Students salute Hitler, display confederate flags

A Wisconsin city that came under national scrutiny several years ago when a group of students drove around the city waving Confederate flags, has come under enquiry again for promoting anti-Semitic gestures.

In both cases, it was a large group of male White students who advertised and promoted their bigotry.

This time the High School's entire male graduating class posed in from the school 'proudly' displaying a Nazi (Sig Heil) salute.

Members of various Jewish organizations condemned the gesture after a salute of the students went viral.

The Baraboo School Superintendent immediately issued a statement on twitter saying "the photo of student posted to #Baraboo Proud" is not reflective of the educational values and beliefs of the school district.

The superintendent later announced that the district will take appropriate actions against the students after an investigation.

Local police will reportedly assist in the investigation of the student activities, although it is unclear what can be done since the anti-Semitic gesture falls under the umbrella of

free speech.

Nothing was done following the students' decision to parade around the city with Confederate flags. While repulsive to African Americans, displaying the Confederate (battle) flag is not a crime and is also



protected by the U.S Constitution.

Baraboo does not have any African American residents.

Baraboo is located north of Madison, which is considered a beacon of liberalism.

That status has been in jeopardy for several years now following several incidents of racism and anti-Semitism at the University of Wisconsin.

Historical Society honors St. Matthews, Lloyd Barbee home

In 2017, the National Park Service awarded the Wisconsin State Historic Preservation Office an Underrepresented Communities Grant to increase awareness and recognition of historic African in Milwaukee.

This Saturday, the Wisconsin Historical Society will be celebrating the nominations of

four properties of historic significance to Milwaukee's African American community to the National Register of Historic Places.

"Through this grant, we can continue to tell the broader history of Milwaukee and the state," said Daina Penkiunas, Deputy State Historic Preservation Officer at the Wisconsin Historical Society.

The four future additions to the National Register of Historic Places include the 16th Street Viaduct that was prominent during the housing marches, St. Matthews CME Church, Lloyd Barbee's house and the Dietz/Palmer House.

The event is open to the public will take place at St. Matthews CME Church, 2944 N. 9th St. from 2 - 4 pm and will include short presentations on each of these historically significant places from National Register consultants, Traci Schnell and Robert Blythe, a presentation from St. Matthews CME Church choir, and refreshments.

"The National Park Service is working with states, tribes, and local governments to help more people connect with their history and explore America's diverse stories,"

Expungement reforms sought by county board

The Milwaukee County Board unanimously adopted a resolution calling for the Wisconsin Legislature to reform and expand upon current expungement laws by adopting several recommendations of the Wisconsin Policy Forum.

Introduced by Supervisor Sequanna Taylor, the resolution calls for reform of laws and practices relating to the sealing of criminal records that make it difficult for people to obtain employment and pursue opportunities to provide for themselves and their families.

"I am pleased that every member of the county board can see the economic urgency of this issue," Taylor said after the vote.

"In a city with one of the highest unemployment rates and which is known as the worst place in the country to raise a Black child, adding a conviction to these other factors makes it extraordinarily difficult for a person re-entering society to gain lawful employment and obtain life's basic necessities.

"Expungement allows people who

Wisconsin ranks 7th among states for high school bullying

I remember the first time walking into my math class at Valdosta High School. I was wearing a cute little shirt that had multicolored polka dots, some blue jeans and some brown shoes my mom picked out for me. I was in the 9th grade and thought I looked pretty decent this day.

My mom and I had shopped at Cato's and my shoes were brand new. I wasn't walking in heels just yet, but the shoe she picked out had a small one on it. As I walked in the class, a student made a joke. I remember hearing her say, "Uh-oh. Look at Paishance with her wanna-be heels on today!"

It wasn't long before the entire class was in an uproar with laughter. I was embarrassed, but more so my feelings were hurt.

It wasn't the first time that I had been bullied. I used to get picked on all the time at school. If it wasn't for my hair, or my clothes, or my big eyes (which I love now) there was always something to be said.

