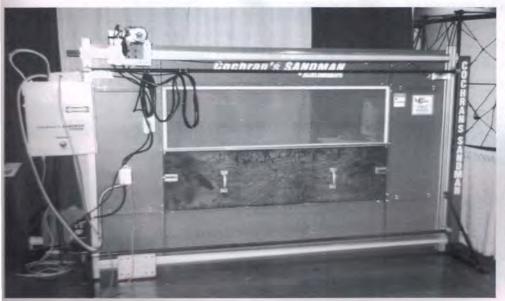
The \$50,000 restoration of the mausoleum came after

years of neglect and disrepair. Sanchez had to remove trees growing through the roof, repair cracking stones, clean the entire interior and exterior stones, and re-entomb the remains of the four family members buried inside the sanctuary.

Thanks to the efforts of Polonia, Sanchez, and numerous community volunteers, the Old Town Cemetery and Robinson mausoleum have been brought

back to their original glory and splendor.

May We Have A Moment Mr. President?

- an interview with GIV's Forrest Rouelle, the new BGA president

1) How long have you been in the granite industry, at your present job, and what types of jobs have you held during your granite career?

I have been with GIV since 1973, at first I ran wire saws, diamond saws, and polishing, then moved on to shipping, quoting, and sales. Been VP since 1995.

2) What do you see as some of the major changes/ developments in this industry during your time in granite?

Our local industry has gotten smaller. Imports are having a major impact on our manufacturing. Not a lot of people are entering this industry, putting us in danger of a diminished skilled labor market. We need more well trained people getting in to this industry. A while ago, we had on-going educational programs that labor participated in on an on-going basis. But as the industry downsized and labor was readily available, these classes fell by the wayside. Now the abundant workforce has retired or gone on to other things and we face the same challenges of the past but without an adequate feeder system to replace these craftsmen. Youth today doesn't want to come into a manual labor force like ours. Computers are what draws them and it is a physically easier lifestyle.

Wages have also increased dramatically. The people who do work here make a good living, the health benefits are good, and a retirement program is now in place. Probably the thing that has made the biggest impact is the mechanization and subsequent advances in technology of our manufacturing plants. Machines today can do amazing things in record time allowing us to produce more jobs with less manpower and higher yields. The cost of that though is the loss of well trained and experienced tradespeople entering the workforce.

3) Do you have other family members who are in this industry? If so, who are they and what do they do?

My father, Leon, was a stonecutter for most of his life. He passed away two years ago.

4) What would you like to see be the BGA's focus during your tenure in the upcoming year?



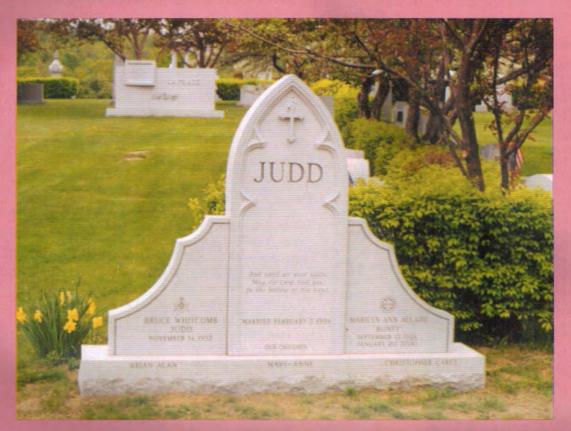
I would like to see the BGA grow. We need some new ideas and programs to entice some former members to return. We have a good Board and are working on new programs. We are collaborating with the state and other agencies to get educational components beyond CAD in our area.

The need for affordable, quality health care insurance is definitely on our front burner but takes time to sort through. We are also looking into ways to partner better with retailers. We welcome any ideas and suggestions that people would like to offer to assist us with these topics.

5) What are the top three issues you see facing the future of the granite industry/BGA and what needs to be done to address them? What would you like to see change/advance in the next 5/10 years?

We need to promote ourselves as an association of craftsmen. We need to show the consumer that we can customize and personalize their family memorials better than anyone in the world. We are presently working on some promotional ideas that will get that in front of the consumer. We need to bring more craftsmen into the world of granite. We need to keep up with modernization and equipment. Lastly, education needs to be an ongoing priority with manufacturers and not seen as a luxury item.

