John Martinelli of S. Martinelli & Co. will be program speaker

Join us for the Annual Vintage Picnic on Sunday, July 1.

John Martinelli, CEO of S. Martinelli and Co., will be the program speaker. The event lasts from 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. and a buffet lunch will be served by Monterey Bay Caterers. It's a historical year for Watsonville and two of its most historic companies. The city, Martinelli's and local newspaper Register-Pajaronian are all celebrating their 150th anniversary.

S. Martinelli and Co. was started in 1868 when Stephen Martinelli first introduced fermented apple cider made from

apples grown on his brother's farm. The plant was moved to Third Street in 1885 and in 1899, it won the first gold medal for excellence at the California State Faire in Sacramento.

John Martinelli is the fourth generation leader of Martinelli's. Born in 1957 at the old Watsonville Community Hospital on Montecito Ave, he is a descendant of the Martinelli and Silliman families, two of the Pajaro Valley's earliest pioneers who settled there in the 1850s.

John graduated from Watsonville High school in 1975 before getting his BA in Economics from Stanford University in 1979. He started at Martinelli's soon after and over 36 years, he has held various positions including Plant Manager, Sales Manager, General Manager, Vice President, President and currently as CEO.

The Great Mystery of the Charley Parkhurst ledger



The Crosby Clambake's Unique Connection to PVHA

PVHA's unique connection to the Crosby Clambake was not just that his sister Catherine Cordella Mullin lived in Watsonville at 264 East Lake Ave. (on the corner of East Lake Avenue and Lincoln Street), but also that his niece was Marilyn McLachlan. Marilyn was Board President and volunteered for over 15 years, from the 1980s to 1990s, at the PVHA. During this time,

Marilyn lived at 824 Delaware St.

Bing Crosby, a singer, and an avid golfer, started the Crosby Clambake on the Monterey Peninsula in 1947. At that time, neighbors said Bing's fancy car was often seen at Catherine's home on East Lake. His niece Marilyn, then 13 years old, attended Notre Dame High School. It was said Bing had some good stories to tell.

After going away to college, Marilyn married Robert McLachlan at Valley Church in 1951. They lived in San Francisco, then returned to the Pajaro Valley to raise their five children. Long time PVHA contributor Diane Porter Cooley recalled that Marilyn was very active with PVHA. Marilyn was Board President for 11 years and named Woman of the Year by the

Chamber of Commerce in 1989. Marilyn's many achievements at PVHA included the benefit opening of the Mansion House, and the White

Dresses Garden Party at the Orr's garden. She was instrumental in the passage of the Historic Preservation Ordinance by the Watsonville City Council. Diane said Marilyn was dedicated to the preservation of the history of Watsonville and

was located on the corner of West Lake Avenue and Walker street.

Before there was a town of Spreckles and the sugar plant that is at that location today, Watsonville boasted a narrow gauge railroad that transported not only

sugar beets for processing but Lime used in the process to strip the bark off of the sugar beet. The Spreckles plant was a major sup-

plier of jobs to local families.

Mr. Rosekrans was equally impressed with our collection of memorabilia about his great grandfather and in particular the porcelain commemorative dishes created in Germany for the Charles Ford Company.

Today, Adolf S. Rosekrans is best known for his horse ranch at Runnymede located in Woodside, CA and his successful career as an architect on the West Coast of the United States.
