During your travels, pick up the individual sized soap, shampoo, toothpaste, etc. that you don't use, and when you get a decent collection, let us know and we can get together to pick them up. We will deliver them to the Fisher House, as they go through a huge amount of toiletries. The Fisher House runs on grants and donations from the community, so every bit helps.



Veterans Affairs Voluntary Services (VAVS)

Did you know that volunteers are an integral and indispensable part of the VA? Volunteers save the VA More than \$232 million annually, plus receive over \$77 Million in gifts and donations annually. But that can't do that without the 75,000+volunteers who perform over 12 million volunteer hours annually. Volunteers are needed at all four VA Clinics, as well as the VA Hospital itself.

Volunteers provide many important functions throughout the Medical Center and help make our Veteran patients' stay more enjoyable. These functions include drivers for the transportation network, information desk and escorts, and in some of the clinics, there are coffee bars that works on donations for most of what they serve.

MEANING OF A FLAG DRAPED COFFIN

All Americans should be given this lesson. Those who think that America is an arrogant nation should really reconsider that thought. Our founding father used God's work and teachings to establish our Great Nation and I think it's time Americans get re-educated about this Nation's history. Pass it along and be proud of the country we live in and even more proud of those who serve to protect our "God Given" rights and freedoms. I hope you read this, to understand what the flag draped coffin really means...this is how to understand the flag that laid upon it and is surrendered to so many widows and widowers.

Do you know that at military funerals, the 21-gun salute stands for the sum of the numbers in year 1776? (Which was the year our Nation was founded.)

Have you ever noticed the honor guard pays meticulous attention to correctly fold the United States of America Flag 13 times? You probably thought it was to symbolize the original 13 colonies, but we learn something new every day!

- The 1st fold of the flag is a symbol of life.
- The 2nd fold is a symbol of the belief in eternal life.
- The 3rd fold is made in honor and remembrance of the veterans departing the ranks who gave a portion of their lives for the defense of the country to attain peace throughout the world.
- The 4th fold represent the weaker nature, for as American citizen trusting in God, it is to Him we turn in times of peace as well as in time of war, for His divine guidance.
- The 5th fold is a tribute to the country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our Country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right but it is still our country, right or wrong."
- The 6th fold is for where people's hearts lie. It is with their heart that they pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States, and the Republic for which it stands,

- one Nation under God, indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all.
- The 7th fold is a tribute to its Armed Forces, for it is through the Armed Forces that they protect their country and their flag against all her enemies, whether they be found within or without the boundaries the republic.
- The 8th fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day.
- The 9th fold is a tribute to womanhood, and Mothers. For it has been through their faith, love, loyalty and devotion that the character of the men and women who have made this country great has been molded.
- The 10th fold is a tribute to the father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters, for the defense of their country, since they were first born.
- The 11th fold represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies in the Hebrew eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.
- The 12th fold represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in the Christian eyes, God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
- The 13th fold, or when the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost reminding them of their nation's motto, "In God We Trust."

After the flag is folded and tucked in, it takes on the appearance of a cocked hat, ever reminding us of the soldiers who served under George Washington, and the Sailors and Marines who served und Captain John Paul Jones, who were followed by their comrades and shipmates in the Armed Forces of the United States, preserving for them the rights, privileges and freedoms they enjoy today.

There are some traditions and ways of doing things that have deep meaning. In the future, you'll see flags folded and now you will know why.

Targeting Hep C in the Veteran Community

Hepatitis C (Hep C) is an important health concern facing U.S. military veterans. That's because veterans enrolled in the care of the Veterans Health Administration are more likely to have Hep C than others. In fact, more than 5% of these veterans have Hep C.*

Because most people don't experience symptoms, many don't know they have it. And over time, Hep C can lead to scarring of the liver (also called cirrhosis). That's why getting tested is so important.

It's time to TAKE ON Hep C

The American Legion is joining forces with AbbVie, a global biopharmaceutical company, to launch TAKE ON Hep C, a nationwide movement to bring free Hep C antibody testing to veterans and their communities.

The TAKE ON Hep C tour is setting out to:

- Identify and test those who are at a high risk for Hep C
- Educate about Hep C and the importance of getting tested
- Energize the community to take action and TAKE ON Hep C

Get the facts about Hep C

Here's what we're up against:

- About 3.4 million people in the U.S. are living with chronic Hep C
- Hep C is a blood-borne virus and is spread through contact with infected blood
- Most people with Hep C do not have any symptoms, or have general or common symptoms
- Symptoms can be flu-like and include fever, fatigue, loss of appetite, nausea, vomiting, jaundice, abdominal pain, joint pain, dark urine, and gray-colored stools
- A simple blood test can show if you have Hep C antibodies, and you can get results in as few as 20 minutes. The presence of Hep C antibodies indicates you may be currently infected with the Hep C virus

Understand the risk to veterans

Data suggest that a higher prevalence of Hep C is seen in veterans enrolled in the care of the Veterans Health Administration versus the general U.S. population. Vets could have been exposed to Hep C in one or more of the following ways:

- Doing healthcare work or sharing personal items, such as a razor or toothbrush with someone who has Hep C
- Receiving a blood transfusion or organ transplant before 1992
- Using injection drugs, sharing drug equipment, or receiving tattoos or body piercings in unregulated settings
- Having a current or former sex partner with Hep C
- Having other potential blood-to-blood exposure, either during military service or at any other time

Who should get tested?

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends Hep C testing for:

- Current or former injection drug users, including those who injected only once many years ago
- Everyone born from 1945 to 1965
- Anyone who received clotting factor concentrates made before 1987
- Recipients of blood transfusions or solid organ transplants prior to July 1992
- Long-term hemodialysis patients
- People with known exposures to the Hep C virus, such as healthcare workers or public safety workers, after needle sticks involving blood from someone infected with the Hep C virus
- People with HIV infection
- Children born to mothers with Hep C

This is a fight we can win because Hep C can be cured—meaning the Hep C virus isn't detectable in the blood 3 months after treatment ends. So let's all get tested and get on with it. Because in the battle against Hep C, no one should be left behind.



The Boys and Girls State programs are among the nation's premier civics training programs, graduating many of our nation's future leaders, and our Post sponsors six high school students each year at a cost of \$1200 to the Post. If you'd like to

help raise some money for this program, so we might be able to sponsor more, here's an easy way to help: Save your aluminum cans. Currently, aluminum cans bring in a decent price at the recycling yards, and two 3-gallon large trash bags full of cans will bring us around \$10.
