July 30 – Julie Niederhauser, Public Library Coordinator, was the driving force behind a three-year grant awarded to the Alaska Library Network (ALN) for \$728k from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) Laura Bush 21st Century Librarian Program. ALN, in partnership with the American Library Association, the Alaska State

Library, and San José State University, will provide financial and scaffolded student support to 15 American Indian, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian graduate students to earn master's degrees in library and information science. The grant will support the recruitment, training, and development of these Indigenous librarians and contribute to growing a diverse and skilled professional workforce. Image of IMLS logo.

August 6 - Kathy Rado did a talk at the APK on Weaving with Sea Otter Fur. She has been weaving in the raven's tail style for three decades and wove this sea otter fur robe for her husband. Raven's tail is a very old hand-weaving technique featuring geometric patterns that predates the more familiar Chilkat robes. This geometric style died out in the early 1800s, and today, only a dozen early robes (or fragments thereof) exist in museums around the world. Kathy based this robe on two surviving similar fur-warp robes currently located in a museum in Russia.

August 6 - *Illustrating Alaska* traveling exhibit hits the road at the Sitka Public Library. August 28 – In a panel at the APK, artist and filmmaker Jiabao Li and collaborators Lindsay Clark and Cooper Galvin discussed the creative process of the series of works created on Alaska's glaciers. The film *Glacier's Lament* was shot on the Mendenhall Glacier and featured music and dance choreographed from the data about glaciers melting over the past years.

Their talk focused on the *Tundra Times*, a newspaper whose copyright is legally unrestricted and in the public domain, but a title for which ownership was transferred to an Alaskan Native group out of respect. This mixture of law and indigenous copyright had to be addressed with great care by program staff. 
This workshop will be OUTDOORS at the APK and is recommended for ages 8 and up. Request a spot by filling out the <u>participation form</u>.
