

### Minimum age for licenses & mandatory inspections discussed for golf carts Relocating major water line will delay East Canal Rd. widening project 'til fall of 2022 By John Mullen said. "So, that's going to be a big chunk just some of the

In the state of Alabama, a 14-year-old can be licensed to drive a boat and motorcycle but the city of Orange Beach might require golf cart drivers to be 16 and have an automobile driver's license.

At the Oct. 19 city council regular session, there was a first reading of a new golf cart ordinance Orange Beach officials hope to have fully implemented by this spring. But Councilman Jeff Boyd has some concerns about the age 16 requirement.

"If someone's child has a driver's license with motorcycle and boating on it at the age of 14 which is legal, I think it's very difficult to tell that parent they can't drive a golf cart but they can drive a 125-cc motorcycle," Boyd said. "And I think that should be changed to 14 with a motorcycle endorsement on your license. I'm just putting myself in a position in my neighborhood with the dad coming to me and going this is nonsense and that's not the word he's going to use and having to argue that case."

Also, Boyd said, a 12-year-old can drive a boat with an

adult aboard and he'd like to see something similar in the Orange Beach ordinance.

"We start hitting tough ground when we start changing the rules on a golf cart versus the boat," Boyd said. "To me with dad on the golf cart and he's 12 I don't have an issue with it but I think we're pushing it. I think if we

get the 14 with an endorsement, I'm at least satisfied with it."

Police Chief Steve Brown had concerns similar to Boyd's. "I would agree with you because I have actually encountered that myself at Marina Road and 161 with someone that was licensed to operate a motorcycle and I started scratching my head," Brown said. "If they can operate the motorcycle, why can't they operate an electric golf cart?"

Other requirements, per state law, will be the golf carts must have lights, brake lights, blinkers and a windshield. Retrofitting to add those features will cost about \$600-\$800.

"We are enforcing the minimum required by state law," Mayor Tony Kennon said. "We're not asking for extras or anything more. I just hope people understand."

The process will start with inspections of golf carts at neighborhood gathering spots and each will require a sticker as well as the added lights and accessories. Fee structures are still being worked out with the cost of the decals as well as an estimated 184 signs the city has to put in neighborhoods where golf carts are legal, also per state law. Other signs will be needed at entrances to the Backcountry Trail and other places where golf carts aren't allowed.

One number bandied about is \$25 a year but Kennon said he wanted the city to at least charge enough to pay the cost of having police personnel inspect the carts, the decals and the signs.

"I don't know what the number is but I do think we need to recoup our costs," Kennon said. "We need to estimate and calculate costs and then come up with a fair number and we'll say guys this is our cost."

The biggest expense, City Administrator Ken Grimes said will be paying for the signs.

"We think a sign is going to be between \$12 and \$15 and every one of these streets has to have a new sign that we will attach hopefully to the speed limit signs," Grimes said. "So, that's going to be a big chunk just some of that maintenance. So those are the costs that we're talking about that we've thought of so far but I'm sure they'll be other things that we'll find beyond the administration of it. It really isn't about the money but now we've got these costs that we have do because state law wants you to have that sign at every street."

#### East Canal Rd. widening delayed

In other Council news, relocation of a major waterline and complicated paperwork surrounding Restore Act funding have delayed the widening of Canal Road east of Hwy. 161 until the fall of 2022 at the earliest. City officials had hoped to begin the project before the end of 2021.

While there was no action item on the project it came up for discussion in the joint regular/work session of the city council on Oct. 19. The waterline runs the length of the project and unless relocated it would be under the newly widened roadway.

Mayor Tony Kennon was more pointed on the efforts to get the waterline moved so the project can begin. Plans are to

make Canal Road from State Route 161 on the west to Wilson Boulevard on the east three lanes with a center turn lane to relieve traffic back ups from cars turning in the GTs By the Bay, the library/senior center and Coastal Arts Center of Orange Beach as well as into neighborhoods along the roadway.

Between the library and the arts center a roundabout is planned to help get visitors back to Doc's without clogging up traffic in that busy 161/Canal Road intersection.

<sup>a</sup>Tm about fed up," Kennon said. "I really am at the point where if you've got to drag your own water authority along to get things done, enough's enough. It shouldn't be (complicated). It's real simple. We need Canal Road widened, we need the Orange Beach Water Authority to get in gear and get it done. How simple is that? We're ready to get it done. We're tired of dragging it out and it should have already been done."

Nicole Woerner was lauded for her work navigating the Restore Act process to hopefully get the \$1.2 million grant into city coffers.

