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HIGHLIGHTS

This report presents results from the 2015 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), an annual census of facilities providing substance abuse treatment. Conducted by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), N-SSATS is designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and use of alcohol and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. It is important to note that values in charts, narrative lists, and percentage distributions are calculated using actual raw numbers and rounded for presentation in this report; calculations using rounded values may produce different results.

- The N-SSATS facility response rate in 2015 was 92 percent. Thirty-four states or jurisdictions had response rates that equaled or surpassed the overall rate [Tables 1.1 and 6.1].
- A total of 14,234 facilities completed the survey. The 13,873 facilities included for this report had a one-day census of 1,305,647 clients enrolled in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2015 [Tables 1.1 and 3.1].
- In the United States, there were 477 clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and older on March 31, 2015. The rate was highest for persons with drug problems only (206 per 100,000 population aged 18 and older). Next were both alcohol and drug problems (195 per 100,000) and alcohol problems only (76 per 100,000) [Table 6.32].

Trends in Facility and Client Characteristics 2005-2015

- The number of substance abuse treatment facilities in treatment fluctuated between the years of 2005 and 2015. From 2011 to 2012 the number increased from 13,720 to 14,311. In 2013 it fell to 14,148 and in 2014 it slightly increased to 14,152. The number of eligible facilities responding to the 2015 survey increased by 4 percent, from 13,371 facilities in 2005 to 13,873 facilities in 2015 [Table 2.1]. The number of clients in treatment on the survey reference date, on the other hand, increased steadily (by 21 percent), from 1,081,049 in 2005 to 1,305,647 in 2015 [Table 3.1].
- The *operational structure* of the substance abuse treatment system (i.e., the type of entity responsible for operating the facility: private non-profit, private for-profit, or government—local, state, federal,¹ or tribal) had some notable changes between 2005 and 2015. Private non-profit facilities decreased from 59 percent in 2005 to 55 percent in 2015 and private for-profit facilities increased from 27 percent in 2005 to 34 percent in 2015. - *The major types of care*—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), and hospital inpatient—changed little from 2005 to 2015 in terms of the proportion of facilities offering each type of care or the proportion of clients in treatment in each type of care [Tables 2.3 and 3.2 and Figure 3].
- *Opioid Treatment Programs* certified by SAMHSA for the provision of medication-assisted therapy with methadone and/or buprenorphine were in 8 to 10 percent of all facilities between 2005 and 2015 [Figure 3].
- The proportion of *all clients receiving methadone* ranged from 22 percent to 27 percent in the period 2005 to 2015 [Table 3.2].
- The proportion of *all clients receiving buprenorphine* ranged from less than 1 percent to 6 percent in the period 2005 to 2015 [Table 3.2].
- The proportion of *clients in treatment for the three broad categories of substance abuse problems*—both alcohol and drug abuse, drug abuse only, and alcohol abuse only—changed between 2005 and 2015. Clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse decreased from 46 to 40 percent percent of all clients. Clients in treatment for drug abuse only increased from 34 to 41 percent, and clients in treatment for alcohol abuse only decreased from 19 to 15 percent [Table 3.3].
- *Clients under age 18* declined from 87,611 in 2005 to 72,977 in 2015. The proportion of clients under age 18 in treatment in each type of care (outpatient, residential [non-hospital], or hospital inpatient) differed little from the proportion of adults, and was stable between 2005 and 2015 [Table 3.4].

Facility Operation—March 31, 2015

- Private non-profit organizations operated 55 percent of all facilities and were treating 51 percent of all clients [Tables 4.1a and 5.1a].
- Private for-profit organizations operated 34 percent of all facilities and were treating 36 percent of all clients.
- Local governments operated 5 percent of all facilities and were treating 5 percent of all clients.
- State governments operated 3 percent of all facilities and were treating 2 percent of all clients.
- The federal government operated 2 percent of all facilities and was treating 4 percent of all clients.
- Tribal governments operated 2 percent of all facilities and were treating 1 percent of all clients.

Type of Care—March 31, 2015²

- Outpatient treatment was offered by 82 percent of all facilities and was received by 89 percent of all clients in treatment [Tables 4.1b and 5.1b].
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment was offered by 24 percent of all facilities and was received by 9 percent of all clients in treatment.
- Hospital inpatient treatment was offered by 5 percent of all facilities and was received by 2 percent of all clients in treatment.

Client Substance Abuse Problem and Diagnosed Co-occurring Mental Disorders—March 31, 2015

- Clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse made up 42 percent of all clients [Table 5.2].
- Clients in treatment for drug abuse only made up 42 percent of all clients.
- Clients in treatment for alcohol abuse only made up 16 percent of all clients.
- Fifty-two percent of clients in treatment had diagnosed co-occurring substance abuse and mental disorders.

Facility Size and Utilization Rates—March 31, 2015

- The median number of clients at facilities with Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) was 252 clients. Outpatient OTPs had a median of 280 clients, while residential (non-hospital) OTPs had a median of 32 clients and hospital inpatient OTPs had a median of 20 clients [Table 6.7].
- The median number of outpatient clients for the OTPs offering methadone or buprenorphine maintenance or injectable naltrexone treatment vary by facility operation.
 - The overall median for all outpatient OTPs is 262; for private non-profit outpatient OTPs the median is 290; for private for-profit outpatient OTPs the median is 265; for local/county/community governed outpatient OTPs the median is 240; for state government operated outpatient OTPs the median is 251; for Federal government operated outpatient OTPs the median is 124; and for tribal government operated outpatient OTPs the median is 200 [Table 4.3 and Table 6.7].
 - The median number of clients at facilities without Opioid Treatment Programs (non-OTPs) was 34 clients. Outpatient facilities had a median of 40 clients, while residential (non-hospital) facilities had a median of 19 clients and hospital inpatient facilities had a median of 12 clients [Table 4.4].
- The median number of outpatient clients for the facilities offering buprenorphine maintenance or injectable naltrexone treatment vary by facility operation.
 - The overall median is 15, for private non-profit facilities it is 15, for private for-profit facilities it is 20, for local/county/community governed facilities it is 12, for state government operated facilities it is 20, for Federal government operated facilities it is 27 and for tribal government operated facilities it is 12 [Table 4.4].
- One hundred five percent of all residential (non-hospital) beds and 109 percent of all hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment were in use (there were more clients than beds in both cases) [Tables 4.6 and 4.7].

Medication-Assisted Opioid Therapy—March 31, 2015

- Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) were available in 1,069 facilities (8 percent of all facilities) in 2005 and 1,349 facilities (10 percent of all treatment facilities) in 2015 [Table 2.3].
- Private for-profit organizations operated 56 percent of OTPs; overall, 34 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities were operated by private for-profit organizations [Tables 4.21b and 4.4].

- More than half (60 percent) of clients who were in OTPs that dispensed methadone were in private for-profit facilities [Table 5.4b].

CHAPTER 1

DESCRIPTION OF THE NATIONAL SURVEY OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT SERVICES (N-SSATS)

The 2015 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS) was conducted between March and November 2015, with a reference date of March 31, 2015. It is the 38th in a series of national surveys begun in the 1970s. The surveys were designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and use of alcohol and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions.³ The Center for Behavioral Health Statistics and Quality, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, plans and directs N-SSATS. This report presents tabular information and highlights from the 2015 N-SSATS. It is important to note that percentages in charts, narrative lists, and percentage distributions in tables may not add to 100 percent due to rounding.

N-SSATS is designed to collect information from all facilities⁴ in the United States, both public and private, that provide substance abuse treatment. (Additional information on N-SSATS, its history, and changes in the survey and survey universe over time is provided in Appendix A.)

