JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The forty-eighth annual conference of the Idaho-Washington District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the district tabernacle at Clarkston, Washington on Monday, July 9, 1962.

The conference began with Reverend D. L. Goss leading the ministers and delegates in the singing of "I Know Whom I Have Believed" after which Reverend Frank Evans led our hearts in prayer.

Reverend E. E. Meeks, our esteemed District Superintendent, introduced Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, General Superintendent of the Western Area of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, to the conference as the chairman. Dr. Snyder based his preliminary remarks to the conference on two passages of Scripture found in Hebrews 1:1 and Matthew 8:5-13. He emphasized that we must have a faith that is exercised in a profound humility, a faith that is exercised in a profound love, a faith that recognizes constituted authority and a faith that exercises authority.

At the call of the Chairman, the roll of conference delegates was read, to which 13 ordained ministers, 7 licensed ministers, 3 ordained deaconesses and 11 lay delegates responded.

A motion carried that the seats within the first three posts of the tabernacle and the platform constitute the conference bar. The Chairman called for all delegates to be seated within the conference bar.

The time for the conference sessions was established as 9:00 to 12:00 for the morning session; 1:30 to 5:00 for the afternoon session; and 6:00 to 9:00 for the evening session.

The report of the District Superintendent was read and received by the conference with gratitude.

Dr. Snyder disclosed that recent International Conference legislation provides that the District Missionary Society President is a member of the district conference by virtue of his office and the conference accordingly seated Mrs. E. E. Meeks.

The following were received into the conference upon recommendation of the Examining Committee: Mrs. Marion King, Gene Whetstone and J. W. Partridge as ordained ministers and Glen Higdon and Francis Aeschliman as licensed ministers.

The report of the District Statistician was approved by the conference and a vote of thanks extended to Mrs. Deloris Boone for her fine work.

The auditor's report was read and accepted with a word of commendation from the auditor for the wonderful work of Reverend and Mrs. Hall.

The conference voted to accept the District Treasurer's report.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary reported to the conference, who gratefully accepted it.

The report of the Youth President was read and accepted.

The report of the Missionary Society President was read and approved.

A motion carried to receive an offering for Ed Meeks who had labored so diligently to keep the district lawns presentable.

A further report from the Examining Committee recommended the following names to the conference for ratification:

Retained in the 2nd year license: Albert Weaver and W. H. Harmon.

To receive a 2nd year license: Curt Heath.

Advanced to 3rd year license: Devere Defield, Dale Defield, Bob Meeks, and Don Sheets.

To be placed in 1st year deaconess license: Martha Meeks.

Advanced to 3rd year deaconess: Alice Fry.

To be ordained: A. P. Huffine.

To recognize the ordination credentials of Reverend Marion King.

The conference voted to ratify.

The District Superintendent appointed Brothers Wells and Rosentrater as the conference Reception Committee.

The Resolutions Committee reported.

Standing Resolutions numbers 4 and 9 were deleted and the following resolution was substituted for number 9: Resolved that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be appointed for the following conference year prior to the annual conference, that the Sunday School Committee be given at least one service during the annual camp meeting and that the Promotional Secretary for the coming year be given the opportunity to present his plans for the coming year.

Standing Resolutions numbers 16, 28 and 30 were deleted.

The following resolution was approved: Resolved that the District Council investigate a hospital insurance plan for the pastors' families of the district.

A motion carried to conduct the ordination service as the first order of business in the evening session.

The morning session was adjourned by prayer.

Afternoon setting

The afternoon session began with Reverend Devere Defield leading the conference in prayer.

The minutes of the first setting were read and approved.

The Reception Committee presented Reverend W. F. Drown to the conference and heard his good testimony. A motion carried to grant him an honorary seat in the conference bar.

The Resolutions Committee resumed its report.

The following resolution was approved by the conference: Resolved that the laity be encouraged to report the number of calls made per month to the pastor so that the pastor may report them to the Editor of the Pilgrim Echoes.

