Hail to the Chief

Margaret Lougee installed as Bow's new Police Chief

Margaret Lougee was sworn in Monday night as Bow's new Police Chief before a standing room only crowd at the Old Town Hall. The crowd included Lougee's large family, friends, along with past and present coworkers. Lougee previously served as a master sergeant in the NH Air National Guard retiring after 21 years of service.

The Chief joined the department in 1996, serving as a patrolman and sergeant, as well, working as an organizer of the Police Explorer Program and secretary of the Bow Police Association. She has served as the student resource officer for the last decade, a role she hopes quickly to fill.

"It really is a great department," she said. As one of only five female chiefs in the state, Lougee will be succeeding another longtime member of Bow Police. Former Chief Erin Commerford stepped down at the end of September for a job in the private sector. She became chief in 2008, six years after starting with the department. "This is a dream come true." Lougee said, "This is my town," she said.

Tilton man hurls Molotov Cocktail at girlfriend's car

Shawn McKenney, 24, of Tilton pleaded guilty to a felony charge for making a Molotov Cocktail and a misdemeanor arson charge of throwing it beneath a car in Belmont as a result of a domestic dispute.

In a plea agreement the state agreed to drop a count of felony arson and misdemeanor criminal mischief. His girlfriend subsequently filed a motion with the court asking that the domestic violence order between the parties be vacated, writing that she no longer feared McKenney, and wished to resume living with him.

He was sentenced to 2.5 to 5 years in prison, suspended on the condition of good behavior for five years. He was also sentenced to 12 months in jail on the arson charge and was credited with serving 11 days of pretrial confinement.

Franklin Mayor leading the fight against education aid reductions

A group of about 75 people, including officials from several communities, listened Monday night as Franklin Mayor Ken Merrifield asked for a unified effort in stopping the effects of the gradual elimination in state education stabilization grant funding.

Merrifield told town and city officials from Derry, Berlin, Manchester and other communities that the state's communities likely all share the problem, as NH House Bills 1 and 2, which passed in 2015, phase out the grants by 4 percent a year starting in 2017.

Towns and cities should look at two choices, he said: a Legislative bill to freeze state education aid at current levels while finding a better solution than the aid cuts, or a lawsuit to force such an outcome.

"We need to work with the Legislature first, before we turn to litigation," Merrifield said.

Officials from Berlin and other communities said the cuts are making them look at cutting fire department and police services, Franklin City Manager Elizabeth Dragon called for action. Merrifield said some towns and cities will be losing mil-

Seven towns assist Weare in battling Mount Dearborn Road fire

On November 13, 2016, at 0100 hours the Weare Fire Department responded to a report of a building fire at 363 Mount Dearborn Road. When firefighters arrived they encountered a 2- story wood framed building heavily involved in fire. Assistant Fire Chief Robert Richards was the incident commander and struck a second alarm to summon additional personnel.

The owner, who had been sleeping, was alerted to the fire and escaped prior to the Fire Department's arrival. The entire building suffered fire and smoke damaged and all the contents were destroyed.

Firefighters from several surrounding communities fought the fire with water that had to be transported via tanker trucks from a nearby pond. The communities of

Goffstown, Henniker, Bow, New Boston, Francestown, Hillsborough, and Dunbarton, provided Mutual Aid.

"This was the second building fire of the night for some of these crews," said Chief Robert Vezina, "everyone did a great job".

The cause of the fire remains under investigation. Red Cross Disaster Ac-

tion Team volunteers have met with the resident to ensure he or she has a safe place to sleep and has food, clothing, and other essentials. Over the next several days, Red Cross client casework volunteers will stay in contact with the resident and provide referrals as he or she begins the road to recovery.