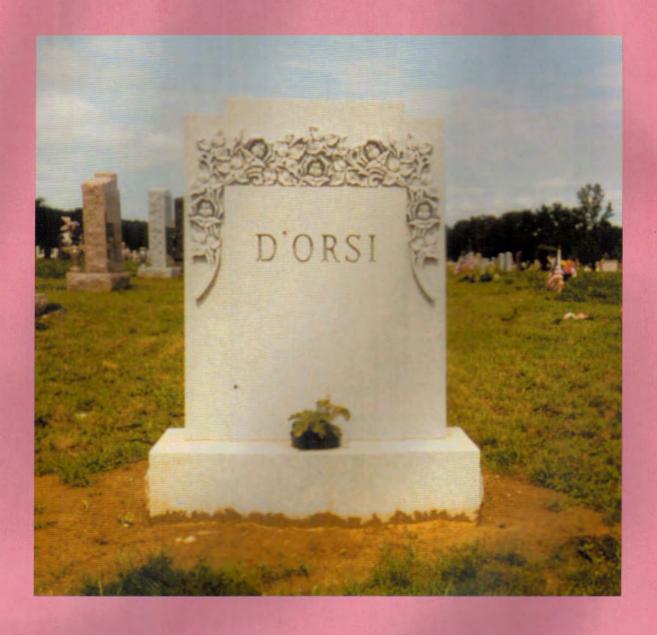

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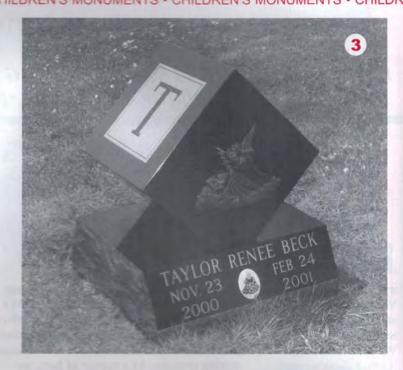

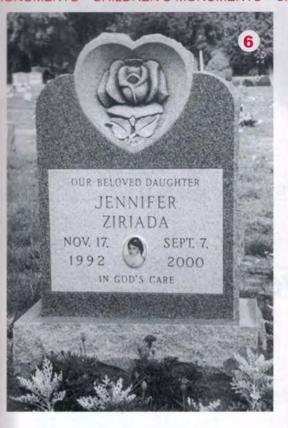

A replica of the Angel Memorial Monument in Salt Lake City, Utah was created by *Riverton Memorial*, *Inc.* and will be erected in John Bator Park in Easthampton, MA. The statue is based upon the novel "The Christmas Box" and tells the story of a woman who mourns the loss of her child at the base of an angel monument. Since the Salt Lake City angel was dedicated in 1994, thousands of people have left flowers, cards, and momentos at the foot of the statue in memory of their beloved children who have died. The Easthampton memorial hopes to recreate the same type of healing for area families. The idea for this version came out of a Compassionate Friends meeting where one of the attendees noted the comfort he derived from visiting the Utah memorial.

Filling A Letter/Number

n interesting twist to the new millenium was the unforseen problem of memorials having the first two digits of the deceased date "19__" but the year now is "20__." Maybe many folks didn't think they would be around to mark the turn of the century, but now thousands of monuments are having to be repaired to address this issue. In this edition of Tips and Tricks, we will show you how to fill a letter to prep it for re-sand-blasting.



Step 1. Find a small piece of stone similar to the one you are repairing. Ideally, you may be able to take a sample from some inconspicuous place on the memorial. Crush the stone into a loose powder using a clean hammer.



Step 2. Follow the directions on the epoxy can and mix the stone, epoxy, and hardener together in a disposable cup. Once blended, you will only have a limited amount of time to work.



Step 3. Pour it into the number/letter you need to fill.



Step 4. All air bubbles will need to be removed so poke the mixture into the hole making certain it is well packed and settled.

Points to keep in mind:

- a) This is a repair step, and not a brand new cut. It is an inexpensive and time efficient solution to replacing the whole stone.
- b) This method works best when the stone is removed from the grave site and brought into a shop for repair.
- The stone should be washed and thoroughly cleaned before beginning your repairs.
- d) Make certain that all the tools you will be using are clean. You do not want any residue such as rust or organic products mixed in with the stone and epoxy.
- e) Note: The epoxy MAY discolor with time. This will depend upon the type of epoxy you use and the environmental conditions the monument will experience. Again, this is an inexpensive alternative to replacing the stone, but not a perfect solution.



step 5. After the recommended setting time, test the area for hardness. It should be very firm and able to be chipped away like stone.



Step 6. From there remove any excess mixture from the stone until the area is flat.



Step 7. Blow away the dust. Your monument is now ready to be recut and sandblast.

A female perspective on a male dominated industry

ay back in 1979 when we published our first issue of *Barre Life*, our cover

story featured the women of the

granite industry. Twenty-two years later we are again taking a look at the fairer sex and the roles they play in a male dominated industry. Women can be found in most every level of operations, with a number of them owners or co-owners of their own manufacturing plants.

