Younger Possible 1

Heavenly Father wants all of His children to return to Him. - Possible Activity 'A'

- ▶ Give one child a coin, another child a picture of a sheep, and another child a picture of the prodigal son (LDS.org).
- ▶ Tell the three parables found in <u>Luke 15</u> and invite the children to hold up their coin or picture when you mention it.
- ➤ You could invite the children to retell the parables to each other in their own words.

Heavenly Father wants all of His children to return to Him. - Possible Activity 'B'

- ▶ Share a time when they lost something.
- Explain that people can become lost spiritually when they don't feel God's love or when they turn away from Him.
- ► Testify that these parables teach that God wants us to help people who are lost come back to Him.

Heavenly Father wants all of His children to return to Him. - Possible Activity 'C'

- ▶ Invite the children to think of other children who don't come to Primary.
- ► Help them write notes inviting these children to attend Primary or a Primary activity.
- ► How else can we help these children feel Heavenly Father's love for them?

Younger Possible 2

I can show my love for Heavenly Father by being grateful for my blessings. - Possible Activity 'A'

- ► Tell the story of the ten lepers who were healed by Jesus.
- ► Show the picture found in this week's outline in Come, Follow Me—For Individuals and Families and invite the children to count to ten on their fingers.
- ► Then ask them to put down nine fingers to show the one leper who thanked Jesus.
- ▶ When have the children expressed their gratitude to a friend or loved one?

I can show my love for Heavenly Father by being grateful for my blessings. Possible Activity 'B'

- Invite each child to act out something he or she is grateful for, and have the rest of the children guess what it is.
- Ask the children to share ways we can show Heavenly Father that we are thankful for our blessings.

Younger Possible 3

We believe that Jesus is the Son of God. - Possible Activity 'A'

- ► Summarize the story of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead (see also <u>"Chapter 43: Jesus Brings Lazarus Back to Life,"</u> New Testament Stories, 107–9, or the corresponding video on LDS.org) and show a dead branch and a living plant.
- ▶ Bear your testimony that because of the power of Jesus Christ, people who are dead will be resurrected and live forever.

- ► Help the children memorize the phrase that Jesus said to Martha: "I am the resurrection, and the life" (John 11:25).
- ► Explain that because of the Savior's Resurrection, we will once again see our loved ones who have died.

Older Possible 1

I can help Jesus find His lost sheep. - Possible Activity 'A'

► Assign each child to read silently either the parable of the lost sheep or the parable of the lost coin, found in Luke 15:1–10, and share what they learned.

I can help Jesus find His lost sheep. - Possible Activity 'B'

- ▶ Write these names on the board: father, older son, and younger son.
- ▶ Show the video "The Prodigal Son" (LDS.org) and pause it occasionally so the children can write on the board some of the feelings of the people listed.

I can help Jesus find His lost sheep.

- Possible Activity 'C'

- Ask a child to leave the room while the other children hide a coin or paper sheep.
- Have the child return and look for the coin or sheep. Remind the children that people can become lost to the blessings of the gospel.
- ▶ Invite them to suggest ways they can reach out to such people.
- ▶ Sing together with the children <u>"Dear to the Heart of the Shepherd,"</u> Hymns, no. 221, and testify of the joy that comes when people return to God.

I can help Jesus find His lost sheep.

- Possible Activity 'D'
- ▶ Explain that Jesus used the lost sheep, the lost coin, and the prodigal son to represent people who are "lost" because they do not have the blessings of the gospel.
- Invite the children to think of people they know who don't come to church.
- ▶ What can they do to help these people feel Heavenly Father's love for them?

Older Possible 2

I can show my love for Heavenly Father by being grateful for my blessings. Possible Activity 'A'

- ▶ Read together the account of the ten lepers.
- ► How was the leper who gave thanks blessed for his gratitude?
- ▶ Why is it important to thank God for our blessings?

Invite the children to list things they are grateful for that start with each letter of their name.

- ► They could hang the notes by their beds to remind them to express gratitude when they pray.

Older Possible 3

- ▶ Write on the board some statements spoken by people in <u>John 11</u>. Invite the children to guess who said each statement, and ask them to search <u>John 11</u> to check their guesses.
- ► How would they feel if they were Jesus, Martha, Mary, or Lazarus?
- How can believing in Jesus help us when we are sad or scared?

- ▶ Read Martha's testimony, found in <u>John 11:20–27</u>.
- Ask the children to look for words and phrases that show that Martha had faith.
- ▶ What can we do to have faith when it is hard?

- Explain that everyone will be resurrected, but only the righteous will receive eternal life and live with Heavenly Father and Jesus Christ again.



▶ 12 Therefore all things <u>whatsoever</u> ye would that <u>men</u> should <u>do</u> to you, <u>do</u> ye even so to them: for this is the <u>law</u> and the prophets.

Matthew 7:24

▶ 24 ¶ Therefore whosoever <u>heareth</u> these sayings of mine, and <u>doeth</u> them, <u>I</u> will liken him unto a <u>wise</u> man, which <u>built</u> his house upon <u>a rock</u>:

- ▶ 1 <u>aTake heed</u> that ye do not your <u>balms</u> before men, to be seen of them: otherwise ye have no reward of your Father which is in heaven.
- ▶ 2 Therefore when thou doest *thine* alms, do not sound a trumpet before thee, as the <u>ahypocrites</u> do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may have <u>balory</u> of men. Verily I say unto you, They have their reward.
- ▶ 3 But when thou doest alms, let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth:

- ▶ **4** That thine <u>alms</u> may be in secret: and thy Father which seeth in secret himself shall <u>breward</u> thee openly.
- ▶ **5** ¶ And when thou prayest, thou shalt not be as the <u>ahypocrites</u> are: for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and in the corners of the streets, that they may be seen of men. Verily I say unto you, They have their reward.
- ▶ 6 But thou, when thou prayest, enter into thy <u>acloset</u>, and when thou hast <u>bshut</u> thy door, <u>spray</u> to thy Father which is in <u>dsecret</u>; and thy Father which <u>eseeth</u> in secret shall <u>freward</u>thee openly.

