





Why do voters act as they do?

Few things are so closely linked to our understanding of democracy than the act of voting. The effort to secure and expand voting rights has been at the heart of some of this nation's fiercest struggles. As you read the quotations below, think about the meaning of the franchise to the American people.

So long as I do not firmly and irrevocably possess the right to vote I do not possess myself. I cannot make up my mind—it is made up for me. I cannot live as a democratic citizen, observing the laws I have helped to enact—I can only submit to the edict of others.

— Martin Luther King, Jr., Give Us the Ballot, We Will Transform the South, May 17, 1957

Under every view of the subject, it seems indispensable that the mass of the citizens should not be without a voice in making the laws which they are to obey, and in choosing the magistrates who are to administer them.

— James Madison at the Constitutional Convention, 1787