N-SSATS provides the mechanism for quantifying the dynamic character and composition of the U.S. substance abuse treatment delivery system. N-SSATS collects multipurpose data that can be used to:

- Assist SAMHSA and state and local governments in assessing the nature and extent of services provided in state-supported and other substance abuse treatment facilities and in forecasting substance abuse treatment resource requirements;
- Update SAMHSA’s Inventory of Behavioral Health Services (I-BHS) which includes all known drug and alcohol abuse treatment facilities, both public and private (see Appendix A);
- Analyze substance abuse treatment services trends and conduct comparative analyses for the nation, regions, and states;
- Generate the *National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Programs*, a compendium of facilities approved by state substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment; and
- Update the information in SAMHSA’s Behavioral Health Treatment Facility Locator, a searchable database of facilities approved by state substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment. The Treatment Facility Locator is available on the Internet at:

Data Collection Procedures for the 2015 N-SSATS

Field period and reference date

The survey reference date for the 2015 N-SSATS was March 31, 2015. The field period was from March 31, 2015, through December 7, 2015.

Survey universe

The 2015 N-SSATS facility universe totaled 17,669 facilities, including all 16,601 active treatment facilities on SAMHSA's I-BHS at a point 6 weeks before the survey reference date, and 1,068 facilities that were added by state substance abuse agencies or otherwise discovered during the first 3 months of the survey.

Content

The 2015 N-SSATS questionnaire contained 42 numbered questions (see Appendix B for the paper version of the questionnaire). Topics included:

- Facility identification information
- Operating entity
- Primary focus
- Type of care provided
 - Outpatient treatment services (regular outpatient treatment, intensive outpatient treatment, day treatment or partial hospitalization, detoxification, methadone/buprenorphine maintenance or extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) treatment)
 - Residential (non-hospital) treatment services (long-term—more than 30 days, short-term—30 days or fewer, detoxification)
 - Hospital inpatient treatment services (inpatient treatment, inpatient detoxification)
- Services offered (assessment and pre-treatment services, counseling, pharmacotherapies, testing, transitional services, ancillary services)
- Clinical/therapeutic approaches
- Special programs or groups provided for specific client types
- Provision of services in sign language and/or in languages other than English
- Detoxification from alcohol, benzodiazepines, opioids, cocaine, methamphetamines, or other drugs, and routine use of medication during detoxification
- Client outreach (outreach to persons in the community who may need treatment, provision of a facility website)
- Licensure, certification, or accreditation agencies or organizations
- Standard operating procedures
- Payment options accepted, including use of a sliding fee scale and/or treatment at no charge
- Receipt of government funding

- Smoking policy
- Manner in which opioid dependence is treated, the operation of an Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) certified by SAMHSA, and offering maintenance and/or detoxification with opioid drugs such as methadone or buprenorphine
- Number of clients in treatment on March 31, 2015, (total; clients under age 18; clients receiving methadone, buprenorphine, or Vivitrol®)
- Percentage of clients in treatment on March 31, 2015, for abuse of both alcohol and drugs, alcohol abuse only, and drug abuse only
- Percentage of clients in treatment on March 31, 2015, with diagnosed co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders
- Number of beds designated for residential (non-hospital) and hospital inpatient substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2015

Data collection

Three data collection modes were employed: a secure web-based questionnaire, a paper questionnaire sent by mail, and a telephone interview. Five weeks before the survey reference date of March 31, 2015, letters were mailed to all facilities to announce the survey. The letters also served to update records with new address information received from the U.S. Postal Service. During the last week of March 2015, a data collection packet (including the SAMHSA cover letter, state-specific letter of endorsement, state profile, information on completing the survey on the web, and a sheet of *Frequently Asked Questions*) was mailed to each facility. To ease the burden on respondents, many of the data items that typically do not change from year to year were prefilled in the web-based questionnaire for those facilities that had completed the 2014 survey. Respondents could also request a paper questionnaire be sent to them. During the data collection phase, contract personnel were available to answer facilities' questions concerning the survey. Support for facilities completing the questionnaire on the web was also available by email. Three weeks after the initial data collection packet mailing, thank you/reminder letters were sent to all facilities. Approximately 8 weeks after the initial packet mailing, non-responding facilities were mailed a second packet. There was no questionnaire in the 2015 second packet. About 2 weeks after the second packet mailing, non-respondents received a reminder telephone call. A third packet containing a hard-copy questionnaire was mailed about 8 weeks after the second packet mailing. Those facilities that had not responded within 3 to 4 weeks of the reminder call were telephoned and asked to complete the survey by computer-assisted telephone interview (CATI).

Facility status and response rate

Table 1.1 presents a summary of response rate information. There were 17,669 facilities in the survey universe. Of these facilities, 2,132 facilities (12 percent) were found to be ineligible for the survey because they had closed or did not provide substance abuse treatment or detoxification. Of the remaining 15,537 facilities, 14,234 facilities (92 percent) completed the survey and 13,873 (89 percent) were eligible for this report.

Quality assurance

The web questionnaire was programmed to be self-editing; that is, respondents were prompted to complete missing responses and to confirm or correct inconsistent responses.

All mail questionnaires were reviewed manually for consistency and for missing data. Calls were made to facilities to resolve unclear responses and to obtain missing data. After data entry, automated quality assurance reviews were conducted. The reviews incorporated the rules used in manual editing, plus consistency checks and checks for data outliers not readily identified by manual review.

Item non-response was minimized through editing and extensive follow-up. The item response rate for the 2015 N-SSATS averaged 98 percent across 269 separate items. Appendix C details item response rates and imputation procedures.

Facility Selection for the 2015 N-SSATS Report

Table 1.1. The N-SSATS questionnaire is deliberately sent to some facilities that are excluded from this report, as explained below. For this cycle, 256 of the 14,234 questionnaire respondents provided information but were deemed out of the scope of this report and excluded from the analyses presented here. The excluded facilities and reasons for exclusion fell into three categories:

- 137 facilities were halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment. These facilities were included in the survey so that they could be listed in the *Directory* and SAMHSA’s Behavioral Health Services Treatment Facility Locator.

- 82 facilities were solo practitioners. I-BHS and N-SSATS are designed to include facilities rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed and surveyed only if a state substance abuse agency explicitly requests that they be included in the survey. The excluded solo practitioners had not been identified for inclusion by a state substance abuse agency.
- 37 facilities were jails, prisons, or other organizations that treated incarcerated clients exclusively.

An additional 105 facilities whose client counts were included in or “rolled into” other facilities’ counts and whose facility characteristics were not reported separately were excluded from facility counts in this report. However, their client counts are included.

After the exclusion of 256 out-of-scope facilities and 105 rolled-up facilities, 13,873 eligible respondent facilities remained to be included in the 2015 N-SSATS report.

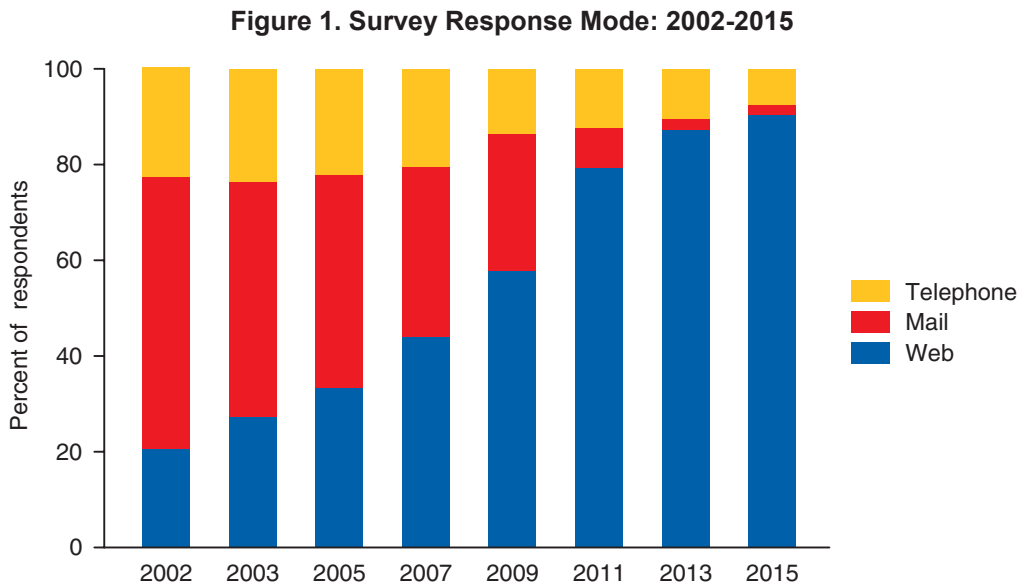
Number of respondents reporting facility and client data

For this report, there were 13,873 eligible responding facilities to the 2015 N-SSATS. The breakdown of facility data and client counts reported by these respondents is summarized below.

