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Polls open one more time

After record-setting early voting period, Election Day is here.

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Election Day has arrived, and the supervisor of elections office will be working overtime today.

Liz P. Horne, supervisor of elections for Columbia County, said her office is prepared to stay late and operate on little sleep to churn out the unofficial totals late tonight.

"We love it, you have to love it," she said. "We put in long, hard hours."

Tomi Brown, assistant Supervisor of Elections for

Columbia County, said Election Day is like Christmas and giving birth wrapped together.

"It started 9 months ago, and by the time it gets here you're done," she said.

Brown said she feels proud to be a part of the election process. She reminded voters that absentee ballots must be turned into the supervisor of elections office by 7 p.m. today.

"Every time you have an election you create history," she said. Horne noted that the

Woman was threatened with knife, says report

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A Fort White man faces charges of battery and felony aggravated assault with a deadly weapon without intent to kill following his arrest Sunday, according to a sheriff's report.

Edwin John Steinhagen, 29, was taken into custody at 9:35 p.m. by a Columbia County sheriff's deputy and booked into the county jail, records show.

The Columbia County Dispatch Center reported a 911 call with an open line over which they could hear an argument between a man and a woman.

When Deputy Thomas Mansfield reached the address of where the call originated, he made contact with the alleged victim.

She said Steinhagen came home drunk and started yelling at her after she told him she went through his things looking for her daughter's Wii remote, according to the report.

The woman said Steinhagen pulled a knife from a holster at his

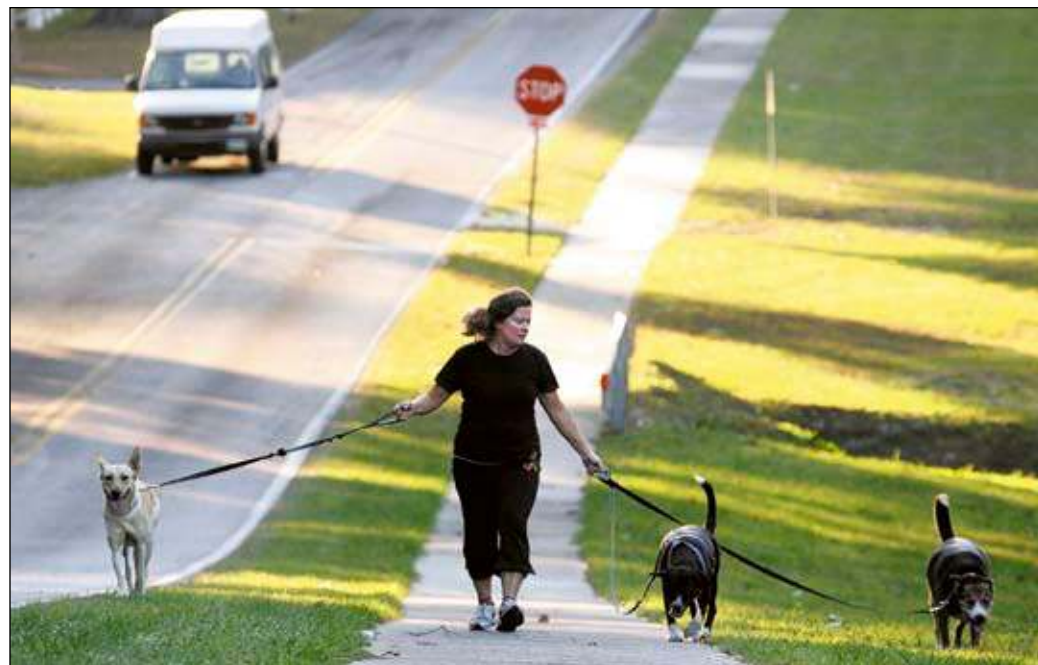
The Lake City City Council on Monday approved state and federal grant money that will be used to improve the Lake City Gateway Airport.

Thousands of fans filled a Boston street to watch Aerosmith play a concert in front of the building where band members once lived.

