
#### "ATG 101" Information Brief 11 April, 2011

  - District-level Police Advisor Teams (PATs) supporting the AUP
- Enabling Partner-Mentor Teams deploying to OEF
  - Globally sourced teams in support of ANP hierarchy
    - Sub-Zone Mentor Teams
    - Border Mentor Teams
    - Regional Operations Coordination Center (OCC-R) Teams
- Security Cooperation Teams
  - Sourced by units tasked with SC or SFA missions

Teams deploying to conduct combat advising are the top priority.


- Embedded Partner-Mentor Teams via eight EMV rotations (1,132 personnel):

  - Two LAR battalions
    - Two Police Advisor Teams (AUP) per battalion
  - Three artillery battalions
    - One combat support (CS) Kandak (ANA) ETT per battalion; 19 personnel per ETT
  - Five Combat Logistics Battalions (CLBs)
    - One CSS Kandak (ANA) ETT per battalion; 19 personnel per ETT
  - One Regimental Combat Team
    - One brigade-level ETT (ANA)
    - One Police Team (AUP)
  - One MAGTF (MEF-FWD) Headquarters




#### A Trained Marine Advisor

# **Training Methods**



- Immersive rehearsal of common advisor situations supported by up to 800 host-nation role players
  - Rapport building
  - Combined operations planning
  - Mounted and dismounted tactical operations
  - Counter-insurgency operations
  - Police operations, site exploitation, detainee handling
  - Integration of PRTs and the "whole of government" approach
  - Assessment of ANSF counterparts (DOTMLPF and CUAT)
- Live-fire foreign weapons training and motorized patrol course
- CIED training (ATN and DtD) integrated into all events
- Integrated training with parent battalions to support partnered operations during "Ground-Air Integration Training (GAIT), and "Clear, Hold, Build" exercises (CHB-1, CHB-2, CHB-4)
- ATG conducts academic instruction on partnered operations and ANSF development during regimental and battalion staff training (Spartan Resolve), as well as during the MCTOG COIN Course



# **Training Standards**



- ATG applies the Systems Approach to Training (SAT) methods to all aspects of training
  - Analyze, design, develop, implement, evaluate
- COCOM, MARFOR, and Service directives determine what tasks ATG trains and assesses
  - ATG has worked with HQMC PP&O, TECOM, MARCENT, and all three Marine Expeditionary Forces to achieve consensus on what PTP tasks must be trained and assessed
  - MCO 3502.6, Marine Corps Force Generation Process breaks defines pre-deployment training and assessment responsibilities by "block"
- Marine Corps Training and Readiness (T&R) Manuals define the conditions and standards for training
  - NAVMC 3500.59, Advise, Train, and Assist T&R Manual
  - NAVMC 3500.87, Infantry T&R Manual
  - NAVMC 3500.10, *Military Police and Corrections T&R Manual*



#### **Evaluation Methods**



- Initial assessment of war-fighting and advisor skills
  - Communications, weapons, and medical hands-on testing and remediation
  - Language and culture oral and written testing
- ATG works through role players to drive particular learning objectives
  - Purposeful approbation or rebuke from the role players typically makes more of a lasting impression than debrief points alone
  - Marine Advisor Rapport Assessment Program also employed
- ATG personnel observe all training and assess designated tasks according to SAT manual and applicable references
  - Mastery or non-mastery of sub tasks yields assessment of collective tasks
- Final assessment of team and unit performance reported to parent MEF via MAGTFTC

## **Training Enablers**



- All training is supported by a sizeable cadre of host nation role players
  - Contract provides role players who are fluent in the partnernation's language and understand the culture
  - Over 190 role players in direct support of ATG during OEF PMT training; over 800 in support of EMV
  - ATG conducts role player academy to indoctrinate role players on training objectives and expected behavior
- CAOCL instructor support
  - Additional language and culture classes as part of POI
  - CAOCL culture SMEs observe training and provide feedback
- MAGTFTC PRT and interagency subject matter experts

   Provide "in-character" education and training as PRT role players
- Equipment sets that replicate OEF EDL

- Language training
  - Need for assessment methods that are

    - Simple
    - Economical
  - Determining the most effective learning modalities
    - Live instructors
    - Computer-based
      - Avatars
      - Games
      - Rosetta Stone
  - Adaptability for different languages & cultures
    - Supports steady-state SFA operations







- Law enforcement training
  - Training Marines to train police
    - Marines are not police
    - Police are not lightly-armed soldiers
  - "Protect and serve"
  - Ability to quickly learn about the host-nation's criminal justice system
  - Building experience base quickly
    - Myriad scenarios and challenges for police that over a career, build an officer's overall competence
- Counterinsurgency training
  - Understanding second- and third-order effects