- 12,667 facilities reported facility data and client counts for themselves only.
- 374 facilities reported facility characteristics for themselves and provided client counts for their own facility and other facilities in the same group (family) of facilities.
- 832 facilities reported facility characteristics only. Their client counts were reported by another facility.

Survey Response Mode

Figure 1. The proportion of facilities using the web survey to respond to N-SSATS has increased steadily since introduction of the option in 2002. The percentage of facilities responding via the web

increased from 33 percent in 2005 to 90 percent in 2015. Mail response declined from 45 percent in 2005 to 2 percent in 2015. Telephone response, which represents follow-up of facilities that had not responded by mail or web, also declined, from 22 percent in 2005 to 7 percent in 2015.

Data Considerations and Limitations

As with any data collection effort, certain procedural considerations and data limitations must be taken into account when interpreting data from the 2015 N-SSATS. Some general issues are listed below; other considerations are detailed in Appendix A. Considerations and limitations of specific data items are discussed where the data are presented.

- N-SSATS attempts to obtain responses from all known treatment facilities, but it is a voluntary survey. There was no adjustment for the 8 percent facility non-response.
- N-SSATS is a point-prevalence survey. It provides information on the substance abuse treatment system and its clients on the reference date. Client counts reported here do not represent annual totals. Rather, N-SSATS provides a “snapshot” of substance abuse treatment facilities and clients on an average day.
- Multiple responses were allowed for certain variables (e.g., services provided and specialized programs). Tabulations of these variables include the total number of facilities reporting each response.

Organization of the Report

- Appendix C contains information on item response and imputation.

Terminology

The majority of tables in the report are organized by facility operation. Therefore, it is important to define facility operation, as well as a few other terms.

- *Facility operation* indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility:
 - Private for-profit
 - Private non-profit

- Government
 - Local, county, or community
 - State
 - Federal (Dept. of Veterans Affairs, Dept. of Defense, Indian Health Service, other)
 - Tribal
- *Clients in treatment* were defined as:
 - Hospital inpatient and residential (non-hospital) clients receiving substance abuse treatment services at the facility on March 31, 2015
and
 - Outpatient clients who were seen at the facility for a substance abuse treatment or detoxification service at least once during the month of March 2015, and who were still enrolled in treatment on March 31, 2015.
- *Type of care* indicates the services the facility offers:
 - Outpatient
 - Regular
 - Intensive
 - Outpatient day treatment or partial hospitalization
 - Outpatient detoxification
 - Outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance or extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) treatment
 - Residential (non-hospital)
 - Short-term (30 days or less)
 - Long-term (more than 30 days)
 - Detoxification
 - Hospital inpatient
 - Inpatient detoxification
 - Inpatient treatment

CHAPTER 2

TRENDS IN FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter presents trends in facility characteristics for 2005 to 2015.

Number of Facilities

Table 2.1. The total number of substance abuse treatment facilities remained stable between 2005 and 2015. There was considerable turnover from year to year in the individual facilities responding to the survey: every year, although between 85 and 91 percent of the facilities responding to a given survey had also responded to the previous year's survey, about 10 to 12 percent of the facilities had closed, were no longer providing substance abuse treatment, or did not respond to the survey, but were replaced by fairly similar numbers of new facilities or facilities that had not responded the previous year.

There was a net decrease of 279 responding facilities between 2014 and 2015, to 13,873 facilities. Of the facilities responding to the 2015 survey, 91 percent had also responded to the 2014 survey and 9 percent were new to the 2015 survey or did not respond in 2014. Eleven percent of the facilities that responded in 2014 had closed, were no longer providing substance abuse treatment, or did not respond in 2015.

Despite the year-to-year changes in the facilities reporting, several core structural characteristics of the substance abuse treatment system remained stable from 2005 to 2015.

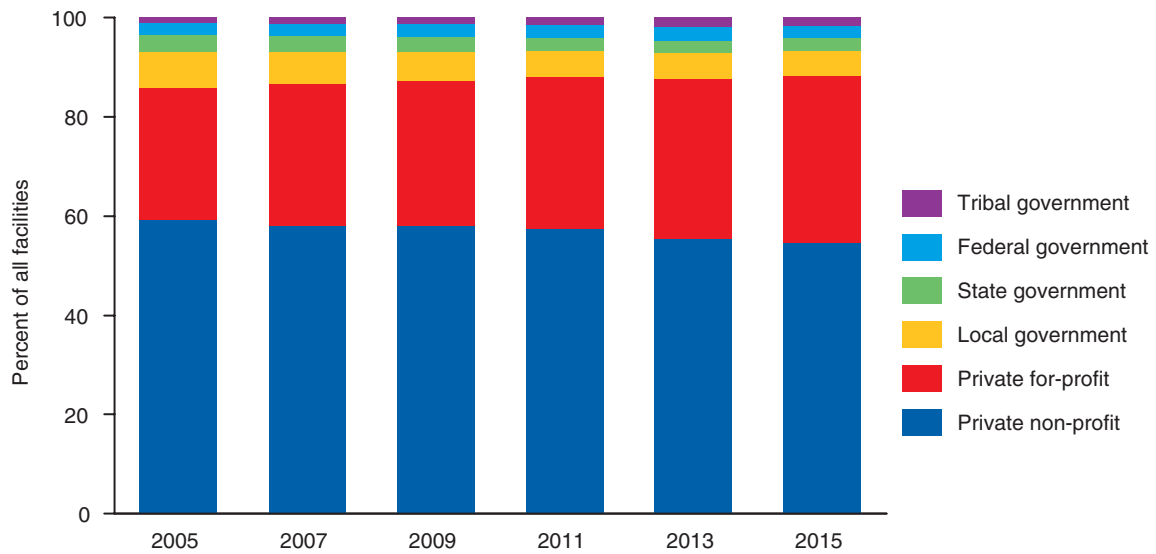
Facility Operation

Table 2.2 and Figure 2. The operational structure of the substance abuse treatment system (i.e., the type of entity responsible for operating the facility) changed little between 2005 and 2015.

- Private non-profit organizations operated 59 percent of all facilities in 2005 compared with 55 percent in 2015.
- Private for-profit organizations operated 27 percent of facilities in 2005, increasing slightly but steadily to 34 percent of facilities in 2015.
- Local, county, or community governments operated 7 percent of facilities in 2005, decreasing to 5 percent in 2015.
- State governments operated about 3 percent of facilities each year.
- The federal government operated 2 to 3 percent of facilities each year.⁵
- Tribal governments operated 1 to 2 percent of facilities each year.

Type of Care Offered⁶

Table 2.3 and Figure 3. The proportions of facilities offering the major types of care—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), and hospital inpatient—changed a little between 2005 and 2015. Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs), certified by SAMHSA, provide medication-assisted therapy with methadone, buprenorphine, and extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®). Facilities with OTPs can be associated with any type of care. OTPs were provided by 8 to 10 percent of all facilities between 2005 and 2015.

- Outpatient treatment was provided by 81 to 82 percent of facilities over most of this period.
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment was provided by 24 to 28 percent of facilities over most of this period and gradually decreasing from 28 percent in 2005 to 24 percent of facilities in 2015.
- Hospital inpatient treatment was provided by 7 percent of facilities in 2005, decreasing to 5 percent of facilities in 2015.
- Outpatient treatment was provided by 90 to 93 percent of OTP facilities
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment was provided by 8 to 10 percent of OTP facilities.
- Hospital inpatient treatment was provided by 8 to 12 percent of OTP facilities.