People hung out windows, crowded fire escapes and stood on roofs on Commonwealth Avenue to watch a show meant to encourage voting and promote the band's new album, which comes out Tuesday on Election Day.

The band played songs including "Walk this Way," "Sweet Emotion" and some of their new album, "Music from Another Dimension!"

New England Patriots quarterback Tom Brady was among those attending Monday's show, getting on stage after the band arrived in an amphibious tour vehicle.

Boston University student Becca Emmetts, who lives in Aerosmith's former building, sent a friend to her physics class with this message explaining her tardiness: "Aerosmith was playing on my front stoop."

Bell and Shepard expecting first baby

42 arrested in prostitution sting

ORLANDO — Forty-two arrests have been made in a prostitution sting in central Florida.

Authorities announced Sunday the arrests from the two day sting led by the Metropolitan Bureau of Investigation in Orlando and Orange County.

Agents conducted a street prostitution operation with undercover agents posing as "Johns" seeking prostitutes on streets and at local hotels. Agents arrested 42 defendants for prostitution-related offenses.

Panther hit by car in Collier County

NAPLES — A remains of a panther struck and killed on a Collier County road will be taken to a research lab for a complete necropsy.

Wildlife officials said the 4-month-old panther was killed early Sunday morning. It was the 19th panther death of the year.

The News-Press reported the carcass would be taken to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Wildlife Research Lab in Gainesville. The remains will be archived at the Florida Museum of Natural History.

Suicidal man shoots deputy

MULBERRY — A Polk County Sheriff's deputy was shot while responding to an attempted suicide call in Mulberry.

According to the sheriff's office, 47-year-old Deputy Terry Storie and other deputies reported hearing gunshots when they arrived at the home Sunday afternoon. Storie took cover behind a patrol

car and a bullet hit the ground, then ricocheted and hit him in the leg. He was treated and released from the hospital.

Sheriff Grady Judd said 42-year-old Doug Meadows kicked his wife out of the house shortly after deputies arrived. That's when he started shooting through the windows.

Meadows surrendered to deputies after they shot gas and pepper spray inside. He faces numerous charges including the attempted first-degree murder of a law enforcement officer.

Obama office burglarized

FORT MYERS — The headquarters for President Barack Obama's campaign in Fort Myers has been burglarized, but detectives said only cash was taken.

Lee County detectives said none of the computers were stolen and there were no political statements or graffiti left behind. Authorities said the only thing missing is an envelope with an undisclosed amount of cash.

Deputies were called to the headquarters Sunday morning after an employee found the glass front door had been smashed and broken. Detectives are looking for a man seen on surveillance video at the time, calling him a person of interest.

The Lee County Sheriff's Office statement said anyone with information should call authorities. They may be eligible for a cash reward of up to \$1,000.

Body found on auditorium roof

DAYTONA BEACH — Daytona Beach police are investigating after the body of a naked man was

found on the roof of an auditorium.

The body was found Saturday afternoon on the roof of the Peabody Auditorium. Police said the unidentified man may have been struck on the head.

The Daytona Beach News-Journal reported the National Symphony Orchestra of Cuba was expected to give a concert there Saturday night. Police said the concert will go on as planned.

Police Chief Mike Chitwood said a maintenance worker inside the auditorium saw debris on the stage, then noticed a hole in the ceiling near a vent and called police. The worker went on the roof and found the body.

Woman hid crack under dentures

PUNTA GORDA — Charlotte County Sheriff's deputies have arrested a 49-year-old woman on drug charges after she allegedly hid three rocks of crack cocaine under her dentures.

According to a news release, officers made a traffic stop Saturday after observing a pickup truck leave a known drug house.