Quick response saves Dunbarton home

A Dunbarton shed was destroyed after catching fire Sunday afternoon. Crews responded to the 36 Twist Hill Road home shortly before 3:30 p.m. after a report of smoke in the backyard. Dunbarton Fire Deputy Chief Bud Marcou said he's not sure who called in the report, but believes it was someone driving by, as no one was home at the time. A second alarm was called, bringing in crews from surrounding towns — Bow, Goffstown, Hooksett and Hopkinton — for extra man power and water supply from tanker trucks. "It was called before we even got here," Marcou said of the two-alarm response. Though the shed was located close behind the house, only a few windows were broken on that structure, Marcou said. No one was injured he said., but the cause remains under investigation.

Bow approves new Municipal Bldg roof

Bow Town Manager David Stack reported the receipt of four bids ranging from \$40,900 to \$69,000 to replace the exterior roof and venting at the municipal building. The Building Inspector and Public Works Director conducted a review of the bids and recommended Score Construction for \$52,700. The Town approved a withdrawal of \$70,000 which will allow some money to be used for the insulation project. The roof will be 30-year shingles. Discussion ensued regarding the quality of the bids and the option of going with the lowest bid. The selectmen unanimously voted to accept the \$52,700 roofing bid from Score Construction and to authorize that the Town Manager execute the contract.

Ausbon Sargent protects New London land

The Ausbon Sargent Land Preservation Trust closed on the Trayner property on Shaker Street and Mountain Road in New London on October 27, 2016. This brings the total number of Ausbon Sargent protected properties to 139 properties, comprising 11,117 acres of land in its 12-town area of operations. The Trayner property is mostly forested, but does contain a maintained field on the northern edge that could be used for pasturing horses or other farm animals. There is extensive road frontage on both Shaker Street and Mountain Road that offers scenic value and the property has valuable agricultural and forestry soils. The resources that will be protected on this property are those recommended in the New London Master Plan.

Over 100 birds killed in fire that destroys Newport pole barn

About 100 birds perished in a barn fire at a family farm on Brown Road Monday afternoon, Newport Fire Chief Wayne Conroy said. Pigs rescued from the barn were revived with water and oxygen. Newport Fire and EMS responded to a report of heavy black smoke in the area of Brown Road at 12:27 p.m. on Monday. Firefighters found the rear of a barn structure on fire as well as a pole barn fully involved in fire.

The residents, Valerie and William Sandborn, were not at home at the time of the blaze. Due to the dry conditions a brush fire started and spread into the woods. Firefighters fought the fire while also rescuing seven pigs discovered when they entered the barn.

"All seven pigs were safely removed from the building, however, one was missing," said Lt. Zach Lobdell. "EMTs gave them oxygen and they were able to walk away and went to another pen with horses." According to the owners more than 100 birds — which included chickens, roasters and pheasants — were in the barn, Conroy said. A few of the birds survived, he said.

The pole barn was completed destroyed, as were several vehicles — a car, tractor and ATV — stored in the pole barn.

No firefighters were injured in the fire. Newport was assisted by multiple fire departments from the area, including Lempster, Claremont, Sunapee, New London, Grantham, Croydon and Newbury.

Newport fire and police investigators evaluated the scene and determined the fire started in the pole barn, but deemed the cause of the fire "undetermined."



Magoon faces 11 counts of sexual assault

Robert Magoon, 74, of Northfield, accused of sexually abusing children and a disabled woman, waived his right to a speedy trial and is now facing 11 counts of aggravated felonious sexual assault, two counts of attempted aggravated felonious sexual assault, one count of felonious sexual assault and a misdemeanor charge of simple assault, involving eight alleged victims. A status conference in the case is now scheduled to be held in mid-January. Public Defenders Erine Flinchbaugh and Hanna Kinne, who are representing Magoon, have indicated that they plan to challenge the admissibility of statements their client allegedly gave to police.

