PASTORAL COLUMN

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Congratulations to our parish community for breaking all records regarding the financial outcome of the Fall Festival! There should be an accounting of the Fall Festival in this week's bulletin. To date, we are looking at a <u>NET</u> profit of \$252,416.33! While the number has taken us to an all-time new record (the previous record was \$218,000 in 2016), it is the result of hard work by the committee members and all



who participated in the work of the Fall Festival in any way. Thank you all for such dedicated service to the work of the festival and your commitment to the parish community. May God bless you all for what you have done and given for the sake of our community.

Over the last two weeks, I have used my Pastor's Column to remind us about the Church's teachings and desires around the process of death and burial. Today, I want to continue with the teachings and practice of Cremation. As I mentioned last week, the practice of cremation has grown and become more commonplace in the USA, and it is often presented as a more affordable alternative to traditional burial. However, what is often overlooked is the Church's teaching regarding the respect and honor due to the human body. The *Order of Christian Funerals*' Appendix on Cremation states: "Although cremation is now permitted by the Church, it does not enjoy the same value as burial of the body. The Church clearly prefers and urges that the body of the deceased be present for the funeral rites, since the presence of the human body better expresses the values which the Church affirms in those rites" (no. 413).

Ideally, if a family chooses cremation, the cremation would take place at some time after the Funeral Mass, so that there can be an opportunity for the Vigil for the Deceased in the presence of the body (during "visitation" or "viewing" at a church or funeral home). This allows for the appropriate reverence for the sacredness of the body at the Funeral Mass: sprinkling with holy water, the placing of the pall, and honoring it with incense. The Rite of Committal then takes place after cremation (see Appendix, nos. 418-421). Funeral homes offer several options in this case. One is the use of "cremation caskets," which is essentially a rental casket with a cardboard liner that is cremated with the body. Another is a complete casket that is cremated (this casket contains minimal amounts of non-combustible material such as metal handles or latches).

The cremated remains of a body should be treated with the same respect given to the human body from which they come. This includes the use of a worthy vessel to contain the ashes, the manner in which they are carried, and the care and attention to appropriate placement and transport, and the final disposition. The cremated remains should be buried in a grave or entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium. The practice of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air, or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains on the home of a relative or friend of the deceased are not the reverent disposition that the Church requires. (OCF no. 417)

So, in general, when should the funeral take place. In the honored tradition of the Church, the Funeral Mass and burial would take place on the "third day" after death. In the Gospel of St. John, chapter 2, Jesus, in referring to His own body said, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." Thus, the time-honored tradition echoed the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus. Also, remember the words spoken to Jesus in John 11 regarding the death of Lazarus: "Lord, by now there will be a stench; he has been dead for four days." Our ancestors in faith believed that the body began to decay (on account of sin) on the fourth day after death. Embalming stops that from happening now. But, again, cremation changes this if the body is sent to cremation BEFORE the Funeral Rites; sometimes it takes a week or more to receive the ashes back from the crematorium. However, the concept that the Funeral Rites are celebrated at the family's convenience is against the very notion of death itself. Death is never convenient; death is a rupture to life and is the greatest inconvenience of all. In planning the funeral and accompanying rites with our team, we often here, "It will be more convenient to have the funeral on Saturday" even though the person died the Saturday or Sunday before. Death is not about our convenience; "for we know not the day nor the hour" says Jesus. When Archbishop Fiorenza was the Ordinary of the Diocese he wrote a letter to the priests regarding funerals. He summed it up with these very simple words: If they are dead, bury them! I think about that when families want to wait weeks and even months before celebrating the Funerals of their loved ones. The process of grieving and mourning should not and can not be put on hold. Holy Mother Church, in her wisdom, places these profound rituals at our disposal to assist us in the spiritual and psychological process of healing.

More on this next week.



THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Christ the light shine

It used to be that sensible people shrugged off most apocalyptic talk as a religious scare tactic. After all, only Chicken Little seriously believes the sky is falling and life as we know it is ending! Yet the present global situation makes apocalypse sound pertinent, even descriptive of the texture of our times. The light of hope can seem dimmer than ever; nonetheless, when fear begins to sound like the wisest course and paralysis the only option, hold fast to the Good News and its promise of light and life!

TODAY'S READINGS: Daniel 12:1-3; Hebrews 10:11-14, 18; Mark 13:24-32 (158). "Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away."

Monday, Nov 19, 2018

Live your faith day by day

You may know "Day by Day," the popular song from the 1970s musical *Godspell*. The refrain, which was adapted from a 13th-century English prayer, includes the lines: "Three things I pray: To see thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, follow thee more nearly." Those words pretty well summarize the yearning in the heart of all Christians. It begins with "seeing clearly" because it's hard to love or follow Jesus unless you do your best to focus on him and his message. The blind man who begged Jesus "Lord, please let me see" spoke for all of us. Spend a moment today reflecting on blind spots in your own faith—areas where doubt, fear, ego, or simple neglect have carried the day thus far.