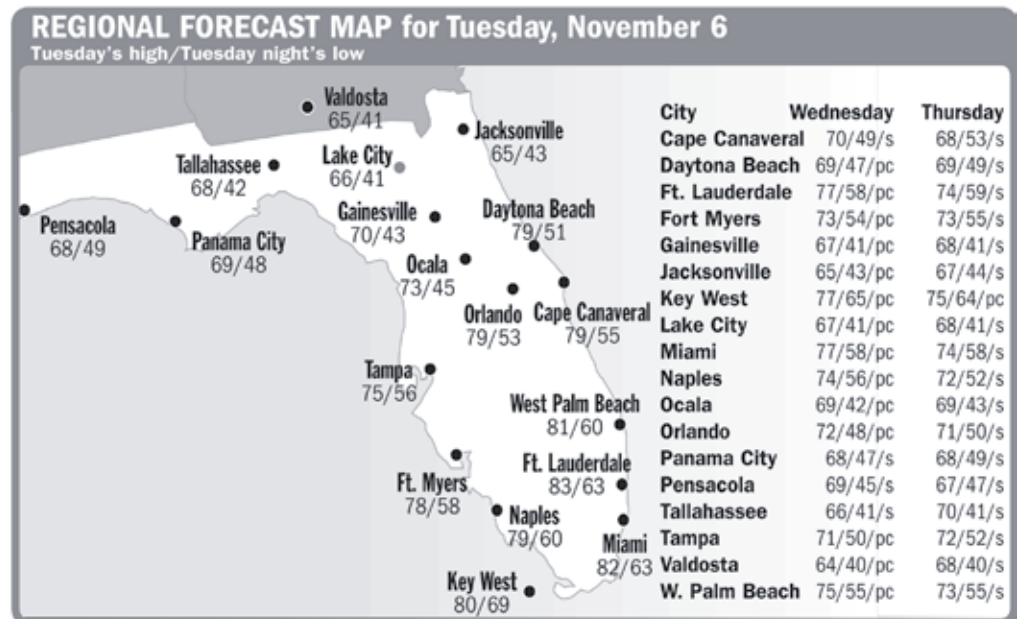
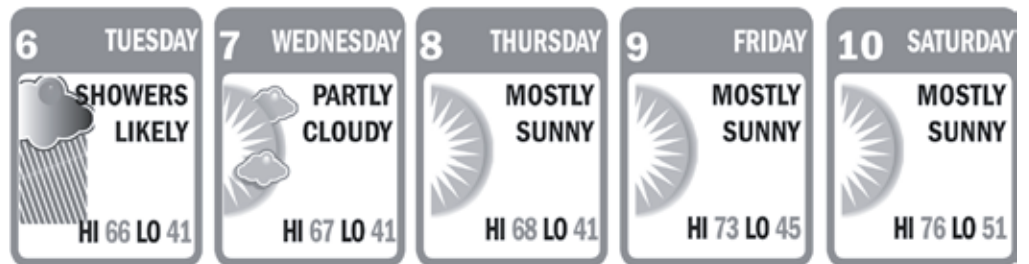
Officers said the passenger in the vehicle, Kimberly Maroney, appeared to be moving something around with her tongue inside her mouth.

When an officer asked her to open her mouth, he noticed that she had upper and lower dentures. He asked her to remove the dentures and the deputy spotted three large pieces of crack cocaine in her mouth.

Maroney was arrested on drug possession charges and later posted a \$3,500 bond.

weather for the election is predicted to be rainy. "We're still looking forward for a heavy voting day tomorrow," she said.

Around 50 percent of Columbia County's 35,000-plus registered voters have already cast a ballot, Brown said.

State a tough sell to end for Obama, Romney

TAMPA — To the last minute, Florida is proving to be an expensive and frustrating state for President Barack Obama and Republican Mitt Romney alike, seemingly resistant to arguments that play well in Ohio, Colorado and other states.

For all the talk of Florida leaning Republican, both nominees are making stops here in the campaign's final 40 hours, a testament to its uncertainty. Their campaigns and allies have poured \$130 million into Florida TV ads.

Florida is a tough sell for Obama's national message of steady economic recovery, because its unemployment and foreclosure rates remain above the national average. The auto industry bailout ads airing in Ohio would make little sense here.

And Obama's standard remarks to Hispanics don't resonate so well in Florida because its two largest Hispanic groups, Cubans and Puerto Ricans, are exempt from immigration laws that Mexican-Americans and others intensely follow.

