

October Message from the Pastor "O Lord, you are our Father. We are the clay, you are the potter; we are the work of your hands" (Isaiah 64:8)

Autumn is a season of change. It is a season marked with vivid color and beauty. God speaks to us daily through his Holy Words of Scripture, through our prayers, through the actions with others, and even through His marvelous creation. Autumn seemed to creep up on us this year, appearing suddenly on a bright sunny Wednesday afternoon with temperatures in the mid 60's. This pleasant, warm and sunny weather is what we enjoy most about Autumn.

In a sermon in September I shared with you a prayer that I came upon that is simple, yet profound. I have found it inspirational and life changing. "God help me to see myself the way you see me. Help me to see others the way you see others. Help me to love myself the way you love me." Amen.

Recently, I had an opportunity to attend a seminar on ways to deal with stress in our lives. The seminar introduced me to a technique called the "Three Good Things Exercise." This approach is evidence based and has shown to increase lasting happiness. It does this by a simple method of redirecting attention towards positive thoughts and away from negative thoughts. We tend to spend more time thinking about negative experiences than positive ones. We spend ample time, maybe too much time, thinking about what went wrong and how to fix it, or how to do things differently the next time around. This negative bias is the source of a lot of anxiety, depression, and general lack of well being.

Psychologist Marti Seligman says, "Memories are tricky: good ones are like Teflon, they slip away, while the bad ones stick like Velcro" (especially when we are tired). The "Three Good Things" approach retrains are brains so that we can remember the good things, and the role we played in bringing them about.

Here's how it works. Each night before you go to sleep think of three good things that happened today. Reflect on why they happened. Focus on the positive rather than the negative. For example, you may have been late for an appointment today (negative), but you may also have had a good conversation with a co-worker, visited a friend in the hospital, and met a deadline for an important work project. Don't let one negative experience cloud your mind and color your whole day in a negative light.

Our Gospel lessons in October come from Mark. This Gospel is filled with practical advice. God is the source of all good things. The readings in Mark remind us of what is really important in life- growing in faith toward God and love toward each other. May this season of autumn bring a change of heart and a renewal of our commitment to "let go, and let God."

The Importance of Trust

Trust is an important part of a relationship between spouses, between parents and children, between employers and employees, and between friends. To illustrate the importance of trust, I will share a story from former President Eisenhower who described an event from his earlier days on a Kansas farm.

"An older farmer had a cow we wanted to buy." the President said. "We went over to visit him and asked about the cow's pedigree."

"Don't know," replied the farmer.

"Well, how's her butterfat production?" we asked.

"Don't know."

"Let's see," my dad finally said. "How many pounds of milk does she give each year?"

"Don't know that either," said the farmer shaking his head. "But I do know she's an honest cow and she'll give you all the milk she has!"

"Well," Ike concluded. "I'm kinda like that old cow. You can always trust me to give you everything I have."

Life would be so much easier if we could take people at their word. It doesn't take long to discover that talk is cheap, so we are forced to decide whom or what we will trust. Where do we place our faith and confidence? Do we trust God as our source of life and things? Trusting is not an easy thing to do. We may trust God in some things but not all things. By nature, we are self-reliant, and we live in a society that admires self-reliance and discourages trust in anyone other than oneself.

Trust knows that God loves us and wants the best for us. Complete trust in God is seeking God Himself, rather than His gifts. Knowing God, through Christ, brings about a self-surrender and total trust in Him. Then our trust is not dependent on what He gives, but Who He is.

In the same manner that God proves He is trustworthy, God wants us to prove our trustworthiness. The apostle Paul wrote, "Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful" (1 Corinthians 4:2). How blessed we are that our God can be trusted totally and that He loves and trusts us enough to be His ambassadors and representatives here on earth. Through the working of the Holy Spirit, we can be faithful to His trust.

Shawl Ministry makes prayer shawls and blankets for members and friends of the congregation who may be experiencing sickness or are otherwise in need of prayer. The gift of a handmade item to people in distress, dedicated with prayer, is meant to be a source of comfort and healing to all who need it. Our supply has dwindled, and we can use contributions of handmade machine washable knitted, crocheted or sewn blankets in lap robe or afghan sizes. We also provide hand knitted or crocheted Baptism blankets to newly baptized infants and small children. Right now, we have a good supply of those.