The city will pay for a multi-modal sidewalk included in the project from Doc's to Wilson and it is included in the scope of work for the widening to save money by having one project design and one contractor handle it all.

Also during the meeting, City Administrator Ken Grimes also gave a report on the Oct. 9 Freedom Fest organized after the National Shrimp Festival was canceled on Sept. 9. Grimes said a steady stream of visitors from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. made for a good crowd for this inaugural event. The city plans on making Freedom Fest an annual event on the

same weekend as the Shrimp Festival. "The Wharf sent us the traffic counters from the Freedom Fest," Grimes said. "Between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. their traffic counters around the property using that plus their formula they use for all their concerts and events they estimate somewhere in the vicinity of 15,200 people were on property during Freedom Fest. It was a huge suc-

cess, obviously we saw that." Kennon praised city staffer Jeanne Fitzgibbons for pulling together the festival in a month's time.

"Thank you again Jeanne (Fitzgibbons) and all the city employees that made it happen," Kennon said. "There's a lot of people who stepped up as volunteers, vendors, it was a true team effort so thank y'all. Now we get to do Seafood Fest in February."

#### During the regular session, the council:

• Approved a special events retail liquor license application by Event Concessions for the Kip Moore Concert on Nov. 13 at The Wharf's Port venue.

• Awarded a bid to Finishing Solutions of \$464,000 to complete roof repairs after damage from the April 10 hail storm. Johns and Kirksey submitted the only other bid and it was for \$615,000.

• Approved a resolution awarding the bid for Backcountry Trail Post-Hurricane Sally Repairs to Asphalt Services, Inc., in an amount not to exceed \$170,977.70.

• OK'd a resolution establishing rates for health and dental insurance for employees with slight increases in employee contributions. For example, starting in January of 2022, an employee with family coverage would pay an increase of \$8.64 per month or \$103.68 extra per year. City documents show the family plan will cost employees \$224.64 per month with the city contributing \$1,210.70 for a total of \$1,435.34

• OK'd a resolution authorizing the purchase of stop loss insurance for the for FY2022. In 2020, the city had a stop loss threshold of \$100,000 meaning the city would be reimbursed for any amount above \$100,000 but the annual premium was \$500,000. Raising the threshold to \$200,000 dropped the premium to \$167,976 in 2021 and the threshold for 2022 will again by \$200,000 with a premium of \$173,240.

• OK'd a resolution authorizing an agreement for Southern Rapid Care to provide physicals for city firefighters.

• OK'd a resolution authorizing to a parcel of land at 25930 Bonita Ave. from Donald R. Lyons, Jr., and Starla Paul for \$220,000. It abuts four other lots the city owns at the intersection of State Route 161 and Bonita Avenue. The city announced at the Oct. 5 council meetings it has an agreement with South Baldwin Regional Medical Center to build an 11,000 medical building with an imaging center and doctors' offices.

• OK'd a resolution authorizing an agreement with CSpire to connect fiber to the Wildlife Center on the northwest corner of the recreation complex on Canal Road. A new Wildlife Center and Trail Barn is planned for Powerline Road but it has been delayed due to lack of materials and a backlog of work by potential contractors.

OK'd a resolution awarding Officer Brock Palmer his duty weapon and badge as part of his retirement benefits.
Approved the sale of the Orange Beach Medical Arts Building on the northwest corner of the intersection of State Route 161 and Bonita Avenue. It is being purchased by Southern Rapid Care the city's medical provider. The council suspended the rules to consider this sale and passed it on a 6-0 vote.

#### During the work session, the council discussed:

• A resolution authorizing a contract with J. F. Morris Performance for theater performance direction and choreography for "Thoroughly Modern Millie" for \$15,250, plus pre-approved expense. The production is expected to be part of the spring season at the Performing Arts Center. Performances are scheduled for Feb. 4-6 and Feb. 11-13.

• A resolution authorizing electrical changes at the Performing Arts Center in an amount not to exceed \$27,318 including a power upgrade on the stage to run digital boards.

• A resolution authorizing a contract with the Coastal Ballet Company for The Nutcracker at the Performing Arts Center. The play will be on Dec. 2, 2022, at 6 p.m., Dec. 3, 2022, at 2 p.m., Dec. 1, 2023 at 6 p.m. and Dec. 2, 2023 at 2 p.m.

• A resolution awarding the proposal for Alabama Point seawall repair design.

• A resolution authorizing the execution of a Service Agreement with ThreatAdvice for IT services related to cyber security.

