Garage Sale Report



As we are nearing the end of 2020, a year many people would rather forget, I can reflect on a year that, while it had its challenges, has also had some positive aspects. Our Garage Sales have been doing quite well, despite being shut down for about 3 months. We have had to adjust our sales area and introduce all the Covid-19 safe practices, which have worked well. Our shed is now a one way system with sanitizers and we record all visitors' details. While daunting at first, the system now works well. We have also introduced a raffle ticket system, whereby purchasers get a ticket and 5 winners get a \$10 voucher at the next sale, if they produce their ticket. So far we have had some happy customers.

A few Lions members have been selling item on-line through Marketplace and Gumtree and this has proved to be very successful. We are happy for others to help with this venture. It is good fun and we have met some interesting people. "How to" classes are available.



A couple of months ago we were lucky enough, thanks to Bill who comes and helps in the shed by sorting the records, CDs and DVDs, to pick up from a friend of his, some school books etc. This turned out to be a huge job but very profitable. As a result, the Club donated 500 new children's books and 200 new exercise books to Puddle Jumpers, 100 new books to Maureen Kerr who gave them to her Church and about 230 used books that hopefully will be sent overseas. I estimated that these books had a value of about \$4000. We also sold many teacher resource books to some schools and teachers and collected about \$300. In addition the Club also donated

about 180 plastic plates and cups, and 70 plastic knives, forks and spoons to the Christies Beach Surf Life Saving Club to be used by their Little Nippers. As a result of this Garage Sale pick up, the Club was able to help hundreds of people in the community.

Lions have been supporting the Working Bees very well and our band of helpers has been sorting, cleaning, rearranging, disposing and displaying goods. A big 'Thank You' to all who come to the Working Bees. As they say, many hands make light work!! Lunch at the office for debriefing is always fun too!

Our future looks good. We will have to be a little more selective in what we take in to sell because we have run out of room to store items. We will also have to spend more time getting rid of stuff that has been on the shelves for a while and replacing it with new stuff. Thank you to all who help with the Garage Sale. It is a good money raiser and we have fun.

3rd Vice President's Report



Our committee has dealt with a number of activities this year but our recent focus has been on trialling the Lions Eye Health Program's venture into conducting Children's Vision Screening.

Members of our Lions Club visited Emu Community Children's Centre at Morphett Vale this month to conduct a vision screening session. They were assisted by Bryan Hearn, a Vision Screening Instructor from the Lions Eye Health Program.


All screening equipment, including a Spot Screening Camera that analyses whether there are any abnormalities with the child's eyes through a simple on-site photograph, produces a printout that details findings and recommends whether an

optometrist should be consulted, was supplied by LEHP.

The members were completing their training to become LEHP Qualified Screeners for the national program that aims to identify any abnormalities with children's eyes. Lance Reeves arranged the activity as part of his training to become a LEHP Accredited Vision Screening Facilitator.

As expected about 1 in 5 of the children screened were suspected of having a vision issue, although all were found to have vision within an acceptable range. Letters explaining the results were left with the centre for distribution to parents.

As a result of this initial screening, our Lions club will consider whether it will continue conducting screenings in the coming year and expand activities to other schools.

At the end of the tour President Deb presented a cheque for \$500.00, from the Lions Club, to assist in the vital research being done at South Australia Health Medical Research Institute.


Speakers, Mrs Lyn Jones (from Rotary District 9510) and a woman who has suffered for many years with mental illness spoke on the condition and how people can assist.

Rotary Health have a broad vision to improve the health and well-being of all Australians by providing funding a broad range of general health areas, providing scholarships for rural medical and nursing students, as well as Indigenous health students. Australian Rotary Health provides funding into areas of health that do not readily attract funding, and promotes findings to the community.