TODAY'S READINGS: Revelation 1:1-4; 2:1-5; Luke 18:35-43 (497). "Have sight; your faith has saved you."

Mercy is the great equalizer

"Mercy that is truly Christian is also the most perfect incarnation of 'equality' between people," wrote Pope John Paul II in his encyclical *Rich in Mercy*. Our compassion compels us to see the dignity of persons in need. They become lovable simply because they are. Despite any faults, poor choices, weaknesses, or circumstances beyond their control, those in need are worthy of alms (from the Greek words for *compassion* and *mercy*)—for Christ's sake. Strive to see in others what Jesus saw in tax collectors, sinners, and the least among us: the face of God.

MEMORIAL OF THE PRESENTATION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

Moment by moment, grace upon grace

Make a list of what you've been taught about Mary of Nazareth: virgin, mother of Jesus, Mother of God, conceived immaculately, assumed into heaven bodily—it's an astonishing list. Her life was "full of grace," yet the Bible says little of her beyond the first moments of Jesus' life and the last. Church tradition supplies the rest, not to invent history but to illustrate how this Jewish girl's life was made holy by her choices and those of the family that nurtured her. Our families become holy in the same

way, one decision at a time.

TODAY'S READINGS: Revelation 4:1-11; Luke 19:11-28 (499). "To everyone who has, more will be given, but from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away."

THANKSGIVING DAY

Gratitude is good for the body and soul

The gratitude you feel on Thanksgiving is good for your mental health. Practicing daily gratitude, psychologists say, results in higher levels of energy, alertness, enthusiasm, and determination. Better yet, people who feel grateful are more likely to feel loved and repay kindnesses. Benedictine Brother David Stendl-Rast, one of the founders of .org, says that, by freely choosing gratitude, we can "create a better life for ourselves and for others." Now there's something to be thankful for.

MEMORIAL OF CLEMENT I, POPE, MARTYR Take a letter

We tend to think that important letter-writing in the early church was limited to the New Testament, Saint Paul being the star correspondent. But others wrote letters to Christian communities, like the third bishop of Rome, Clement, who wrote to the same church in Corinth that Paul had tried to straighten out earlier. Though we don't know much else about Clement, we know he lived in Rome at the end of first century, only a generation or two after Peter and Paul had died there. Clement mentions their deaths, writing of Peter, "Let us set before our eyes the illustrious apostles. Peter . . . endured not one or two, but numerous labors, and when he had finally suffered martyrdom, departed to the place of glory due to him." Let us recall those early martyrs who gave everything for Christ and his church.

TODAY'S READINGS: Revelation 10:8-11; Luke 19:45-48 (501). "Jesus entered the temple area and proceeded to drive out those who were selling things."

MEMORIAL OF ANDREW DÜNG-LAC, PRIEST, AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS

Culture gets holy; holiness gets culture

In 1988, when Pope John Paul II canonized the Vietnam martyrs whose feast we celebrate today, he used the opportunity to speak of the value of enculturation. The pope praised the martyrs and witnesses for initiating dialogue among various religious groups and proposing ways to put Christian faith in action that were suited to Asian culture, such as teaching that "one should respect and venerate one's ancestors according to the customs of the land in light of the mystery of the Resurrection." Out of respect for these humble and courageous martyrs, do your best to respect the customs and religious practices of all faiths as you freely practice your own cultural expressions of faith



ADVENT The Season of Advent begins December 1st. Advent consists of four weeks that are popularly considered to symbolize the four thousand years of darkness before the coming of Christ. We set up Nativity scenes, light Advent candles, and decorate wreaths in our homes to signify Christ's presence coming in the darkness of sin and suffering. Four candles adorn an Advent wreath, one for each week. A fifth candle is sometimes placed in the center for the beginning of the Christmas season. Advent colors are worn by the priests and deacons and decorate the church. They are represented in the candles that surround the Advent wreath: Violet: royalty, repentance, and fasting (First, Second, and Fourth Week of Advent) Rose: abundant joy (Third Week of Advent, known as Gaudete Sunday, joy in Latin) White: light and purity (Christ Candle, center candle completes the season and begins Christmas)

COLUMNA PASTORAL

Queridos hermanos,

¡Felicidades a nuestra comunidad parroquial por batir todos los récords con respecto al resultado financiero del Festival de Otoño! Creo que habrá un informe del Festival de Otoño en el boletín de esta semana. ¡Hasta la fecha, estamos programando una ganancia **NETA** de \$ 252,416!33! Si bien el número ha alcanzado un récord histórico (el récord anterior fue de \$ 218,000 en 2016), este es el resultado del arduo trabajo de los miembros del comité y de todos los que participaron en el trabajo del Festival de Otoño de cualquier manera. Gracias a todos por el servicio dedicado al trabajo del festival y su compromiso con la comunidad parroquial. Que Dios los bendiga a todos por lo que ha hecho y dado por nuestra comunidad.

