# Gospel Message Deacon Jack Baker

The readings for the fifth Sunday of Easter emphasize the need for us Christians to abide in Christ as a condition for producing fruits of kindness, mercy, charity, and holiness. Something much needed today given what we as a people of God are experiencing nowadays with so much turmoil going on around us.

The reading from the Acts of the Apostles testifies to the abundance of spiritual fruits yielded by the apostles because of their close bond with the risen Lord. It provides us the reason why we must abide in God, for He is the source of all goodness, and He will provide us the strength, wisdom, and fortitude to cope with the challenges with face in our lives.

As the world around us drifts away from their dependence on God, all sorts of problems are arising in our society. Therefore, we must hold on to our faith and continue the evangelization mission that our Lord Jesus Christ called us to do. We must reach out to those that have drifted away from God, for in the readings we heard how the Lord pruned the former Pharisee, Saul of Tarsus, a fanatic who had persecuted the Church, to produce a fruit-bearing branch called Paul, the zealous Apostle to the Gentiles, entirely dedicated to the proclamation of the Gospel. And my dear brethren, in Paul we find the greatest conversion story in the New Testament, which proves to us that nothing is impossible for God.

John, in his first letter to the Church, tells us that if we remain united to Christ by putting our Faith in him and drawing our spiritual strength from him, will we be able to obey God's commandments, especially the commandment of love, loving one another as Jesus commanded us. In the Gospel, Jesus uses his favorite image of the vine and branches to help his disciples understand the closeness of their relationship with him and the necessity of their maintaining it. Using this image, Jesus is explaining to us what our relationship with him should be like. For us this means that our lives are mutually dependent on him, as close as a vine and its branches.


May is the month of Mary

# Catechesis

Grace and Justification

### What is justification?

Justification is the merciful, free act of God which takes away our sins and makes us just and holy. This is not merely an external covering of our sins but an actual interior change. This change makes us just and holy in our entire being.

In his Passion, Christ merited the grace of the Holy Spirit on our behalf. Thorough the Holy Spirit we join ourselves to His Passion by dying to sin and to His Resurrection by being born to new life through baptism. We are members of the Body of Christ, the Church, grafted onto the vine. Justification begins by our cooperation with the grace of the Holy Spirit which is manifested as the gift of faith in Christ.

### What is the grace that justifies?

Grace is God's life in us, making us participants in the Trinitarian life and enables us to according to the charity of the Trinity. This grace is called habitual, sanctifying or deifying because it makes us holy and elevates our nature to the divine.

This grace is supernatural because it builds upon our nature, it is an entirely free gift bestowed on us and surpasses the abilities of the intellect and the power of men.

### What other kinds of graces are there?

Besides sanctifying grace, there are actual graces, sacramental graces, and charisms.

Actual grace is that which enables us to do good works and to avoid evil in particular situations. It is a temporary gift of divine light.

Sacramental graces are the gifts that are particular to each sacrament. These enable each Sacrament to attain the end for which Jesus instituted each Sacrament. Every Sacrament is an outward sign of a grace that God grants to those who receive them worthily.

*Charisms* are gifts that are intended for the common good of the Church. These accompany the exercise of ecclesial ministries and the responsibilities of life.

### How are grace and free will related?

Free will enables us to choose the good. Grace precedes, prepares and elicits our response toward that good. It enables us to cooperate with God's will and leads freedom toward its ultimate perfection. Put another way, all the good that we do comes from grace that is given to us by God. True human freedom is found in our ability to cooperate with God's grace, ordered toward the good.

#### What is merit?

Merit is the recompense for a good deed. e are not capable of meriting apart from God, from who we receive every good thing. However, by fully cooperating with God's love we can merit by responding to the grace he freely gives us.

#### How can we merit?

Under guidance of the Holy Spirit we can merit the graces needed for our sanctification and the attainment of eternal life. Temporal goods can be merited if they are in accord with God's plan. However, no one is able to merit the initial grace which is the origin of conversion and justification.

### Are all Christians called to be holy?

Yes. This is the fullness of the Christian life and the perfection of charity. It can only be brought about by intimate union with Christ and, in him, with the most Holy Trinity. The way of the cross is our path to holiness, and it is fulfilled in the final resurrection of the dead.
