This particular Locust was sold as surplus after WW2 to be used as farm equipment. It was pulling farm machinery around a field in Indiana for years, then changed hands three times, one of the owners being Bayliss Restorations, Mims, FL (USA). It is currently undergoing restoration. The former owner replaced the original engine with a 300 chevy engine and got rid of the original engine. The current owner has put a 350 chevy engine instead