The General Resolutions of appreciation to camp workers were approved.

Using I Timothy 4 as a basis for his remarks, Dr. Snyder preached to the candidate and all attending ministers, on "Saint Paul's 3-fold Admonition to the Ministry". He set forth the first as a **Warning**—"Take heed to thyself and the doctrine;" the second as an **Exhortation**—"Continue in them"; and the third as a **Promise**—"In so doing thou shalt both save thyself and them that hear thee".

With the laying on of hands, Dr. Snyder proceeded to ordain Reverend A. P. Huffine to the ministry of the gospel, charging him and his wife to make full proof of their ministry.

The Ways and Means Committee resumed their report.

Ways and Means resolution number 6 was deleted.

Ways and Means resolution number 7 was amended to read, "Resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$55.00 per week, to be supplemented by generous donations and offerings from the churches at the Superintendent's two yearly calls. The District is to assume all district phone expense, utilities, and postage and office supplies.

Ways and Means numbers 9 and 11 were deleted.

Ways and Means resolution number 12 was amended by striking out the words "five dollars" and "per year" and substituting the words "forty cents" and "per month", respectively.

Ways and Means resolution number 14 was deleted.

Ways and Means resolution number 15 was amended and a new camp meeting rate schedule adopted.

Ways and Means resolution number 16 was amended to read, "Resolved that this conference recommend that each local church pay the assessments of the Ministerial Benefit Association for their pastor and his wife.

Ways and Means resolutions numbers 17, 18, 19 and 21 were deleted.

A late resolution was approved that provided for each church to give an offering on the camp beef, or in lieu of an offering, give canned goods or vegetables, and that the District Council appoint one person to contact the churches for this purpose prior to camp.

The conference approved a late Examining Committee recommendation that Edith Aeschliman be granted first year deaconess license and Mrs. A. P. Huffine 4th year ministerial license.

The conference proceeded to elect district officers for the coming year.

Reverend E. E. Meeks was re-elected Superintendent on the first ballot.

Reverend D. D. Goss was re-elected Assistant Superintendent.

Reverend W. L. Boone was re-elected as District Secretary.

Reverend E. W. Hall was re-elected as District Treasurer.

Reverends James Rosentrater and Frank Evans were re-elected as advisory members on the first ballot. Reverend O. A. Wells was elected on the second.

After much prayerful deliberation, the conference passed the following resolution presented from the District Council: Resolved that we favor the General Executive Council's proposal for the merger of smaller districts and that this District Conference authorize their District Council to effect immediate merger with the Pacific-Northwest District if acceptable terms can be attained.

The Reception Committee presented Reverends J. H. Philpot and Devere Defield to the conference who enjoyed their remarks and testimonies. Reverend Philpot was granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The Ways and Means Committee reported.

Ways and Means Resolution number 1 was presented to the conference for amending as follows: Resolved that each

church raise the equivalent of 12% of the receipts, excepting building and improvement funds and evangelist offerings, to be applied on the district budget as follows: 54% for district administration expense; 6% for International Conference delegate expense, and 40% for district church extension. Be it further resolved that the ministerial tithe from each pastor be channeled to the district administration fund through the local treasurer.

There was a motion to amend the resolution by inserting the words "an amount equal to". It was lost.

A further motion to change the 12% assessment to 13% was lost.

A motion carried to vote the previous question.

The resolution as originally presented carried.

Ways and Means resolution number 5 was amended to read, "Resolved that the annual remuneration of the secretary and the statistician be \$15.00 each, the treasurer \$120.00 and the editor of the Pilgrim Echoes \$25.00. Be it further resolved that all authorized travel for district interests be reimbursed at the rate of 5¢ per mile, and that entertainment for all sessions of the District Council and all other committees appointed by the Council, except those meetings held during Camp meeting and conventions, be assumed by the District.

The afternoon session was adjourned by prayer.

Evening Setting

The ordination service began with Reverend Frank Evans leading the congregation in singing, "A Charge To Keep I Have".

