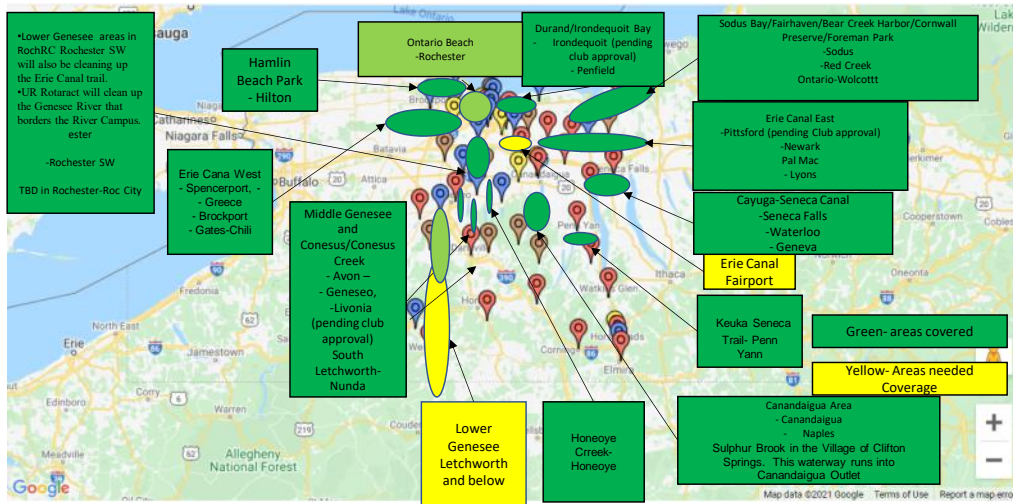

Rotary: Open for Business?

Many Rotary clubs are transitioning from pandemic Zoom to recovery “in person,” or at least hybrid, meetings. Questions remain. What is safe? What is responsible? What is fair to all concerned?

Who among us Rotarians would want to be responsible for transmitting CoVid-19 to another person? Imagine the consequences if a Rotary meeting or event proved to be the epicenter of disease transmission in a community.

Heed the warnings! Don't defy the health advisories! Those over 65 years old and those with diabetes, obesity, respiratory disease, and immune conditions are at increased risk. Masks and hand sanitizer work.

MASKS should cover both your mouth and your nose completely and fit snugly enough over your nose, around your cheeks, and under your chin so that the front of the mask sucks in toward you when you inhale. Adjust your mask before the meeting and then leave it alone! If you are not comfortable with this, if you feel claustrophobic, if you have that “I can't breathe” feeling with a mask on, then stay home and practice with it on! You will adapt. If your mask keeps slipping out of position, you've got the wrong mask. Do not remove your mask when speaking. Just project your voice more loudly. Do not remove your masks for pictures. Smile with your eyes!

HAND SANITIZER should be readily available at any meeting. Use it before and after touching any common use items at a meeting: tabletops, laptops, keyboards, hand-held microphones, podiums, money, and ticket stubs. These fomites can carry infectious particles for a short period of time. Resist touching your face.

MICROPHONES on a stand are better than the hand-held versions. Project your voice loudly and keep the microphone from contacting your mask.

SOCIAL DISTANCE of at least 6 feet radius is important, excepting your family. Your family is your household. Your third cousin, once removed, is not family; nor is your daughter-in-law or your nephew, unless you live in the same household.

Stay safe, Rotarians. Live to serve another day!

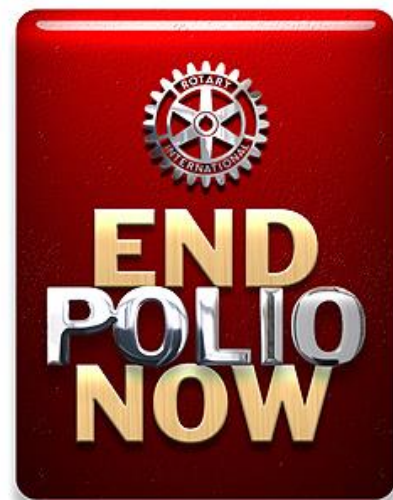
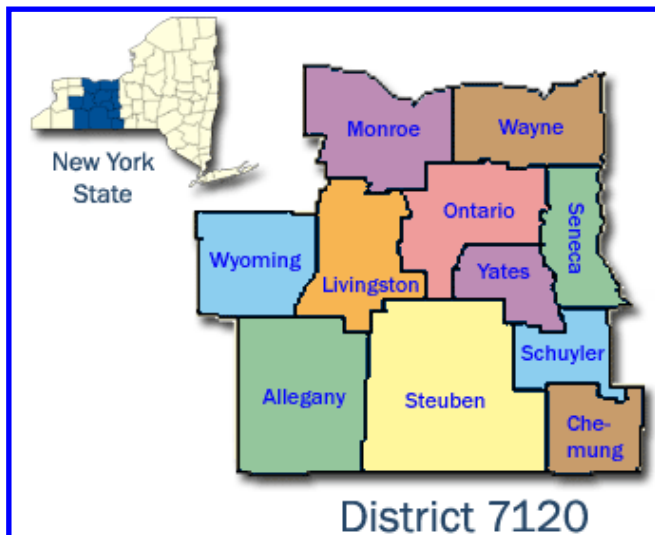
Chris Edgar, Executive Director Literacy Volunteers of Wayne County will be the speaker.