# **Construction begins for \$9.7 million Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism and Sustainability** Mayor says this could be start of city's emergence as center for Gulf research, education

It may seem like a stretch to compare the Gulf Coast Eco Center coming soon to Gulf Shores with the space program that transformed small town Huntsville into the largest city in Alabama.

But Jean-Michel Cousteau is onboard, and the son of the famed oceanographer and underwater filmmaker, Jacque Cousteau, was in Gulf Shores to help Mayor Robert Craft and other city officinals break ground for the Gulf Coast Center for Ecotourism and Sustainability (GCCES) to be located on a 12 acre building site located between the city's school complex and Gulf State Park. The build site is contiguous with 100 acres of mostly wetlands owned by the city. Mayor Craft said that just like the Rocket City is synonymous with NASA and its space program, Gulf Shores could be the center of research and education for all thing concerning the Gulf of Mexico.

"We've got a NASA Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville. I want us to have a comparable position - an ocean center for lack of a better term," Craft said. "I know we've got the Gulf, not an ocean, but space and ocean. I think we can do that in Alabama, and this is how we start."

Cousteau's innovative education program, Ambassadors of the Environment, will be at the forefront of the Center For EcoTourism.

"I'm emotionally involved because everything I've attempted to do, my father attempted to do, my team has attempted to do is happening, happening, happening," Costeau said. "The future decision makers - young people - are making better decisions already."

Ambassadors to the Environment connects participants with their natural and cultural environment through overnight camps focused on active, hands-on outdoor experiences with a curriculum developed for students in grades 4-12.

Construction of the Eco Center will begin in early 2022 and completion is scheduled by March of 2023. The \$9.7 million Restore Act-funded project will be a center for programs promoting sustainable tourism, environmental awareness, and stewardship of natural resources. The theory is that what's good for the Gulf of Mexico is good for a tourist economy that is centered around the Gulf.

The city's total Restore Act funding gen-

erated from a settlement with BP following the Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill is \$41.8 million, including \$4.4 million to extend the Fort Morgan Trail, \$5.9 million for the Little Lagoon Restoration project and \$21.7 million for traffic capacity improvements, including Canal Road.

The Eco Center will include a great hall, a dining area, offices, classrooms, outdoor learning spaces, gardens, greenhouses, laboratories, instructor housing and team-building areas. The build-out will utilize the latest technology in sustainable building design.

The Eco Center staff and Cousteau will produce programs in cooperation with the nearby Gulf State Park Learning Campus and utilize GSP's backcountry trails, lakes, beaches and buildings as part of its curriculum.

Other partners include Valor Hospitality, Gulf Shores & Orange Beach Tourism, Gulf Shores City Schools, with cooperation from numerous environmental and ecotourism entities.

Research universities, environmental education groups and businesses are potential partners. Regional school districts will also have access to the programs.

#### Cousteau's environmental program has campuses all around the world

Filmmaker, explorer, and ocean advocate Jean-Michel Cousteau (**pictured**), like his famous father, has devoted his life to protecting the



world's oceans. He founded the Ocean Futures Society and Ambassadors of the Environment to carry on his father's pioneering work and continue the family legacy of conservation and education.

In addition to Gulf Shores, his Ambassadors of the Environment has programs in Hawaii, California, the Caribbean, Mexico, and the Maldives. The program will offer many of its programs at the Learning Campus at Gulf State Park.

Like his father, Cousteau has spent much of his life investigating the world's oceans aboard Calypso and Alcyone while dedicating himself and his vast experience to communicate to people of all nations and generations his love and concern for our water planet.

# **Fines from BP oil spill will be used to teach future generations to protect environment** Cousteau associate Travis Langen already teaching students that nature is self sustaining

It's fitting that fines generated from the 2010 BP oil spill will be earmarked for teaching future generations to protect the environment through the Gulf Coast Eco Center.

"We want to get people to understand the region, understand the environment and understand how tourism can actually positively impact a place by basically leaving it better than they found it," said Travis Langen with the Center for Ecotourism.

"The model is that we show kids how nature works, and then you realize that nature works really well at conserving resources at being selfsustaining of its system, so we have a lot of lessons we as humans can learn from nature," said Langen.