These factors played into

Obama's decision to make his strongest battleground stand in Ohio, which has 18 electoral votes to Florida's 29. And they prompted Republicans to hope Romney would lock up Florida early.

But a well-organized Democratic ground game, and a population that's increasingly non-white, have given Obama hope of winning Florida narrowly and all but assuring his re-election.

"I think it's too close to call," said Jerrold Kronenfeld, 68, an Obama volunteer who attended Friday's rally by former President Bill Clinton in Palm Bay.

Kronenfeld wore a "Jews for Obama" button, and he said it was frustrating to see Romney pursue Jewish votes by portraying Obama as unfriendly to Israel.

The sometimes sharp exchanges over Israel are just one example of campaign bitterness that has spilled over in this sprawling state, the biggest of the toss-up prizes.

Republican Gov. Rick Scott and the GOP-controlled legislature curtailed early voting this year and took other steps that Democrats say were designed to suppress

voting in heavily Democratic areas.

After people waited for hours to vote in south Florida on Saturday, the last day of early voting, the state Democratic Party filed a federal lawsuit seeking more voting time Sunday. Local officials allowed it on a limited basis. But some would-be voters gave up when facing six-hour waits Saturday, poll watchers said, and similar problems could arise Tuesday.

A Florida judge extended early voting hours in one central Florida county on Sunday after Democrats sued to allow more time. An early voting site in Orange County was closed for several hours Saturday after a suspicious package was found outside and later detonated by a local bomb squad. The state Republican Party decided not to challenge the decision.

If Obama loses Florida by a hair, partisan recriminations seem inevitable.

Florida's unemployment rate — 8.7 percent, compared to the nation's 7.9 percent — would seem to help Romney's economic argument against Obama.

"Jobs, the economy, that's it," said Tammy Celeste, chairwoman of

the Romney campaign in Osceola County, explaining why independents and some Democrats walk into the Kissimmee office to make phone calls for the GOP nominee.

And yet Romney has been forced to spend precious time and money in Florida from the very start. He campaigned Wednesday in Miami, Tampa and Jacksonville. He was in Sanford, north of Orlando, on Monday morning.

"We can begin a better tomorrow tomorrow," Romney said Monday. Obama adviser David Plouffe taunted the former Massachusetts governor Sunday on ABC's "This Week."

"A few weeks ago, Gov.

Romney's campaign was saying, 'Oh, we're going to win Florida, we're going to win Virginia,'" Plouffe said. "On Monday, the day before the election, Gov. Romney is going to Florida and Virginia. Why? Because he's at great risk of losing those states."

Obama made his last

Florida campaign stop Sunday, before about 23,000 people south of Fort Lauderdale. As usual, he accused Romney of having said Clinton's tax and spending policies would hurt the economy.

"Turns out his math then was just as bad as it is now," Obama said.

The right and duty to vote

It's almost over. Or is it? The dynamic of this election has once again raised the prospect that one candidate could lose the popular vote but win the White House on the basis of the vote in the Electoral College, whose members aren't scheduled to meet until Dec. 17 after settling what is described in the Federal Register as "any controversies over the appointment of their electors." Ugh.

It's a scenario that creates more political tension, bitterness and division, much as it did in 2000 when George Bush was declared the winner by the Supreme Court after a prolonged recount in Florida that gave him the majority of electoral votes even though Al Gore won the popular vote nationally by a whisker.

A repetition of this frustrating outcome would satisfy virtually no one, including supporters of the declared winner. It raises troubling questions about legitimacy that undermine the authority of the chief executive. The other candidate's backers, meanwhile, will claim they were robbed.

The next occupant of the Oval Office will need all the powers at the command of the presidency to persuade Congress to make the sort of compromises necessary to reach sensible and lasting agreements on the related problems of the budget, the national debt and entitlements. Even with the president's powers intact, getting any deal will be tough. Otherwise, expect more gridlock.

Time for a change? You bet. The outdated Electoral College is ill-suited to modern-day politics. And other aspects of our voting process desperately need to be changed. ...

