Comment: What is Kuring Gai LAC doing in the local areas to win the war on drugs?

Reply by Kuring Gai LAC - NSW Police: Provide education to young school students at schools and encouraging the community to report information or sus behaviour. It is the community who see these things long before police do, see something say something.

17 November: Anti Social behaviour, how you can help stamp it out.

Anti social behaviour is a term Hornsby police hear a lot. It is also something the community could do without. Those who live near or use parks and ovals all over our LAC can do their bit to stamp it out. In one particular park, **Robert Pymble**Park, it has become a bit of a problem. The park, off Alma street, Pymble, has tennis courts with a day use shelter and other park facilities for all users. The park in recent weeks has become a hangout for youths and older teens who have damaged seats, broken into storage sheds and graffiti-tagged everything in sight. The discarded alcohol containers and rubbish is the end result of their partying, it has become a bit worse probably due to school winding up for the seniors. The locals and park users are fed up and want their parks and oval back, clean and fit to use. Hornsby police are now working with Ku-ring-gai Council to try and address the situation but need the local community to help.

You can report suspicious behaviour such as, loud unruly voices that are heard. Car loads of youths suddenly converging on the area. noises that sound like something breaking or smashing. Finding evidence of their antics like alcohol containers, drug use items and rubbish left behind. You can report these anonymously by calling **Crime Stoppers 1800 333 000**, or calling the **Hornsby police station 9476 9799** preferably as it is occurring. Any information given is treated with confidentiality and your identity stays with police only.

Parents: It is worthy to note, older youths or young adults can and do bring alcohol to these gatherings. They supply this to younger teens which is illegal. They drive there, drink alcohol then drive away, sometimes with your kids in the car or drive past you as you are driving home with your family inside your own car, Drug use; do you know who your kids are hanging out with? Do you know, or need to know

what their new friends are like or are up to? Would your kids succumb to peer pressure and take drugs or binge drink? Now is the time to talk to your kids about these issues and that respect talk you may have been putting off.

Remember: Anti-social behaviour is not acceptable behaviour, The police and all Councils need your help to stop it, so take control of your community and report it. Not reporting it, is condoning it.

16 November: Police are appealing for information after a man allegedly committed an act of indecency at Turramurra.

About 8.30am yesterday (Saturday 15 November 2014), two ten-year-old girls attended a park near the Comenarra Parkway with their parents. The two girls went to play near cricket nets at the park, where they allegedly saw an unknown man performing an indecent act. The pair ran from the location and informed their parents, before the man fled the scene. Officers attached to Kuring Gai Local Area Command were contacted and launched an investigation into the incident. They conducted an extensive search of the surrounding area; however the man was not found. Police are continuing their investigations into the incident and would now like to speak to a man who may be able to assist with their inquiries.

The man is described as being of Caucasian appearance, about 40-50 years of age, around 178cm tall, with short brown hair, a beard and of a large build. He was last seen wearing a navy blue shirt and dark-coloured pants. Anyone who knows the man's identity or has any information that could assist police is urged to come forward.

13 November: Police are looking for a man following the spate of armed robberies on supermarkets and bottle shops across Sydney over the last two months.

About 2:15pm today, (Wednesday 12 November 2014), a man with his face covered entered the store on Warringah Road, and threatened the male shopkeeper with a knife. He was handed cash and was last seen running towards the Roseville pedestrian bridge near Arthur Street. Police from Northern Beaches and North Shore Local Area Command attended the scene and conducted a search of the area but were unable to locate the man. A crime scene was established at the store and examined by forensic officers.

Detectives from the Metropolitan Robbery Unit are investigating the robbery and believe it is linked to robberies on supermarkets in Rydalmere, Meadowbank and Guildford; as well as the robbery of a bottle shop at **Lindfield**. Police have established Strike Force Urandangie to investigate the robberies and have released a closed-circuit television image of a man who they would like to speak to.



The man depicted in the image is described as being aged in his 20s with an olive complexion, a thin build, short brown hair and wearing a blue hooded jumper and carrying a black backpack. Police have also released an image of an early 1990 model grey-coloured Holden Commodore sedan believed to be used during the robberies. Anyone with information about the robberies or the identity of the man depicted in the image is asked to contact Crime Stoppers.

• A supermarket on Victoria Road, Rydalmere on Monday 27 October 2014, • A supermarket on Bay Drive, Meadowbank on Thursday 30 October 2014, • A supermarket on Woodville Road, Guildford on Tuesday 4 November 2014, • A bottle shop on Moore Avenue, Lindfield on Tuesday 11 November 2014, and;

• A bottle shop on Warringah Road, Forestville today (Wednesday 12 November 2014).



13 November, Issued on behalf of <u>Victoria Police</u> - Have you seen Abdul Nassir?

Police in Victoria continue to investigate the disapparance of a man in his 60s who went missing on a trip to Sydney in 1998. Abdul Nassir, 68, was going through a marriage separation and told his wife he was going to Sydney for a few days to relax on 20 April 1998. That night the Greenvale man caught a Sydney bound train from the former Spencer Street Railway Station, now Southern Cross Station. The following day he contacted his wife to let her know he had arrived and was looking for a hotel.

