

Presidents Report

Mission Statement: In order that current and future generations can know and appreciate the heritage of the area, Old Falls Village, through its many supporters including the Menomonee Falls Historical Society, Village officials, and other community leaders, gathers, preserves, educates, and organizes and exhibits artifacts and information about the origins and development of the Village of Menomonee Falls.

Vision Statement: Old Falls Village will be a showcase for Menomonee Falls and an exciting destination for residents and visitors. A premiere resource for local history, Old Falls Village will be a vibrant attraction where history comes alive. Complete with quality storage areas, exhibit space and meeting facilities, Old Falls Village will offer year-round activities and generate income to help future development.

Year Overview: 2018 started with an amazing start with exciting news about a strategic plan for Old Falls Village Park. There were many great improvements for the park this year starting with a new platform behind the Depot which was paid for by tourism money from 2017. The first Beer Garden was started in May 2018 with over 5500 attendees this year, many who were first timers to the park. We made great strides in expanding the attendance to the park this year and grew our membership. More flower beds were created and attended to this year. The ash trees took a terrible hit in Menomonee Falls and over a dozen Ash trees died in the park. In June during a thunderstorm, the largest tree in the park by the school house fell because of carpenter ants in the base. The tree missed most of the school house but did damage the gutter and soffit on the north side. We lost many limbs in the park also. The Ash trees need to be taken down to avoid another situation like this summer.

The Train Depot was transformed with an extension of the platform to the south of the building. A new deck/stage was built with tourism money early spring 2018 for the use of entertainment throughout the year and to be a part of the plans for the new beer garden called Depot Beer Garden. The stage was used for bands, performances and displays throughout the year and was a hit with the public. Lights were hung to add illumination at night.

An admission hut was built for use during the events for this year. It is a representation of the Depot ticket box. Thank you to all involved in the building and donations towards the completion of the admission hut. Thank you to Mr. and Mrs. Burgess and family who spent countless hours working on the admission hut. It turned out so nice and useful that it was used weekly during the beer garden to check ID's.

The Sparrow Cabin was dedicated at the Civil War Event with Peter Sparrow and Dano Walker presenting at the dedication. The cabin was arranged as a German farming cabin with chickens and has sugar beets plot growing next to the cabin. Ken Pruess ordered sugar beet

seeds from California and planted them in a new raised plot north of the cabin. With a fence surrounding the sugar beets, he grew the sugar beets in Menomonee Falls just like when Menomonee Falls was growing as a farming community over hundred years ago.

The first annual WW2 Days happened on June 15-16 with a record number of attendees despite the 90 degree weather. On June 14, a double row of flags were on display as a fundraiser and looked great on display for Flag Day. The USO Dance had the Big Band Command Performance perform in the evening on the new platform with half the platform as a dance floor. The dance floor was full from the second song until the end of the night.

This year was plagued with weird weather, from hot early in June to a colder July, but throughout the year a constant rain that affected many of our events. This was the fourth rainiest year on record in Wisconsin's history.

Strategic Plan: Through a planning process the Executive Board worked with the Village on creating a long term plan layout for the park including an expansion of the Beer Garden behind the Train Depot, develop more pathways within the park for easier access to the buildings. Developing a Main Street north south of the Gazebo and a Banquet hall close to the corner of Pilgrim Road and County Line Road. The expansion of the existing parking lot is one of great improvements designed as well as a second parking lot near the water tower. Finally a parking lot and expansion along pilgrim road is created for more parking and easier safer entrances and exiting.

Tourism:

The Tourism Committee for Menomonee Falls did a study with the Wisconsin Department of Tourism starting in April 2018. In December we received a final report about the assets in Menomonee Falls that we should be promoting and Old Falls Village was definitely one of the highlighted assets.

The Tourism Committee for the Village of Menomonee Falls decided to award the Historical Society \$90,000 for the construction of a Blacksmith shop which is proposed by the tree line along the west side of the park. The original plan was to have a workshop and bathrooms attached to the blacksmith shop but after some **consideration** it may be better to add a space that is multi-functional with a rental hall.

BUILDINGS and GROUNDS

Maintenance

In order to determine the maintenance requirements for each building, a detailed survey was done over the summer and fall of the year. A list was compiled, and priorities determined. Work was scheduled as in-house capabilities and budgets allowed. Notable major maintenance projects were repairs to the squirrel damaged Miller-Davidson House roof, installation of racoon proof barrier around the Miller Davidson House and the new Depot stage, shoring and a rain tarp for the Brogan cabin, completion of the interior chinking of the Sparrow cabin, and repair to the storm damaged roof of the School.

New construction

A replica of the Sunnyside school bell tower was constructed and dedicated. Located on the southside of the school, the bell tower is flanked by benches allowing visitors to sit and enjoy the ambience of the park.

To provide shelter and better security for the admissions workers, a 6 foot by 8-foot portable ticket booth was built using volunteer labor and donated materials. The booth has 2 ticket windows and the outside walls have room for bulletin boards and chalk boards. Built to mimic the design of the Depot, the booth captures the essence of a whistle stop on the rail line. The booth is designed to be easily moved by fork truck.

As a venue for future entertainment a 16 by 40-foot stage was built on the south side of the Depot. The stage is tied in to the existing front platform of the Depot with a walkway on the east side of the building. The stage has already been used for the WW-2 dance and during the Civil War days and for numerous other entertainment. Plans to move the Beer garden to the east side of the Public House will provide for additional uses.

A contract was signed to install "period" looking gutters on the south side of the Depot, the Umhoefer cabin, and the Sparrow cabin. The gutters will provide much needed rain water protection for all 3 buildings.