Durante las últimas dos semanas, he usado la Columna Pastoral para recordarnos las enseñanzas y los deseos de la Iglesia en relación con el proceso de muerte y entierro. Hoy, quiero continuar con las enseñanzas y la práctica de la cremación. Como mencioné la semana pasada, la práctica de la cremación ha crecido y se ha vuelto más común en los EE. UU.., Y a menudo se presenta como una alternativa más común al entierro tradicional. Sin embargo, lo que a menudo se nos pasa por alto es la enseñanza de la Iglesia sobre el respeto y el honor debido al cuerpo humano. El Apéndice de la Orden de Funerales Cristianos sobre la cremación dice: "Aunque la iglesia ahora permite la cremación, no tiene el mismo valor que el entierro del cuerpo. La Iglesia claramente prefiere y suplica que el cuerpo del difunto esté presente para los ritos funerarios, ya que la presencia del cuerpo humano expresa mejor los valores que la Iglesia afirma en esos ritos "(n. 413).

Idealmente, si una familia elige la cremación, esta se llevará a cabo en algún momento después de la misa fúnebre, de modo que pueda haber una oportunidad para la Vigilia del difunto en presencia del cuerpo (durante la "visita" o "velorio" en una iglesia o funeraria). Esto permite la reverencia apropiada por lo sagrado del cuerpo en la misa fúnebre: rociar con agua bendita, colocar el manto fúnebre y honrarlo con incienso. El Rito de Compromiso se lleva a cabo después de la cremación (ver Apéndice, núms. 418-421). Las funerarias ofrecen varias opciones en este caso. Una es el uso de "ataúdes de cremación", que es esencialmente un ataúd de alquiler con un forro de cartón que se incinera con el cuerpo. Otro es un ataúd completo que se incinera (este ataúd contiene cantidades mínimas de material incombustible, como mangos de metal o cierres).

Los restos incinerados de un cuerpo deben tratarse con el mismo respeto que el cuerpo humano del que proceden. Esto incluye el uso de un recipiente digno para contener las cenizas, la manera en que se transportan, y el cuidado y la atención a la colocación y el transporte apropiados, y la disposición final. Los restos cremados deben ser enterrados en una tumba o enterrados en un mausoleo o columbario. La práctica de dispersar restos incinerados en el mar, desde el aire o en el suelo, o mantener los restos incinerados en la casa de un pariente o amigo de un difunto no es la disposición reverente que exige la Iglesia. (OCF no. 417)

Entonces, en general, cuándo debería tener lugar el funeral. En la tradición de honor de la Iglesia, la misa fúnebre y el entierro se llevarán a cabo en el "tercer día" después de la muerte. En el Evangelio de San Juan, capítulo 2, Jesús, al referirse a su propio cuerpo, dijo: "Destruye este templo y en tres días lo levantaré". Así, la larga tradición se hizo eco de la muerte, el entierro y la resurrección de Jesús. Además, recuerden las palabras que le dirigen a Jesús en Juan 11 con respecto a la muerte de Lázaro: "Señor, ya huele; es el cuarto día". Nuestros antepasados en la fe creían que el cuerpo comenzaba a descomponerse (a causa del pecado) en el cuarto día después de la muerte. El embalsamamiento evita que eso suceda ahora. Pero, nuevamente, la cremación cambia esto si el cuerpo se envía a la cremación ANTES de los ritos funerarios; a veces toma una semana o más para recibir las cenizas del crematorio. Sin embargo, el concepto de que los ritos funerarios se celebran según la conveniencia de la familia va en contra de la noción misma de la muerte. La muerte nunca es conveniente; La muerte es una ruptura de la vida y es el mayor inconveniente de todos. Al planear el funeral y acompañar los ritos con nuestro equipo, a menudo escuchamos, "Sería más conveniente tener el funeral el sábado", aunque la persona falleció el sábado o el domingo anterior. La muerte no se trata de nuestra conveniencia; "Porque no sabemos el día ni la hora", dice Jesús. Cuando el Arzobispo Fiorenza era el Ordinario de la Diócesis, escribió una carta a los sacerdotes sobre los funerales. Lo resumió con estas simples palabras: ¡Si están muertos, entiérralos! Pienso en eso cuando las familias quieren esperar semanas e incluso meses antes de celebrar los funerales de sus seres queridos. El proceso de duelo y luto no debe ni puede suspenderse. La Santa Madre Iglesia, en su sabiduría, pone estos rituales profundos a nuestra disposición para ayudarnos en el proceso espiritual y psicológico de la curación.

Más sobre esto la próxima semana.

"Concédeles, Señor, el descanso eterno, Y que la luz perpetua brille sobre ellos. Que las almas de todos los fieles partidos, por la misericordia de Dios, descansen en paz. Amén."