Facilities that Use Medication-assisted Opioid Therapy

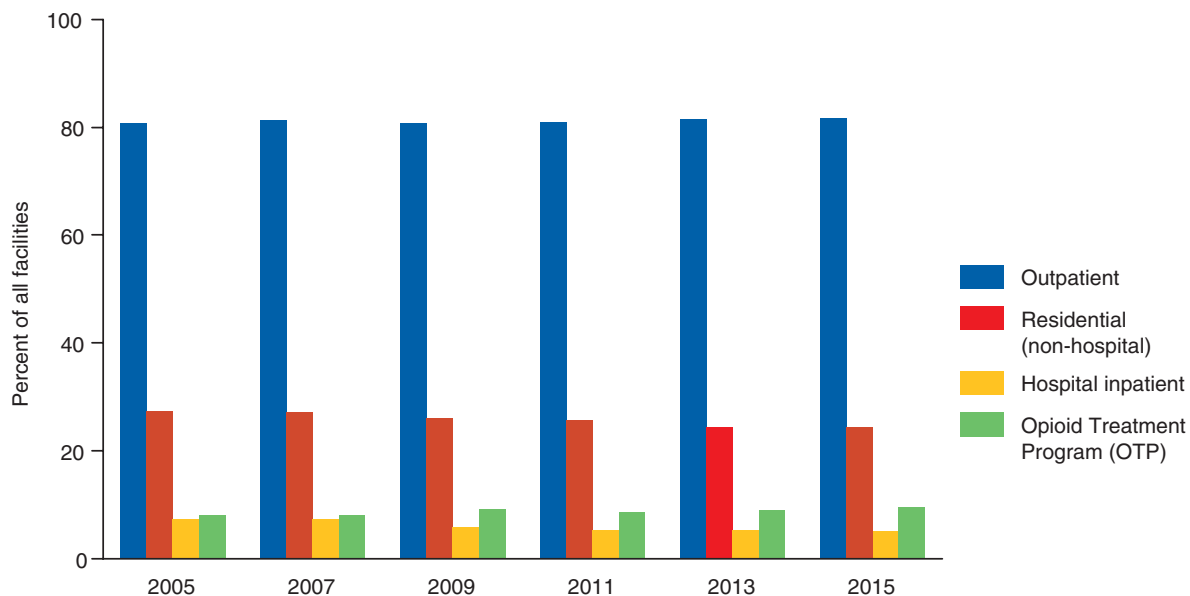
Table 2.4 and Figure 3. Medication-assisted opioid therapy (MAT) includes the use of methadone and buprenorphine for the treatment of opioid addiction or dependence and the use of extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) (injectable naltrexone) for relapse prevention in opioid

addiction. Methadone is available only at the Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) that are certified by SAMHSA’s Center for Substance Abuse Treatment. Buprenorphine may be prescribed by physicians who have received Drug Addiction Treatment Act of 2000 (DATA 2000) specific training and received a waiver to prescribe the medication for treatment of opioid addiction; some of these physicians are affiliated with facilities (either OTPs or other). All physicians or approved medical personnel can prescribe injectable naltrexone.

- The proportion of OTPs providing methadone-only treatment decreased from 70 percent of all OTP facilities in 2005 to 39 percent of all OTP facilities in 2015.
- The proportion of OTPs providing methadone and buprenorphine treatment increased from 26 percent of all OTP facilities in 2005 to 45 percent in 2009 and then fell to 35 percent of all OTP facilities in 2015.
- The proportion of all facilities providing any buprenorphine services increased from 9 percent in 2005 to 25 percent in 2015.
- The percentage of facilities providing injectable naltrexone treatment remained at about 16 to 17 percent of all facilities between 2011⁷ and 2015. This chapter presents trends in client characteristics for 2005 to 2015.

CHAPTER 3

TRENDS IN CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter presents trends in client characteristics for 2005 to 2015.

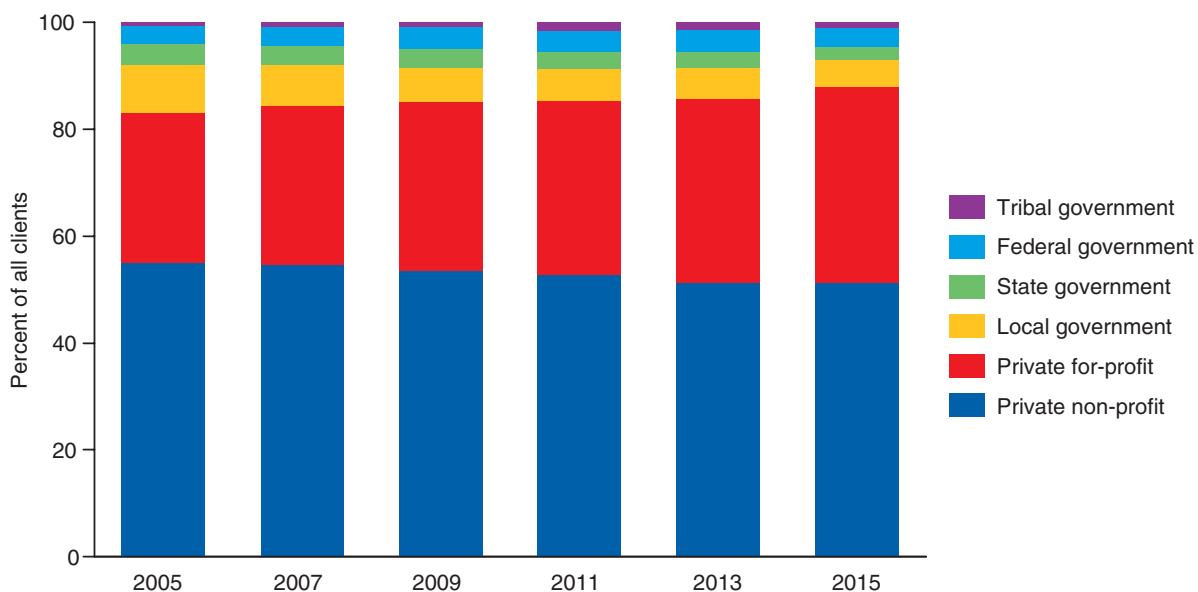
Table 3.1. The number of clients in treatment on the survey reference date increased by 21 percent from 2005 to 2015, from 1,081,049 in 2005 to 1,305,647 in 2015.

Facility Operation

Table 3.1 and Figure 4. Within the categories of facility operation, the proportions of clients in treatment demonstrated some gradual changes between 2005 and 2015.

- Private non-profit facilities treated 55 percent of clients in 2005, decreasing to 51 percent in 2015. (The number of clients in private non-profit facilities increased by 13 percent, from 595,633 in 2005 to 670,593 in 2015.)
- Private for-profit facilities treated 28 percent of clients in 2005, increasing to 36 percent in 2015. (The number of clients in private for-profit facilities increased by 57 percent, from 302,595 in 2005 to 475,531 in 2015.)
- Local government-operated facilities treated 9 percent of clients in 2005, decreasing to 5 percent in 2015. (The number of clients in local government-operated facilities decreased by 30 percent, from 95,667 in 2005 to 67,060 in 2015.)

