Welcome to St George's Parish.

St. George's welcome YOU as we celebrate these days of Holy Week and Easter. We seek a faith which is prayerful, reflective, intelligent and connected with all aspects of our lives in the world today.

St. George's is a lively parish with room for everyone, whether they are asking questions about the Christian faith, or life long members of the Church. We are an inclusive parish, sharing worship with those who want simply to come and depart quietly and those ready to make themselves known and join in parish activities.

Baptisms When parents bring children for baptism we welcome the little ones in our midst just as Jesus once took the children into his arms. Sometimes **adults** are baptised and we are glad because they have come to faith in God who raised Jesus to new life through the deep waters of death.

Weddings We love to see the joy of bride and groom when they marry here, including those marrying for a second time, after a bereavement or divorce. The clergy meet with couples to plan an Anglican service which blends the best of old and new and create memories of their wedding day to support spouses through the years ahead. We provide marriage preparation workshops led by a registered psychologist to enable couples to explore what makes for a fulfilling and happy marriage.

Funerals The clergy are available to all people who ask for support in times of grief. We farewell the dead with our prayers and our tears trusting in the God who loves beyond the grave, and who comforts those who mourn. The memorial garden is also available as a final resting place and the departed are remembered in our prayers on each anniversary.

Pastoral care. We extend our care to anyone who would like some support and a friendly hand. We donate money, goods and time to community agencies and overseas organizations.

St George's team of clergy and lay people provides pastoral ministry to Anglican patients at **Cabrini Hospital.** We also extend the sacramental care of the Church to the homes of those who cannot attend on account of illness or age.

The Living Well Centre offers spiritual direction for all who seek it as a means of enriching their life's journey. It also offers training and supervision for directors, as well as seminars, workshops, quiet days and retreats exploring issues of spirituality, prayer and human life.

Spencer painted scenes from the life of Christ set in his native Thames side village of Cookham.

The worship of the Church over these three great days.....

Maundy (Holy) Thursday marks the beginning of the Three Great Days of the Christian year. From the Eucharist of the Last Supper on this night our worship continues through to Easter morning in one extended act of prayer and praise. The service tonight has no ending. We will resume our worship with the Liturgy of Good Friday in the morning.

As the church gathers tonight we listen to three stories: the Passover event when the Hebrew slaves left Egypt, Paul's account of the Last Supper and John's account of Jesus washing the disciples' feet. This particular action is the Lord's command to us (in Latin *mandatum*) that we love one another as he has loved us. The Latin word gives today its name of Maundy Thursday. In the end, if we would follow Jesus we must get down on our knees and love.

There are various themes in this liturgy of Maundy Thursday: love and service expressed in the Gospel reading and focused in the ceremony of the washing of the feet; the institution of the Lord's Supper; and the approaching betrayal and death of Jesus, which we mark by the stripping of the altars. After the Church is stripped bare, the lights are extinguished and we enter into the Watch.

In the Watch we quietly watch and pray with Jesus as if we ourselves were in the Garden of Gethsemane. Our worship continues tomorrow

9 am Morning prayer

followed by Preparation of the Church for Easter

5 pm Evening prayer in a time of holy darkness

Daylight Saving begins overnight

Easter Day

6 am New Fire, Paschal Vigil and Festive Eucharist

10 am Sung Eucharist children especially welcome

5 pm Eucharist and meditation on the Emmaus journey

After communion, there is no blessing as our worship continues in one act of prayer and praise tomorrow and on Easter Day.

The servers and celebrant depart just as Jesus' disciples fled upon his arrest..... and the church is now stripped in preparation for The Watch.

The stripping of the altars

The church is now stripped bare, as once Jesus was stripped by his executioners.

Psalm 22 is read without haste as the church is prepared for the Watch.

The Watch will be kept until 11pm. You are invited to stay and pray with Christ, sitting in the darkened church and simply 'watching' as did the disciples in Gethsemane. Like them, we prefer sleep but we are exhorted to remain attentive to God's presence.

Please remain as long as you are able and leave when you must, in silence.

Sung Jesus, Lamb of God, have mercy on us.
Jesus, bearer of our sins, have mercy on us.
Jesus, redeemer of the world, grant us your peace.

Come let us take this holy sacrament of the body and blood of Christ in remembrance that he died for us, and feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

During communion the choir will sing.

Drop, drop, slow tears, and bathe those beauteous feet, which brought from heaven the news and Prince of Peace.

Cease not, wet eyes, his mercies to entreat; to cry for vengeance sin doth never cease.

RECEPTION OF THE HOLY OILS

The Oils for anointing the sick (the Infirmarium) and for anointing the newly baptised (the Chrism) are blessed each year at the Bishop's Eucharist of the Oils celebrated earlier this week. The Vicar now presents these oils to the parish for use in our worship and pastoral care.

Oil for the Sick

We bring the oil for the sick blessed by our bishop for the anointing of those who suffer in mind and body.

God of healing, by holy anointing may the sick and distressed gain strength in suffering. May they be released from fear and receive the comfort of faith.

Amen.

Oil for the newly baptised

We bring the holy chrism, a mixture of oil and fragrant perfume consecrated by our bishop to anoint all those baptised and confirmed.

God of eternal life, may the newly baptised be signed as Christ's own forever and strengthened to work for justice, and serve others in love. **Amen.**

The oils are placed on the altar.

Unless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies it bears much fruit.

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

A reading from the book of Exodus

This reading provides instructions for the celebration of the Jewish ritual of Passover. It is hard to take hear the story of God 's intention to destroy the first born of Egypt. it helps to know that in the ancient world the first produce of farm and home belonged to the gods. Animals and grains 'stood in' for humans. The story of God bringing humanity from slavery to freedom becomes a key to understanding Jesus' life, death and resurrection.

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight.

They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Reader A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians

The Corinthians had fallen into the bad practice of bringing their own food to the Eucharist and then not sharing equally. Paul reminds them of the character of the meal we share at the Lord's table—all are invited as equals, all receive an equal portion. Nothing else is fulfills Jesus' command to do this in remembrance of him.

For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you

drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

Jesus removes and 'lays down' his outer garments and washes the disciples feet in an act of service that foreshadows the cross. Soon he will lay down his life—just as he has said earlier the good shepherd would do. In John's gospel Jesus' life is not taken from him but he lays it down himself (see John 10.18). Also, in the ancient world the body was likened to a garment.

Before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his

outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean." After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

Jesus said, "Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."