ROTARY DISTRICT 7120 SECURES

\$24,585 DISASTER GRANT

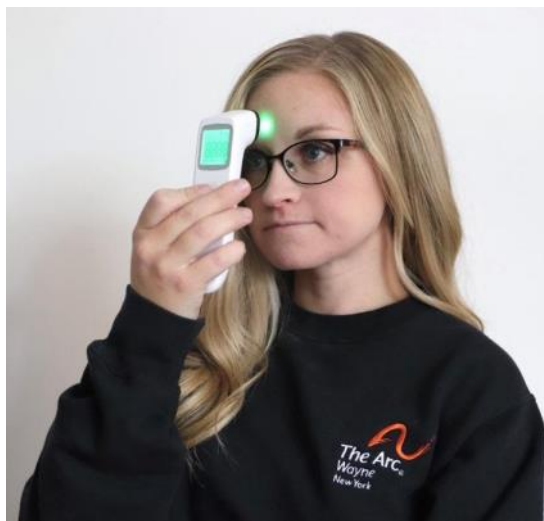


Rotary District 7120 has secured a Disaster Relief Grant of \$24,585 from The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International, as part of its worldwide response to humanitarian needs during the CoVid-19 pandemic. This grant request was initiated by Bath Rotarian Mike Slovak and Bloomfield Rotarian Ralph Brandt with special assistance from Canandaigua Rotarian Janet Tenreiro for the benefit of the ARC's in the 11 counties of Rotary District 7120.



The ARC's of Chemung-Schuyler, Genesee-Orleans, Livingston-Wyoming, Monroe, Seneca-Cayuga-Yates, Steuben, and Wayne shared equally in the proceeds, which are being used for gloves, masks, disinfectant wipes, gowns, and sanitizer. The ARC's serve 8,000 clients in 115 group homes with a staff of 3,000 employees. Many of the clients are among those at high risk for contracting CoVid-19 and experiencing complications.

There are over 2,200 Rotarians in 66 clubs in the 11 counties of District 7120. They contribute over \$250,000 annually to The Rotary Foundation, much of which is returned to the district for community projects. The foundation also supports global grants and the eradication of Polio. More information is available at Rotary7120.org



