In this in-between time, there will be plenty of ways to create some breathing space in our busy lives, explore our faith in new ways, listen to the Spirit, listen to our lives, and prepare our hearts and minds and bodies for the Lenten journey. Here's a highlight of some of the things coming up in February:

Sunday, February 2

We welcome back to the pulpit Brian Edwards, executive director of Suburban Crossroads Counseling Center. Catonsville Presbyterian has a long history with Suburban and its unique ministry in the community. Their counselors/psychologists meet clients in several rooms in the Church House. Brian preached back in November for the first time, and many expressed to me deep gratitude and appreciation for his message. After worship, stay for a meal. The Souper Bowl of Caring Luncheon will follow in fellowship hall.

Sunday, February 9

Scout Sunday, an annual tradition at Catonsville Presbyterian. We will celebrate our century-long relationship with Scouting, first through Troop 306 and, more recently, Scout Pack 306. The Scouts will usher, host fellowship hour, and a senior member of the Troop will offer a Moment for Scouting.

Sunday, February 16

We welcome Dr. Roy Howard, recently retired pastor of St. Mark Presbyterian Church in Rockville, MD (National Capital Presbytery). Roy will be leading adult education at 9 a.m., building on Brené Brown's important work on shame and vulnerability and providing a theological dimension to her findings. And then he'll also proclaim the Word during worship. Roy is Book Editor of *The Presbyterian Outlook*. Good friend, colleague, and fellow pilgrim, his wisdom was invaluable to me preparing for my Camino to Santiago de Compostela several years ago. (If he doesn't share the story about his tattoo, be sure to ask him.)

Sunday, February 23

Transfiguration of the Lord Sunday. During adult education we welcome back Pauline scholar Dr. Michael Gorman, who will be talking about

the central importance given to "participation" in Paul's theology. Mike will help us understand what it means to say that we are "in Christ." (See page 3.) During worship we will hear the story of transfiguration and open ourselves yet again to the transfiguring power of Christ's Spirit. We will share in the baptism of Elianna Maze. And following worship we have our Lenten Event, which will include lunch and the making of Peace Cranes, which will be on display throughout Lent. (See page 5.)

Saturday, February 29

And, finally, on Saturday, February 29, we will welcome Dr. James Hollis—author, teacher, and Jungian psychoanalyst—who will lead a workshop based on his book *Living An Examined Life*. Jim is a good friend and mentor. His writings and friendship have had a deep impact on my life over the last ten years. A wise soul, I'm confident that you will gain much from our time together. He is a highly sought-after speaker and I'm grateful for his willingness to come to Catonsville. You can register to attend after worship throughout February, as well as online. (See page 7.)

Finding Brigid

Patrick may be Ireland's best known saint, but Brigid (also spelled Brigit) figures prominently among its three patron saints, with the third being Columba (also called Columcille, the founder of the monastery at Iona). Several Christian churches celebrate Brigid at this time of the year, particularly for her association with daily life of the Irish people—from bringing forth the flame on the hearth to the birthing of lambs and churning of butter. This class will be a journey to find Brigid at her wells and monastery and through her stories. Personal photography, historical texts, and current scholarship will be the basis of uncovering some of the facts and fables associated with this early Celtic woman who is said to stand “on the boundary between pagan mythology and Christian spirituality.”

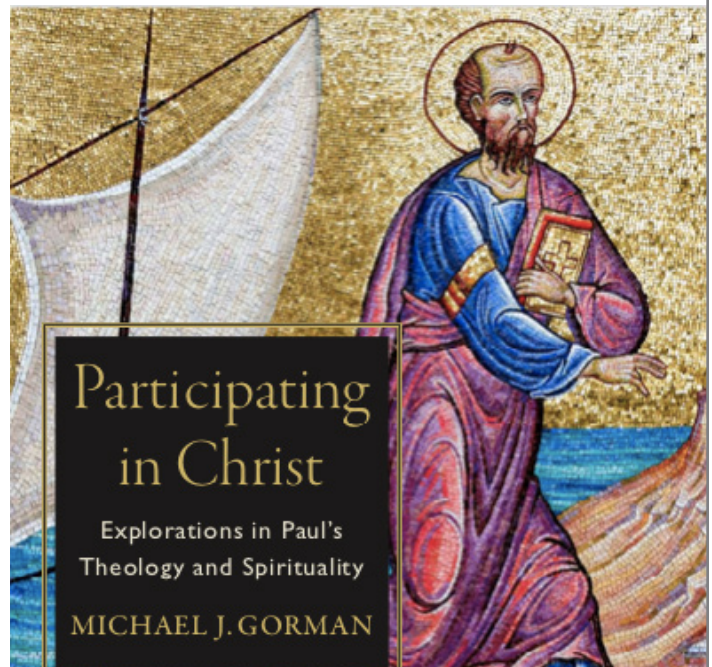
faculty member of The Academy of Artful Leadership, trained coach with the International Coaching Federation, a certified facilitator for Healthy Congregations.

