

Ash Wednesday Is March &

Lenten Theme: Things the Bible Doesn't Say

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 6. The ashes are a sign of our repentance, and we will worship with Mid-Day Quiet Communion at 12:15pm and then with Holy Communion and Imposition of Ashes at 7:00pm.

Our Wednesday worship services during Lent will be centered around Responsive Prayer (also called Sufferages). Our Lenten Theme this year is "Things the Bible Doesn't Say." Pastor Gary will explore with us various "sayings" prevalent in our culture that are often thought to originate in the Bible, but which really don't, and which sometime speak a message far different than what the Bible says. We will begin on Ash Wednesday with the topic: "The Devil Made Me Do It". Other topics through Maundy Thursday will be: "Money Is the Root of All Evil," "God Helps Those Who Help Themselves," "God Won't Give You More than You Can Handle," "God Needed Another Angel in Heaven," "God Is On Our Side," and "Everything Happens for a Reason."



Our Wednesday worships will be at 7:00pm. Starting March 13, we will offer a supper prior to the worship (6:00pm). Come join us!.

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I say it every Monday night at worship and whenever we have a baptism at worship. Three lines, all with the same answer from you:

Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God?

I renounce them.

Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God?

I renounce them.

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God?

I renounce them.

They are intriguing questions, and perhaps our renunciation rolls off our tongues without a whole lot of thought. Maybe as we begin this Lenten season, a time of repentance and awareness of our sin, we should give them a bit more consideration.

Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God? First, the question implies our assent that there are forces out there defying God. To renounce something means 'to formally declare one's abandonment of' or 'to reject and stop using or consuming." There's an old story of a man on his deathbed who refused to renounce the devil when the pastor asked. He said, "This is no time to be antagonizing anyone." But the question asks us to do exactly that. It asks us to affirm that not only do we strive to be on God's side, but also that we completely reject all that opposes God. What might that mean for your life? What might that mean for how you are living, for the choices you make? When we answer this question by renouncing the devil and the forces opposing God, we are truly saying, "Get behind me Satan," and putting God before us.

Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God? Having renounced the spiritual realm opposing God, we now turn to the powers of this world. This one may be even more difficult for us. The world entices us in so many ways, in so many subtle ways that it's easy not to think about. It's so easy to go along with the crowd or to seek what's popular and



common in our society and culture. That's the easy road. But to reject all that, to renounce it, is to ask ourselves all sorts of uncomfortable questions: How does my lifestyle contribute to the poverty or harm of others, even on the other side of the world? How has my consumerism consumed me to the point that I am blind to it's effect on me and

others? How can I be so comfortable and at ease when others aren't? I have told often of the man who said, "You've heard that you should give until it hurts. I think we should give until it stops hurting." In other words, we should ache for the needs of others that we can't rest until they are no more. Is that what it means to reject the powers of this world?

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God? Here we admit that it is our very nature to sin. It's not just the things outside in the spiritual realm or in our world that draw us away from God. We draw ourselves away too. Our own greed, lusts, desires; our own self-centeredness and placing ourselves first draw us away.

The ashes on our foreheads are a reminder. They remind us of our sin, of our participation in our sin, of our helplessness against sin and the forces aligned against us. But this year, as we see the ashes, maybe too, we can remember the water put in the exact same place in our baptisms, when God said, "You are mine."

In the midst of renouncing all these, perhaps we could affirm their opposites:

I affirm God and all the forces that work on God's behalf.

I affirm those seeking to do good in the world because of God and join with them.

I affirm what God has done to forgive and save me and that I belong to God forever.

I say it every Monday night at worship and whenever we have a baptism. Maybe we could all say it every day.

Why We Do What We Do – Lent



What is it about Lent? Why do we gather for these special worship services in this period leading up to Easter.? Actually, this tradition goes back a long way. Originally, Lent began as a brief period between Palm Sunday and Easter. A new Christian would be baptized on Palm Sunday and then spend a week in penitent prayer and fasting in order to receive their first communion on Easter Sunday. Over the

years, this period of prayer and fasting was extended to 40 days. Some say it was extended to 40 days in remembrance of the 40 days of Jesus being tempted in the wilderness after his baptism, or perhaps the 40 years the Hebrews wondered in the wilderness on the way to the promised land.

Lent can be understood as a time of spiritual discipline. Some people choose to give up something for Lent as a way of sacrificing for their faith. Such denial of the self helps strengthen faith and demonstrate to oneself a depth of faith. Lent can also be understood as a time of repentance. In this season we are reminded in stark ways of Jesus' suffering and death on our behalf, of our sin, and of our need to return to God.

If you count the days between Ash Wednesday and Easter, you will, however, find that there are 46, not 40. That's because the Sundays in Lent don't count. Every Sunday is a little celebration of Easter, although the Sundays in Lent are still more somber in nature. One small way you can see this demonstrated is that we've had, say, the Third Sunday **of** Epiphany or 12th Sunday **After** Pentecost. But during Lent, the wording is: the Second Sunday **in** Lent.