As an adult, my feelings aren't so easily hurt, but my self-esteem could be better. Being a victim of bullying made me want to be in a shell and cause as little attention to bullying does not only happen at school. I've witnessed it in the work place, churches, and even at home. Things are happening right now in your local area and the awareness is little to none.

According to Fox6now.com, Wisconsin ranks 7th among states with biggest bullying problems and 4th for students bullied at school. Here are more numbers to look at.

Ranked fourth for percentage of high school students bullied on school property

Ranked 11th for percentage of high school students bullied online

Ranked 22nd for percentage of high school students involved in a physical fight at school

Ranked 16th for cost of truancy for schools due to bullying

Ranked ninth for state anti-bullying laws and policies

Ranked second for state anti-cyberbullying laws requiring school policy

Drastic measures needed to turn around North Div.

Collabortive doesn't go far enough

Some say the new community school collaborative at North Division high school is a godsend. We say it doesn't go far enough. The partnership between United Way, the Milwaukee Urban League and MTEA includes warp around services that will benefit students, parents and neighborhood residents. A full-time coordinator has been hired to help facilitate the various programs that are intended to help the students with a myriad of social services and career planning options. The project also seeks to create a new culture at the northside school, which at one point was a revered institjution in the Black community. In its heyday, North Division produced dozens of history makers and thousands of leaders including Congresswoman Gwen Moore, former MPS Superintendent Howard Fuller, and Army General Robert Cocroft, Today, however, North Division is but a shadow of its previous self and an embarrassment to the Black community and MPS. North is ranked as the worse high school in Wisconsin, with an abysmal graduation rate, and the lowest academic achievement rate in the state. According to the Department of Public Instruction, only three percent of North students are proficient in social services, and one percent in math and science. You can almost count on one hand the number of students who are proficient in reading. That depressing status prompted a group of stakeholders and alumni to form an organization to turn North Division around. Since 2014, Community Call to Action has provided tutoring, mentoring and linked students to scholarships. However, members of the organization, most of whom are alumni, became increasingly frustrated with the unwillingness of central administration to turn the school around academically. In fact, many said North has become a dumping ground for adjudicated youth and a disproportionate percentage of special needs students. Earlier this year, the group supported a proposal to merge the successful Milwaukee Colligate Academy with North. That plan was blocked by North teachers and their union. After extensive research and collaborations with other groups, Community Call to Action is now exploring the possibility of making North a 'Community Controlled School,' meaning an independent board would be established and empowered to have oversight over staff selection, curriculum and school culture. This is not a novel ideal, MPS has supported a similar concept for Bradley Tech. We strongly support the organization's proposal becasue nothing short of an complete overhaul of North will save the institution. That is also the conclusion of a task force established a decade ago by MPS to explore options for the school. The task force explored making North a non-instrumentality charter, similar to what was proposed with the Colligate Academy. Several members of the task force have joined Community Call to Action and are advocating for the Community Controlled concept. And there is a sense of urgency to their actions. Noting the new community partnership doesn't go far enough—in fact it doesn't address the academic failures at the school—stakeholders are fearful that a third, or fourth entity, are moving toward taking over the school. There are two charter schools seeking to take over North, neither of which are operated by African Americans. And it was learned recently that a Glendale businessman has an interest in buying the facility. As noted, we applaud the community school designation, and all that it brings to the table. But that new investment does not come with an academic component, nor does it address the structural changes tht must be in place if North is to be turned around. Most of the studnets at North Division can't read at grade level—a majority are several years behind—a guarantee that they will not reach their potential and are destined for menial job, or worse. And all the political rhetoric and promises of investments by the board and admisnration won't change that realitiy. Even with the new partnership, most of North students are slated to slip between teh cracks, which has grown into a cravest. North needs a complete overhaul and should be under community control. We have already lost three generations of children while MPS has annually promised new initiatives to turn the school around. Now it is our turn. Anything short of community control is nothing more than a placebo.

