Worthy Sir Knights, Ladies, and Friends.

Easter will soon be upon us. I pray Lent is spiritually enhancing for you and your family. March is full of special feast days. We celebrate St Joseph in this Year of St. Joseph as announced by Pope Francis. The Holy Father hopes that "every member of the faithful, following his example (St Joseph), may strengthen their life of faith daily in the complete fulfillment of GOD's will." There are so many traditions associated with St Joseph's feast day - St Joseph's table, St Joseph Altar, bread, fava beans, leaving a place at the table for someone in need. St Joseph is a great example for us as Knights and Catholics as a worker and as guardian and protector. You might consider checking out Father Calloway's book, Consecration to Saint Joseph. March also brings us the Annunciation of the Lord on March 25. Many will also remember St Patrick on 17 March. We remember St Casimir and St Basil as well.

The Maryland District traditionally presents an Exemplification of the Fourth Degree around this time of year. We will do that virtually on Saturday, 13 March at noon. Everyone should be logged into the degree by 11:45. This is our major Exemplification for the fraternal year and we really need candidate numbers like we used to have, 150 to over 300. The District's goal this year is 219 and even that will not keep up with our losses so please get out and bring men into the Fourth Degree and the Order. Across the Order, there are Exemplifications of the Fourth Degree being conducted nearly every weekend. So if a Knight cannot attend on 13 March, let District Master Fritz Leach and District Secretary Bill Copes know when the man is available. We need to step up our recruiting.

Faithful Navigators, remember that your Civic Award submissions need to be to Supreme not later than 30 June. Most all Assemblies should be able to submit them already. Don't delay. Submit them sooner rather than later. At the end of June, the end of the Fraternal Year, many different forms are being submitted to Supreme for

the current year and the next year. So you can imagine the onslaught of forms and mail hitting Supreme all at the same time and the very real possibility that a form becomes misplaced. If the Civic Award is not received by 30 June, the Assembly will not receive credit and that would be a shame after all the efforts that Assembly members put into patriotic and civic programs.

Generally, you can use the four programs you submit in the Civic Award to select your best program for the To Be A Patriot Award that MUST reach District Master Fritz Leach not later than 30 April, no exceptions. Both forms are available at kofc.org. Supreme has not updated the forms for 2020. Just use the form that is available at kofc.org. Once Master Leach receives your To Be A Patriot Award application (Form TBP-2), he evaluates each submission and sends the best in the District to the Vice Supreme Master (VSM) not later than 15 May. The VSM then evaluates each District's submission and forwards the best in the Province to Supreme not later than 31 May.

Every Assembly should submit the Civic Award and the To Be A Patriot Award application even if you may not achieve your recruiting goal. Take credit for your Assembly's efforts.

I am very proud of all of you. In this COVID challenging time, Assemblies continue to conduct patriotic and civic programs, continue to bring in new members, continue to support your communities and parishes, support veterans and first responders, support Brother Knights and their families, and your neighbors. Well done!!!

Our Lady of Fatima Church now has a new flag and flagpole to fly it from, thanks to the efforts of a group of dedicated and patriotic Sir Knights from Our Lady of Fatima Council, St. Joseph and Christopher Columbus assemblies.

For ten years the flagpole needed repairs. During inspection it was found that that flagpole would require replacement. Thanks to generous private donations a new

pole was purchased and installed by the Knights. The new flagpole is located at the very center of the front of the church and stands 34 feet high. A solar light was installed at the very top to provide light to illuminate the flag during hours of darkness.

This project was recognized with the presentation of a certificate of appreciation presented by Mr. John Davidson, President of the Maryland Sons of the American Revolution., Colonel John Eager Howard chapter. Fr. Varela also expressed his and the parish's appreciation for another job well done by the Knights of Columbus.

The Ship That Disguised Itself as an Island to Evade the Japanese in WWII

Camouflage for ships and other naval vessels was widely used in both the First and Second World Wars, but the crew of one Dutch ship – a Second World War minesweeper of the Royal Netherlands Navy named HNLMS *Abraham Crijnssen*, which was operating in the Java Sea – took the concept of naval camouflage to the next level. They successfully disguised the ship as a tropical island and thereby escaped the Imperial Japanese Navy.

The precursor to Crijnssen's daring plan of evasion was the Battle of the Java Sea, which was fought on February 27th, 1942. In this naval battle the Allied fleet suffered a crushing defeat at the hands of the Imperial Japanese Navy. After the defeat only four Dutch ships survived in the Java Sea, and in the days following the initial naval encounter, the Imperial Japanese Navy sunk three of them. The last remaining ship - Crijnssen - was a Jan Van Amstel-class minesweeper, 184 feet long, with a displacement of 525 tons. Α slow-moving vessel, Crijnssen was pretty much a sitting duck for any Japanese aircraft or naval vessels that might spot her, and being only lightly armed wouldn't be able to put up much of a fight if it came down to a battle.

The minesweeper's only chance of survival in the now-Japanese-dominated area was to escape, as rapidly as possible, to the safety of Australia. The problem, of course, was that there was no way the slow *Crijnssen* could outrun any Japanese naval vessel. The only option was to somehow sneak past the Japanese without being spotted... and in order to do this the crew of the minesweeper came up with one of those plans that are so crazy that they just might work: disguising the ship as an island.

Taking a few factors into consideration, the plan wasn't really as insane as first impressions make it out to be. The Java Sea around Malaysia and Indonesia is dotted with well over 18,000 islands, from huge ones like Borneo to tiny ones with barely more than a handful of trees on them. And while *Crijnssen* wasn't a large ship, the minesweeper was large enough to possibly be passed off as a tiny island.

To achieve the seemingly impossible feat of turning a ship into a geographical feature, the 45 members of the crew stopped off on the nearest island and immediately began cutting down as much vegetation as they could. The main threat of being spotted was from the air, and to effectively camouflage themselves they needed to cover the entire surface area of the ship with foliage.

With much effort they managed to do this, totally covering *Crijnssen*'s deck with vegetation, and arranging it in as convincing a manner as they could to imitate jungle canopy. Any metal that was exposed was painted in hues of gray to imitate rock formations. Once the feverish work had been completed, *Crijnssen* actually did resemble an island quite convincingly – from a distance, anyway.

Of course, one major difference between ships and islands is that one moves and the other doesn't. Therefore, to maintain the illusion that HNLMS *Abraham Crijnssen* was in fact a little tropical island, the ship anchored close to the shores of actual islands during daylight hours and remained completely stationary.

As soon as darkness fell, however, Crijnssen would set off, agonizingly inching her way toward Australia and out of the hostile zone of the Java Sea. After a journey of eight difficult days, Criinssen finally made it to the safety of Australian waters. Somehow, against all odds, the crazy plan of turning the minesweeper into a tropical island had actually worked, and the Imperial Japanese Navy had been none the wiser to the fact that an Allied ship had slipped through their clutches. In so, Crijnssen thus became the only Dutch vessel of her class to escape the Java Sea, and was the last Allied naval vessel to escape the area, which then came fully under Japanese control.

Crijnssen's story didn't stop there, though; once she reached the safety of Australia, she was commissioned into the Royal Australian Navy. In the RAN, Crijnssen was reoutfitted and then reclassified as an anti-submarine convoy escort.

After the war *Crijnssen* was recommissioned to the Royal Netherlands Navy and used to patrol the Netherlands East Indies. until returning to Europe and being decommissioned from the **RNN** in 1960. HNLMS Abraham Crijnssen remains the only ship to have evaded the enemy by being disguised as an island during WWII.