- Voter purges late in the election year. ...
 - Fewer early voting days. ...
 - Long, perplexing ballots. ...
- Voting is a right, as well as a duty. Too many Americans take it for granted. Do your part and vote, and let's hope that next time around those who make the laws make voting easier instead of harder.

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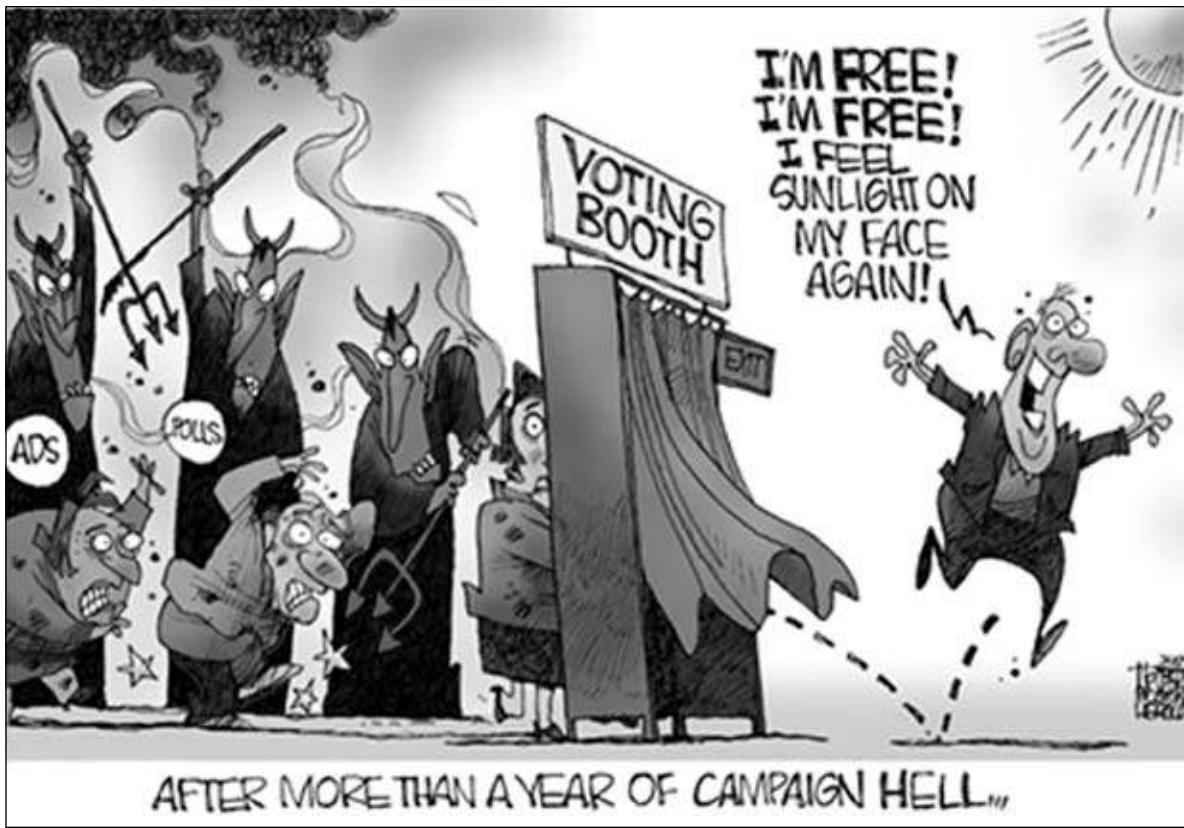

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Time to prepare for 2016

As I write this, the election is still two days away; as you read it, the dust may already have settled, and the presidency entrusted to one of the candidates for the next four years.

Or not. The race is so close and contentious that every vote in every crucial county will be subject to extraordinary scrutiny, and the declaration of a winner could take a while, as it did in 2000.

But let's hope not. Whatever the race is like, a good election is transparent and decisive. May this one be.