Reverend O. A. Wells offered prayer.

Our voices blended in the stirring words of "Rock of Ages".

The candidate for ordination, A. P. Huffine, was presented by the District Superintendent, Reverend E. E. Meeks, to the conference and General Superintendent Snyder.

Scriptural charges were offered the candidate by Rever-

end D. L. Goss reading I Tim. 3:1-7, Reverend W. L. Boone reading II Tim. 4:1-8 and Reverend E. W. Hall reading Titus 3:1-11.

From the names of Frank Evans and W. L. Boone, Frank Evans was elected to serve on the Educational Board for the coming year.

A motion carried to elect the Examining Board members by plurality vote. Reverends O. A. Wells and Marion King were elected to fill the two positions on the Examining Board. O. A. Wells, 3 years and Marion King, 2 years.

The District Council was retired momentarily to nominate two or more names for the office of District Missionary Society President. From the names of Mrs. Elizabeth Evans and Mrs. Martha Meeks, Sister Meeks was elected.

To show The Meeks' the appreciation and esteem of the conference, a love offering was taken for them.

Motions carried to authorize the Council to care for any unfinished business and to approve the minutes of the last setting.

The conference was adjourned by prayer.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the 48th annual conference of the Idaho-Washington District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church; to Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, Chairman; to our good Pastors; and to our fine laymen, Greetings.

This is our first report to this conference as District Superintendent. This has been a new field of labor to us and there have been many perplexing problems; but we can say the Lord Jesus Christ has stood by us. The Council have given us their concentrated cooperation throughout the year; the Pastors have stood by us; and the Laymen and the churches have given every time they have been asked. For this, we praise God!

Once more this conference is convening to study and hear of the activities of yesterday, to profit by its mistakes, and to praise God for its successes; to consider the future

with all its opportunities and responsibilities, and to face the realities of today. We feel we have just cause to rejoice, but not as much as we should have. We trust we will not only say we are going into this year to make it the best of our church labors, but we will have such a grounded faith in God that it cannot be otherwise. St. John 15:7, "If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you." What a challenge this is to our hearts!

Through the demands and burdens of the District and the Evangelistic field, Sister Meeks has carried her share of the load. Often the financial strain has been heavy; but when discouragement came, she was there to give words of encouragement and believing faith. We praise God for her life and for her affections. When we would have thrown up our hands in despair, she would be praying and shouting, "Fight on! God will give victory!"

We are made to believe God is mindful of His people. We have not had an accident or serious illness in the ministry, and but few in the laity this year. We humbly thank God, and to Him be all the praise.

It has been a pleasure to labor with such a fine group of pastors. These men are dedicated to God in every way to labor on an organized district that is as small as this one. They have had no financial backing from any part of the General Church. Their success has depended to a large extent upon their own relationship with God, and their ability to carry out the work of the local church. If they have not had the finance to supply their needs, they have prayed it in or worked with their hands. These men have wholeheartedly supported the district program and have given when they needed the money in the local church. At times, to give meant they must find more to carry on their own program. We praise God for men such as these.

We express our appreciation to everyone that came out for the clean-up days. We were amazed at the good number who came; we believe it was the best in many, many years.

We have never seen a larger number since we have been on the district.

TEMPORAL GAINS:

The Coeur d'Alene church has painted the exterior of the parsonage, redecorated the kitchen, and laid a new tile floor. Their Sunday School bus has had quite a bit of repair done on it.

The Kennewick Church has painted the front of the church as well as the halls and rest rooms. The parsonage has had a considerable amount of redecorating; and they were working on it at the close of the conference year.

