s, safety hazards and uncivil and illegal activities" at the Skyway Lane property.

My office was happy to help and appreciated all the out-pouring of support in helping to transform this from the "Trouble in the Hills" to "Some Things in Oakland are Working and Working Well." 

#### **Cypress-Mandela Job Training Hearing**

The hearing for my Job Training Proposal drew an outstanding show of support, with over 150 union members and graduates from Cypress-Mandela, Men of Valor, and other training centers coming to voice their strong opinions in favor of funding the non-profits that have provided them with stable, well-paid jobs in the construction trades. So many came in support that the hearing had to be moved to



the main Council chambers to accommodate everyone.

The testimonies showed how life changing these programs have been.

Access to good paying jobs is one of the most pressing issues facing Oaklanders today. With the massive construction boom going on in our city, there are



thousands of construction jobs that could be raising up our communities but aren't. We need to disrupt the status quo and do whatever it takes to make sure these jobs are filled by Oaklanders. My proposal to fully fund these vital job training centers like Cypress-Mandela will allow Oaklanders to access these jobs, over half of which are currently being outsourced. The City is not meeting its commitment to hire 50% of construction staff locally, and that needs to be fixed.



My plan is the first step in a process to grow opportunities for local employment. Critics of this plan think that it's not the right way to fund these centers, but after decades of neglect something must change. The City has paid millions of dollars directly to artists over the last 30 years but hasn't spent a dime to support local construction training. I am calling on the City to show at least the same

level of support for working families as it does for these artists.

It was disappointing to hear the Mayor say that I shouldn't try to "raise the hopes" of anyone with this proposal, because that's exactly what we need to be doing. We need to be investing in Oakland. We need to bring jobs to the unemployed, and housing to the homeless. We need to clean our streets and invest in our parks and schools. We need to give people the hope that they can stay in the city they were born in, find work, raise a family, and not be forced out.

#### **Protecting TPS**

I'm committed to pushing back against any agenda that seeks to divide our community and families.

That's why I presented legislation alongside Abel Guillen supporting our immigrant community and

demanding the renewal of the TPS program. I'm pleased to share it was passed unanimously by the council.

TPS status is preserved for those fleeing conditions that are impossible to survive and seeking the safety of asylum in the United States. Those that received the status are



citizens of countries that have been ravaged by war, natural disasters and civil conflict. There are over 350,000 people from 7 countries who have been granted Temporary Protected Status. A significant number of them live in the Bay Area and have been productive, tax-paying members of the community.

In January of this year a federal Executive Order was signed that dramatically increased the number of immigrants subject to deportation, creating an atmosphere of uncertainty and fear in Oakland's large immigrant community. Our resolution supporting TPS is another step I've taken in my efforts to protect all members of our community and keep Oaklanders safe.



This documentary presents for the first time, a cross section of the 1.2 million African Americans service men and women who served in that war. They speak of the motivations for their fighting and service to a nation that had not yet recognized their humanity. The first hand recollections of these men and women, all of which have been independently corroborated by recognized military historians, are both touching and tense, and evoke in the viewer a sense of wonderment and admiration for the selflessness and sacrifice which characterized their participation. The program intercuts World War II footage of African Americans, much of which is seen publicly for the first time, with candid interviews. Tony Award winner, television, and film actor, Keith David, narrates the program.

Last year we installed our first washer and dryer at Frick. Three additional schools received washer and dryers.



#### **Ticketing Program**

Did you know Oakland has a program that offers assistance to those struggling to pay parking tickets? My office held open hours from 11am-1pm on March 17th to help guide people through the process.

Do you have parking tickets you can't afford to pay? Are you financially challenged or considered indigent?

In accordance with State Assembly Bill 503 and an effort to further serve the most vulnerable in our community, the City of Oakland has increased our efforts to assist those who may have extreme difficulty paying their parking tickets, with a payment plan that provides a less challenging way to help eligible individuals resolve ticket citations, before the vehicle is subject to tow or fees are added to registrations.

# City of Oakland Launches OAK 311 Service For Reporting Problems & Requesting Maintenance

This past week, we announced the launch of OAK 311, a new service to make it easier for Oaklanders to report problems and request infrastructure maintenance.



This new service is designed to make it easier than it's ever been for residents to request the City's help with issues including potholes in their streets, graffiti on their neighborhood public spaces, and piles of dumping left on their sidewalks.

#### Contact OAK 311 for:

- Dumping on public streets and sidewalk
- Potholes/sinkholes
- Graffiti on public space and buildings
- Traffic safety issues (non-emergency)
- City building maintenance
- Street light problems (traffic signal outages should be called in right away)
- Parking meter maintenance
- Damaged sidewalks
- Park maintenance

Oaklanders can begin using the service now to request infrastructure maintenance services and report problems. There are four basic ways to reach OAK 311:

**Phone:** Call 311 from any phone within Oakland. (If you are calling from outside Oakland, continue to use the number (510) 615-5566.)

E-mail: OAK311@oaklandnet.com

Web: 311.oaklandca.gov

**App:** OAK 311, available free for Apple and Android smart devices (powered by SeeClickFix)

Even in cases where residents have reported issues before and not seen the changes they requested, the City is encouraging them to keep reporting.

**An important note:** All urgent issues should be called in. These include:

- Objects blocking the roadway
- Fallen trees or branches
- Downed road signs such as stop signs
- Flooding
- Mudslides and landslides
- Sewer overflows
- Manholes overflowing onto streets and sidewalks

OAK 311 operators answer calls from 8:00am to 4:30pm Monday through Friday, and on off hours the system can connect callers to the City's emergency dispatchers, so urgent issues may be reported 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Other important numbers include:

**For downed power lines** or if you smell natural gas, leave the area immediately and then call 9-1-1 or PG&E at 1-800-743-5000.

For power outage alerts go online to pge.com/outagealerts.

**For water service emergencies** (e.g., no water service, broken hydrants, broken water main pipes), contact EBMUD at 1-866-403-2683.

**For life-threatening emergencies**, call 9-1-1 from a land line or (510) 777-3211 from a cell phone.

## Goodbye <u>Oaklandnet.com</u>, Hello <u>OaklandCA.gov</u>!

The City of Oakland launched its new website -oaklandca.gov-the City's new "digital front door" to City services. The "search" is now a robust feature of the new site, reflecting how most people actually find the information they are looking for. Oaklandnet.com was more like a map of the City's bureaucracy. Oaklandca.gov focuses on delivering services at the click of a button, regardless of which department is responsible for that service.

We invite the public to explore the site, and are eager for feedback. Suggestions, insights and reports of problems can be made by filling out this form.