The curriculum, designed in collaboration with the Gulf Shores State Park Nature Center, will focus on beach ecology, environmental conservation, and sustainability in nature and communities. Students will participate in field studies and ecological restoration activities in the State Park and Gulf Shores area, as well as team-building exercises, kayaking, hiking, organic gardening

#### and much more.

Other programs will include day programs for local school groups and Gulf Coast tourists and visitors, weekend retreats, arts & ecology summer camps, family camps, and special events and workshops. The Center will also engage universities and industry groups throughout the region to establish partnerships and develop programs that will support the economy and enhance the quality of life along the Gulf Coast.

"At the time of the oil spill, I didn't know what our future would be and knowing that the Exxon Valdez is like 30 years and it's still a dead zone in the ocean," Craft said at the Oct. 25 council meeting. "I feared greatly that the things that we had and that we knew were changing and I did not know. You look and see that oil wash up on that beach and I thought our quality of life and our lifestyle were threatened."

City leaders, including Craft, started exploring ways to preserve the coastal environment and



teach younger generations about the importance of sustaining it for the economy of the Alabama Gulf Coast.

"When the oil was in the water and the oil was on the beach nobody came," Craft said. "Everything we have is dependent on our environment."

Craft was aware of Jean-Michel Cousteau's Oceans Future Society and his Ambassadors of the Environment program when his daughter worked at the

Cousteau's center on Catalina Island in California and at one in Hawaii.

A leading member of

Cousteau's team and former longtime director of the Catalina Island program, Travis Langen, was hired by the city to implement those programs here. On Oct. 25 Cousteau came to town and spoke to the city council and on Oct. 27 participated in the groundsaving ceremony.

"Let's never forget that we're all connected to every species on land, in the ocean, animals, plants and the diversity of stability," Cousteau told the council. "We cannot afford losing species. We are connected to nature and we need to do everything we can to make something that will never disappear. If you protect the ocean, you protect yourself. Remember when it rains that's the ocean. When you're drinking a glass of water, you're drinking the ocean. When you're skiing, you're skiing on the ocean. There's one single system that we need to project which we all depend on, every plant, every animal."

A delegation from Gulf Shores including Craft and Ty Warren of the Gulf State Park Enhancement Program visited the program on Catalina Island in 2013 and in 2014.

Developing a center on the Gulf Coast was documented in the city's Vision 2025 plan.

"The city wants to build an eco center here and camp facilities similar to what we have on Catalina Island," Langen said.

Ironically, fine money from that 2010 oil spill will pay for the center. The city was able to get \$9.7 million in Restore Act money to fund the program in 2018 and officials say the design is complete and hopes are construction will begin before the end of the year. The target date for opening is winter

of 2022.

In 2019, Langen left the Catalina Island program to begin developing the new facility using assets at the Gulf State Park Learning Campus.

"It's been a really fun project, it's been a crazy few years," Langen said. "We've had a lot of collectively ups and downs these last couple of years but we've made great headway in the development of that program."

Most of his time has been spent

working with Gulf Shores City Schools and running s u m m e r camps for kids to teach them about the environment's vital

g- role.

"It is a pleasure and a privilege and I am very honored to be part of this experience that is taking place here where I had the privilege of seeing a lot of young people and decision makers of tomorrow," Cousteau said. "I can tell you there is hope. We're going to do it. If I didn't have this privilege of being connected with those children I may wonder about the future of our species."

Other summer activities already being run by Langen and his team include bike tours of the state park, working on the elementary school, Little Lagoon programs, studying at the Gulf State Park Pier and kayaking.

"We did a summer camp with Gulf Shores Elementary and we had about 150 students for five weeks. We're doing all sorts of fun programs at the Learning Campus at Gulf State Park," Langen said. "We had a fantastic summer with a total of about 220 kids. It was our most successful summer ambassadors' program to day and we look to expand each year."

# O.B. Performing Arts Center grand opening Nov. 16

And it is spectacular.

# Air traffic control tower opens at Jack Edwards

Gulf Shores will host a Nov. 4 town hall meeting (6 p.m. at the Erie Myer Civic Center) in advance of its Nov. 10 ribbon cutting to announce completion of the air traffic control tower at Jack Edwards National Airport. Construction of the 8-story tower, located on the south side of the airfield, started in September of 2020.

The new tower was made possible through \$6.13 million in grant funding from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and the Cares Act.


"This full-service airport is an outstanding asset creating jobs and diversification opportunities for new and existing businesses," said Gulf Shores Mayor Robert Craft. "It is vital to the development and continued economic growth of the area.'

Mayor Craft said the tower will allow for increased safety at the airport and the addition of commercial flights could lesson traffic pressure on Hwy. 59. With the tower, the airport will be able to accommodate 737class jets carrying 180 passengers.