- ▶ 13 <u>aAnd blead</u> us not into <u>stemptation</u>, <u>abut</u> deliver us from evil: For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the <u>eglory</u>, for ever. Amen.
- ▶ 14 For if ye <u>aforgive</u> men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you:
- ▶ 15 But if ye <u>aforgive</u> not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses.
- ▶ 16 ¶ Moreover when ye fast, be not, as the hypocrites, of a sad countenance: for they disfigure their faces, that they may appear unto men to <u>afast</u>. Verily I say unto you, They <u>bhave</u> their reward.

- ▶ 17 But thou, when thou fastest, anoint thine head, and wash thy face;
- ▶ 18 That thou appear not unto men to <u>afast</u>, but unto thy Father which is in secret: and thy Father, which seeth in secret, shall <u>breward</u> thee openly.
- ▶ 19 ¶ Lay not up for yourselves <u>atreasures</u> upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves <u>bbreak</u> through and steal:
- 20 But lay up for yourselves atreasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor bsteal:
- ▶ 21 For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

- ▶ 22 The light of the body is the eye: if therefore thine <u>aeye</u> be <u>bsingle</u>, thy whole body shall be full of <u>clight</u>.
- ▶ 23 But if thine eye be evil, thy whole body shall be full of darkness. If therefore the light that is in thee be darkness, how great is that adarkness!
- ▶ 24 ¶ and man can be serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon.
- ▶ 25 <u>aTherefore</u> I say unto you, Take no <u>bthought</u> for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than meat, and the body than raiment?

- ▶ 26 Behold the fowls of the air: for they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feedeth them. Are ye not much better than they?
- ▶ 27 Which of you by taking thought can add one cubit unto his stature?
- ▶ 28 And why take ye thought for raiment? aconsider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they toil not, neither do they spin:
- ▶ 29 And yet I say unto you, That even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these.
- ▶ 30 Wherefore, if God so clothe the grass of the field, which to day is, and to morrow is cast into the oven, ashall he not much more clothe you, O ye of little beginth?

- ▶ 31 Therefore take no thought, saying, What shall we eat? or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewithal shall we be clothed?
- ▶ 32 (For after all these things do the Gentiles seek:) for your heavenly Father aknoweth that ye have need of all these things.
- ▶ 33 aBut bseek ye first the ckingdom of God, and his drighteousness; and all these things shall be dadded unto you.
- ▶ **34** Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take <u>athought</u> for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day *is* the evil thereof.

- ▶ 1 <u>aJudge</u> not, that ye be not <u>bjudged</u>.
- ▶ 2 For with what <u>ajudgment</u> ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what <u>bmeasure</u> ye mete, it shall be <u>cmeasured</u> to you again.
- ▶ 3 <u>And</u> why beholdest thou the <u>bmote</u> that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the <u>cbeam</u> that is in thine own eye?
- ▶ 4 Or how wilt thou say to thy brother, Let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and, behold, a beam is in thine own eye?
- ▶ 5 Thou <a href="https://example.com/packed-street-out-street-ou

- ▶ 6 ¶ aGive not that which is bholy unto the dogs, neither cast ye your pearls before swine, lest they trample them under their feet, and turn again and rend you.
- ▶ 7 ¶ <u>aAsk</u>, and it shall be <u>bgiven</u> you; <u>seek</u>, and ye shall find; <u>dknock</u>, and it shall be opened unto you:
- ▶ 8 For every one that asketh receiveth; and he that <u>aseeketh</u> findeth; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened.
- ▶ **9** Or what man is there of you, whom if his son ask <u>abread</u>, will he give him a stone?
- ▶ 10 Or if he ask a fish, will he give him a serpent?

- ▶ 11 If ye then, <u>abeing evil</u>, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father which is in heaven give good things to them that ask him?
- ▶ 12 Therefore all things <u>awhatsoever</u> ye would that <u>bmen</u> should <u>cdo</u> to you, <u>ddo</u> ye even so to them: for this is the <u>elaw</u> and the prophets.
- ▶ 13 ¶ Enter ye in at the <u>astrait bate</u>: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to <u>destruction</u>, and many there be which go in thereat:
- ▶ 14 Because <u>astrait</u> is the <u>bate</u>, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto <u>clife</u>, and few there be that find it.

- ▶ 15 ¶ Beware of <u>afalse prophets</u>, which come to you in <u>bsheep's</u>clothing, but <u>cinwardly</u> they are ravening <u>dwolves</u>.
- ▶ 16 Ye shall <u>aknow</u> them by their <u>bfruits</u>. Do men gather grapes of thorns, or figs of thistles?
- ▶ 17 Even so every good tree bringeth forth agood bfruit; but a corrupt tree bringeth forth devil fruit.
- ▶ 18 A good tree cannot bring forth evil fruit, neither can a corrupt tree bring forth good fruit.
- ▶ 19 Every tree that bringeth not forth good <u>afruit</u> is <u>bhewn</u>down, and cast into the fire.

- ▶ 20 Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them.
- ▶ 21 ¶ Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven.
- ▶ 22 Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy bname have cast out devils? and in thy name done many wonderful works?
- ▶ 23 And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity.