A project is underway to clean out the Carriage Hose and convert it to a carriage and agricultural implement museum. Completion date for the project will be sometime in 2019.

HISTORIAN REPORT

Pioneer Certificates

Only one certificate was given out this year, to Lawrence Schmitz. His sister, Joan Adams got it for him for his birthday. His ancestors; Magdalena (Theil) Schmitz (1865), Matthias Schmitz (1869), Arthur Schmitz (1905).

We had 251 second graders from the MF public schools and 35 third graders from St Mary's school attend ITWH on Friday 6-1-18. We had gross income of \$1716.00 and expenses of \$285.74 leaving us a profit of \$1430.26. We have been doing this since 2004. The children cut wood, pumped water, shelled corn, ground corn into flour, saw a blacksmith in action, made ice cream, peeled apples, churned butter, took an old fashioned schoolhouse lesson, chopped corn stalks for silage, planted seeds, pounded nails, learned about pioneer agriculture, saw a demonstration of starting a fire using flint and steel, heard a musket shoot, saw a woods man campsite and generally learned how much work pioneer children had to do to help Mom and Dad

The floral arraignment it held was artistically created and donated by Bank of Flowers. The poinsettias were also donated by Shady Lane Nursery.

Many thanks to every volunteer who helped make the event a success! To Deb Schultz and her decorating crew (they also do the float for the Christmas Parade) the house was beautiful, as always! Whether you cleaned and polished beforehand, lent us items for display, or baked (we had 54 bakers this year) and plated the day before, or guided, poured, washed dishes, or cleaned up afterwards, my heartfelt thanks. This could never happen without you!

This year we had an early turn out. We were barely ready when they all started showing up. It was a great success until about 3pm when it started to sleet. That did slow it down, so we didn't beat last years' total, but we will next year!

SPRING QUARTERLY MEETING

Our Spring Quarterly Meeting was held on April 30, 2018. We began with a social time, treats, and a short business meeting led by President Nancy Greifenhagen. Our guest speaker was local author Carole McGibany, who gave a presentation about "Glimpses", her recently published book about the history of Fussville.

For about 100 years, the small triangle of land along Appleton Ave., Good Hope Rd., and Lilly Road was the unincorporated community of Fussville that was settled by German immigrants. Carole shared information about what happened to this little community, and answered questions from the audience. Everyone in attendance gained interesting information about our area, and many people purchased her book to learn even more.

SUMMER COOKOUT/QUARTERLY MEETING

August 27, 2018 was the date of our summer cookout/quarterly meeting. Forty-six members and guests attended this enjoyable event.

President Nancy Greifenhagen talked about our summer events: In Touch With History and Old Falls Village Days, our first World War II Days event, the Civil War Encampment, and the

She also shared information about the first year of our Beer Garden. From May to October, 5557 people enjoyed different craft beers, food from Ally's, music, and the park. Next year the Beer Garden will occur from June to September, with the possibility of our Historical Society serving hot dogs and pizza.

Our members then carpooled to Richfield Historical Park. We toured the Mill House, the Mill, the Blacksmith Shop, and the Welcome Center. Volunteers explained each of the places, and answered our many questions. An enjoyable time was had by all.

SPARROW CABIN DEDICATION

The Sparrow Cabin was dedicated on July 21, 2018, as part of the Civil War Encampment.

This cabin was built around 1849 on Silver Spring Drive. It was made of heavy tamarack logs, and it was built in the German style with half-dovetailed corners. The cabin had a full fieldstone basement built from rock (the majority of which was granite) cleared from the nearby fields. This structure was hidden under clapboard siding for many years, and was moved to Old Falls Village in December, 2003.

THE SUNNY SIDE SCHOOL BELL TOWER REPLICA DEDICATION

June 2, 2018

Sunny Side School was built in 1875. Located on the southwest corner of the intersection of Main Street and Menomonee Ave. in Menomonee Falls. It was a one room school house, until the summer of 1952, when two new classrooms were added. It continued to be used as a school until 1961, and then it was used for storage by the School District.

A lot of time and effort went into rescuing the bell tower from demolition, when the school was torn down in 2014 to make way for the new firehouse. After it was moved to Old Falls Village, is was examined from every which way, and after much consideration, repair was not an option. So, it was decided to be used as a template for a replica. Pictures old and new

were looked over, paint color was discussed, plans made. The original school bell from that tower, has already resided, for many years now, in the School House at Old Falls Village.

The dedication ceremony, took place during the Old Falls Village Days celebration. Starting out with the pledge of Allegiance, said by all, this was followed by an Invocation by our president Reverend Warren Granke. Vice President Nancy Greifenhagen issued welcoming remarks, with the history of the school, given after, by Diane Harley and myself. Diane gave a bit of history on the school, I talked about how my grandmother and her siblings went to school there and the classes they took. Jonathan Verhaalen got an Eagle Scout Recognition for his work in building the seating area around the reconstructed bell tower. School District of Menomonee Falls Superintendant Pat Greco and School Board Members gave remarks. Accompany of Kids, dressed as pioneer children gave a few cute and enjoyable musical selections, one being "School Days". Warren was in charge of the Ceremonial Ribbon Cutting, and closing remarks were made by Diane.

After the ceremony, everyone was free to come up and get an apple from a basket, to enjoy. Many came up to look at the display about the school, and peruse the class photos we were able to find. Marge Krainer found two pictures with her and her twin sister and their classmates. There were more displays and information about Sunny Side School in the School House. The day was sunny, cool and crisp. All in all a wonderful dedication of our new exhibit.
