



Understanding Setting

In order to understand the events of the play fully, you must have an understanding of the CONTEXT of the place in which the events are set.



Centre of Finance and Commerce

Venice was famous for its Rialto - a world centre for trade and commerce built over and around the Grand Canal. It was known as the 'Port to the East' and its merchants became extremely wealthy.



Dependent on Sea Borne Trade

Venice is an insular country that depended on the sea for the transportation of goods.



Good Credit

Venice enjoyed a strong reputation throughout the world for strictly enforcing its laws. It enjoyed good credit as a result.



With a partner, try reading out the following lines from Antonio and Solanio. How might the delivery of the lines change meaning?






ANTONIO: In sooth, I know not why I am so sad.

Analysing Relationship

Think about the following questions to help you analyse the relationship between Antonio and Bassanio:

 How does Shakespeare make it clear that Bassanio is younger than Antonio? How does this affect our understanding of their relationship?

 If Bassanio is already in debt with Antonio, why might Antonio agree to give Bassanio yet more money?

 How does Bassanio describe Portia? How might this influence Antonio's response?
 What might this tell us about the relationship between Antonio and Bassanio?

 What might Antonio's language tell us about the way he feels about Bassanio?