And may it provide a little breathing space for us to consider our electoral process before the race for 2016 begins, which will be soon enough.

First: It's probably time to do away with the Electoral College. The best book I know of on this subject is "Why the Electoral College is Bad for America," by George C. Edwards III, a professor of political science at Texas A&M University in College Station, Texas. He argues that the Electoral College may not have been such a bad idea at the beginning, but the founders would have had a hard time imagining how unsuited its original purposes are for the modern United States.

Edwards' arguments are cogent and convincing, and they're couched in his justified reluctance to tinker with the Constitution. Still, he points out that when the Constitution has been amended in the past, often the direction is toward more enfranchisement — of blacks, of women — rather than less, and

the abolishment of the Electoral College would enfranchise millions of Democratic voters in Texas and Republican voters in California.

Of course, the abolishment of the Electoral College has been proposed many times in the past without success. But maybe it's time to do some bold thinking on this subject for the good of the republic.

Second: In Mexico, you cannot buy a drink on Election Day — no cervezas, no margaritas, no alcohol of any kind. Believe me, I've tried. The presidential election is always held on Sunday, a day when many Mexicans are off work. Furthermore, beginning on the previous Wednesday, campaigning and political advertising are forbidden by law, and polling organizations aren't allowed to release the results of their polls until after the election.

I'm not necessarily holding Mexico up as a paragon of democracy and, of course, some of these measures would violate our allegiance to free speech. Still, why not, every four years, make our presidential Election Day a national holiday, set aside for the important business of voting? For many of us, voting has become an afterthought, an inconvenient civic duty that we

neglect or just send in the mail. Why not honor it every four years with a national holiday in which we do little else? Let's call it National Voting Day.

Third: Shakespeare's plays, 500 years old, are still legible in contemporary manuscripts, and I suspect that if the ballots that elected George Washington to the presidency are archived somewhere, they're still legible, as well. But where's the ballot that I cast last week by dialing through a series of computer screens and pressing buttons?

Electronic balloting is faster and potentially more accurate, but its transparency and verifiability are questionable, leading some smaller countries, such as Sweden and Switzerland, to continue to use traceable, recountable, unhackable paper ballots.

The fact is, the integrity of the electronic ballot is beyond the capacity of the ordinary person or local election entity to verify. And your faith in our electronic electoral system might be shaken by Victoria Collier's "How to Rig an Election," which appears in the November edition of Harper's Magazine. Collier argues with considerable credibility that the development of computerized voting technology and the outsourcing of elections to corporations have produced highly suspicious vote totals over the last few decades.

Nothing is more important to democracies than elections. Ours need attention. Let's get started. The race for 2016 begins at any moment.

Sandy: A growing pattern?

People who live in areas prone to flooding or other disasters can be forgiven for thinking they've lived through so many "once in a century" weather events they mathematically must have been here since the time of the Pharaohs.

For whatever reason, destructive storms, drought-related wildfires and other events are becoming harsher and more frequent. If it's your house that gets destroyed, the debate over whether it was due to manmade global warming or long-term climatic change is beside the point.

Mitt Romney got some good laughs at the Republican convention by mocking President Barack Obama's token commitments to easing climate change. "My promise," Romney said in a non sequitur, "is to help you and your family." He didn't say exactly how he would do that, but offering to help out Americans who are the victims of natural disaster is about the least one would expect of a president.

A good place to start would be with storm mitigation. The 1968 National Flood Insurance Act was a federal insurance pro-

gram aimed to encourage people in flood-prone areas to move to safer ground, or at least to flood-resistant structures, in exchange for flood insurance that no private insurer would offer because of the outsize risk. The program never fully worked as intended because of opposition from homeowners, developers and waterfront resorts.

The Census Bureau says that more than half the U.S. lives within 50 miles of the coasts. Those who live on the actual coasts favor living right on the water, especially on barrier islands that are basically moving sandbars.

The lessons of Hurricane Katrina seem to be slipping from memory. The 2005 storm was the nation's fifth deadliest, claiming more than 1,800 lives, and its

most expensive, costing around \$108 billion in damages. About a third of New Orleans' population never moved back.

