#### MESSAGE FROM THE STEERING COMMITTEE

This Spring, when the Pandemic necessitated everyone to stay home, LWVF cancelled all our in person meetings. We looked at each other in dismay and asked "How can we remain relevant during this Pandemic?" Well, here is the answer:

- The Voter Service Committee (in association with FCTV) presented two Candidates Nights .
- The Centennial Grove of Tupelo trees was planted at Peterson Farm in mid-April to celebrate the Centennial of the 19th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution and the founding of the League of Women Voters.
- Olivann Hobbie maintained a yearlong collaboration with The Falmouth Enterprise by writing "SUFFRAGE EXCERPTS" for each issue
- The Voter Service Committee presented a program at the Cape Verdean Club in September. This was the beginning of our outreach effort to focus on the League priority of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. Together we produced banners which were placed on their property at the Cape Verdean Club.
- In October, the League held a virtual stress-free social night on Zoom.
- The Voter Service Committee delivered information and forms regarding voter registration and requests for ballots to local senior group residences
- An article in the Enterprise describing Massachusetts election law changes on how to navigate Voting by Mail is by Judy Ziss
- After primary, prepared one-page summary of Massachusetts Covid-19 changes for rules for general election.
- Advocacy piece on Ranked Choice Voting by Margaret Cooper published in *The Enterprise* and also in *The Cape Cod Times*
- An extremely successful Community Mural Painting Day on October 10 with great participation and publicity statewide.
- A Falmouth High School Voter Art Competition and an Exhibition of Voter Art in partnership with the Falmouth Art Center with over 50 submissions. The League awarded prizes.
- The Natural Resources Committee is preparing a presentation to be released in November on "Falmouth's Progress Towards Sustainability". This will be a YouTube Video.

I think we have met the challenge of this Pandemic and then some!

#### **VOTING IN FALMOUTH BY THE NUMBERS**

The November 3<sup>rd</sup> election this year had several races to be decided besides the Presidency, and several ballot questions.

Due to Covid 19, the Commonwealth expanded early voting and voting by mail options significantly from previous presidential elections, and the

expectation/ hope was that this would increase voting participation significantly. In fact, the 2020 election saw **81.9% turn-out** or 21,193 votes cast in Falmouth (26,612 registered voters): 56.6% of the votes were cast during early voting. By comparison, the 2016 presidential election had 20,274 votes cast (79.9% of registered voters),



and the 2012 presidential election had 19,643 votes cast, essentially the same as the 19,986 votes cast in 2008.

It is not easy to discover how many registered voters there were in 2008 or 2012 but the US Census estimates that the town's population will decline 1.7% from 2010 to 2020. The increase in voter participation is at least partially due to the new early and mail voting options. Hopefully, these choices will persist long after the Covid 19 pandemic.