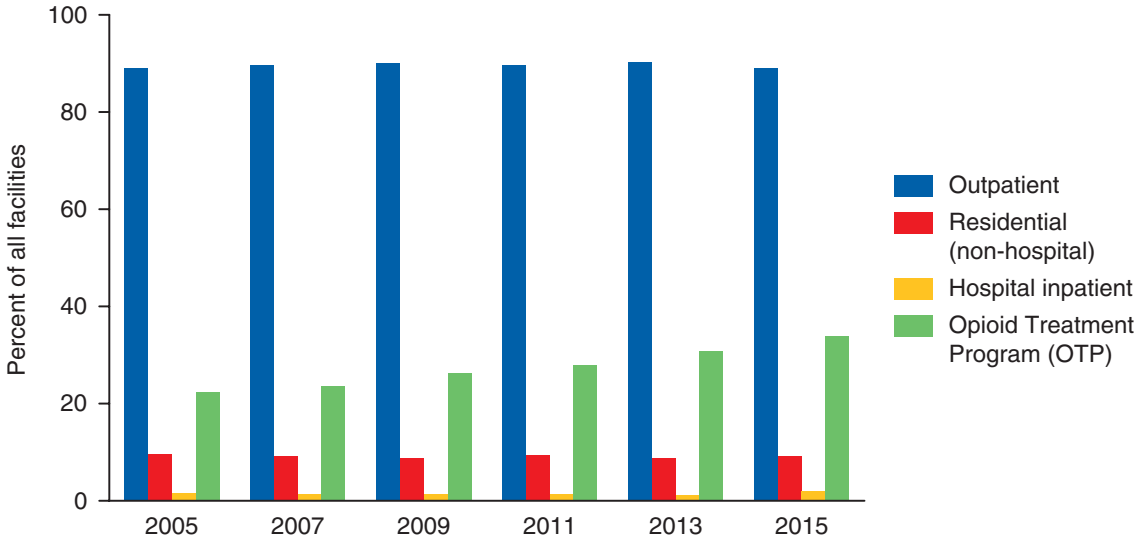
- State government-operated facilities treated 4 percent of clients in 2005, decreasing to 2 percent in 2015. (The number of clients in state government-operated facilities decreased by 28 percent, from 42,431 in 2005 to 30,675 in 2015.)
- Federal government-operated facilities treated 3 percent of clients in 2005 and 4 percent in 2015. (The number of clients in federal government-operated facilities increased by 29 percent, from 36,194 in 2005 to 46,721 in 2015.)⁸
- Tribal government-operated facilities treated 1 percent of clients both in 2005 and in 2015. (The number of clients in tribal government-operated facilities increased by 77 percent, from 8,529 in 2005 to 15,067 in 2015.)

Type of Care Received

Table 3.2 and Figure 5. The proportions of clients in treatment for the major types of care—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), and hospital inpatient—were stable between 2005 and 2015.

- Clients in outpatient treatment made up 89 to 90 percent of clients each year. (The number of outpatient clients increased from 961,805 in 2005 to 1,161,456 in 2015.)
- Clients in residential (non-hospital) treatment made up 9 to 10 percent of all clients each year. (The number of residential (non-hospital) clients increased from 104,015 in 2005 to 119,900 in 2015.)
- Clients in hospital inpatient treatment made up about 1 to 2 percent of all clients each year. (The number of hospital inpatient clients increased from 15,229 in 2005 to 24,291 in 2015.)

Clients Receiving Medication-assisted Opioid Therapy

Table 3.2 and Figure 5. Clients receiving methadone, buprenorphine, or extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) could be in any type of care—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), or hospital inpatient. Clients could receive methadone only in Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs), certified by SAMHSA to provide medication-assisted therapy with methadone and buprenorphine. However, clients could receive buprenorphine or extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) in any type of facility.⁹

- The proportion of all clients receiving methadone was 22 to 27 percent between 2005 and 2015. (The number of clients receiving methadone increased by 51 percent, from 235,836 in 2005 to 356,843 in 2015.)
- The proportion of clients receiving buprenorphine was less than 1 percent in 2005 but increased to 6 percent in 2015. (The number of clients receiving buprenorphine increased by 1,385 percent, from 5,099 in 2005 to 75,724 in 2015.)
- The proportion of clients receiving extended release, injectable naltrexone was less than 1 percent in 2013¹⁰ and 1 percent in 2015. (The number of clients receiving extended release, injectable naltrexone increased by 86 percent, from 3,781 in 2013 to 7,035 in 2015.)

Substance Abuse Problem Treated

Table 3.3. The proportion of clients in treatment for the three broad categories of substance abuse problems—both alcohol and drug abuse, drug abuse only, and alcohol abuse only—changed little between 2005 and 2015.

- Clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse made up 40 to 46 percent of all clients from 2005 to 2015. (The number of clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse increased by 4 percent, from 500,234 in 2005 to 520,866 in 2015.)
- Clients in treatment for drug abuse only ranged from 34 to 41 percent of all clients from 2005 through 2015. (The number of clients in treatment for drug abuse only increased by 45 percent, from 366,640 in 2005 to 531,963 in 2015.)
- Clients in treatment for alcohol abuse only ranged from 15 to 19 percent between 2005 and 2015. (The number of clients in treatment for alcohol abuse only increased by less than 1 percent, from 199,986 in 2005 to 200,187 in 2015.)
- Clients in treatment for diagnosed co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders made up 37 to 47 percent of all clients from 2007 through 2015.¹¹ (The number of clients in treatment for diagnosed co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders increased by 48 percent, from 416,260 in 2007 to 614,789 in 2015.)

Clients under Age 18 in Treatment

- *Table 3.4.* The proportion of clients under age 18 remained between 6 and 8 percent of all clients from 2005 through 2015.
- The proportion of types of care received by clients under age 18 were stable between 2005 and 2015.
 - 87 to 89 percent of all clients under age 18 were in outpatient treatment. (The number of outpatient clients under age 18 decreased by 17 percent, from 76,240 in 2005 to 63,493 in 2015.)
 - 10 to 12 percent of all clients under age 18 were in residential (non-hospital) treatment. (The number of residential [non-hospital] clients under age 18 decreased by 24 percent, from 10,313 in 2005 to 7,807 in 2015.)
 - 1 to 2 percent of all clients under age 18 were in hospital inpatient treatment. (The number of hospital inpatient clients under age 18 increased by 59 percent, from 1,058 in 2005 to 1,677 in 2015.)
- The proportion of clients under age 18 in treatment facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents ranged from 75 to 84 percent between 2005 and 2015. (The number of clients under age 18 in treatment facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents decreased by 26 percent, from 73,731 in 2005 to 54,650 in 2015.)

CHAPTER 4

FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS AND SERVICES

This chapter outlines key characteristics of facilities and programs in 2015.

Facility Operation and Type of Care

Table 4.1b. Facilities were asked to designate the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility. They were also asked to designate the facility's type of care.

- The proportions of all facilities by facility operation were:
 - Private non-profit organizations 55 percent
 - Private for-profit organizations 34 percent
 - Local, county, or community governments 5 percent
 - State governments 3 percent
 - Federal government¹² 2 percent
 - Tribal governments 2 percent

Three quarters (75 percent) of private non-profit facilities provided outpatient care and one third (33 percent) provided residential (non-hospital) care. In contrast, 91 percent of private for-profit facilities provided outpatient care and 12 percent provided residential (non-hospital) care.

Type of care offered was made up of three broad categories (outpatient, residential [non-hospital], and hospital inpatient), each with several subcategories. A facility could offer more than one type of care. The proportions of all facilities offering the different types of care were:¹³

- Outpatient treatment 82 percent
 - Regular outpatient treatment 76 percent
 - Intensive outpatient treatment 45 percent
 - Outpatient day treatment or partial hospitalization 13 percent
 - Outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance or extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) treatment 19 percent
 - Outpatient detoxification 10 percent
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment 24 percent
 - Long-term treatment (more than 30 days) 20 percent

Client Substance Abuse Problem and Diagnosed Co-occurring Mental Disorders

Table 4.2. Facilities were asked to estimate the proportions of clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse, for alcohol abuse only, and for drug abuse only. They were also asked to estimate the proportion of clients with diagnosed co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders.

- On March 31, 2015, almost all facilities (93 percent) had clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse, 83 percent had clients in treatment for drug abuse only, and 79 percent had clients in treatment for alcohol abuse only.
- On March 31, 2015, most facilities (92 percent) also had clients in treatment with diagnosed co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders. One percent of facilities had 90 percent or more of clients with alcohol-only problems and seven percent of facilities had 90 percent or more of clients with drug-only problems.

Facility Size

Table 4.3. Facility size is defined by the number of clients in substance abuse treatment. The median number of clients in substance abuse treatment at a facility with Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) on March 31, 2015, was 252 clients.