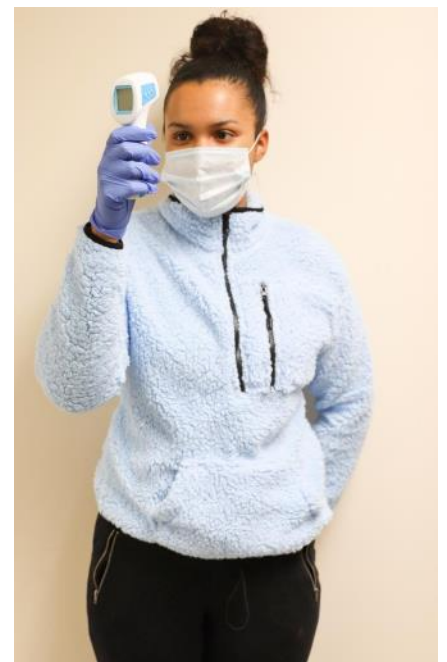

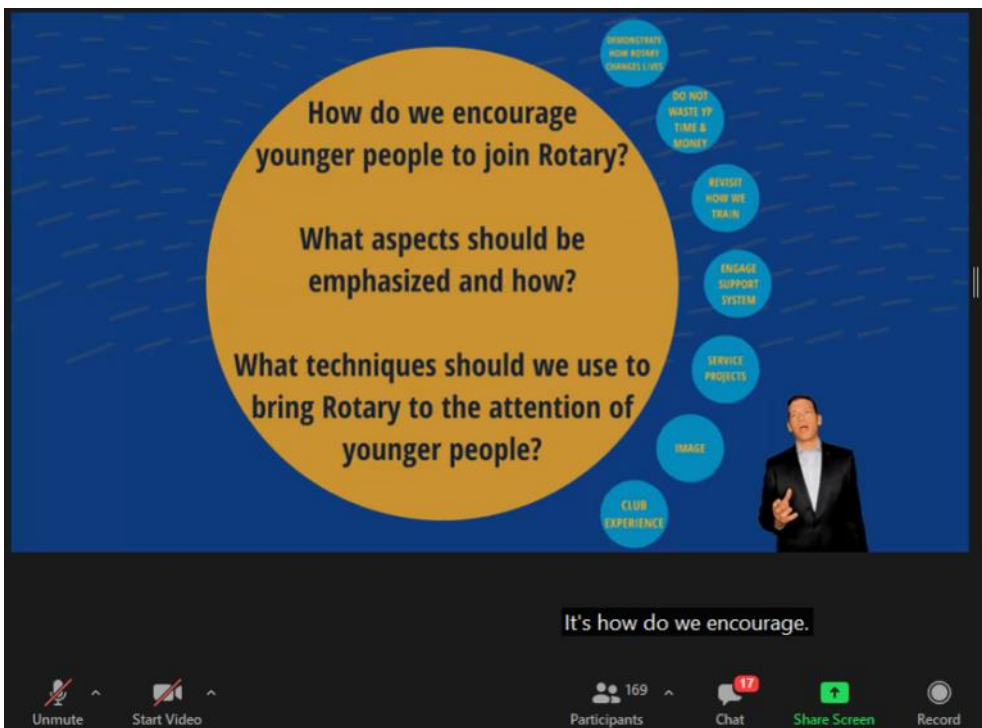
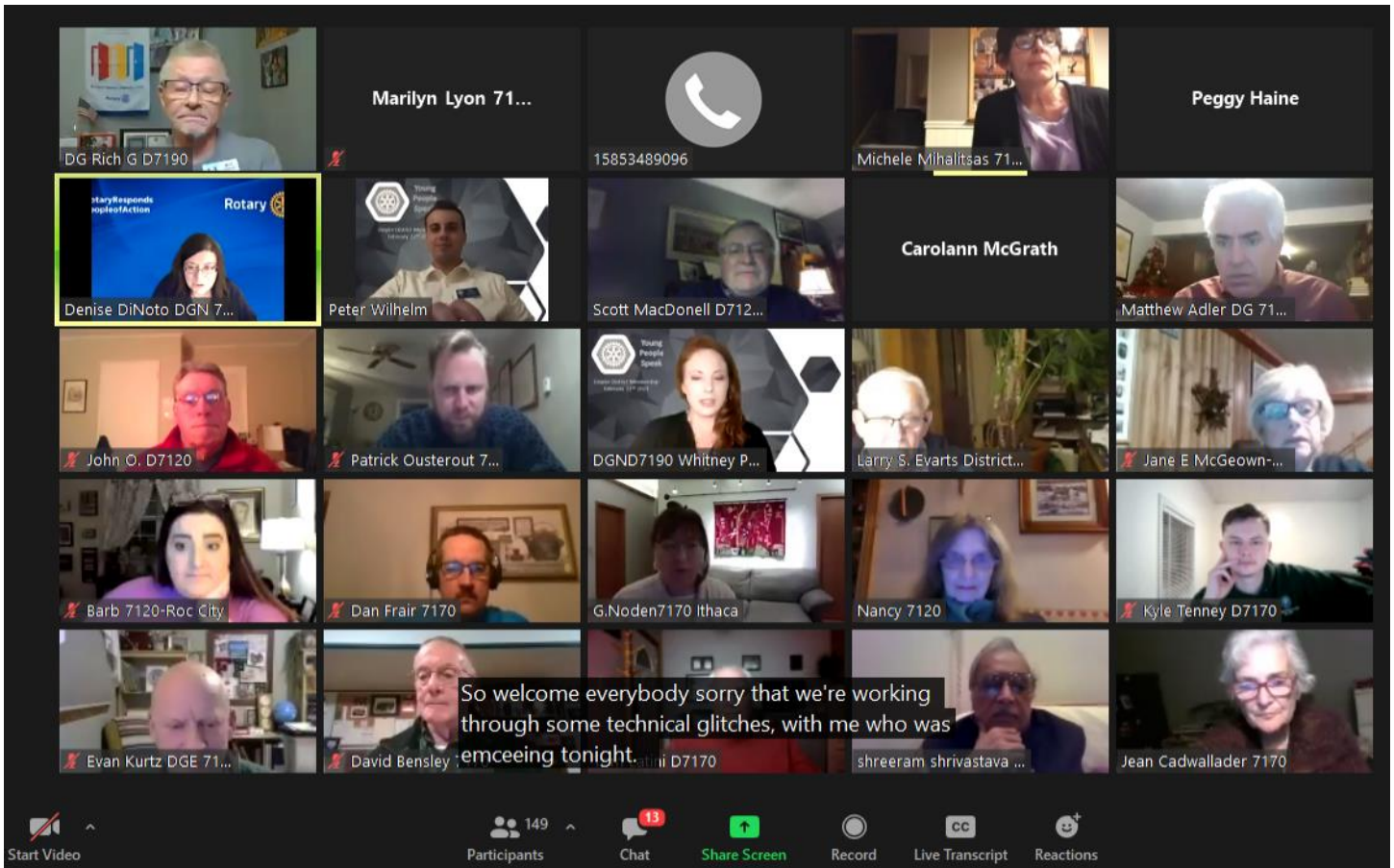