A chapter from the book appeared in *The Christian Century* last summer.

For native plants, I highly recommend Herring Run Nursery, www.bluewaterbaltimore.org/herring-run-nursery, operated by Blue Water Baltimore. Many of the native plants and trees used in our projects were purchased there. The Staff also make great recommendations and provide advice on planting. We will be scheduling general spring garden workdays in late March and April, depending on the weather patterns, and then throughout the coming season. Watch for more information! 2020 Senior High Mission, Service Learning Trip

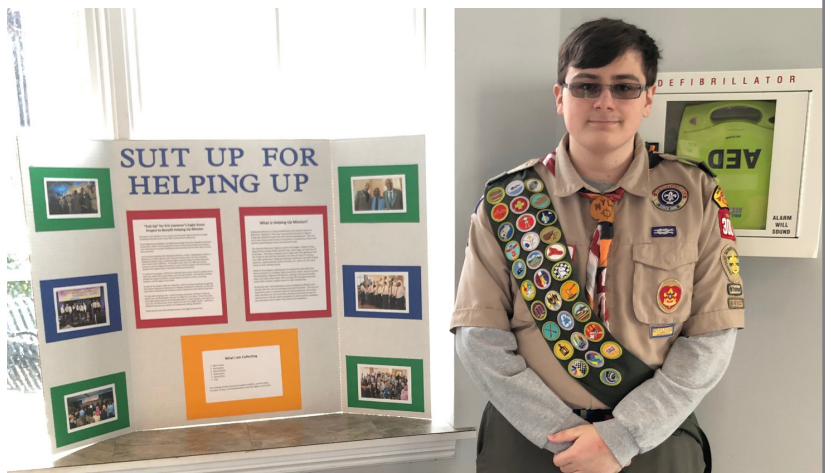

“Through daily dialogue at work sites, small discussion groups, and worship,” we’ll “develop a rich theological, social, and academic understanding of justice while recognizing ways in which Holy Scripture calls for justice and love for all—fostering conversations focused on topics such as lifelong service and discipleship.”

Session Meeting Highlights

The Session is a body of fifteen members, elected by the congregation and ordained as ruling elders, who provide leadership for our congregation. Following are highlights of the regular monthly Session meeting of January 8, 2020.

■ A new member class will be received at a special meeting called by Session on Saturday, January 25, 2020, and the new members will be welcomed at worship on Sunday, January 26, 2020.

■ Most of the rest of the Session meeting was concerned with our financial performance against the budget for 2019, and the proposed budget process for 2020. The 2019 financial performance and the 2020 budgets will be presented and interpreted for the congregation at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation on January 26, 2020. The budget discussions were as follows:

■ 2019 Budget Performance: We finished strong for 2019, with the deficit reduced to \$3,664 by the end of the year. This was a good result, considering that there was a planned deficit of \$10,000 built into the budget from the beginning of the year. The congregation is to be thanked for its support, and the Child Care Center for a timely year-end gift that made the reduced deficit possible.

■ 2020 Proposed Operating Budget: The stewardship campaign has resulted in pledges to-date of \$363,000 versus \$377,000 for 2019, despite a loss of \$35,000 in pledgers due to deaths, moving out of the area, or changed circumstances. The 2020 budget will be determined

when remaining pledges and income from other sources have been considered against predicted expenses for 2020, and will be approved at a special meeting called for that purpose.

■ 2020 Investment Budget: The Finance Committee proposed that an additional budget category be adopted to account for variable income and expenses outside of the usual operating budget system. This would include capital expenses, unusual building and grounds expenses, and similar types of non-recurring expenses. For 2020 this will include items such as the roof replacement project, which is a major, non-recurring expense. The Investment Budget will be funded, as needed, from such sources as the investment accounts, undesignated bequests, grants, etc. The Investment Budget will also be approved at the special called Session meeting on January 25, 2020.

Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with our membership, and we welcome your suggestions for communication exchange. Session member contact information is listed in the Church Directory, so it is easy to communicate directly with your church leaders. Take a few minutes to send a message to a Session member, the pastors, or the church office, and let us know what you think. We want to hear from you! — David Hutton, Clerk of Session