A principal reason behind Katrina's devastation: Human activity, including channels dredged in the Mississippi and its feeder rivers, destroyed protective mangrove swamps and effectively created super highways for storm surge.

While Sandy was not a particularly powerful hurricane, it had a 1,000-mile reach and killed more than 100 people in 10 states. Though the damage is still being totaled, Sandy will likely be our second most expensive storm after Katrina.

And lest the need for foresight and preparedness be lost on us, another big storm, a nor'easter, is taking aim later this week at the Delaware and Raritan bays, areas already pounded by Sandy.

Less and less does it seem that storms like Sandy are freak occurrences, "once in a century" events that now seem to occur every two or three years. We can't say we weren't warned.

Fast and Furious probe fizzles

In a last-gasp effort to get some political mileage out of the overworked Operation Fast and Furious gun-trafficking investigation, two Republican congressmen — Rep. Darrell Issa of California and Sen. Charles Grassley of Iowa — chose last Monday to release their final report on the Obama administration's scandal.

The only problem: Their timing, on the eve of one of the worst storms ever to hit the Eastern Seaboard, practically assured the report would get little or no publicity. In fact, it was virtually ignored by the mainstream media. That's just as well, considering that the episode's explosive power had long dissipated in a welter of political charges and countercharges — including contempt-of-Congress against Attorney General Eric Holder — that were lost in the cacophony of the presidential campaign.

The report held no surprises. In fact, it would have fallen with a dull thud even on a slow news day. As expected, it lambasted the Justice Department for lack of cooperation with the House and Senate investigations and for ignoring the seriousness of a gun-walking operation that went completely wrong. It listed some recommendations, mostly obvious and lame.

As anyone who really cares knows, the Phoenix office of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives hatched Operation Fast and Furious to try to nail Mexican drug dealers who have been committing mayhem with battlefield weapons sold in this country. The idea was to allow straw purchases here to go unimpeded and then trace the guns to their destination south of the border. It was an ill-conceived plan for big arrests that resulted in some of the weapons bought in the United States disappearing across the Rio Grande without a trace, until one of them ended up at the scene of a U.S. Border Patrol agent's shooting death.

Issa and Grassley — obviously seeing a wealth of political gold to mine — went galloping after Holder quicker than you can say "National Rifle Association." Their intent from the beginning seemed to be to smoke the attorney general and the White House rather than to get at the root causes of the gun-trafficking problems, including Congress' own major culpability in the whole mess. That isn't to deny the White House role in failing to curtail the illegal flow of firearms through this country. Lip service is about all the president has paid to the problem, for obvious political reasons.

The new report accuses the Holder regime of failure to cooperate with Congress or to get to the bottom of the matter in order to protect the department's top political appointees.

Chances are slim that anything substantial will come out of the Fast and Furious debacle — certainly not any impact on the presidential race, as was clearly the intent. Both sides in this case have made the mistake of not using it to address an increasingly serious problem.

side and pointed it at her, saying he would kill her. She said she dialed 911 but left the phone off the hook for fear of what he would do to her. She said he then pushed her into the wall and said he would kill her if he was sent to jail.

Mansfield waited until back-up arrived. After another deputy arrived at the house, they entered and put Steinhagen in handcuffs. The officers found a 12-inch-black-handled Buck knife, which was taken into evidence, according to the report.

Steinhagen said he "had a few" beers at his uncle's house then came back to his own home to move his belongings from the property.

The officer asked him why he was carrying a knife on his side.

According to the report Steinhagen responded, "I went over to my uncle's and we don't get along, so just in case anything happened I could protect myself."

He said he never took the knife out, but "just undid the flap" when the alleged victim "got in my face," according to the report.

Steinhagen, who told police he was a former corrections officer, said he never touched or threatened the alleged victim. "She is trying to get me put in jail, so she can steal my stuff," he reportedly told deputies.

A deputy overheard the uncle calling other family members to come to Steinhagen's home and it was decided to take Steinhagen to jail before they arrived.