Several commercial passenger airline companies will now be able to schedule regular flights in and our of Jack Edwards.

"There are a lot of airlines out there that will not fly into an uncontrolled airport so this opens that door up, yes but we've needed it," said Airport Manager, Scott Fuller. "There are a lot of aircraft that won't fly into here because of the congestion."

James Griner will lead a team of five other controllers as the air traffic manager at Jack Edwards. The tower will be operational daily from 7 a.m. 'til 9 p.m. Griner comes to Gulf Shores from Key West where he worked for Robinson Aviation one of three major ATC contractor firms in the Federal Contract Tower program in the U.S.



#### Scheduler/webmaster Cynthia Adams is ready for marathon

Following a Covid dominated year that saw the FBISF shrink from 11 to five days, the fest is back running at capacity, and so is Cynthia Adams, the woman tasked with matching writers with venues.

"Last year was a cakewalk," Adams said from her Georgia home a couple weeks before heading for the Gulf Coast and an event for which she also serves as webmaster and oversees production of the fest program, which she also composes, designs and edits.

"I actually had energy the day after last year's fest," she added. "Usually after 11 days, I disconnect for two full days and watch Hallmark movies on television. It's normally eleven straight days of sensory overload. It's a marathon."

In addition to keeping the website updated during a fest that is free flowing by design, Adams answers calls from writers with questions that range from paychecks to directions to gigs and a hot meal.

Besides a new group of Nashville writers, the fest will feature some new venues such as Johnny Barbato's Front Porch in Lillian, Fresh Off The Boat in Orange Beach and From The Ground Up Community Garden in Pensacola.

"A couple dozen younger writers from Nashville are coming and they will add complexity. We usually group them together," she said. "These up-and-coming writers all know each other. Some have had hits. They are too young for the Hall of Fame, but they are really good writers."

The responsibility of matching writers with venues can be stressful, but Adams is not complaining. She loves her job and she loves the fest.

"It's the stories behind the songs. They are like golden nuggets to the audience," she said. "What spurred them to write it? Hearing the writers tell those stories allows the songs to come to fruition. Each audience member goes home with a nugget."

Adams said during a good set, the audience becomes one of the song's instruments. And it is that connection between writer and

audience that allows for spontaneous magic moments. "The underlying thread is like Joe (FBISF founder Joe Gilchrist) says, 'music makes the world a better place," and we are in a climate where the world could use a little sunshine," she said. "This festival has survived all these years despite hurricanes, an economic crisis, a pandemic. So many things. But it is still a beautiful thing where magic happens."

Close to 200 songwriters will perform some of the biggest hits in modern music during the event. And while the Flora-Bama is the base for the fest, venues involved stretch from Summerdale (The Frog Pond) to Pensacola (The Oar House). Writers trade songs and stories on stage and sets can turn quickly into spellbinding jam sessions.

Gilchrist, also co-owner of the Flora-Bama, founded the FBISF in 1984 as a way to celebrate the end of the season with local artists, visiting Nashcats and other musical friends. Gilchrist was sponsoring his songwriting friends for shows at the Flora-Bama in the off-season prior to 1984. But the first official FBISF was held at The Saenger Theatre in Pensacola. Gilchrist said he lost \$10,000 on the venture.

"After that, I figured if I was going to lose that kind of money, I might as well have it at my own place," he said.

The festival thrived at the Flora-Bama with 11 nights of non-stop music - usually ending with Gilchrist buying a round for the diehards at 2 a.m. - until 1994, when event director Brucie Glassell spearheaded an effort to share the musical wealth throughout the community.

The festival is fluid by nature, meaning the schedule is subject to change. Even if you have a printed schedule, it is best to check FrankBrownSongwriters.com daily for updated info. "We are nice people who are respectful," said Gilchrist.

"Quite frequently, these writers are unappreciated even within the music business. We're glad to provide a listening environment where they can play, and it's not background music. It's living music that professes emotions and feelings that all of us have, but very few of us know how to express."

Jason Aldean and Thompson Square are among Nashville stars that played the festival before their careers took off.

A Mississippi native, he has toured and written songs with 3 Doors Down, Cowboy Troy, Mickie James and The Ying Yang Twins. He holds major publishing deals in every country in the world, garnering over 200 revenue earning copyrights, four #1 songs on the Americana and Independent charts, six Top 40 on Billboard and Independent Charts, songs in major movies, documentaries, and NFL Sports.