Each Paul Harris Fellow receives a commemorative certificate, a Paul Harris Fellow pin, and a medallion. Reed will be presented with the award in person by the Corning Rotary Club at a future date.

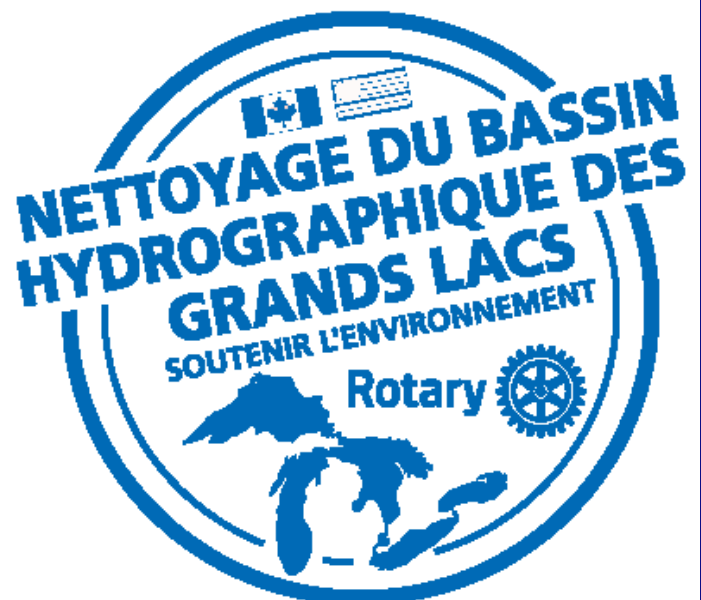

ROTARY GRANT SUPPORTS

SERENITY HOUSE

The **Victor – Farmington Rotary Club** recently provided much-needed financial support for the Serenity House hospice in Victor. The support came in the form of a Rotary District Grant totaling \$3,888.00 that enabled Serenity House to replace two aging hot water heaters with two new 50-gallon units.

The Serenity House is in a ranch-style home on four acres of land on Brace Road adjacent to the Victor Municipal Park. It opened its doors in 1999 and since that time has served over 400 patients and their families. It is a United Way agency and is supported by generous contributions from the local community. Kayko Jarmusz is the Director of Serenity House and she worked with the V – F Rotary to secure the funding.

The new system will allow the hospice facility to continue to provide an uninterrupted hot water supply for the terminally ill residents and their visiting families as well as the team of fully trained volunteers and on-call medical professionals that are staffed at the house.

Anne Heiligman, who talked to us about the Jack Foundation. This program, which partners with groups such as Kiwanis, was begun in 2016. There is probably no heartbreak greater (for parents) than losing a child. This is where the story of Anne, and her husband A.J., began when they lost their 3-year-old son, Jack, in a tragic accident. Though so devastated by this loss, they knew they needed to move forward. They were surrounded and embraced by the community, and they wanted to give back to the community by doing something special to keep Jack's memory alive.

They decided to build playgrounds which would reflect two of Jack's loves, the color blue and dinosaurs. "We just dove in, and turned a situation into a positive," noted Anne, as she added that \$400,000 was raised in two years through various fund-raising activities. Examples of how they gained momentum were by setting up blood drives, collecting canned goods, creating "blessing bags" for the homeless, and making fleece blankets for the children at Golisano Children's Hospital. Anne reported that people just continued to donate toward this cause.