Knots of Love provides hats and scarves for homeless adults, teens and children. We work through an Episcopal church in Detroit which supports the homeless in many ways. These items should also be machine washable. Warmth is stressed over fashion.

We meet once a month during the Sunday School year, usually on the 3rd Tuesday of the month. This year the meetings will be in the afternoon at 1 p.m. The place will be published each month in the newsletter. In October, we will meet at Karen Dei's house.

At our meetings, we dedicate any blankets that we have finished or received and spend time talking and working on our projects. Anyone who wishes to join us is welcome. You can also get help with your project if you need it. If you don't want to attend the meetings, we are happy to have your handmade blankets, hats and scarves anyway. We have a continuing need for all these items and are happy to have them to distribute as the need arises, even if you don't come to any of the meetings.

God saw everything that God had made, and indeed, it was very good!



Our year of the Bible is well underway at our LOL confirmation class. I want to share our instructor prep sheet for the Genesis creation lesson.

The Genesis story takes two forms: first, the creation of the heavens and earth in a series of six days followed by a day of rest; and second, the story of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. These two stories contradict one another at times, and if Genesis were submitted for publication today as a brand-new manuscript, it would probably go through much revision.

The first creation story (Genesis 1:1–2:4) is a methodical story beginning with the chaos of a dark, formless void that in six days becomes a flourishing, diverse earth with living creatures of all kinds. This creation account moves from confusion to order in a logical sequence by the command of the all-powerful God. The source of this writing is generally attributed to the **Priestly** writer, or "**P**."

The second creation story (Genesis 2:4–25) begins with the creation of a human from the dust of the ground. Here, too, God is the creator. But God is personified-planting a garden, breathing into the nostrils of the human being-which playfully allows for errors in creation. The source of this creation story is ascribed to the **Yahwist** writer, or "J."

Despite their literary differences, both creation stories point to one thing: God is the creator, and we are part of God's good creation. Boundaries between creator and creation have been set; there is order in the world between God and humans, humans and animals, and in the interrelationships within humanity.

The creation stories of Genesis tell us who we are and where we came from while still acknowledging the deep mystery of God. Some things just can't be explained, even with a really good story. What we do know is that we, male and female, were created in God's own image (1:27) and that "God saw everything that [God] had made, and indeed, it was very good" (1:31). Although God created us for good, it did not take long for humanity to push the boundaries. Genesis reveals a world where humans' less-than-perfect

decisions have consequences. God does not control us, nor can we control God. Rather, we are called to live faithfully and responsibly within our relationship with God the creator.

Human beings have been given a special place in God's creation, but it comes with a burden: Men and women share the task of being conscientious stewards of the earth and all creation. Humans need one another and should not take the gifts of creation for granted. We also need boundaries! The stories of the people in Genesis read like stories about small children testing the boundaries set by parents. There are consequences for going beyond, but there is also grace in forgiveness.

Many teenagers can relate to the story of Adam and Eve pushing the boundaries that God gave them. Like a good parent's discipline, boundaries are set out of love to protect and preserve. For teenage students struggling with normal adolescent anxieties like acne and awkwardness, it is very helpful to truly know that we are created in God's own image, created to be good. Our lives are to be lived as a reflection of the image of God.

The Bible is a story of a living people that is passed on through the ages largely by oral tradition. Most cultures throughout human history have had some sort of creation story; Judeo-Christians are no different. In fact, our creation stories share similar themes. Universal foundation stories help us understand what it means to be human and where we came from in a divine sense. Genesis reads like a family history of the people who will be the nation, Israel. The central points are that God loves us, God alone created us, and chaos will not win.

The two versions of the creation story show us that the Bible should not be read as a science or history book. The issue of creationism has been distorted in contemporary thought, polarizing hard science against religious meaning. The writers of these biblical words lived in different worldly understandings and could not have foreseen the unfortunate modern battle that has pitted faith against fact. The earth is undoubtedly billions of years old; our religious ancestors could not have known such geological and anthropological facts, nor could they have particularly cared as it relates to our relationship with God the creator.
