Extension Update — July 2014

What's been happening in the Master Gardener's corner at the UW-Extension? Last month at the Master Gardener meeting I told you about the 'Crazy Worm'. That is just one of the issues dogging us this spring and summer. There have been a lot of inquiries about dead or dying trees and shrubs, especially conifers and fruit trees. Yews and boxwood are looking as though they have been painted brown on the top half. Juniper, pines and spruce have dead branches. Some of these might recover but pruning them out may be necessary. Fruit trees are leafing out, then some of the branches die back or half of the tree. Numerous branch and leaf samples have been sent to Madison for analysis and for the most part few diseases or pests are found. It appears to be a factor of the 2012-13 droughts and the 2014 winter. A number of tomato/Solanaceae problems are coming in, wilting, yellowing leaves and die back. One bacterial canker was found but no blight has been confirmed in Portage County or for that matter even in Wisconsin as of July 8. The closest late blight to be confirmed is in northern Indiana. Conditions are ripe for blight to appear.

Some interesting insects have crawled across my desk. Last week someone called saying they had a purple lady beetle. It turns out to be either a 'Fifteen-spotted lady beetle' or an 'Eyespotted lady beetle'. Earlier this year a Japanese beetle look-alike came in; that was a 'Sand chafer'. They are not too damaging to plants.

Numerous weed and flower I.D.s (Black medic, Yellow woodsorrel, Curly dock, Swamp milkweed and an Ozark sundrop to name a few) came in and the question of should they be pulled or not or how to get them out of the lawn.

Responsibilities of a UW-Extension Master Gardener Volunteer

- 1. To represent the University of Wisconsin- Extension in a professional manner.
- 2. To accept only realistic assignments.
- 3. To be acquainted with County Extension Office procedures, Extension publications and personnel.
- 4. To respect confidences and clientele information.
- 5. To remain calm and courteous at all times.
- 6. To follow guidelines outlined by the Wisconsin MG Program and/or the local UW-Extension agent, and adhere to the behavior policies in the Volunteer Agreement.
- 7. To know your limitations; to be able to say "I don't know"; to admit you can't provide everything to everyone. Appropriately refer complex calls to Extension educators.
- 8. To acquire and retain the knowledge, and to become familiar with the resources necessary to accomplish the assigned tasks.
- 9. To follow through on commitments.
- 10. To provide unbiased, research-based information from the University of Wisconsin, other Land Grant institutions, or the United States Department of Agriculture.
- 11. To ensure that Master Gardener programs and outreach efforts do not discriminate on the basis of any of the legally prohibited categories of discrimination, based on Civil Rights laws. These categories include: race, color, gender/sex, creed, disability, religion, national origin, ancestry, age, sexual orientation, pregnancy, marital or parental status, arrest or conviction record, or membership in the national guard, state defense force or any other reserve component of the military service.
- 12. To follow published University of Wisconsin-Extension recommendations.
- 13. To refer all commercial horticulture calls to the respective Extension Agent.
- 14. To always use tact and to give constructive advice; never be disparaging Of opinions or procedures.

August Garden Guide

- Mulch dahlias to conserve moisture and eliminate weeds.
- Stake plants with heavy blooms.
- Order spring-flowering bulbs for fall planting.
- Keep phlox plants deadheaded. Never let phlox go to seed if you want to keep colors true.
- Start seeds of Daisy, Coreopsis, Sweet William and Pansy in peat pots or nursery beds. Transfer to permanent beds in late September or early October.
- Cut gladiolus blooms leaving maximum amount of foliage on plants.
- Transplant and divide iris and day lily.
- Watch for red spider mites on phlox.
- In mid-month, take cuttings of coleus, geraniums and other plants for winter houseplants.
- Plant chrysanthemums for fall color. Fall planted chrysanthemums need extra winter protection.
- Plant Madonna lily and Japanese and Siberian iris.
- Continue watering flowerbeds at least once a week during dry periods.
- Plant or transplant oriental poppies. Do not mulch, as they prefer hot, sun-baked ground.
- Bring poinsettias indoors.



- By the end of the month, start withholding water from amaryllis.
 Amaryllis requires an eight-week period of drought to bloom.
 Place in cool basement for three-month rest.
- Sow cover crops in vegetable garden areas not in use.
- Cut and dry or freeze herbs. Pick herbs just before blossoms open for best flavor.
- Inspect corn regularly. Corn pests become abundant in mid-August.
- Keep eggplant and peppers picked so younger fruit develops.
- Plant late crops of radishes, lettuce, spinach and beets.
- Mid-August to mid-September is the best time to establish grass seed. Keep soil moist at all times or seed will dry and die
- Plant evergreens now through mid-September so they are well established before winter.
- Remove thatch from lawn if more than one-half inch thick.
- Tip layer black and purple raspberries for replacement.
- Fertilize strawberries with 10-10-10 fertilizer applied at 2-3 pounds per 100 square feet. Thin plants if needed.
- Maintain lime-sulfur spray program on tree fruit to control apple and pear scab and certain other diseases.
- Collect and bury diseased, mummified plums for future brownrot control.
