

Moving Forward


Dear friends,

It was a great joy to go to the ECO National Gathering in Dallas in February. It was a time filled with vibrant worship, good fellowship and multiple opportunities to grow. Additionally, we are planning to share our experience at 10 a.m. Sunday, March 8, in the Fellowship Hall. I hope you join us.

I believe ECO is asking a number of the right questions as the church discerns how to be faithful disciples in the world today. "ECO" (not E.-C.-O.) should evoke "eco-system" – we are about creating a "flourishing environment" in which we can "plant churches and grow disciples." (Incidentally, Mike Lavespere just joined the SC Presbytery ECO church planting team.)

On another note, I am so pleased with the session. I delight in their collective wisdom, hard work and earnestness in following the Lord.



I do want you to be aware that we now meet twice a month - and one of these meetings is purely for an hour of prayer. We are seeking the Lord to show us the way forward as a congregation. It will take time and I sense the Lord pacing us, even as we are doing some necessary organizing. As you may know, the session has shrunk over the past years down to 12 elders. This means only two elders are assigned to each one of our six ministry units, and this massive amount of work is now being spread out as we grow our teams. I do believe we are growing in our core ECO value of

"engaging the laity." We do desire each covenant partner to live out their gifts to God's glory.

In addition to growing in prayer together, here are a few things to take delight in:

• FPC is sponsoring a tiny house build as part of the House of Hope (see Debbie Jackson if you have questions);

• There is a matching-fund program for the Emerts fruitful work in Zambia (see Janet Brand);

• The second group of "Jobs for Life" cohort will launch soon (this is a job training program that helps prepare men and women for meaningful work through honest relationships, mentoring, workforce development training, and an ongoing community of support; see Bryon Frost)

• We are reading The Master Plan of Evangelism by Robert Coleman.

I enjoy hearing feedback, and if you have some thoughts on how to communicate and be transparent as a Body, I would love to chat as we move forward. Peace,

Dressed as her main character in her book, *The Missing Piece*, Grace DuBose reads to the CDC children and Keenagers during Keenagers' February program.

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
A Thought or Two Challenging You Toward Discipleship Check out the booklet library

So much is happening that we could consider.

First, let me share that our Fellowship elders, Jayne Boswell and Betsy Olsen, have brought to us a booklet library that will give us helpful insight to many issues we face in our time.

This booklet library in our Welcome Center covers issues such as parenting, worry, temptation, retirement, caregiving, cancer, and leading your child to Christ. Written from a counseling perspective they will help folks begin thinking there way through some of the difficult times in life. Not only will these resources help you personally, but also they could be a resource you use to help someone you know dealing with one of these issues. There are 30 titles to choose from so most likely there will something helpful.

Secondly, be aware that Restoration Calling is the name of a ministry born out of a community group in our congregation. The Halls, the Canfields, the Fleenors, the Hughes, Lindsey Bannister, Danny Jones, Stan Bergstram and the Handleys have been packing food boxes once a month for the last year and half at Southern Calvary Baptist (Ron Echols' home church). During the course of this time we met Mary Freyer, a 76-year-old woman on disability. She lives in her home at 525 Jefferson St. This home was built in 1926 and has come to the end of its usefulness. There is no running water. The floors are rot-



ting so badly that the kitchen sink is falling through the floor. The long and short of it is that this community group, led by Chris Canfield, has taken on a project to provide Mary with adequate housing on the land that she owns. So far three city councilmen have weighed in to help. The city is going to provide Mary temporary housing while the group seeks to raise funds to build her adequate housing.

I shared a few words yesterday in worship about our ECO National Gathering experience in early February. The bottom line is that the time in Dallas was gift. We were both encouraged and challenged during the event. One thing that ECO leadership has set before us as a goal is church planting. Currently our denomination has 393 congregations. By the year 2029, our goal is to hit 1000 churches, church plants or missional communities. The Presbytery of South Carolina has a Church Planting Team (CPT) that elder Mike Lavespere from First Presbyterian Florence has joined. The CPT will be visioning in the months ahead about where and how to plant churches in our state/presbytery. If you would like to join Mike on the CPT, there's room for you. Stay tuned for more information about the Gathering as we meet on March 8 during the Sunday school hour. Let's all be challenged to a greater discipleship to our Lord!