- The median number of clients by facility operation ranged from 99 clients in OTP facilities operated by state governments to 312 clients in OTP facilities operated by the federal government.
- By type of care, the median¹⁴ number of clients in treatment at OTP facilities on March 31, 2015, was:

■ Outpatient treatment	280 clients
– Outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance or extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) treatment	262 clients
– Regular outpatient care	60 clients

Table 4.4. Facility size is defined by the number of clients in substance abuse treatment. The median number of clients in substance abuse treatment at a facility without Opioid Treatment Programs (non-OTPs) on March 31, 2015, was 34 clients.

- The median number of clients by facility operation ranged from 29 clients in non-OTP facilities operated by tribal governments to 61 clients in non-OTP facilities operated by the federal government.
- By type of care, the median¹⁵ number of clients in treatment at non-OTP facilities on March 31, 2015, was:

■ Outpatient treatment	40 clients
– Regular outpatient care	30 clients
– Intensive outpatient treatment	15 clients
– Outpatient buprenorphine maintenance or extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) treatment	15 clients

Table 4.5a-c. Facilities were sorted into five size groups based on the total number of clients in treatment on March 31, 2015. These five groups consist of fewer than 15 clients, 15-29 clients, 30-59 clients, 60-119 clients, and 120 or more clients.

- *Table 4.5a.* Outpatient facilities operated by the federal government were generally larger than outpatient facilities operated by other entities—33 percent had 120 or more clients in treatment on March 31, 2015, compared with 26 percent of all outpatient facilities.

- *Table 4.5b.* Residential (non-hospital) facilities operated by tribal governments were generally smaller than residential (non-hospital) facilities operated by other entities—66 percent had fewer than 15 clients in treatment on March 31, 2015, compared with 35 percent of all residential (non-hospital) facilities.
- *Table 4.5c.* Inpatient facilities operated by tribal governments were generally smaller than facilities operated by other entities—100 percent had fewer than 15 clients in treatment on March 31, 2015, compared with 55 percent of all inpatient facilities.

Facility Utilization Rates

Facilities were asked to report the number of residential (non-hospital) and hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment. Utilization rates were calculated by dividing the number of residential (non-hospital) or hospital inpatient clients by the number of residential (non-hospital) or hospital inpatient designated beds. Because substance abuse treatment clients may also occupy non-designated beds, utilization rates could be more than 100 percent.

- *Table 4.6.* There were 2,958 facilities that reported having 104,012 residential (non-hospital) beds designated for substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2015. The utilization rate¹⁶ was 105 percent, and ranged from 95 percent in facilities operated by state governments to 111 percent in facilities operated by tribal governments.
- *Table 4.7.* There were 461 facilities that reported having 15,415 hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2015. The utilization rate¹⁷ was 109 percent, and ranged from 78 percent in facilities operated by the federal government to 248 percent in facilities operated by local governments.
- *Tables 4.6 and 4.7 and Figure 6* show the distribution of facility-level utilization rates for residential (non-hospital) beds and for hospital inpatient beds. Facilities with hospital inpatient beds (109 percent) had generally higher utilization rates than facilities with residential (non-hospital) beds (105 percent). Forty-six percent of facilities with residential (non-hospital) beds had utilization rates of 91 to 100 percent and 11 percent had utilization rates above 100 percent. Twenty-five percent of facilities with hospital inpatient beds had utilization rates of 91 to 100 percent while 20 percent had utilization rates above 100 percent.

Services Provided

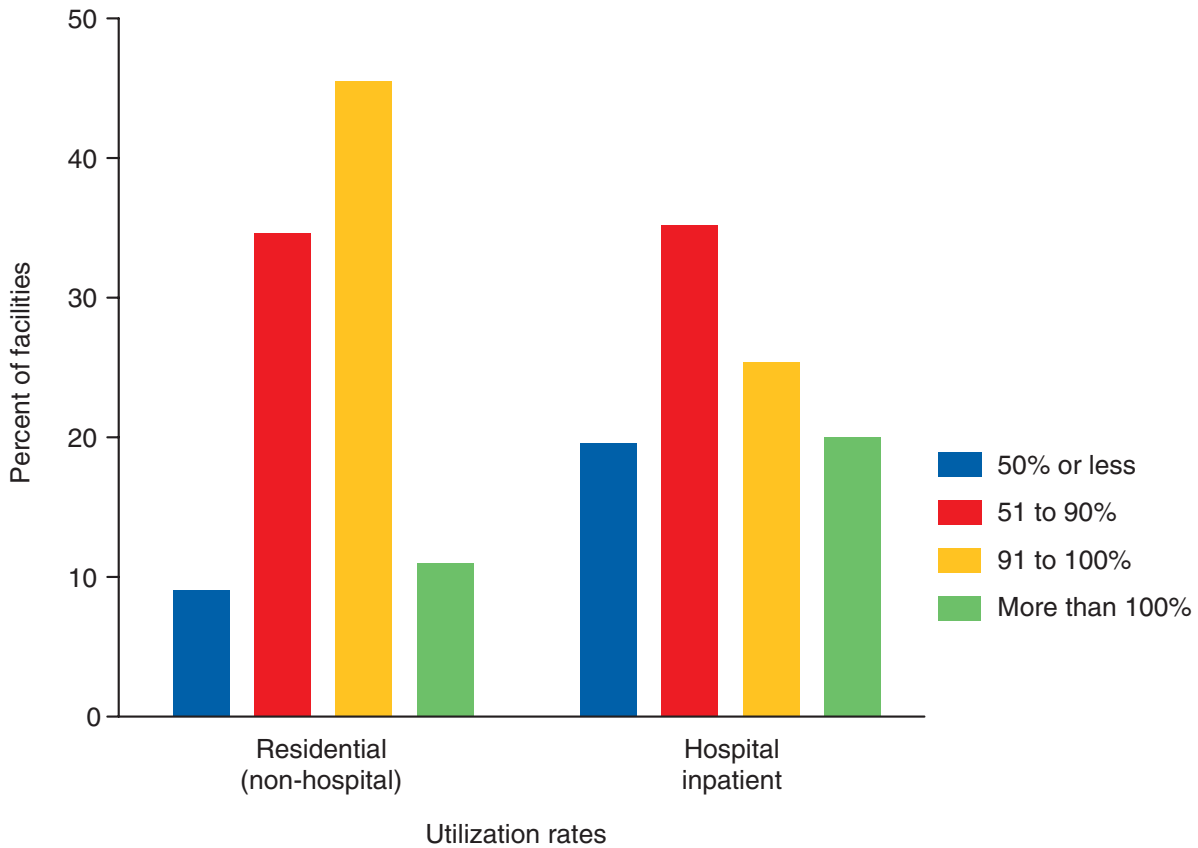
Tables 4.8 and 4.9b. Facilities were asked about the types of services they provided. Services were grouped into the six broad categories shown below.

- *Assessment and pre-treatment services* were offered by 99 percent of all facilities.
 - Screening for substance abuse was provided by 95 percent of all facilities.
 - Comprehensive substance abuse assessment or diagnosis was provided by 92 percent of all facilities.

- Screening for mental disorders was provided by 71 percent of all facilities.
- Screening for tobacco use was provided by 62 percent of all facilities.
- Comprehensive mental health assessment or diagnosis was provided by 49 percent of all facilities.
- Outreach to persons in the community who may need treatment was provided by 58 percent of all facilities, but by 87 percent of tribal government-operated facilities.
- Interim services for clients when immediate admission was not possible were provided by 46 percent of all facilities, but by 77 percent of federal government-operated facilities.
- *Testing services* were provided by 89 percent of all facilities.
 - Drug or alcohol urine screening was provided by 85 percent of all facilities. Breathalyzer or other blood alcohol testing was provided by 62 percent of all facilities, but by 84 percent of federal government-operated facilities.
 - Testing of TB, HIV, hepatitis B and C, and STDs was provided by between 21 and 37 percent of all facilities.