This was the last time Abdul's family heard from him. He was reported him missing to police in Broadmeadows on 4 May 1998. Abdul may have been spoken to by police around railway stations in New South Wales in 2007 and 2008 however follow up enquiries revealed the addresses provided by the person were false. Police have checked Abdul's bank accounts which have not been touched and enquiries with other government agencies have proved fruitless. Investigators do not believe Abdul's disappearnace is suspicious and believe Abdul may be residing in New South Wales or Queensland.

Investigators have released a photo of Abdul from 1998 and a FACE image of what they believe he may possibly look like now.

12 November: Kuring gai LAC is issuing a warning to females who carry and use handbags.

Ladies, particularly those a little older, please make sure you know exactly where your handbag is at all times. It is advised to physically hold your bag at all times when in public (never in a shopping trolley). Make sure it is zipped up so the contents can't be lifted (stolen). Hornsby police have taken reports recently where a few female victims have had purses or wallets taken from a handbag that was unzipped or unclipped. To a thief the sight of a purse sticking out of the bag is just too enticing to pass up. They will stalk their prey for that opportune moment, or

they create a distraction and pounce. After the purse is taken the credit and debit cards are used to commit frauds. So please tell all your friends and relatives to be aware, but not alarmed.

12 November, from neighbouring Northern Beaches command: P plater hides passengers in the boot.....

An Avalon man might get the Royal Order of the Boot from a magistrate after he was charged with drink driving and with being a P-plater with more than one passenger under 21 in the car between 11pm and 5am. As well as having one man in the passenger seat, another man was lying on the floor in the back of the car, and a man and a woman were lying in the car's boot. Police were told a young man was driving erratically in Avalon early Wednesday morning and spotted the car in George St at 1am. The Avalon man, 18, returned a blood-alcohol reading of .034 and was charged with special-range drink driving. Further charges are pending in relation to the number of people in the car and the fact that three of them were not restrained by seat belts.

11 November, from neighbouring Northern Beaches command: BEACH THIEVES AT WORK ON THE NORTHERN BEACHES.....

Off to the beach??? If so don't be a victim of beach theft. The Northern Beaches Local Area Command has received a number of reports of beach theft over the weekend. These have occurred at from Manly to Palm Beach. The weather is getting hotter now and the beaches are starting to get busy for both beach goers and thieves. A few tips to take note of:

- *Do not take valuables to the beach
- *If in a group always have a friend stay and mind your property
- *Do not leave car keys under the wheel arch of your car
- *If lockers are available for hire use them
- *Always know where you have left your property
- *Leave any belongings that you don't need locked away in your vehicle

11 November: Incident: Mail theft and fraud.

Time/Date: Between 9pm and 5pm Thursday 6th

Place: Pacific Highway, Hornsby.

Details: A unit owner (victim) has noticed his mail box had been broken into and some mail possibly taken. Later that night the owner received a phone call from male person purporting to be from his mobile provider. The victim was asked to clarify his personal details, which he did. Thinking nothing of the call, soon after the victim noticed he had no mobile reception, on checking with his provider it appears the victim was †scammed'. By confirming his details the victim inadvertently gave the mail thief access to his accounts. The victim has changed security on several accounts but there are concerns other accounts may be at risk.

Warning, please never give out your personal details to someone you don't know. If you receive a call from someone asking to confirm details about you, don't under any circumstance give any information out. If you believe you have been a victim of this type of scam, report it to police and any businesses or providers accounts you believe are at risk.

11 November: Incident: Lost bushwalkers.

Time/Date: About 2pm Saturday 8th

Place: Kuring gai Wild gardens St Ives.

Details: Two bush walkers aged 39 and 48 entered the walking track for a planned walk. They had a GPS unit with them but only a small amount of water. After about 3km down steep tracks they realised their water supply was low and they were having a bit of difficulty. Emergency services were called and attended, with the aid of the Kuring gai Wild flower staff the two walkers were located and after a quick health check were walked out of the bush.

Tips, such as: At the very least, we advise that you carry:

- 1. matches
- 2. topographic map(s)
- 3. a compass
- 4. a space blanket
- 5. a first aid kit
- 6. raincoats for everyone in the group
- 7. plenty of water

Think before you TREK promotes the benefits of planning ahead for your bushwalking trip by using an easy to remember acronym:

- **T** Take adequate supplies of food, water, navigation and first aid equipment.
- **R** Register your planned route and tell friends and family when you expect to return.
- **E** Emergency beacon (PLB's) are available FREE of charge from NSW Police Force and NPWS.
- **K** Keep to your planned route and follow the map and walking trails.

Details: A home owner had left a kayak on a rack inside a car port at the family home. During the above times it was stolen. The kayak was valued at \$1,000.

Incident: Stolen push bike

Time/Date: Between 6pm Friday 7th and 7am Monday 10th

Place: Kissing Point Road, Turramurra.

Details: A pushbike valued at \$2,200 was stolen from the car port of a home in

Kissing Point Road. It is unclear if the bike was locked or not.