#### Open mic & jam opportunities at Bama most afternoons

Sign up and sing a song or two during open mic sessions held almost daily during the fest in the Flora-Bama Main Room. Hosted by Don and Karen McNatt, the open mic sessions are from 1-3 p.m. Nov. 4-5 and 1-5 p.m. Nov. 8, 9 10, 11 & 13. The open mics are among the most laid back FBISF experiences and it is not unusual for a Hall of Fame writter to follow an aspiring teenager from Pleasure Island.

T-bone Montgomery and Rhonda Hart will host respective open jams on Nov. 9 & 10 on the Flora-Bama dome stage from 6-11 p.m.

They've had it annually in conjunction with the Frank Brown International Songwriters' Festival for several years except for 2020 when the pandemic prompted shortening the fest to one four day weekend.

"We charged a \$5 cover charge that all went to Autism Pensacola and then we passed the hat a few times," Sunset owner Nina Martin said. "We didn't know what to do. We did this for two years I think."

In 2017, the fundraising committee decided to raise money with a silent auction and by 2019 the FBISF Autism Awareness Night collected more than \$7,500 through the silent auction. After the year's break because of COVID, the group is hoping to top that number with the 2021 event. "Our mission with this Silent Auction is to provide opportunities for local children the opportunity to attend summer camp and other enriching activities," Silent Auction Committee Chair Pat Stout said. "It is our hope with love and compassion to give them a voice of empowerment to be able to contribute back to the community. I sincerely thank each and every one of our generous donors from the bottom of my heart."

If the room packed with items (see slide show at the bottom of the story) in the auction is any indication it looks like that goal will be easily surpassed. Bidding can begin on Nov. 2 at Sunset Cork Room with highquality experiences, handmade crafts, clothes and furniture and many items with a "buy it now" price tag. The concert and culmination of the fundraiser will be on Nov. 10 with songwriters volunteering to provide entertainment and the silent auction ending at 8 p.m.

"How it all got started was there was a lady that knew a lot of folks within the Frank Brown organization and they came and asked me if I'd do it," Martin said. "They put it out to all of the songwriters and those that wanted to donate their time to sing did that, too."

This year eight songwriters will perform including Mary Sarah, a top-five finisher on The Voice, and guitar virtuoso Mac Walter. A special guest will also be among those taking the stage. "Logan Blade is a 21-year-old autistic child that cannot speak but he can sing," Stout said. "It's amazing. You get chill bumps."

Some of the top prizes include a sunset cruise for eight, a Cruisin Tiki trip for six, four rounds of golf at toprated local golf courses that includes a golf cart and cooler of drinks, a Blue Chair Rum guitar signed by Kenny Chesney, two dinner and show packages from OWA.



### 2020 Census could put Perdido & Innerarity back in District 1

Preliminary decisions among elected officials about new Escambia County voting districts, spurred by population growth data from the 2020 Census, would move Perdido Key and the Innerarity peninsula from District 2 back to District 1. Perdido Key and Innerarity were part of District 1 prior to redistricting after the 2000 Census. Strangely enough, District 1 currently includes Perdido Bay Golf Club, but not Perdido Key and Innerarity Point. Both the county and school board have the power to set their own voting districts, but both boards said doing so would create voter confusion.

The Escambia County Supervisor of Elections Office solicited proposals from elected officials in advance of the Nov. 2 second joint meeting to be held at the downtown County office building, beginning at 5:01 PM. The new zoning maps are expected to be announced next month, but there is no mandated deadline involved.

Charles Krupnick, president of the nonprofit 501(c)3 Perdido Key Association (PKA) in a message to PKA members wrote that "The PKA Board is working to keep Perdido Key a viable and improving beach community. The ramifications of shifting Perdido Key from District 2 to District 1 or remaining in District 2 are uncertain and to a large extent dependent upon the individuals who will serve as District 1, District 2 and other District Commissioners." Krupnick added that projects affecting Perdido Key such as approval of the Pensacola Pass Inlet Management Plan to reduce beach erosion and the Perdido Key Master Plan, construction of the Perdido Key Multi-Use Path, crosswalks on Perdido Key Dr., and a new traffic light and crosswalk at the Flora-Bama were implemented with Perdido Key in District 2. District 1 has seen extensive growth in the Beulah area, home of the Navy Federal Credit Union campus and extensive subdivision and apartment construction.

The proposed redistricting draft would leave District 1 with the smallest population of the five districts. Currently, District 1 is the most oversized and District 2 the most undersized of the county's five districts. Under the 2020 census, if all five districts were split evenly, each district would have a population of 64,381, according to Supervisor of Elections David Stafford.

