I believe this school is making an important difference in the lives of students and the larger community. Ryan prepares young men and women to lead productive and meaningful lives that will make a difference! It has been my privilege to be a part of that.

For the last month, the Office of Catholic Education has been accepting applications for the position of president of Archbishop Ryan. I expect that the interview process will begin shortly. I am hopeful that we will know who my successor is during the month of June. I officially begin my new job on July 1. I know I will miss Ryan, and it will always have a place in my heart. *We are AR*!

## FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL FOR ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

*Mr. Joseph McFadden* It seems like just yesterday I was writing about roster changes and PSAT tests and here we are at the end of the year. Just as important as a great start is a great finish. With so few days remaining, please encourage your students to finish strongly in their classes. Underclass exams begin in ELA on May 27 and all other courses finish on Thursday, June 5. Any senior who has not passed a class has been notified. They will not be able to participate in any Graduation exercises and will be required to attend the Archdiocesan Online Summer School Program. If the credit is not made up, a diploma will not be given nor will final transcripts be released.

Underclassmen who fail any class will also be required to attend the Archdiocesan Online Summer School Program. Students will be notified the final week of school. If a credit is not made up, students will not be allowed to return the next year.

#### **Summer School**

Students in the Secondary School System of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia who have not met the academic expectations during the school year 2013-2014 are required to attend the Archdiocesan Summer School **Education Program. Summer** school provides an opportunity for students to learn the course material, earn a passing grade, work at their own pace and be eligible to return to their Catholic high school for the following school year. In order to return for the school year 2014-2015 all failures must be successfully remediated .The Archdiocesan Summer School Online Education Program is offered through Educere.

Registration for the Online Education Program will be June 16<sup>th</sup> at Archbishop Ryan. The program will begin on June 23<sup>rd</sup> and end on August 11<sup>th</sup>. The cost is \$325 per course. Work will be completed online but students will be required to attend sessions at Archbishop Ryan also. More information will be available at registration.

Final report cards will be mailed out the week after school ends.



Summer Reading Archbishop Ryan encourages students to become life-long readers and learners by asking them to read during noninstructional time. Summer reading provides students an opportunity to enhance their reading skills and enjoy a book they've selected. Our philosophy is that summer reading should be both pleasurable and thought provoking. With that in mind, we have provided a range of selections reflecting student interests and readability levels.

We believe that students who read over the summer:

- Maintain or improve reading comprehension and vocabulary.
- Broaden their experience, knowledge and

understanding of topics that are of personal interest.

- Experience personal and academic success by developing their literacy skills.
- Become lifelong readers by choosing a book and reading at their own pace.

The Summer Reading assignment is posted on the website and has been explained to the students. Students choose a book from the list, read at least one, and complete the online assignment.

I wish you and your family a happy, healthy, and holy summer. My office staff and I will be working away all summer on creating a schedule and rosters for your children. Should you have any questions, do not hesitate to email or call our office so we can assist you.

## FACULTY FOCUS: Mr. Gerard Donahue, Science Department

Students at Archbishop Ryan are provided with many opportunities to broaden their experiences for future careers. One of these opportunities is shadowing at Holy Redeemer Hospital. Students are able to spend an entire day with health care professionals employed in their field of interest. Their field choices include: maternity, anesthesiology, physical therapy, cardiology, laboratory, and plenty more.

Every two months, Mr. Donahue, the coordinator of these trips and the moderator of the Health Careers Cub distributes forms to students so that they can choose in which area they would like to shadow. Students list their most preferred choices, ranked from one to ten, and they always receive two of them, one in the morning and one in the afternoon.

Shadowing experiences allow students to witness directly the reality of a hospital setting. It displays the everyday life of nurses and doctors, not the glamorized images depicted on television shows. There is unlimited access to the real-life workings of a hospital. If the patients at the hospital allow it, students may witness births, transfusions, simple surgeries, ultrasounds, x-rays, catheter or stent procedures, rehabilitation exercises, and laboratory research. However, students may choose not to view procedures if they feel uncomfortable. Those who do participate are subject to the HIPAA laws of confidentiality.

The shadowing day starts off with a presentation by multiple health care professionals explaining their educational background, schools they attended, jobs, schedules, work life, and any advice they have for high school students in planning their future. Health care workers at Holy Redeemer are just as fond of these trips as the students are. They do not mind taking time to explain all the details of their job throughout the day.



After the presentations, students begin to split up into the different areas that they will shadow in, and spend an hour and half in that department. Then all the students convene and meet with the recruiter in charge to discuss their encounters, after which they eat lunch provided by the hospital. Following this is the second shadowing part in a different area of the hospital. Finally, students take a group tour of all the facilities of the hospital and receive a certificate of completion and a gift of a sports bag or t-shirt.

This eye-opening experience is usually not what students expect it to be. Jobs prove to be more tedious and challenging than they thought! Learning this motivates students to apply themselves to their academics more to help them reach success. Even if students do not like the area which they shadowed, they can now cross that off the list of potential future careers for themselves. All experiences are valuable. Students have so many choices to make about their future that being aware of what they do not want to be involved in is just as useful as knowing what they do want to involve themselves in. I am personally very grateful and thankful for being able to attend these trips because they have given me insight I could not gain anywhere else. I have met doctors and nurses that provided me with beneficial and lasting guidance for my future career in the medical field. Every trip has expanded my knowledge of health care positions and enhanced my appreciation for education.

On behalf of the students who attend these trips, I thank Mr. Donahue for taking the time to organize and schedule these enlightening experiences.