The first playground, which is 8000 square feet, is located in Penfield, and it has a dinosaur theme, of course. The second playground in Webster is 10,000 square feet, and it has similar features to the one in Penfield. The playground also has educational aspects, such as a Sign Language Area, and a Little Library! Anne's husband, A.J. works in the construction field, and has had a fundamental role in the building of the playgrounds. Anne reported that they're getting response and help from the kids, and this is helping them to be caring and giving also. Anne talked about "Kindness Cards" which is another way to support the Jack Foundation. Please contact Naples Rotary if you would like Anne to share her story with your club. 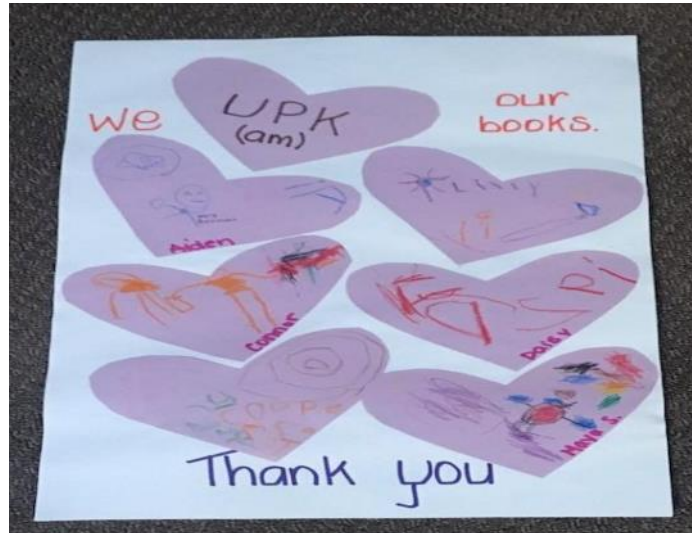


Honeoye Lake Rotary's "GIFT BOOK A MONTH" PROGRAM

ROTARY PROGRAM ON LOCAL KOA CAMPGROUND

The Victor – Farmington Rotary Club traditionally strives to have interesting speakers address the club as part of their weekly club meeting. At times, individual club members will be the principal speaker for the meeting and discuss their professional career and life experiences.

Rotarian Victor Arsenault, the owner/operator of the KOA Campground in Farmington, recently discussed his career and the development of his business. He had moved to the local area over twenty years ago after retiring. Victor had retired after a professional career with the Boy Scouts of America. Victor and his wife, Kathy, purchased the campgrounds and commenced a new career. Their son, Jonathan, has since joined them in developing the campground's facilities to meet a growing public demand.

Victor traced the history of privately owned campgrounds in the US. As the American public became increasingly mobile and began to take to the road to explore the scenic opportunities available by visiting the US National Park system there was an increasing demand for additional camping facilities. There also was a demand for more amenities at camp sites. The demand outstripped the resources of public campsites. A new generation of campers were looking for modern amenities including the availability of water and electric hook ups, Internet availability, recreational areas, swimming pools, and space for larger campers and motor homes.

In the 1950s, President Eisenhower's push for a modern interstate highway system accelerated the ability of American campers to travel to distant US parks. At the same time, the older practice of campers looking for a site to pitch a tent began to be replaced by campers and motorhome owners looking for a site to camp.

Over the past two decades the Arsenault family has kept pace with the new demand and has greatly increased the range and scope of services provided by their KOA campground. Victor, as a franchise owner, is proud of their relationship with KOA, the world's largest system of privately held campgrounds. KOA now has almost 500 locations across the United States and Canada. It was founded in 1962 and is based in Billings, Montana.

Victor shared his many experiences in developing the campground that is now a familiar part of the local landscape. He advised that last year was their "best year ever" with over 7,000 campers utilizing their facilities.

Drawing on his own personal belief, and the Rotary goal of a strong sense of business and professional ethics by Rotarians, he closed his presentation by reminding club members, "Never lose sight of the basics – the most valuable commodity you have is trust."

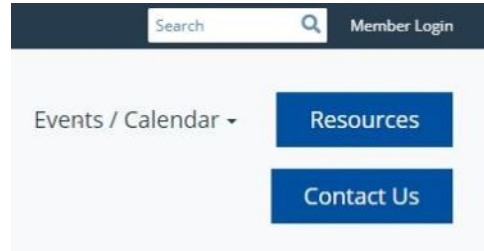

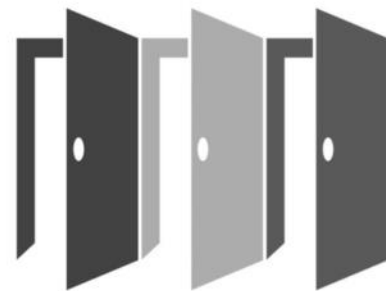