From the 100 applicants vying to become Gulf Shores Police officers over the last three months, only nine made it to the interview process following orientation, physical agility testing and written examinations.

The interviews are conducted by GSPD command level officers, officers with command rank from another agency and members of the community including Ole Miss legal studies professor Linda Keena and David Bass, a former assistant sergeant at arms for the United States Senate. Others on the committee included Sergeant Major (Ret) Bryan Battaglia, Deputy Chief of Police Daniel Netemeyer, Chief of Police Edward Delmore and Chief Scott Stewart.

But it was a third committee member, actor Morgan Freeman, that created a social media buzz. Freeman is a Mississippi native who owns property in Gulf Shores and spends time here. Also an award winning director, producer and narrator, Freeman and Keena recently donated \$1 million to establish the Center of Evidence-Based Policing and Reform at Ole Miss.

The next steps for the remaining candidates include extensive background investigations, psychological examinations, medical evaluations, polygraph examinations, and drug screening.

"It was kind of a last minute thing, but he was an active participant," Deputy Chief Netemeyer said. "He had a hat on, and he was kind of sitting back. When he introduced himself it was almost like an old 'Candid Camera' scene. It was that voice, the same one you hear in the movies."

#### Grants to mitigate Magnolia watershed flooding, improve Graham Creek Preserve Spanish Fort secures GOMESA funds for Tensaw Delta waterfront park

Alabama Governor Kay Ivey announced South Baldwin County 17 projects, including sewer infrastructure, water quality, land acquisitions, research and recreational access improvements, which are included in the original intent and authorized use of a grant fromGulf of Mexico Energy Security Act (GOMESA) funds. The City of Foley recieved \$2.5 million to expand Graham Creek Nature Preserve and the Five Rivers Delta Resource Center on the Mobile Causeway in Spanish Fort received \$253,275 for energy efficiency upgrades and needed structural repairs. Five Rivers attracts around 65,000 visitors and 5,000 students annuallv.

The Governor also approved a \$4 million grant for the Magnolia River Watershed wetlands and Detention mitigation site that will convert an existing borrow pit into a constructed wetland to improve water quality and reduce flooding within the Magnolia River and Weeks Bay watersheds. Magnolia Springs, Foley and Baldwin County staff will work togeteer on the project to alleviate flooding and stormwater issues along the watershed.

The City of Spanish Fort will use a grant from GOMESA to create a city park on Bay Minette Creek at the entrance to the Mobile-Tensaw Delta. The park will include a nature center and will be funded from an \$8.5 grant from Alabama's \$41 million windfall for allowing offshore oil and gas production in the Gulf of Mexico. The park will include a pier, walking trails, picnic areas, canoe and kayak launches and contract services for enviornmentally friendly rentals. The park can be easily accessed from I-10, U.S. Hwy 31 and State Hwy 225.

A timeline has yet to be set for the park's completion, but with the purchase of the city's main access to the Tensaw-Delta, Spanish Fort has secured land that was previously approved by Baldwin County for a multi-family mixed use development.





## WHAT'S HAPPENING

## **PIER & SHORE FISHING OUTLOOK** BY DAVID "THE PIERPOUNDER" THORNTON

Well, our previous fortnight was again plagued by dingy waters, rough seas, and high winds. But let's hope the future pans out a bit better in our favor. The coastal water temperature is set to tumble through the middle to low 70s during this



period, as successive cold fronts bring a distinctive chill to the area on northerly winds.

These will coincide with midday low tides, which lends toward early mornings and late afternoons probably being the best times to catch the fish feeding. The few coastal pelagic species

(jack and mackerels) still hanging around, will likely catch the next front to head south into Florida for the winter as the water cools.

The good news is, that opens up bottom rig fishing for our resident drum species like red and black drum, croaker, and whiting, which are tolerant of cooler water. We can add pompano, bluefish and sheepshead into the mix, along with the obvious 'scourges' like catfish and rays to round out the list of what shore anglers might expect to encounter through the middle of the month.

Bull redfish should still be a high priority prospect for trophy minded surf anglers, especially at the Point of Fort Morgan peninsula. Outgoing tides are usually better for reds to feed there as they await any mullet, menhaden or other small finfish, shrimp and crabs to be swept out of the cooler, shallow bay.

A similar situation sets up at Perdido Pass. And even Little Lagoon Pass at times may hold a good concentration of reds feeding near the mouth. In times past, the Gulf State Park Pier saw good numbers of large redfish landed this month. But in its shortened state, we probably won't see as much of that.