While headed north on State Road 47, Mansfield reported that a vehicle pulled in behind his squad car. According to the report, Columbia County Dispatch Center notified Mansfield that the vehicle's occupant was on the phone with the dispatch center, "demanding" that he pull over, according to the report.

Mansfield said the vehicle kept flashing its high beams at him and remained a few feet off his bumper at 65 miles per hour for about 10 miles.

Mansfield called for another deputy to stop the other vehicle. At that point the vehicle stopped and turned around.

The city council accepted the grant money to hire an engineering company to expand taxiway "A."

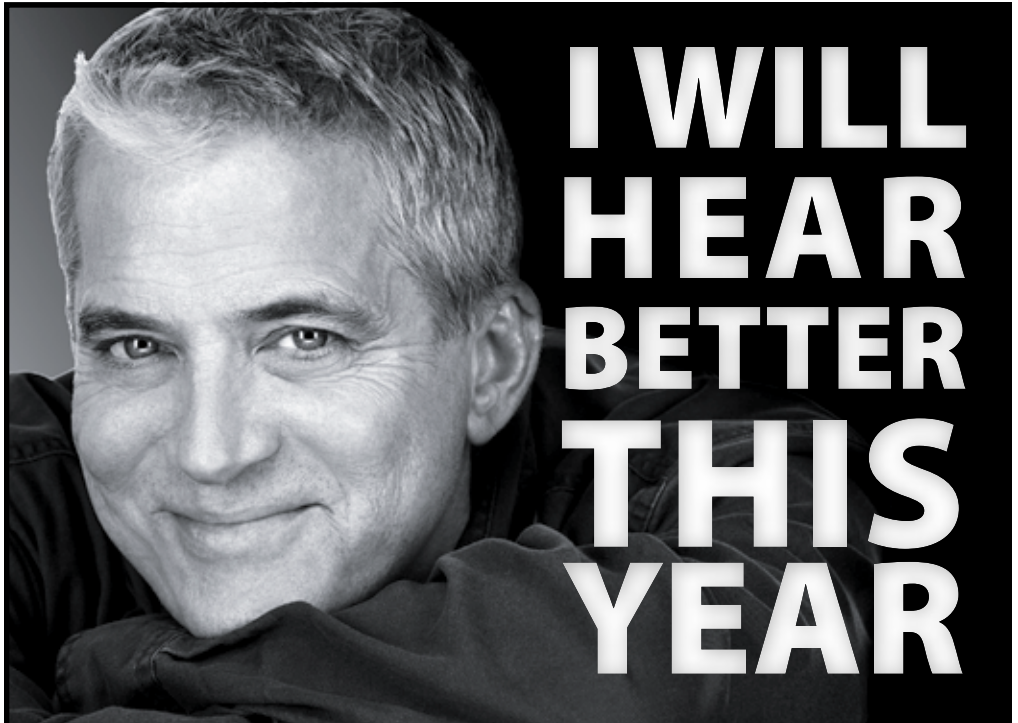
The total amount of the grant from the Florida Department of Transportation was \$161,125.

Scott continues push of new education plan

BOCA RATON — Gov. Rick Scott continued his push Monday for changes to how schools operate, saying education is the key to a robust economy.

Speaking to the state Board of Education at its meeting in Boca Raton, Scott outlined his previously announced "College and Career FIRST" plan. He gave no new details but drew wide praise from the board.

Scott said the plan could reduce burdensome regulations that cut into teaching time, expands school choice and increases accountability. He said schools' success was key to the state's overall well-being.

"If we have the right education system," he told those gathered at Boca Raton High School, "then we'll have plenty of jobs in the state."

Among the proposals in Scott's plan: measures to avoid spending cuts; efforts to reduce regulation; an expansion of charter schools; debit cards for teachers to purchase classroom supplies; and an end on the introduction of new standardized tests unless they support planned common core standards.

Scott said his plan for higher education was still in the works, but that college affordability was key to helping all students. He said the issue had special resonance with him because he once lived in public housing.