New Boston responds to federal lawsuit

Lt. Michael Masella, the New Boston officer accused of ranking women drivers on a "rapability" scale in a federal lawsuit filed denied the allegation in a 26-page response to the suit filed in U.S. District Court by ex-officer Alexandra Drake, 24, of Nashua. He does admit that on occasion he would make self-deprecating comments jokingly claiming a female driver must have found him attractive but he denies ever developing a "rapability" scale or that he tested Drake on whether a particular driver was "rapable." The town filed documents on behalf of Police Chief James Brace and the selectmen asking that most of the federal suit be dismissed except for Drake's claims of wrongful termination, sexual harassment and retaliation, "since the factual allegations, though false," could support a plausible claim.

Jim Kofalt's refuses recount in 1 vote loss

Although he lost his election in a race for the N.H. House of Representatives by one vote, but Jim Kofalt did not challenge the result. Kofalt, a Wilton Republican, was beaten last week by fellow Republican John J. Valera, of Windsor in a contest for the two seats in Hillsborough House District 38. Valera won the second highest vote tally, with 5,415 ballots. Kofalt took in 5,414 votes, a hair away from victory. Incumbent Democrat Rep. Richard D. McNamara of Hillsboro took the highest total of ballots, with 5,595.

White Birch joins Discussion on Early Learning and Affordable Childcare

White Birch Center teacher Ashley Murphy recently participated in a public roundtable discussion on the importance of quality, affordable child care for working families here in New Hampshire. Held in Antrim, NH on October 27, the panel presentation was hosted by the non-profit organization The Campaign for a Family Friendly Economy. Ms. Murphy shared her expertise as a teacher, emphasizing the importance of quality early learning experiences for children during their most formative years of growth. "Brain development is at a critical point of growth for children from birth through five years of age. We have this window of opportunity, paired with a significant responsibility to children and families, to support this growth and development in the most positive and encompassing ways possible," explained Murphy. As the parent of a preschooler, Ms. Murphy also spoke to the significant challenges parents and caregivers face regarding access to quality, affordable childcare.

Cause of New Boston fire remains under investigation

New Boston Fire Dept. responded to a structure fire last Saturday night reported by the owners of the home around 7:10pm. First arriving responders found fire burning through a wall on the west side of the home. Even before the first engine arrived, members were using fire extinguishers and a new extinguishing technology to hold the fire in check until the engine arrived. With the help of responders from Mont Vernon, Milford, Francestown and Lyndenborough Fire Departments the fire was quickly extinguished. Extensive overhaul was required to ensure the spread of the fire was completed. According to New Boston Fire Inspector Eric Dubowik, the cause of the fire is under investigation.

Henniker's Safe Routes to School

The Henniker Selectmen spent a lot of money Tuesday evening. Fortunately much of it will not effect the local tax rate. The Board unanimously approved \$280,000 to construct Phase I of the Safe Routes To School Project, first applied for in 2009. The project is funded with a 100% federal grant with construction to begin in the spring.

Also approved was \$52,600 for the Phase II Engineering Study. 80% is funded by the federal government and 20% by local taxpayers. Construction is projected for spring of 2018. Police Chief Matt French received approval to apply for a \$24,575 grant to purchase two mobile date terminals for his cruisers. The grant funds 100% of the cost.

Things got a bit testy when member Ben Fortner renewed his attack on the Road Management Committee, most of whose members were in attendance. Fortner moved to have the committee immediately send the Town Administrator a copy of its spread sheet, which the committee objected to as merely its unfinished work product. Selectman Scott Osgood angrily called them an insubordinate committee. The motion then passed 3-0-2 with Selectmen Bob Fench and Tia Hooper abstaining as they both serve on that committee.

Weare Middle School students tour Hopkinton-Everett Dam

As part of the watershed education portion of the 7 and 8th-grade science curriculum, Weare 7/8th grade students learned about the 1938 Great Flood in Weare and the subsequent construction of the Hopkinton-Everett dam system and its lasting effects on the Towns of Weare, Henniker, and Hopkinton.

In November, the students took a walking tour of the approximately 2.5 miles into the flood control area. Students were led on the tour by US Army Corp. Ranger Brad Clark who also shared with students information about his career as a

Park Ranger. On the tour, WMS teachers shared with students much of the history of East Weare and sites of historical significance, all while students picked up trash along the way.