What pier anglers can look forward to is increasing catches of "whiting" (Gulf kingfish), along with more sheepshead. There could be good numbers of large croaker at times, and even some pompano, redfish and bluefish around, and perhaps even a few speckled trout and flounder. Though the season for flounder is closed the whole month of November in Alabama, and remains closed in Florida waters too. Still, there are opportunities for some catch and release of these fine gamefish. Live shrimp is a more popular and productive bait now, as the numbers of pinfish and other pesky 'shrimp stealers' thin out. When the water is clear, use a small hook and just enough weight (splitshot) to encourage the shrimp to swim towards the bottom. That's where most of the predators will be, with the notable exception of sheepshead which may be suspended on the pilings. A similar presentation works well along the seawall at Alabama Point, and from the rock jetties where there may still

be some mangrove snapper as well. Sheepshead become the primary target species now, using live shrimp and/or fiddler crabs, as the numbers of bait stealing pinfish, pigfish, and such generally decrease in the cooling Gulf waters.

Surf fishers can better target pompano now, though they will usually catch more kingfish (whiting) than anything else. Nothing wrong with that really, as these small drum are frisky fighters and fine table fare. This is a good time to use the double drop pompano rigs baited with fresh cut shrimp perhaps tipped with Fishbites or Fishgum. These synthetic baits slowly dissolve on the hook, releasing a scent trail to your hook. They come in a variety of flavors and colors, and every angler seems to have their preferences. Though which works best often varies from day to day (as do fishing conditions) in my observation. But fresh bait is a key to consistent success, even if you have to find or kill it yourself. Beach ghost shrimp become the number one prey item on the menu of these surf dwelling species as the water get cooler. These fragile baits are easily cast off, but can be better kept on the hook with a piece of Magic Thread (or Miracle Thread). It looks like elastic dental floss, and is tied to the hook and wrapped around the bait several times to secure it to the hook. VERY effective at times! Selecting the exact presentation and location to find feeding fish becomes more critical as the water gets cooler.

Remember always that fish are cold blooded, and respond in kind to their environment. Finding a good feeding spot to set your baits will ensure more fish get a look at it, and you get more action. Sandbar points, breaks and drop-offs are prime real estate in the surf zone. But keep in mind these features are transient, and can change drastically with the next storm. Wind and waves are always shaping and reshaping the beach and these sandbars. So checking around for alternative sites to fish (relocate) can often make, or save the day for you. Good luck and good fishing!

## Gulf Shores takes in \$20 million more than it spent

### By John Mullen

An audit of the city of Gulf Shores 2020 budget revealed the city's revenues were \$12 million higher than expenditures during the budget year. The council received a report on the audit from Finance Director Cindy King during the Oct. 18 work session.

With the overage, the city's year-end balance in the General Fund budget increased from \$39.6 million to \$51.7 million and the overage was used for paying down a line of credit used for Hurricane Sally cleanup and other expenses and to pay for 2021 transportation projects without borrowing more money.

The audit also revealed the city's assets exceeded its liabilities by \$110 million and increased \$4.7 million in 2020 over 2019 numbers.

King reported that governmental revenues increased by \$5.37 million to \$59.2 million including \$7.9 million from federal and state grants for FEMA damages from Hurricane Sally and a tax decrease from the state of \$2.9 million mainly for the NRDA/Laguna Cove grant. The annual audit expense of \$76,000 is in the 2021 budget.

During the nine years pervious to 2019 the city's finance department received the Government Finance Officers Association certificate of achievement for excellence in financial reporting. The city did not receive the designation for the 2019 audit but will submit the 2020 audit for GFOA consideration.

During the meeting, the council discussed or appointed: • Approving an intergovernmental service agreement with the Baldwin County Commission for use of voting machines and the services of the county voting machine custodian and employees for municipal elections.

• Transferring the liquor license from Tequila's Mexican Restaurant to Cantina La Lux.

• Transferring the city's event ticket vendor to Audience View. Previously the city used Vendini but that company was bought out by Audience View which will offer the same services to the city. All costs of using the service are included in the price and fees for tickets, city documents said. Reappointing Billy Adcock to the Utilities Board

• Reappointing Robert Malone to the Public Education **Building Authority** 

• Reappointing Councilman Philip Harris to the Library Board

• Reappointing Councilman Gary Sinak, Brooke Taylor, Rodney Powell and Parezetti Bauer to the Beautification Board

• Reappointing Ken McKenzie as administrative law judge