The Interconnected Gathering

I am grateful to have had the opportunity to attend the ECO National Gathering in Dallas last month. The theme for the gathering was **"Interconnected"** based on Hebrew 10:24, which reads: **And let us consider**



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how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds. It was a great time of fellowship for the eleven of us from First Presbyterian. More importantly, I think, was gathering with nearly 3,000 other folks from across the United States for a time of inspiring worship, large group sessions and

breakout sessions all focused on challenging us to be the church in new and different ways. Consider this from the conference brochure:

We are interconnected in relationship with churches and covenant partners across the country who want you and your congregations to flourish in order that God's kingdom may be made known throughout our communities and the world.

One of my "take-aways" from our time in Texas is that when people have a vision, God will make provision. We heard stories of churches who had a vision for something that seemed impossible only to see God make it happen!

First Presbyterian Church Columbarium and Memory Garden

At various times throughout the history of First Presbyterian Church, there has been talk of constructing a columbarium and memory garden for use by the covenant partners of First Presbyterian Church. A columbarium is a structure designed to hold urns containing the cremated remains of a loved one who has died. In 2015, a team (Ginger Owen, Glenn Bell, Susan Bankson, Greg Cleveland and George Beshere [2017]) was created and tasked with the responsibility of developing a plan to construct a columbarium and memory garden for First Presbyterian Church. The team conducted an interest survey in April 2019. Approximately 60 percent of those who responded to the survey answered the question either "Yes" or "Possibly." Based on the results of the Columbarium Interest Survey, the decision was made to move forward with the marketing phase for the Columbarium Memory Garden at First Presbyterian Church. The response to the marketing phase has been good and several of our covenant partners have reserved a niche. We have now moved into the construction phase with a targeted completion date later this spring (May/June).

The Columbarium team hopes that the covenant partners of First Presbyterian Church will benefit by having the Columbarium and Memory Garden as one of their choices in end of life planning. Do More ONREALM

First Presbyterian Church implemented a new ACS database system called REALM last year. Since then, many covenant partners, staff and leaders have taken advantage of this system to communicate with each other. REALM allows you to update your personal information, follow church announcements, and look up other covenant partners. REALM also allows you to manage your giving to First Presbyterian Church. You can access REALM from your home computer. You can also access REALM from your mobile device (phone, tablet, etc.) with RealmConnect. Simply download the Connect app from wherever you get your mobile apps (App Store, Google Play, etc.) If you have questions, contact Teresa Stewart in the church office and she'll be happy to help you get signed up. Our goal is for everyone to get connected. Let's be the church ... together.

Paul's advice to the church


1 CORINTHIANS 16: 1-24

In the final chapter of 1 Corinthians, Paul calls the Christians in Corinth to live by love and not with jealousy or division. The chapter divides into two parts with the first 12 verses dealing with two concerns expressed by the church. The first concern Paul deals with is the collection for the church in Jerusalem.

"Now concerning the collection for the saints: you should follow the directions I gave to the churches of Galatia. On the first day of every week, each of you is to put aside and save whatever extra you earn, so that collections need not be taken when I come. And when I arrive, I will send any whom you approve with letters to take your gift to Jerusalem (1 Corinthians 16:1-3)." Paul is not collecting money for himself but to unite the church between Jew and Gentile. He offers for the Corinthians to send someone with the collection. Paul wishes to visit the church. His plan is to spend several months with them. The Lord directs Paul's life and mission.

Paul writes to the Corinthians from Ephesus: "But I will stay in Ephesus until Pentecost, for a wide door for effective work has opened to me, and there are many adversaries I Corinthians 16:8-9)." Paul's missionary work is never without those who seek to undermine the ministry of salvation by grace. Timothy will represent Paul to the Corinthians.

The second concern in the first 12 verses is the status of Apollos. The Corinthians may have wanted Apollos to come and be their leader but Paul understands that it is not in the Lord's will at the present time. The second 12 verses give a final farewell, instructions, and Paul's travel plans. The second half of the letter begins

with a summary of the entire letter: "Keep alert, stand firm in your faith, be courageous, be strong. Let all that you do be done in love (I Corinthians 16:13-14)." This advice transcends the centuries since it was written and implies the full teachings of Jesus.

The themes of the letter are included in these statements. If we translate these into our world, we are reminded of the heritage of Paul and Jesus in the Hebrew faith. We are to stand in the faith of a crucified, risen and ascended Savior. Jesus saves us from the destruction all humans choose for themselves. Without the leading of God's Spirit each and every human would choose destruction. The directive that the Lord has given humanity is to live in love. The Lord sent Jesus to show love and the religious people had him killed. The love of God defeats death as Jesus is resurrected as the first fruits for all of humanity. Paul urges the church to follow the leaders that love the Lord.