The Walla Walla church has remodeled, repainted, and refloored most of the basement of their church. We are giving Brother Evans a word of praise for the way he keeps these buildings in good repair. The Southwick church has been painted on the exterior. We believe this is the first time this building has had anything done on it in quite a few years. The Wenatchee Church has erected a new church sign, painted the outside of the entrance, and laid a rug in the church vestibule, (no cost to the church). They have repaired and painted the front porch of the parsonage and redecorated the inside of the parsonage. They have planted many rows of flowers around the church and parsonage. The Spirit Lake church has made an outside entrance to their basement and are in the process of installing new rest rooms. They have operated a Kindergarten successfully this year. They have had about twelve or fifteen students which has helped them to make some good contacts in the community. God is helping these folks. The Post Falls church is ready to start on their addition for their Sunday School rooms and rest rooms. This has been much needed there for years; we are glad to see these folks moving forward. They have about two thousand dollars in the building fund. There have been many, many church improvements this year, but some of the pastors have failed to report them to me for this.

REVERSES:

We have had some reverses in Spokane even though some

may call them that, while others might say they have just returned to the neighborhood where God wants them. We must take realities as they are and we lost quite a bit of money in this venture. We must say it was not Brother Link's fault, nor do we blame anyone else. This year brought us back to the buildings we sold a few years ago. There was considerable repair and repainting on them before they were usable. The people there and Brother Link have given and sacrificed in every way; we have never witnessed anything like it, these people surely love God. The Wenatchee work has suffered reverses throughout the year. We feel Brother Boone has labored there conscientiously, faithfully, and honorably. We are not defeated here but we are taking on new faith and holding the fort until we can make inroads on the devil's territory. We have the faith to believe God is going to give us a good church here.

SPIRITUAL:

We feel the churches have made real progress this year spiritually. They seem to be settled down and are getting ready to do something for the Lord. There are some who have come to life because of the Whipple Meetings. We feel this is the only hope for our church,—lay visitation. We are glad to see some awakening to this reality. We feel that one of the greatest marks of spirituality is for the people to become interested in their neighbors, and want to tell them about Christ. Pastor, we must take the lead in this; we cannot expect our people to witness if we don't. Acts 1:8, "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you; and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." If we want our district to grow, let us act like it.

OUR GOALS:

We feel we need to trust the Lord God of Elijah and set some marks that we must reach. We must make a ten percent gain in church membership and a fifteen percent increase in our Sunday School attendance with a ten percent increase in the enrollment. We must start at least one

branch Sunday School this year. I know we feel we cannot do this with struggling churches but a branch Sunday School started in the right place may soon grow into an organized church and surpass the church that started it. We want to start one new church this year. These goals are not beyond our reach, and certainly we must do something or soon we will cease to exist.

MY PERSONAL REPORT IS AS FOLLOWS:

We thank God for our General Men and Our General Church. We are glad to have a place to labor for this great Church and to work for our Lord. We feel the Pilgrim Holiness Church owes us nothing, but we owe everything to this Church and to God.

I have visited the churches sixty-five times, conducted forty board meetings, preached one hundred fifty-two times, attended four zone meetings, traveled approximately twenty-four thousand miles, have had seven council meetings, and preached five revivals. We have attended the Church Leaders Conference, attended the school board meeting at C.P.C. attended the Ministerial Meeting, attended the Youth Convention. I covered the district by zones with Brother Whipple, visited a number of the churches with Brother Flexon in all the zones on the district.

I have received my salary in full, three hundred thirty-four dollars and forty-six cents in love offerings, one hundred seventy-eight dollars in food donations, and four hundred ninety-five dollars in revivals.

We have been paid in full for all the mileage we have turned in.

Brother Rosentrater and I remodeled the Benton City Parsonage, which consisted of a new roof, a number of squares of siding, repair of the wiring, a number of trim boards on the outside, and redecorating the inside. Brother Gene Hall and I repaired the front porch on the district parsonage which took considerable work. We wish to express our appreciation to him at this time for his labors.

We have inclosed the back porch and plumbed it for the washer and dryer. We have repaired and redecorated the inside, and refinished the floors. Brother Rosentrater helped me some on this district parsonage and we want to express our appreciation to him for his work here and on the Benton City Parsonage.

I deeply appreciate the valuable assistance rendered through the year by Brother Goss, our able Assistant Superintendent.