- *At least one pharmacotherapy* was provided by 55 percent of all facilities; rates were higher in federal government-operated facilities (83 percent).
 - Medications for psychiatric disorders were the most frequently available pharmacotherapies—in 43 percent of all facilities.
 - Buprenorphine was provided by 25 percent of all facilities.
 - Medications for smoking cessation were provided by 19 percent of all facilities.
 - Extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) was provided by 16 percent of all facilities.
- *Transitional services* were provided by 98 percent of all facilities.
 - Discharge planning was provided by 96 percent of all facilities.
 - Aftercare/continuing care was provided by 85 percent of all facilities.
- *Ancillary services* were provided by more than 99 percent of all facilities.
 - Substance abuse education was provided by 96 percent of all facilities.
 - Case management services were provided by 81 percent of all facilities.
 - Mental health services were provided by 65 percent of all facilities.
- *“Other” services*¹⁸ were provided by 27 percent of all facilities.
 - Treatment for other non-substance addiction disorders was provided by 20 percent of all facilities.
 - Treatment for gambling disorders was provided by 18 percent of all facilities.
 - Treatment for internet use disorder was provided by 9 percent of all facilities.

Clinical/Therapeutic Approaches

Table 4.10. Facilities were asked to indicate if they used any of 14 specific clinical/therapeutic approaches.

- Two approaches were each used “always or often” by nearly all facilities:
 - Substance abuse counseling was used “always or often” by 93 percent of facilities.
 - Relapse prevention was used “always or often” by 83 percent of facilities.
- By treatment approach, the proportion of facilities that used the approaches at least sometimes (“always or often” or “sometimes”) were:

■ Substance abuse counseling	98 percent
■ Relapse prevention	93 percent
■ Cognitive-behavioral therapy	91 percent
■ Motivational interviewing	90 percent
■ Anger management	80 percent
■ Brief intervention	79 percent

- Trauma-related counseling 75 percent
- 12-step facilitation 72 percent
- Contingency management/motivational incentives 52 percent
- Dialectical behavior therapy 47 percent
- Rational emotive behavioral therapy 43 percent
- Matrix model 40 percent
- Computerized substance abuse treatment 13 percent
- Community reinforcement plus vouchers 12 percent
- Some approaches were “rarely” or “never” used by more than half of all facilities:
 - Rational emotive behavioral therapy was “rarely” or “never” used by 53 percent of facilities, and it was unfamiliar to an additional 4 percent of facilities.
 - The matrix model was “rarely” or “never” used by 51 percent of facilities, and it was unfamiliar to an additional 9 percent of facilities.
 - Community reinforcement plus vouchers were “rarely” or “never” used by 80 percent of facilities, and it was unfamiliar to an additional 8 percent of facilities.
 - Computerized substance abuse treatment was “rarely” or “never” used by 83 percent of facilities, and it was unfamiliar to an additional 4 percent of facilities.

Programs or Groups for Specific Client Types

Table 4.11b. Facilities were asked about the provision of treatment programs or groups specially tailored for specific client types. Overall, 82 percent of facilities offered at least one special program or group to serve a specific client type.

- The proportions of facilities providing specially tailored programs or groups were:
 - Adult women 44 percent
 - Clients with co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders 44 percent
 - Adult men 42 percent
 - Clients who have experienced trauma¹⁹ 32 percent
 - Criminal justice clients (other than DUI/DWI)²⁰ 32 percent
 - Clients arrested for DUI or DWI 27 percent
 - Young adults 27 percent
 - Adolescents 27 percent
 - Clients who have experienced intimate partner violence, domestic violence 22 percent
 - Clients who have experienced sexual abuse 22 percent

Services in Sign Language for the Hearing Impaired and in Languages Other than English

Table 4.12b. Facilities were asked about the provision of substance abuse treatment services in sign language for the hearing impaired. They were also asked if treatment was provided in languages other than English, if this treatment was provided by a staff counselor or by an on-call interpreter, and in what languages staff counselors provided treatment.

- Substance abuse treatment services in sign language for the hearing impaired were offered in 30 percent of all facilities. Facilities operated by local and state governments were most likely to offer these services (56 and 45 percent, respectively).
- Substance abuse treatment services in languages other than English were provided in 47 percent of all facilities, ranging from 25 percent of federal government-operated facilities to 65 percent of local government-operated facilities.
- Thirty-two percent of facilities providing services in languages other than English used only staff counselors who spoke other languages; another 25 percent of facilities used both staff counselors and on-call interpreters.
- In facilities where staff counselors provided services in languages other than English, Spanish was the most frequently spoken language (93 percent of those facilities and 25 percent of all facilities). Services in American Indian/Alaska Native languages were provided by 3 percent of all facilities where staff counselors provided services in languages other than English. Most tribal government-operated and Indian Health Services-operated facilities where staff counselors provided services in languages other than English offered services in American Indian/Alaska Native languages (84 and 83 percent, respectively).

Detoxification Services

Table 4.13. Facilities that provided detoxification services were asked to indicate whether or not they detoxified clients from specified substances, and whether or not medication was routinely used during detoxification. The number of facilities providing any type of substance detoxification services was 2,592 (19 percent) out of a total of 13,873 facilities.

²¹ Clients who have experienced trauma, active duty military, and the members of military families categories appeared for the first time in the 2012 questionnaire.

- Of the 2,592 facilities that offer detoxification, the proportions from the following specific substances were:
 - Opioids 86 percent
 - Alcohol 67 percent
 - Benzodiazepines 60 percent
 - Methamphetamines 51 percent
 - Cocaine 51 percent
 - Other substances 7 percent
- Medications were routinely used during detoxification in 82 percent of the facilities providing detoxification services.

Client Outreach

Table 4.14. Facilities were asked if they had a website providing information about their substance abuse treatment programs.

- Websites providing information about a facility’s substance abuse treatment programs were maintained by 82 percent of all facilities. Website availability ranged from 54 percent among facilities operated by the federal government to 88 percent among facilities operated by private non-profit organizations.
- Outreach to persons in the community who may need treatment was provided by 58 percent of all facilities, but by 87 percent of tribal government-operated facilities.

Facility Licensing, Certification, or Accreditation

Facilities were asked to report licensure, certification, or accreditation by specified agencies or organizations. These included the state substance abuse agency, state mental health department, state department of health, hospital licensing authority, the Joint Commission, CARF, NCQA, COA, HFAP, and other federal, state, or local agency or organization.²²

Table 4.15b. Overall, 93 percent of all facilities reported that they were licensed, certified, or accredited by one or more agencies or organizations.

- The proportions of facilities reporting that they were licensed, certified, or accredited by the specified agencies or organizations were:
 - State substance abuse agency 79 percent
 - State department of health 45 percent
 - State mental health department 39 percent
 - CARF²² 27 percent
 - Joint Commission 18 percent
 - Hospital licensing authority 7 percent

Table 4.16b. Facility licensing, certification, or accreditation was associated with the type of care offered.

- State substance abuse agencies licensed, certified, or accredited 80 percent of facilities offering residential (non-hospital) treatment, 79 percent of facilities offering outpatient treatment, and 54 percent of facilities offering hospital inpatient treatment.
- State mental health departments licensed, certified, or accredited 42 percent of hospital inpatient facilities, 41 percent of outpatient facilities, and 31 percent of residential (non-hospital) facilities.
- Hospital inpatient treatment facilities were more frequently licensed, certified, or accredited than facilities offering residential (non-hospital) treatment or outpatient treatment in five of the reported licensing, certification, and accreditation organizations (Joint Commission, State department of health, Hospital licensing authority, State mental health department, and NCQA).
 - Seventy-two percent of hospital inpatient treatment facilities were licensed, certified, or accredited by the Joint Commission compared to 18 percent of outpatient facilities and 17 percent of residential (non-hospital) facilities.
 - Sixty-six percent of hospital inpatient treatment facilities were licensed, certified, or accredited by the state department of health compared to 50 percent of residential (non-hospital) facilities and 43 percent of outpatient facilities.
 - Fifty-one percent of hospital inpatient treatment facilities were licensed, certified, or accredited by a hospital licensing authority compared to 6 percent of outpatient facilities and 4 percent of residential (non-hospital) facilities.
 - Forty-two percent of hospital inpatient treatment facilities were licensed, certified, or accredited by a state mental health department compared to 41 percent of outpatient facilities and 31 percent of residential (non-hospital) facilities.
 - Eight percent of hospital inpatient treatment facilities were licensed, certified, or accredited by NCQA compared to 3 percent of outpatient facilities and 2 percent of residential (non-hospital) facilities.

