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Summer Travels


This summer I attended one Fibre Art show, and two Quilt Shows, not counting ours. I'll highlight each below.

Belleville Public Library, John M. Parrott Gallery, July 2012



In early July, Joan Legros and I went to Belleville to see a show of fibre art. Here we Saw "20/20: Twenty Canadian Fibre Artists Imitating Canadian Art", that is "The Laurentian Foothills" - 20 fibre panels 12" x 12".

If you check out the picture to the left, you'll see they divided the painting, "The Laurentian Foothills" into 20 sections, and each of 20 Fibre Artists made a 12"x12" block of the section they were given. No one knew what the final picture looked like until they put their finished pieces together. It was just like the piece that Nelly did with her friends in the Netherlands.



In an adjacent room, a second show, "Synthesis II", was a travelling exhibition featuring the fibre-based work of the Canadian members of SAQA. (The Studio Art Quilt Association). These were the same 20 fibre artists that made the 12"x12" blocks above. Several of the artists are from the Kingston area: Bethany Garner, Sandra Garner, Robin Laws Field, Margaret Morris, Shirley White. Others included Ann Bird, Elaine Quehl, Cathy Breedyk Law from the Kanata and Ottawa region and still others were from across Canada. Some of the pieces used a traditional block as background with a non-tradition motif appliquéd on top. It was a fun show to see the different techniques that are being used today – from dyed and painted pieces to silk fusion with embroidery and stump

work, and free motion quilting with machine and hand quilting. The full gambit could be seen.



Brockville was our next show in July. They had everything from traditional to art quilts in their new venue, the Brockville Memorial Civic Centre. My favourite quilt was "California *Lily*", a quilt from 2002 made by Patty Latourelle, pictured to the left. Of course, the hand quilting really caught my eye. There were many, many quilts that were machine quilted.

Dianne Fyn made "Wild Girl", a design by Toni Whitney, shown above and to the right.





And then there were lots of fun quilts, like "Appliqué Group Round Robin 2010-2011" by Tammy Spencer and her friends. The tag on this quilt said: "Tammy pieced the centre block, inspired by an image by Dan DiPaolo. The first round with 9-patch blocks and appliquéd by Lammy Shapelhouman. Lammy wrote that my lady looked sad so she did birds to sing to her. Second round – purple and gold triangles by Jeannette Catchpaugh. Third round – green and fold half square triangles by Darlene Nelson. Final round crazy patch corners and appliqué words by Diane Fyn. Most crazy patch embroidery was also done by Diane. Each crazy patch corner in centre of quilt has the initials of the ladies who worked on the quilt."

A very enjoyable Show. Hope you got to see it!

Prince Edward County Quilters Guild Quilt Show in Wellington

Next was the Prince Edward County Quilters' Guild Show which was also in a new venue, the Wellington new



arena. There were lots of quilts, mostly machine quilted, with many hand quilted too. And there were even more wall hangings. One lady had about

30-35 Japanese wall hangings in the show (not hand quilted). My favourite quilt was "*My Blue Hawaii*" made by Vicki Lafleur shown to the left. It is 61"x 61" and is needle turned appliqué and hand quilted.

Another favourite was "*Tennesse Waltz*" made by Shirley White. It was a black and white challenge

project with a group of Shirley's friends known as "The Trippers". It is 48"W x 65"L and is machine quilted.

I could go on, but I'm running out of space. So I'll end here by saying:

All of these shows were wonderful and fun to go to. But, I have to say, as I did at my first Festival of Quilts Show, our Quilts Kingston was a step above. Maybe I'm biased, as I was so involved. But others said the same to me. Our shows continue to be great. I hope this continues as we raise the bar.



I hope you were able to take in some of these shows and a few that I missed.
