CONCRETE FOR FINCE POST. Concrete fencepost liave ber tisted by the Governent and by several state agricaltural col leges, and have been found to be more economical and moresub stantial than wooden posts, bulletin has just been issued by the Department of Agriculture showing the different ways c iv erete may be usad on the farm and prationlarly descuibing the method of making fence posts.

In the first cost, the bulletin says, concrete poels may more or less exprasive than the Leality. Butaftert'ree yearso service woolen posts poses on ly from one thiro to one half of their original strengith, whereas concrete grows stranger with needs no repairs, for neither weather nor fite mjures it. Under ordinary circumstar:ces good concrete posis will las forever
Molds made of 2-inch planks are recommended as formins neater posts than the lighter Iumber. The re-onforcement if posts that are suliject to mote than ordinary side pressure or strain, is recommended. Th. proportion of ingredionts recommended by the department is, in case of unscreened bank-sun gravel, one part of cement to four parts of graval. For crush ed rock or ecreened gravel the emicrete should be twed in the proportion of one part cement, two parts sand and four parts of rock or gravel. Enongh wates shontd be used so the coneretr will $q$ tiver under a blow fron the shovel. A rodthree-sisteenth of an inch in diameter shontd be used as a center for the post
The best method for attaching the fence wire to the posts is to encircle the post with a wire cne slze less than the corresponding wire in the fence proper, and to twist this wire aronid the fonee wire.
Triangular posts hivit been found to be cheaper thuremuare ones. The cost of malerial ond labor in a triangular post th well as matorial is lesk thatif square one of the same length —Ex.
