INDEPENDENT LIVING COVID-19 RESTRICTIONS REDUCTIONS

All of our indicators for the lifting of restrictions continue to be positive, and we are moving forward with our May plans to lift additional restrictions. Please note the following changes that will be taking place during the month of May:

- We will allow the Suwannee County Tax Collector's office to resume on-campus services for property tax issues. The FLOW Mobile for driver's licenses is operated by the state of Florida, and they have not yet announced when they will resume service.
- The professional offices will be allowed to return and resume services at the VS. You should check with them individually for scheduled times and appointments.
- Beginning May 10 we will no longer lock DH, CH, RV, or Lawrence House during the day. However, for the time being, we ask that you continue to restrict off-campus visitors. Please continue to contact your service coordinator if you plan to have off-campus visitors.
- CCC will begin to allow all CCC members to resume use of the facility. Until further notice, we ask all members to make an appointment to limit the overall occupancy of the facility, and use will be limited to the hours of 6:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.
- We are scheduling an outdoor event for the Members Association in May. More details to follow.
- Beginning in May we will resume our new member receptions.

Thank you all for your cooperation. This continues to be a community effort, and we would not be where we are today without all of you doing your part.

- Please remember that all visitors to the campus must continue to be screened at the IC.
- Continue to exercise caution as you make travel plans both locally and to other areas of the country.

MOTHER'S DAY

Did you know? More phone calls are made on Mother's Day than any other day of the year. These holiday chats with Mom often cause phone traffic to spike by as much as 37 percent.

Ann Reeves Jarvis and Julia Ward Howe

The origins of Mother's Day as celebrated in the U.S. the origins of Mother's Day as celebrated in the U.S. date back to the 19th century. In the years before the Civil War, Ann Reeves Jarvis of W.V. helped start "Mothers' Day Work Clubs" to teach local women how to properly care for their children. These clubs later became a unifying force in a region of the country still divided over the Civil War. In 1868 Jarvis organized "Mothers' Friendship Day", at which mothers gathered with former Union and Confederate soldiers to promote reconciliation. reconciliation.

Another precursor to Mother's Day came from the abolitionist and suffragette Julia Ward Howe. In 1870 Howe wrote the "Mother's Day Proclamation", a call to action that asked mothers to unite in promoting world peace. In 1873 Howe campaigned for a "Mother's

Peace Day" to be celebrated every June 2.

Anna Jarvis Turns Mother's Day

Into a National Holiday

The official Mother's Day holiday arose in the 1900s as a result of the efforts of Anna Jarvis, daughter of Anna Reeves Jarvis. Following her mother's 1905 death, Anna Jarvis conceived of Mother's Day as a way of honoring the sacrifices mothers made for their children.

After gaining financial backing from John Wanamaker, a Philadelphia department store owner, in May 1908, she organized the first official Mother's Day celebration at a Methodist church in Grafton, W.V. That same day also saw thousands of people attend a Mother's Day event at one of Wanamaker's retail stores in Philadelphia.

Following the success of her first Mother's Day, Jarvis · - who remained unmarried and childless her whole life — resolved to see her holiday added to the national calendar. Arguing that American holidays were biased toward male achievements, she started a massive letter-writing campaign to newspapers and prominent politicians urging the adoption of a special

day honoring motherhood.

By 1912 many states, towns and churches had adopted Mother's Day as an annual holiday, and Jarvis had established the Mother's Day International Association to help promote her cause. Her persistence paid off in 1914 when President Woodrow Wilson signed a measure officially establishing the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day.

ROADSIDE WILDFLOWERS

We have all been enjoying the beauty of the wildflowers along the highways. Do you sometimes just ride around to take in the splendor of the blooms? Well, you have President Johnson and more specifically, his wife, Lady Bird Johnson, to thank for initiating the experience

The Highway Beautification Act (HBA), Title I of the Highway Beautification Act of 1965, as amended, was signed into law by President Lyndon B. Johnson on Oct. 22, 1965. It was nicknamed "Lady Bird's Bill" because it was the pet project of First Lady Lady Bird Johnson, who believed that beauty, and generally clean streets, would make the U.S. a better place to live. In a nutshell, her program is, "masses of flowers where masses pass." Water, lights, and color-mass of flowers — those things spell beautification to her, Lady Bird wrote in her diary. Lady Bird also saw her beautification projects as beloing soothe the nation at a time when projects as helping soothe the nation at a time when the Vietnam war, civil rights, and other highly charged political topics were encouraging division. Lady Bird believed that a cleaner, more beautiful country could calm people and bring them together.

But even before that law was signed, the Florida Department of Transportation initiated the Wildflower Program for the state's rights-of-way in 1963. There are many, many laws encouraging highway beautification—state and national— and thousands of people who work to see it carried out. But seeing the blossoms each year always makes me think of Lady Bird Johnson.