Incident: Stolen motor vehicle

Time/Date: Between 12midnight and 5.45am Saturday 8th

Place: Bundarra Avenue, Wahroonga

Details: A White Subaru Imprezza was parked on the street. During the early hours

of Saturday it was stolen.

Incident: Stolen hot water system

Time/Date: Between Thursday 6th and Sunday 9th

Place: Ayres Road, St Ives.

Details: A hot water system was installed next to a house in Ayres road, an unknown person has stolen the unit as well as the copper pipe work to the house.

The total value is estimated to be \$2,000.

Incident: Stolen mobile phone.

Time/Date: About 4.45pm Sunday 9th

Place: Phone store within Westfield Hornsby.

Details: A phone retailer had multiple phones on a display stand, these phones were secured with an alarm system. About 4.45pm and alarm activated and it was

found a Sony Xpiria was missing, it had a retail value of \$960.

11 November: Police believe new details about the number plate of an alleged getaway car may hold the clue to a recent spate of armed robberies across Sydney.

On Friday 24 October 2014, police released vision and images in relation to 15 armed robberies and attempted robberies in recent months. Since the initial appeal, detectives have received calls from members of the public to report additional details. Of particular note, they believe the Kia Carnival Van that was possibly involved in the incidents, has black and gold number plates and the first digit was "B". Anyone with further information on the vehicle or incidents is urged to contact **Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000**.

Between Sunday 24 August and Tuesday 21 October 2014, a series of armed robberies was committed upon newsagencies, service stations, liquor stores and hotels across Sydney. During some of the incidents, two men entered the premises armed with a pistol and demanded cash from employees before fleeing the scene. Officers attached to the Metropolitan Robbery Unit established Strike Force Tuft to investigate the 15 armed robberies and believe they may be linked. Investigators previously released CCTV images of two men who they believe may be able to assist with their inquiries; as well as an image of a vehicle believed to be similar in appearance to the one used during the incidents.





One man depicted in the images is described as being of Pacific Islander/Maori appearance, about 175cm tall with a medium build and wearing high visibility clothing. The second man is described as being of Pacific Islander/Maori appearance, about 180cm tall with a medium/solid build.

- a club at Eastwood on Saturday 30 August 2014,
- a hotel at Fairfield on Monday 1 September 2014,
- The attempted robbery of a hotel at Allawah on Sunday 7 September 2014,
- a hotel at Ashfield on Sunday 7 September 2014,
- a hotel at Villawood on Thursday 9 September 2014,
- a hotel at Warwick Farm on Monday 13 October 2014,
- a hotel at Merrylands on Wednesday 15 October 2014,
- a hotel at Summer Hill on Saturday 18 October 2014,
- a hotel at Greenfield Park on Monday 20 October 2014,
- a hotel at Waitara on Monday 20 October 2014, and;
- a hotel at Smithfield on Wednesday 22 October, 2014

10 November: Five people have been charged following a three-month investigation into an alleged home invasion and kidnapping at Hornsby earlier in the year.

Strike Force Norwin was established by Kuring-Gai detectives to investigate the

alleged kidnapping and serious assault of a 21-year-old man at a house in Hornsby on Sunday 24 August 2014. Earlier in the week (Wednesday 5 November 2014), detectives executed two search warrants in Hornsby with the assistance of the Hornsby Proactive Crime Team, the Public Order and Riot Squad and officers from the North West Metropolitan Region Enforcement Squad. The search warrants were conducted at premises in Linda and Albert Street, Hornsby, resulting in the arrest of three men. Following further inquiries, a fourth man and a woman were arrested by detectives yesterday (Thursday 6 November 2014).

Three Hornsby men aged 19, 27 and 32, were charged with take/detain person in company with intent to get advantage occasioning actual bodily harm, cause grievous bodily harm to person with intent and reckless grievous bodily harm in company. The 19-year-old man was also charged with possess prohibited drug. All three have been refused bail to appear at Central Local Court on Thursday 18 December 2014. A 21-year-old Pennant Hills man was charged with take/detain person in company with intent to get advantage occasioning actual bodily harm, cause grievous bodily harm to person with intent and reckless grievous bodily harm in company. He was refused bail to appear at Central Local Court yesterday (Thursday 6 November 2014) where he was granted conditional bail to reappear on Thursday 18 December 2014.

A 51-year-old Asquith woman was charged with hinder investigation (serious indictable offence) and granted conditional bail to appear at North Sydney Local Court on Wednesday 26 November 2014.

Kuring-Gai Local Area Commander, Detective Superintendent David Jones, said the arrests were the result of meticulous and dedicated police work by his officers. "These arrests are the result of ongoing, professional investigative work, and I commend each officer who worked tirelessly during the past three months to get these results,"

Det Supt Jones said.

safe to move over




From the North Shore Times, 13 November: On the spot fines are on the way to make smokers butt out of non-smoking areas around Royal North Shore Hospital.

Criminals are often opportunists. They know they want to steal something, and they know if they look hard enough they will find unlocked premises or cars. That makes it easy for thieves to steal because it does not attract the attention that breaking a window or door will do." Detective Inspector Jon Gross