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1,335 victims of mass shootings, but we didn't pull the trigger

Dear Bigot: Better look in the mirror for the color of terrorism in America

A few months ago, my son and I visited a gun range in Washington County to spend a little family time together and to work on our aim in case rumors of a race new civil war or Martian invasion comes to fruition. The range consists of 12 stalls, and we were assigned to number 6, which meant we had to pass five units to reach our assigned spot. Being a friendly sort, I tried to acknowledge--through word or 'man no'--each of the shooters (all of whom were Caucasian and firing assault type rifles—ranging from a M-16s to a bazooka and anti-aircraft missiles), but none responded to my gestures. In fact, I sensed what might have been racial hostility or disdain in the air, save for one older dude who almost smiled as he noticed the Vietnam veteran's hat I was wearing. After firing our guns for 30 minutes or so, we collected and packed away our weapons and prepared to leave.


Again, each of the White shooters seemed to ignore us as we passed them, until we reached the last stall where a middle-aged White guy wearing a camouflage jacket and ball cap was reloading his banana magazine clip. (I guess he can't shoot straight and needs 30 rounds to kill poor old Bambi.) Since he was turned in our direction, I paused in front of him and asked-- in a humorous tone, and of course using my most proper diction--"are you guys waiting on ISIS, or some terrorist invasion?"

The guy looked up at me, stared for a second at my ball cap but quickly shifted his attention to my son who was wearing a Malcolm X tee-shirt. After looking him up and down, the White guy blurted out, "yeah, we're waiting on terrorists... ALL terrorists!"

His response shocked, but didn't surprise me. I thought about responding in a 'Black way,' but given my assumption that the others shared his feelings and we were greatly outnumbered, I simply sighed, adjusted my 9 mm in a way he couldn't ignore and walked out. I've been thinking about that incident for months, but the recent 'terrorist' attack in a White suburb in California that left 12 dead prompted me to seek an avenue to reach out to those local 'racist guardians of truth, Just-us, and the American Way' from the gun range.

Thus, my plan is to post this column at the range with the hope that the members of the suburban white militia will hopefully read this and ponder my observations: Dear John Wayne Wannabes: You're barking up the wrong tree, and obviously

can't see the forest for all the misinformation you've been fed or the racism you seek to justify. It's bad enough that your ignorance about terrorism has blurred your vision, but your witlessness about the real threat to America may soon blind you to the real face of terrorism in America. And he doesn't look like me. We, Black men, are not a threat to White America, and surely not outstate Wisconsin. The real threat looks like Fyou, your sons and uncles. You could see that if your prisms were not obscured by prejudice and feelings of White Supremacy. So, before you put up a target with a Black thug on it (which I know some of your friends have purchased), realize that of the the 300 plus mass shootings over the last year (yes, 311 to be exact) none were committed by people who looked me. All of them were facilitated by angry White men.




SIGNIFYIN'

Most of those terrorists viewed themselves as true Americans, and several were trained by the U.S. military to supposedly kill brown terrorists elsewhere. In case you're confused or ill informed, it wasn't a Black man who killed 12 White people in Thousand Oaks, California last week, a city almost exclusively White and ranked as the third safest community in America. And it wasn't Shaquan or Marquez who opened fire in the Antioch Waffle House, or who killed 58 mostly White people in in Las Vega last year. No brother in a hoodie walked into the synagogue in Pittsburgh last month, or in Bakersfield in September. The crazed terrorist who killed 17 in Parkland, Fla, 10 young adults in Santa Fe, or 17 at the Marjory Stoneman Douglass High School in Parkland, Fla. would not have been profiled by police as they drove through any of those communities. They didn't fit the profile of what you've been told, or assume is a terrorist—a Black or brown person. Think about this: there have been 158 shooters in the last two decades, 1,135 victims, including 186 children, and two thirds of the assailants ob-