Our evaluation of church leaders is to examine their love of God. It is important in our walk on earth as a Christian to place ourselves under those who are following Christ. Paul's final words are a reminder of his prayer for Jesus to come back to earth, for God's grace in Christ to bless the church, and that Paul's love is with the church. Love for one another and for the Lord is the primary emotion and action of the church.

God's Work in our Community House of Hope

The House of Hope is a non-profit ministry based organization that provides housing and support to men, women, and children in the Florence community. The House of Hope provides emergency, short-term, and transitional housing, as well as long-term support through its Life Recovery Program.

The Courtney McGinnis Graham community Shelter provides emergency and temporary housing, food, clothing and support to the homeless community. Guests at the shelter are able to meet with the case manager and connect with support to find help, housing, and employment. The shelter also provides emergency housing during times of extreme cold and heat with nobody being turned away.



The Life Recovery Program is another part of the ministry that provides long-term support, job training, financial guidance, substance recovery, and bible study. This program is a commitment of 9 months to one year long. Upon completion, graduates have the tools and support needed to work and live independently.

House of Hope includes two Mission Marts with 100 percent of the profits from the marts going to the ministry. And House of Hope will hold its Run for Hope in conjunction with the Downtown Roll this year. Save the date for the 5K: June 13!

God's Work Around the World

Chandan Sah Empower Believers Movement Nepal

One of the global missions First Presbyterian Church supports is the Empowerment Believers Connection is a network of indigenous (Indian) mission agencies that are planting churches and transforming communities throughout the northeastern state of Bihar. Bihar is 0.06 percent Christian. The state is mostly Hindu (80 percent), followed by a large Muslim population (18 percent) and a mix of Buddhism, Jainism, Seiks, etc.

EBC was founded and is led by Chandan Kumar Sah who employs multiple strategies to reach and transform communities, including: CHE (Community Health Evangelism), CPM (Church Planting Movements), DMM (Disciple Making Movements), and MED (Micro-Enterprise Development). Pramila, Chandan's wife, is instrumental in equipping and discipling women as she leads a strong women's ministry.



Empower Believers Movement Nepal (EBM-Nepal) is encouraging the leaders in the network to do Micro Enterprises Project to become self-supportive. Now EBM Nepal has provided Micro loans to 17 different leaders in the network. They are doing projects such as bicycle repairing shop, Sewing Center, Carpentry, Mobile Repairing Centre, Cosmetic shop, General store shop, Private Nursery School, etc.



Paying attention in an internet world

We have recently gotten a series of booklets that are available in the Welcome Center for your perusal and use. One of them is this booklet by Nicholas Black, Parenting in an Internet World. In it, Black quotes a 2001 study by social psychologists at the London School of Economics highlighted in the Guardian issue 28 February 2002. This study finds that 9 out of 10 children (ages 11 to 16) had viewed pornography on the internet. This is something we need to be concerned about as parents. In our internet world there is much to like about what it offers, but much to be concerned about what is available to our children.

Black says, "Pornography can capture the mind and heart of a child or teen almost instantly. And it can set the stage for years of inner



turmoil, along with depraved thinking, hiding, lying and experiencing deeply broken sexuality. Porn produces a warped concept of sexuality and relationships, which years later can erupt with destructive force in dating, marriage, family, or vocation."

As parents we pay attention to the traps that our children can fall into. We make sure that our children are protected from dangers encouraging wearing seat belts, staying away from drugs, setting curfew. But are we vigilant about what they have access to on the web? Let me encourage you to think about this and even get more help by reading the whole booklet by Nicholas Black.





The Culture Translator from Axis.org

• One of Generation Z's defining characteristics is a high level of loneliness and dissatisfaction in their network of friends. Many reporters, writers, sociologists, and psychologists point to social media as the primary reason for this pervasive sense of isolation. But what if the problem isn't social media itself, but rather how it's being used? An older article from i-D suggests younger people share more of themselves online in what's called "vulnerability p*rn" — a way of sharing candidly online about sad or vulnerable experiences and feelings. This results in a quick hit of attention, but ultimately an empty feeling for the sharer, since simply telling people what you've been through doesn't breed real intimacy.

Action step: Ask your teen if this is something they encounter often in their time online. Talk about how telling painful truths can be liberating while also shedding light on how sharing before processing pain with those closest to you can play out in ultimately unsatisfactory ways.