We have spent many, many hours on the grounds.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

I. Conference

1. Resolved that the District Council serve as district trustees.

2. Resolved that all recall meetings be held 60 days prior to the district conference, and that the District Superintendent be notified of the results of said meeting within ten days.

3. Resolved that the conference year close May 31st and that each pastor see that correct reports from his church be sent not later than June 15th.

4. Resolved that all committees be appointed by the District Council and hold office through the year, except the reception committee which the superintendent shall appoint at the beginning of each conference.

5. Resolved that each pastor and the superintendent be given a two-weeks vacation with pay.

6. Resolved that we include a directory of pastoral appointments and local major officers in our minutes.

7. Resolved that 175 copies of the district conference minutes be printed.

8. Resolved that a copy of the records of the Educational and Examining Boards shall be given to the District Secretary each year.

9. Resolved that the Pilgrim Echoes be the established

name for the district publication.

10. Resolved that the District Council appoint an editor and arrange a means of finance for the Echoes.

11. Resolved that a ministers' institute be held in the spring and that the public be invited to the evening services only. The time, place and speaker will be arranged for by the District Superintendent.

12. Resolved that the reports of all officers to be published in the minutes be limited to 400 words except the report of the District Superintendent and that the officers reporting be the Treasurer, Sunday School Promotional Secretary and the Missionary Society President.

13. Resolved that this conference recommend to the local churches that one other person, appointed by the pastor, assist the local treasurer in counting the offerings and that a written record be given the pastor after each service. (1960)

14. Resolved that we proceed immediately to build a new district parsonage with volunteer labor. Be it further resolved that the present district parsonage be retained indefinitely as a rental property after the new parsonage is completed. (1961)

15. Resolved that the District Council investigate a hospital insurance plan for the pastor's families of the district. (1962)

16. Resolved that the laity be encouraged to report the number of calls made per month to the pastor so that the pastor may report them to the editor of the Echoes. (1962)

17. Resolved that we favor the General Executive Councils' proposal for the mergers of smaller districts and that this district conference authorize their District Council to effect the immediate merger of our district with the Pacific-Northwest District if acceptable terms can be attained. (1962)

II. Camp

18. Resolved that each church pay their pastor his salary during camp and conference.

19. Resolved that all reports to the conference be typed: be it further resolved that secretarial help be furnished the District Secretary so that the conference minutes be completed within a month from the ending of conference.

20. Resolved that the district conference convene the Monday following the close of camp meeting.

21. Resolved that the District Council appoint a Camp Meeting Board of three to be responsible for the operation of the camp meeting. It shall be the responsibility of this board to plan and execute the various functions of the camp such as: maintenance and repair; cooking and kitchen help; the operation of the book store and the lunch stand; reservation and assignment of rooms; advertising and all relevant functions pertinent to camp meeting operation. The members of this board shall be appointed respectively for one, two and three year terms.

22. Resolved that the name of our camp grounds be known as the Highland Park Camp Ground. (1960)

23. Resolved that the Assistant District Superintendent be made the permanent chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1960)

24. Resolved that we adopt a one-week camp meeting schedule, and be it further resolved that it be held so as to conclude on the first Sunday of July. (1960)

25. Resolved that each church give an offering on the camp beef, or, in lieu of an offering, give canned goods or vegetables; and that the District Council appoint one person to contact the churches for this purpose prior to camp. (1962)

III. Sunday School

26. Resolved that the people that attend camp meeting be counted in attendance at their local Sunday School.

27. Resolved that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be appointed for the following conference year prior to the annual conference, that the Sunday School Committee be given at least one service during the camp meeting, and that the Promotional Secretary for the coming year

be given an opportunity to present his plans for the coming year at this service. (1962)

IV. Youth

28. Resolved that we have a district young people's convention during the year and that it be held at a convenient time for the young people who are in school.

29. Resolved that the District Youth President be a member of the Camp Meeting Board by virtue of his office.

V. Missionary

30. Resolved that we elect a District Missionary Society President to oversee the work of the local missionary societies and be it further resolved that each missionary society send a quarterly report to the President and an annual report to the conference and that said report be entered in the minutes.