The Shrove Tuesday tradition began as people sought to get fats and sweets out of their homes before the somber Lenten season. After six weeks of no sweets or fats, having them on Easter enhances the celebration of Christ's victory and marks the change Christ makes.

In recent years, it has been suggested that rather than giving up something for Lent, perhaps a better "fast" is to take something on. Maybe take on an hour a week volunteering for a needy cause. Maybe give up one meal eating out a week and donate the money to world hunger. Take on doing something good for someone else instead of giving something up.

That's exactly what we don't want, at least when we are inside our church building. Our ancestors in the faith here have bequeathed us a wonderful building in which to gather, worship, and serve. Unfortunately, eventually,

things have to be repaired and renewed. We are rapidly nearing the end of the life span of our flat roof (according to our roofer), and in the coming years, we are going to need to do something. The Council has been inviting gifts to help defray this anticipated cost (\$125,000+) and has scheduled a Capital Appeal for early next year as well. Another major item before us is our front parking lot. The parking lot is a visible statement to our community about how we care for our Church, so it's important too. Our roof/parking lot needs mark a great place to give special gifts, honoraria and memorials. If you would like to make a special gift, honor someone or memorialize someone, consider adding to this fund.

Internet Improvements On the Way

Redeemer has long had open access wifi internet throughout our building – or at least we have tried to. If you've tried to use it, particularly in our Fellowship Center or the Back Conference room, sometimes it works and sometimes it doesn't. The internet enters our building up in the office area, and then is relayed wirelessly to the rest of the building. When it works, it's great. When it doesn't, it can be frustrating.

Recently, wired access points were donated to the church. We're still working out a couple of kinks, but when these are put up, you should find that you have much better access to the internet throughout our building. Thanks, Tech Team!

We are often tempted to overlook the beauty and richness of our liturgy and our worship services because they've become part of our routine. It's so easy to overlook the truly beautiful things in our lives and take them for granted. Seeing this graceful old bookcase made me realize the many things God has blessed us with that we fail to see because we're surrounded by them daily.

Secondly, I was struck by the intricate details on this piece and thought about the craftsmanship and artistry that went into making this piece. In an IKEA era, it's refreshing to see something that took time, care, skill, and patience to craft. We try to put that care and craftmanship into our worship services. Yes, it takes a lot of time, lots of practice, deliberate coordination, and just plain hard work to put worship services together, but hopefully the results are something that uplifts us and points us to God and deepens our faith. It's not that it's old that makes this piece so beautiful to me. It's the artistry behind it. And so it is with worship experiences. It doesn't have to be old and stogy to be meaningful and beautiful.

Finally, this piece was handed down to me, and I'll hand it down to one of my kids. And such is our liturgy. It is a beautiful expression of our faith that's been handed down to us by people who have spent a lot of time and thought into developing our pattern of worship. I hope we get a chance to hand it down to the next generation. Hopefully, they'll see the beauty with fresh eyes.











Council Approves New Search Committee to Fill Position for Youth, Family Ministry and Outreach

Several months ago, Redeemer's Council put together a Strategic Planning Team to consider Redeemer's needs and desires as we move forward following Sarah Bowers' departure. The Team looked at Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats facing our congregation, and then ranked them for the Council to consider action as we move forward. In early February, the Team met and offered the recommendation that the Council seek a person to fill a position focused on Youth Ministry, Family Ministry, and congregational Outreach. Council approved the recommendation and has authorized chair Paul Austin and Pastor Gary to initiate conversations at the Synod Office and in the near future, Council will be creating a search committee to find the right person for Redeemer.

In February, Pastor Gary also presented some ideas regarding a Capital Appeal to fund our roof and parking lot projects. Two years ago, Redeemer was advised that our roof likely had about 5 years of life remaining. Our front parking lot (Fellowship Hall around to Preschool Covered Drive) is in need of repair and speaks to our community about how we care for our building. Some generous gifts have been received already, but current estimates of what we will need for these two projects is somewhere between \$225,000-\$250,000. Council asked Pastor Gary to provide a suggested Appeal theme. Pastor Gary suggested the theme "Foundations for the Future" because as we care for our roof and our parking lot, we are building a foundation for the future of ministry here at Redeemer. Council struggled with the timing of when to engage in this Appeal, and suggested that early in January 2020 would be the right time. Any gifts until then are appreciated and reduce the amount we will need then.

Pastor Gary also offered an update on the Scout Troop resources that now belong to Redeemer. Council had asked if the Williamsburg County ministry could use the 14 foot trailer, and they have received it with gratitude. Earl Wells will be working on cleaning out the • Scout Room and the large Conex box on the west side of our building. Council is exploring moving the box to the back of our property (less obtrusive), and using it to store large items for Williamsburg County. Pastor will ask Tim Campbell for help in determining what kind of pad we might want to put down in the new location (concrete, concrete corners, crush and run?).

In other business, the Council heard reports and expressed appreciation to our Strategic Planning Team as they complete their work and (cont. p. 7)