tained their guns legally. How many of those murderers looked like Kwame or Marcellinus or Daquan? A half dozen? Instead they overwhelmingly looked like Luke, Johnny and Sam. Terrorists? You can stop looking with suspicion at Muhammad, Malik or Abdul because those Arab Americans don't pose a threat to you or yours. Nor does Juan or Miquel. The truth of the matter is that since October of last year, we have had over 300 mass shootings, but you can't put a finger on an African, Asian, Arab or Hispanic Americans as the culprits. Instead, it's been Irish, Polish and German Americans. In other words, if you're going to be a racist and need a target, you best look in the mirror, or over your shoulder. Or under your bed. And don't give me that garbage about the Black murder rate being a threat to you. In over 86% of the cases, Black people kill other Black people, and White people kill White people. You kill who you are closest to, and very few of us live in Washington County. And few are brave enough to venture outside our plantation without a 'pass. We know that the Fugitive Slave Action is still in effect, it is merely called something different in 2018. In fact, most Black folks are afraid of y'all. They won't admit it, but they have been conditioned to cast their eyes down in your presence, to self-consciously accept their second-class citizenship and intellectual inferiority. Many fear that 45IQ is rousing up racial hatred as precursor to the final solution and his declaration of being a 'White Nationalist' was a signal for y'all to come out the closet. When we hear the 'Make America Great Again' motto, we immediately think of the movie Birth of a Nation. Not the Nate Turner version, but the original which help spread terrorism and White Supremacy around the country. The KKK was justified and lynchings were as common place as political rhetoric. But that's all a lie, which makes you a fool—and pawn—to follow your leader. This is not the way Nyame (God) planned things. If He (or She) truly blessed America, he did so assuming America would be a template for diversity and democracy. It was to be a melting pot of cultures and ideals. I'm sure Nyame is pretty ticked off at what America has become and what folks like you are doing. Think about that dichotomy. But in the meanwhile, if you're going to sight your guns and pre-

Few days left to have city pick up your fallen leaves



The City of Milwaukee Department of Public Works (DPW) reminds residents that they have through November 15th to rake their leaves into the curb lanes for pick-up by the Department of Public Works (DPW). DPW Sanitation crews currently are collecting leaves and will make one last sweep of all City neighborhoods after November 15, weather permitting. Significant snowfall will curtail leaf collection operations for the season. Important reminder: Rake your leaves into the curb lane - one (1) foot away from the curb. Make sure to keep leaves away from storm drains and sewer grates. Do not put leaves in paper or plastic bags – keep them loose. NOTE: It takes about two weeks for leaf collection operations to cycle through the entire City. After the final leaf pick-up cycle, residents are encouraged to mulch their leaves and leave them on their lawn, compost them, or take them to a City Drop-Off Center for composting. Leaves and brush, along with other yard waste, are banned from landfills and must not be placed in garbage

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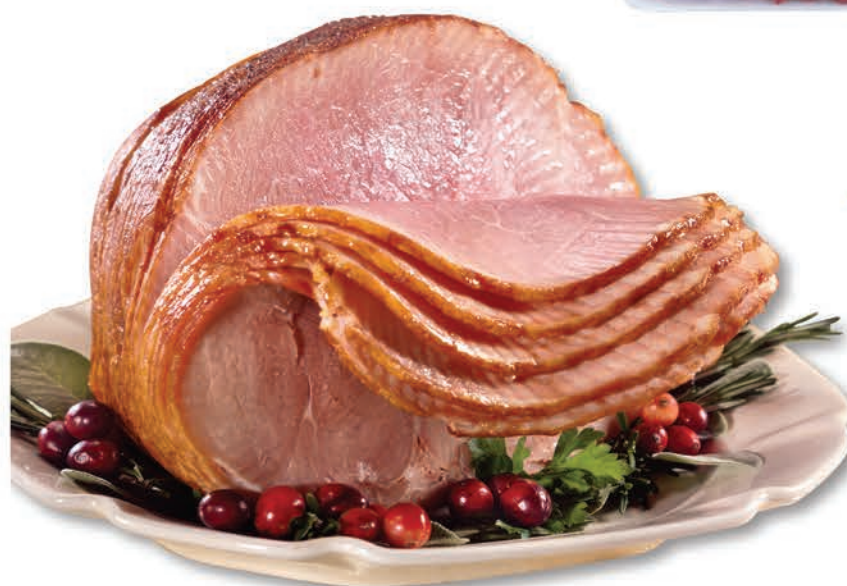