VI. Special (annual)

31. Resolved that we express our appreciation to the following for their ministry among us:

Rev. J. H. Philpot, camp evangelist.

Rev. Don Sheets, song evangelist.

Mrs. Alice Fry, camp pianist.

Rev. W. L. Boone, Central Pilgrim College Representative and youth leader.

Rev. and Mrs. A. P. Huffine, children's workers.

Mrs. Elizabeth Davis, head cook; Marjorie Meeks and Holly Hassinger, assistant cooks.

Mrs. E. W. Hall, camp registrar and treasurer.

Rev. James Rosentrater, purchasing agent.

Rev. W. F. Drown, who brought the messages Tuesday and Friday afternoons.

Rev. R. C. Hawkins, Secretary of General Church Extension.

Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, General Superintendent of Western Area, Chairman of the district conference, Speaker for District Church Extension service on Sunday afternoon. (1962)

32. Resolved that we express our appreciation to Sister E. E. Meeks for her hospitality and work behind the scenes during camp and conference. (1962)

WAYS AND MEANS

1. Resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 12% of the receipts, excepting building and improvement funds and evangelists offerings, to be applied on the district budget as follows: 54% for district administration expense, 6% for International Conference delegate expense and 40% for district Church Extension. Be it further resolved that the ministerial tithe from each pastor be channeled to the district administration fund through the local church treasurer.

2. Resolved that all treasurers send local monies for the District Treasurer by the tenth of each month.

3. Resolved that each local treasurer give the pastor a monthly statement of the district obligation and when in arrears the pastor and the treasurer shall attempt to raise the same.

4. Resolved that a special offering be taken the last Sunday of camp for district church extension and/or camp improvement.

5. Resolved that the annual remuneration of the Secretary and statistician be \$15.00 each; the Treasurer, \$120.00 and the editor of the Pilgrim Echoes, \$25.00. Be it further resolved that all authorized travel for district interests be reimbursed at the rate of 5¢ per mile, and that entertainment for all sessions of the District Council and all other committees appointed by the Council, except those meetings held during camp meeting and conventions, be assumed by the district.

6. Resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$55.00 per week, to be supplemented by generous donations and offerings from the churches at the Superintendent's two yearly calls. The District is to assume all district phone expense, utilities, postage and office supplies.

7. Resolved that the District Treasurer be bonded, such amount to be set by the Council, and the cost be paid out of the district expense fund.

8. Resolved that the Treasurer deposit the International Conference delegate fund into a savings account until needed.

9. Resolved that we set a goal of 40¢ per month per voting member for our Bible College to be distributed two-thirds directly to Central Pilgrim College and one-third to be used to be administered at the discretion of the District Council. (1960)

10. Resolved that the District Superintendent or his duly authorized representative be permitted to visit each church for the purpose of raising funds for the district church extension needs. (1960)

11. Resolved that two meals and one lunch be served each day at Camp meeting, and that the following rate schedule be adopted:

1 person over 12 years of age	\$10.00
2 persons (in a family) over 12 years of age	20.00
3 persons (in a family) over 12 years of age	25.00
4 persons (in a family) over 12 years of age	30.00
5 persons (in a family) over 12 years of age	35.00

Per person between 6 and 12 years	5.00

Part-time rates will be 35¢ per day registration for those who lodge on the camp grounds, and 50¢ per meal. (1962)

12. Resolved that this conference recommend that each local church pay the assessments of the Ministerial Benefit Association for their pastor and his wife. (1960)

13. Resolved that each Sunday School give 5% of their total regular offerings into the district treasury for the purpose alone of promoting the district Sunday School interests. (1961)

14. Resolved that Christian Education Sunday each May be utilized by the pastor to bring to the attention of his people the need and importance of supporting our zone Bible College. And let an offering be taken this Sunday to be applied toward the district goal for our college support. (1961)
