

"A Symphony must be like the world ... it must contain everything." This program highlights how three titans of classical music tell the stories of other larger-than-life characters within our world, from kings to philosophers to heroes. The power



of music is on full display with George Frederic Handel's vivid soundtrack to a monarch's monumental 18th century fireworks display, Leonard Bernstein's creative depiction of a meeting between some of the greatest minds in history, and the unmatched symphonist Mahler's first spectacular foray into the genre that would cement his musical legacy for all time.

■ WHAT'S IN A NICKNAME?

Franz Josef Haydn's Symphony No. 96 and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's Symphony No. 41 were so legendary they each earned nicknames the composers could never have imagined. Composed within a few years of one another, Haydn's *The Miracle* and Mozart's *Jupiter* captured the ears, hearts, and minds of their audiences and took on lives of their own. These composers and their symphonies are just as relevant today as they were in the 1780s. The program also features Danish composer Carl Nielsen's Flute Concerto, a musical portrait dedicated to the flutist of the Copenhagen Wind Quintet.

Great works of music are often inspired by human relationships and the performance of music is almost always done in partnerships. There are few examples of collaboration between musicians that are more impressive than those found in an orchestra or concert band. All of the works on this creative concert program tell the tale of partnerships; those that are told by the music itself and those that bring it to life on the concert stage. Among these exciting and original works are two world premières: internationally lauded conductor and composer Gerard Schwarz's new transcription of his intensely personal tone poem about two sweethearts' tragic destiny and a substantial new transcription for band of Percy Grainger's incredibly inventive imaginary ballet *The Warriors*.

Music has the remarkable ability to convey emotions, transform feelings, tell stories, or portray the character of

someone or something. The latter quality is exemplified in the cornerstone of this program, Gustav Holst's large-scale orchestral suite depicting the astrological character of the planets. Paired with this monumental suite are two relatively newer works for band: John Mackey's *The Frozen Cathedral*, a portrait of Alaska's majestic icy peak of Denali, and William Bolcom's Concerto Grosso featuring a saxophone quartet.

The musical and personal lives of Romantic composers Robert and Clara Schumann and their contemporary Johannes Brahms were inextricably intertwined. At their very first meeting, Robert invited the relatively unknown twenty-year-old Brahms to his piano and was so taken that he ran to get his wife, Clara, to hear what he described as "genius." That night Clara took to her diary, writing, "Here is one who comes as if sent from God." Thereafter, Robert served as Brahms' mentor, dear friend, and unabashed supporter, even calling him "the next Beethoven." Following Robert Schumann's tragic suicide attempt and committal to an asylum several months later, Brahms vowed to stay with Clara until Robert's recovery. In the intervening two and a half years until Robert's death at age 46, Brahms realized he had found his "one great love" in Clara. The two never married, Brahms instead choosing to live by the motto "Frei Aber Einsam" [Lonely but Free]. Their unconsummated relationship continued for 40 years



until Clara's death in 1896. Stricken with grief, Brahms was physically unable to attend her funeral procession. After her burial, Brahms took ill and followed Clara to the grave less than 11 months later. The three composers' mutual love and influence lives on in their music.

Few would argue the musical sway Jean Sibelius held over Nordic composers, but he also significantly impacted the work of many British composers. William Walton subscribed to compositional techniques that were very similar to those of Sibelius when he composed his First Symphony. And although Sibelius was essentially a contemporary to Ralph Vaughan Williams, Vaughan Williams' initial pre-published inscription on his Fifth Symphony read, "Dedicated without permission and with the sincerest flattery to Jean Sibelius, whose example is worthy of all imitation." So it became the musical fashion of Great Britain to emulate the great Finnish composer.



stablished by an Act of Congress in 1798, the United States Marine Band is America's oldest continuously active professional musical organization. Its mission is unique—to provide music for the President of the United States and the Commandant of the Marine Corps.

President John Adams invited the Marine Band to make its White House debut on New Year's Day, 1801, in the then-unfinished Executive Mansion. In March of that year, the band performed for Thomas Jefferson's inauguration and is believed to have performed for every presidential inaugural since. An accomplished musician himself, Jefferson is credited with giving the Marine Band its title, "The President's Own."

Whether performing for State Dinners or South Lawn arrivals, events of national significance, or receptions, Marine Band musicians appear at the White House an average of 200 times each year. Every fall, the Marine Band performs throughout a portion of the continental United States during its National Concert Tour, a tradition initiated in 1891 by "The March King" John Philip Sousa, who was the band's legendary 17th Director from 1880-92.

While the Marine Band is firmly dedicated to preserving the musical traditions established over its long

history, it is equally committed to serving as a leading ensemble in the development of new repertoire for winds. In recent years, "The President's Own" has commissioned David Rakowski's Ten of a Kind (Symphony No. 2), "Scamp" by Pulitzer Prize-winning composer Melinda Wagner, and Flourishes and Meditations on a Renaissance Theme by Michael Gandolfi. Additionally, the band has premièred dozens of other works by composers such as Scott Lindroth, James Stephenson, Gerard Schwarz, Jacob Bancks, Laurence Bitensky, and Narong Prangcharoen. "The President's Own" also continues to attract prominent guest conductors to its podium including Osmo Vänskä, Leonard Slatkin, José Serebrier, Gerard Schwarz, Giancarlo Guerrero, and John Williams. During its bicentennial year in 1998, the Marine Band was the very first ensemble inducted into the Classical Music Hall of Fame in Cincinnati.

For more than two hundred years, the Marine Band has been an integral part of countless events that have helped shape the nation's identity and unique artistic culture. Now well into its third century of bringing music to the White House and to the American public, "The President's Own" continues to affirm that the arts are an invaluable bridge between people.
