

Little Bones from a Big state: Baby Dinosaurs from the Cretaceous Paleo-Arctic of Alaska

30 years ago, new paleontological discoveries suggested something remarkable: dinosaurs existed in polar latitudes. How they managed to live in these challenging environmental conditions has since remained an active area for debate. A particularly contentious area of discussion has been whether they overwintered in the Arctic or migrated south to escape the long periods of cold and darkness. The Cretaceous Prince Creek Formation of northern Alaska is recognized as the single most important unit for understanding polar dinosaurs in the world. Recent work by our team along the Colville River has lead to the discovery of new sites and unexpected fossils that reveal a completely new insights into the fascinating lives of these animals: they not only lived in the Arctic but they reproduced there too. In this talk, Dr. Druckenmiller will discuss the new finds and their implications for dinosaur migration.

About the Speaker:

Patrick Druckenmiller is Director of the University of Alaska Museum and Professor of Geology at the University of Alaska Fairbanks. He is a vertebrate paleontologist who specializes in Mesozoic marine reptiles and dinosaurs, particularly from the Arctic. He has lead field investigations on fossil vertebrates across the State of Alaska and currently working on Cretaceous vertebrates from the Prince Creek Formation of northern Alaska and dinosaur tracks in Denali National Park.



Donald Richter Scholarship and AGS recognition



The AGS strongly supports maintaining Donald's legacy through this scholarship.



Donald H. Richter September 29, 1926 to October 8, 2004

Especially at home in the mountains, Don loved the out-of-doors. His thirst for learning about the natural world was unquenchable and he loved to share that knowledge. Don was a remarkable field geologist whose Alaskan activities, primarily with the USGS, began in 1963 and continued for over 40 years to the present. Although Don was widely known as "Mr. Wrangells" for his work on the Wrangell volcanic pile, his many publications range from reports on: mineralization in the Slana district in 1965; a 1971 seminal paper on Quaternary faulting in east-central Alaska in which the Totschunda Fault was defined; the geology and mineral resources of the Nabesna area in the late 1970's and 1980's, and the many geologic maps of volcanic centers in the Wrangell Mountains in the 1990's, including, more recently, popular accounts of the geology of the Wrangell Mountains.

Don spearheaded the initial USGS's AMRAP program in east-central Alaska enabling the entire program to get off to a flying start. His participation in the fledgling Alaska Volcano Observatory response to the 1989-90 eruption of Redoubt volcano was pivotal to its success.

Don was still producing geologic maps and reports on the volcanology of the Wrangell-St. Elias National Park at the time of his untimely death.

His wisdom, experience, and keen perceptions of Alaskan geology will be sorely missed by friends and colleagues.
