May 4 Minister Sarah: "Mercy as a Restoration" As we celebrate Buddha's Birthday (marked as May 6) we celebrate the idea of mercy as a gift and look at the idea of restorative justice as a form of this gift. As we delve into what is "right relationship" and how we can restore right relationship, we will take a look at the life and work of Quillen Shin, an early Universalist as well as the religious figure in Buddhism, Kwan Yin. Additionally, the traditions of many American Indian nations include practices to restore right relations and invoke mercy as a quality of life. We are joined again by musician and seminarian Christopher Watkins!

May 11 'Memories of Our Mothers' This Sunday's program is an eclectic, spiritual tribute to mothers, memories and music which we've combined into Memories of Our Mothers' Music. You are invited to bring something musical that evokes a memory of your mother (or grandmother or even mother-inlaw). You might perform a piece of music that your mother played or sang (maybe a lullaby?), OR you might bring a recording of a song that she loved, OR you might simply tell a story or anecdote of how your mother's music touched your heart. As a special treat, we'll have our own choir singing with the UU music director AND SOME MEMBERS from our sister congregation in Ft. Collins to provide musical interludes to our sharing.

May 18 Minister Sarah: "Hats Off to UU!" As we end one church and begin preparations for the next, Minister Sarah will review our year and preview our upcoming year. Offering a view of our accomplishments, ongoing challenges, and new opportunities as we move forward, Sarah will prepare our hearts and minds for the congregational meeting. We will talk about the hats we are wearing, hats we'd like to take off, and hats we'd like to try on. Bring a hat or two with you so we can play with this metaphor! Ministry Matters



Mercy, the theme for May

Mercy evokes our experiences of compassion and forbearance, those moments in life in which we receive or offer an unexpected kindness or shift in outcome for the better. These might come from people in our lives, in the form of forgiveness and generosity or from an unknown source, a mysterious presence or turn of events. We may be able to offer mercy within a particular role (end of the semester grading, perhaps?) Mercy can be a way of "paying it forward," a hopeful act on behalf of others which has no immediate benefit to us except in the joy of offering kindness. Many world religions have a concept of mercy and have attributed the quality of merciful to God, Allah, Mary, Jesus, Mohammed, Kwan Yin and many other divine presences and figures. For some, this is like the experience of a prayer "answered." For others mercy may happen as a kind of profound coincidence. Many forms of prayer evoke mercy, whether we are asking for mercy, offering mercy along with loving-kindness. When have you experienced a sense of mercy, offered or received compassion, forgiveness, blessing or clemency? How can we practice mercy as individuals or a community? How can we teach or engage mercy?



Board Report

The board congratulated our minister on receiving her "Preliminary Fellowship" from the Unitarian Universalist Association. Now that she is in Preliminary Fellowship, she can be ordained. Sarah is considering Ordination in the fall of 2014 through the Boulder Valley UU Fellowship or First Unitarian Church of Denver, both congregations she has ties to through her studies for the ministry.

The board discussed the initiation of 2 new task forces, a Stewardship/annual giving Task Force and a By-Laws review Task Force. Task forces differ from committees in that they are generally limited in focus, task, and time commitment as opposed to committees, that are specified in the by-laws and duties outlined in the policies and procedures (both of which are accessible on our website). If you would be interested in serving on either of these task forces, please contact a board member.

The board discussed the May 18 annual meeting. The agenda for the annual meeting will be published prior to the annual meeting. The agenda will include committee reports, budget report, Endowment Fund and a slate of candidates for elected positions to be voted upon at the annual meeting. There are 3 openings for officers of the board, 1 opening on the Committee on Ministry, and a position to be filled on a newly created Endowment Fund Trustee board. If you are interested in serving in any of these capacities, please contact one of the Nominating committee members: Linda Goldman, David Perry, and Nancy Lockwood.

The Pledge drive is ongoing, but many persons had not yet responded regarding their pledge at the time of our meeting on April 10. So if you have not yet contacted our pledge drive chairs regarding your pledge, please do so.

The board has decided to have meetings twice a month, but shorter in duration -1.5 hours, due to the length of the meetings of late and our flagging energy levels after a couple of hours. This is a sign of a vibrant Fellowship!

Carolyn and her daughter, Claudia, started attending our Fellowship about 4 years ago when Carolyn came back to Laramie after living in California for many years. Born in 1929, Carolyn had a BA from UW in English and married a journalist. She was very interested in History, especially women's history and the suffragists. Carolyn's parents, Helen and George Hollister were instrumental in starting our UUFL back in 1955; a fact she was justifiably proud of. Although Carolyn and her husband moved quite a bit to accomodate his work as a journalist, her parents were Laramie, Wyoming regulars and so this is where she eventually came back to. Her parents also were part of a group of people who started a UU Fellowship in the Denver area during the Vietnam War to allow some of the young men in the community to avoid the draft as conscientious objectors. She was a quiet but delightful addition to our Fellowship. She is survived by daughter Claudia, a member of our Fellowship as well, and sons, Bruce and Douglas who will be in Laramie for her memorial service on June 5th. Our condolences to the family of Claudia Thompson.