The group later traveled by bus to Elm Brook State Park and hiked across the dike at Elm Brook to the Hopkinton Dam before touring the dam and gate house. While at Elm Brook Park, Ranger Steve Dermody used a 3D topographical map to lead a discussion on the scope of the Hopkinton-Everett Flood Risk Managment area.

The Goffstown Selectmen granted Fire Chief Richard O'Brien's request to increase the transfer out of the EMS account from \$454,000 to \$539,000. The new ambulance rates, effective in January, are expected to generate \$540,000 in fees.

New London Board explains tax increase

New London's 2016 Town tax rate is \$4.35. Why did the tax rate increase by 7.4%? There are 2 principal explanations:

For the past four years the Board of Selectmen have chosen to use a total of \$1,700,000 of Unassigned Fund Balance* to reduce the tax rate. In so doing, the Unassigned Fund Balance remaining at year end has fallen from over \$1,000,000 in 2012 to approximately \$900,000. This fund balance is a measure of the financial stability of the Town. The State of New Hampshire recommends that a minimum Unassigned Fund Balance of 5% of regular operating expenditures be maintained, or in the case of New London at the end of Fiscal Year 2016, \$1,002,775. The Board of Selectmen chose this year to partially close the gap between the minimum recommended balance and New London's actual balance by applying \$275,000 of the Unassigned Fund Balance to reduce the 2016 tax rate, leaving an Unassigned Fund Balance of \$946,352.

Management of cash flow for the Town requires that the Town collect adequate tax revenue in a timely fashion to meet its cash obligations. The Board of Selectmen prefers not to borrow funds to meet these obligations. Due to the increasing obligations to Merrimack County and the Kearsarge Regional School District, cash flow has become tighter, and the use of less Unassigned Fund Balance to reduce the tax rate assists in having adequate cash on hand.

* Unassigned Fund Balance is the accumulation of unexpended appropriations and excess revenues. The increase to Unassigned Fund Balance for the year ended June 30, 2016 was approximately \$318,000. The Board of Selectmen may vote to use a portion of Unassigned Fund Balance to reduce the tax rate.

French upsets Hosmer for State Senate

Republican challenger Harold French of Franklin hung onto his narrow victory over Democratic State Sen. Andrew Hosmer of Laconia. Following an all-day recount of the ballots Wednesday, French defeated Hosmer by 17 votes. The final count was 13,880-13,863. On Nov. 8, French was declared the winner by 16 votes. At that time before the recount, the split was French with 13,875 to Hosmer with 13,859. In the recount, French picked up five votes while Hosmer gained only four. The recount affirms that the Senate will stay made up of 14 Republicans and 10 Democrats.





In a study of nearly 650 people with the eye disease age-related macular degeneration (AMD), half still had vision 20/40 or better, typically good enough to drive or to read standard print, after five years of treatment with anti-VEGF drugs that are injected into the eye. The results were published in the journal *Ophthalmology*.

Patients receiving cancer treatment could increase their chance of survival by up to 20% and help stop their cancer from spreading by taking a low-dose aspirin, new research published in the journal *PLOS ONE* suggests. A systematic review of the available scientific literature found a significant reduction in mortality and cancer spread by patients who took a low-level dose of aspirin in addition to their cancer treatment (average study follow-up length over 5 years).

Umbilical cords of children whose mothers used selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors during pregnancy may be longer than umbilical cords of other newborn children, according to a new study from the University of Eastern Finland and Kuopio University Hospital. Selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors, SSRIs, are commonly prescribed antidepressants. This is the first time their association with umbilical cord length was observed. The findings were published in *PLOS ONE*. A long umbilical cord can weaken fetal circulation and expose the fetus to a lack of oxygen during the pregnancy or birth, among other things. According to the study researchers, this newly observed association of prenatal SSRI use with umbilical cord length may indicate that SSRI drugs increase fetal activity and movement in the uterus.




