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




ACT II. SCENE 1

Bunk returns - not as Precious - but as Mr. Robinson. While Bunk suffered physical amnesia, Momma suffered psychological amnesia.

Bunk knocks on Momma's bedroom door, and for the first time, she answers the door.

DIRECTOR NOTES

In many of my promotional efforts for this particular work, I have often referred to Who's There? as a cross between Joseph Kesselring's Arsenic and Old Lace and Samuel Beckett's Waiting for Godot. When I first read — and then later saw — Waiting for Godot so many, many years ago, I found myself deeply moved by it. Oftentimes, life does seem to be that little thing that happens to us while we wait. Although influenced at the time by many of the Theatre of the Absurd playwrights, I was particularly enamored with the work of



Beckett and Harold Pinter. Their works best addressed the stark reality life mirrored in the existential question: *Why am I here?* Thus, <u>Who's There</u> became for me my own quest to find meaning in a world that sometimes does not seem to offer any. Whether I happened to adhere to all the aspects of the Theatre of the Absurd style or not, there is indeed one to which I do adhere: The "purpose [is] to provoke thought with laughter." If pressed to describe this work, then I guess I would have to say "Theatre of the Absurd with a southern slant," and I'll let you, the audience, decide what that slant is. 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


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PROFILES (In order of appearance)