We chose five women for this story, Judee Chatot and Gwen (Bell) Plante were part of that very first story and are still active in the granite industry. Diane Cochran, Suzanne Begin, and Lee Ann Chaloux are all owners and operators of their respective companies.

Suzanne Begin

Secretary/Treasurer and Office Manager of Frank's Memorials. Started in 1984 in the office and with her sister Lee Ann, took the business over in 1993.

What do you see as some of the major changes/developments for women in this industry during your time in granite?



I have seen women bringing their talents and views of doing sandblasting and drafting. I have always felt that if a woman has the talent and the desire to do something then why shouldn't we do it?

Do you feel being a woman helps/hinders or doesn't affect your opportunities/advances in the granite industry?

At first, when I would go into the plant to order stock or check on orders, I would be stared at by the men in the plant. But after a while when I would come in and they realized I knew what I was talking about, I got their respect. After a while I would just come through like anyone else.

Other comments/thoughts?

I feel proud that my sister Lee Ann and I were able to take over a so called "man's world business" and have earned the respect of manufacturers and the dealers we work with.

Lee Ann Chaloux

President/Operator of Frank's Memorials. Started in 1985 in sandblast, and with her sister Suzanne, took the business over in 1993.

What do you see as some of the major changes/developments for women in this industry during your time in granite?

The presence of women in the granite industry is much more acceptable than in years past. My father hired me in 1986 to work in the sandblast department. I work hard, did my job well, and earned the respect of my co-workers so it was never an issue for me.

What are the top three issues you see facing the future of the granite industry and what needs to be done to address them? What would you like to see change/advance in the next 5/10 years?

1) Health care. More discussion is needed amongst all those involved in this industry to research and obtain a cost effective insurance company that will provide a good health care package. 2) Skilled labor. I feel we need to attract and teach the skill of this industry to individuals who will replace those retiring. 3) Competitive pricing. We need to have competitive pricing which allows a profit margin that's able to consume the rising cost of supplies and granite stock which is affecting a number of smaller businesses in this industry. I would like to see the above implemented in this industry over the next five years.

Other comments/thoughts?

I feel my presence in the sandblast dept. as being a

What do you see as some of the major changes/developments for women in this industry during your time in granite?

Computerization has dramatically changed the face of our industry. Employees and employers have become less gender biased, there are more single parent women in the workplace, and the attitude towards working women has changed as well, it is far more acceptable these days than in the past.

What are the top three issues you see facing the future of the granite industry and what needs to be done to address them? What would you like to see change/advance in the next 5/10 years?

1) The influx of imports, 2) the shrinking skilled labor market (manual drafting, hand craft work, etc.),

 the need for more educational programs to retain our artistic skills versus becoming more reliant on auto-

mated techniques.

Co-owner of Cochran's Inc. Joined husband Sherm in 1981 and assists in the operation of the company, design of new products, and creation of numerous marketing and advertising materials.

Vhat do you see as some of the major changes/developments or women in this industry during your time in granite?

Some women are granite salespeople, draftspeople,

and customer service representatives. I think women are taking more leadership roles. Many are co-owners of granite businesses. They are serving on many committees relating to the industry. Within the last decade, several women served as president of the MBNA.

What are the top three issues you see facing the future of the granite industry and what needs to be done to address them? What would you like to see change/advance in the next 5/10 years?

The world is changing and the granite industry needs to keep pace with it. The last twenty years have brought a number of changes to our industry. We need to maintain our level of production, without sacrificing quality and craftsmenship. We need to maintain trained employees, or be able to re-train employees for new positions that will be created in the next decade. And, we also need to contain operating costs, so that our granite products aren't overpriced. With utility and oil prices getting higher, I'd like to see wind or solar-powered granite plants in the near future!

What do you see as some of the major changes/developments for women in this industry during your time in granite

At the time when I started my drafting career, there was only a handful of women doing this job. More and more women have entered the profession, hand etching has also become a great career for women.

What are the top three issues you see facing the future of the granite industry and what needs to be done to address them? What would you like to see change/advance in the next 5/10 years?

1) Escalating operating costs, 2) Affordable health care, 3) Influx of low cost imports, 4) Lack of skilled labor knowledgeable in art and design basics.

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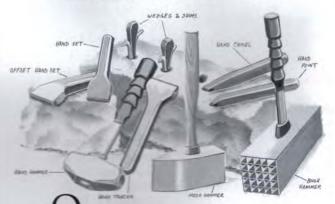
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