Facility Standard Operating Procedures

Table 4.17b. Facilities were asked to indicate whether or not they followed specified practices as part of their standard operating procedures. All of the standard practices listed were used by two-thirds or more of all facilities.

- The proportions of facilities reporting use of the specified standard practices were:
 - Required continuing education for staff 98 percent
 - Regularly scheduled case review with a supervisor 94 percent
 - Periodic client satisfaction surveys 93 percent

■ Periodic drug testing of clients	86 percent
■ Periodic utilization reviews	86 percent
■ Case review by an appointed quality review committee	73 percent
■ Outcome follow-up after discharge	69 percent

Payment Options

Table 4.18b. Facilities were asked to indicate whether or not they accepted specified types of payment or insurance for substance abuse treatment. They were also asked about the use of a sliding fee scale and if they offered treatment at no charge to clients who could not pay.

- The proportions of all facilities reporting acceptance of specific payment options were:

■ Cash or self-payment	89 percent
■ Private health insurance	68 percent
■ Medicaid	62 percent
■ State-financed health insurance	45 percent
■ Medicare	34 percent
■ Federal military insurance	33 percent
■ Access to Recovery (ATR) vouchers ²³	11 percent
■ IHS/Tribal/Urban funds ²⁴	6 percent
- Facilities operated by federal and tribal governments were least likely to accept cash or self-payment (39 and 38 percent, respectively). Private for-profit and federal government-operated facilities were less likely to accept Medicare, Medicaid, or state-financed health insurance than were facilities operated by any other entity.
- Acceptance of Access to Recovery vouchers was reported in 34 states or jurisdictions. The proportion of facilities accepting Access to Recovery vouchers ranged from 3 percent in New Jersey to 80 percent in Idaho [Table 6.19b].²³
- Facilities operated by tribal governments were the most likely to accept ITU (IHS/Tribal/Urban) funds (79 percent).²⁴
- Use of a sliding fee scale was reported by 60 percent of all facilities, ranging from 19 percent of facilities operated by the federal government to 83 percent of facilities operated by local governments.
- Treatment at no charge for persons who cannot afford to pay was offered by 47 percent of all facilities, ranging from 20 percent of private for-profit facilities to 79 percent of facilities operated by tribal governments.

Work Activity Methods

Table 4.19. Facilities were asked to indicate what methods they used to accomplish their work.

- Ninety-six percent of all facilities used any electronic (either electronic only or both electronic and paper) resources to accomplish any of their work.
- One hundred five facilities (4 percent) used only paper resources to accomplish all of their work.
- Fifty-seven percent of all facilities used both electronic and paper resources to accomplish intake activity.
- Fifty-seven percent of all facilities used both electronic and paper resources to accomplish referral activity, while 23 percent used only paper resources.
- Thirty-nine percent of all facilities used only electronic resources to accomplish billing activity.
- Seventy-one percent of all facilities used any electronic resources (either electronic only or both electronic and paper) to accomplish health records activity.
- Seventeen percent of all facilities used only paper resources to accomplish health records activity.

Facility Funding

Table 4.20. Facilities were asked if they received federal, state, or local government funds or grants to support their substance abuse treatment programs.

- Overall, 55 percent of facilities reported receiving government funds to support substance abuse treatment programs. The proportions were highest in facilities operated by local or tribal governments (89 and 81 percent, respectively). Seventy-two percent of facilities operated by private non-profit organizations reported receiving public funds whereas 17 percent of facilities operated by private for-profit organizations reported receiving public funds.

Facilities Using Medication-assisted Opioid Therapy

Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs), are certified by SAMHSA to provide medication-assisted therapy in the treatment of opioid addiction. Currently, methadone and buprenorphine are the only opioid medications approved for the treatment of opioid addiction. Extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) is approved for opioid addiction relapse prevention. Only OTPs may use methadone for the treatment of opioid addiction. Facilities with DATA 2000 waiver physicians may prescribe buprenorphine.²⁵ Any authorized personnel (physicians, physician's assistant, etc.) may prescribe or administer extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®).

²⁵ Individual physicians can receive special authorization from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services that allows them to prescribe buprenorphine for the treatment of opioid addiction. These physicians may prescribe buprenorphine to patients in an office setting or to patients at substance abuse treatment facilities. Only clients who received buprenorphine through a facility affiliated with an authorized physician are included in this report; it does not include clients who received buprenorphine through an independent physician.

Table 4.21a.

- Of all 13,873 facilities, 10 percent (1,349 facilities) had OTPs, 25 percent (3,404 facilities) offered buprenorphine for medication-assisted opioid therapy, and 16 percent (2,274 facilities) offered extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) for medication-assisted opioid therapy.
- Methadone was provided at 95 percent of OTP facilities. Of the 1,349 facilities with OTPs, 39 percent (522 facilities) provided methadone only, and 56 percent (754 facilities) provided methadone as well as buprenorphine and/or extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®).
- Of the 3,404 facilities offering buprenorphine, 23 percent (779 facilities) were in facilities with OTPs. The majority (2,625 facilities or 77 percent) of facilities offering buprenorphine as a medication-assisted opioid therapy were in facilities other than OTPs.
- Among the 2,274 facilities offering extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®), 14 percent (315 facilities) were in facilities with OTPs, and 86 percent (1,959 facilities) were in facilities that were not OTPs.

Table 4.21b.

- Private for-profit facilities with OTPs were more likely than private non-profit facilities with OTPs to offer methadone only (61 vs. 33 percent). However, there were more private non-profit facilities with OTPs than private for-profit facilities with OTPs to offer methadone and extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) (90 vs. 6 percent) and buprenorphine only (77 vs. 9 percent).
- Of all facilities that offered buprenorphine, 87 percent were either private non-profit or private for-profit facilities (50 and 38 percent, respectively), 5 percent were operated by the federal government, and 3 percent were operated by the state government.
- Of all facilities that offered extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®), 85 percent were either private non-profit or private for-profit facilities (51 and 34 percent, respectively), 7 percent were operated by the federal government, and 2 percent were operated by the state government.

Table 4.22b.

- Most facilities with OTPs offered outpatient treatment (92 percent). Eighty-eight percent offered outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance or extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) treatment while 44 percent offered outpatient detoxification.
- Private for-profit organizations operated more than half (56 percent) of facilities with OTPs in 2015, and private non-profit organizations operated about one third of facilities with OTPs (35 percent).

Tables 4.1b and 4.21b. Private for-profit organizations operated 56 percent of OTPs, but only 34 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities.

Tables 4.16b and 4.23b. Facilities with OTPs were more likely than all facilities combined to be licensed, certified, or accredited by a state department of health (62 vs. 45 percent), the Joint Commission (27 vs. 18 percent), CARF (65 vs. 27 percent), or state substance abuse agencies (89 vs. 79 percent).

Counseling Services Offered by Facilities

- *Table 4.24.* Individual counseling (99 percent of all facilities) was the most frequent form of counseling reported. Next was group counseling (98 percent of all facilities), family counseling (95 percent of all facilities), and marital/couples counseling (93 percent of all facilities) was the least frequent form of counseling reported.

Facility Smoking Policy

- *Table 4.25.* Of the 13,603 facilities that responded to the question about smoking policies, 56 percent permitted smoking in designated outdoor areas whereas 34 percent of facilities did not permit smoking anywhere outside or within any building.

CHAPTER 5

CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter describes key characteristics of the 1,305,647 clients in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2015. *Clients in treatment* were defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential (non-hospital) clients receiving substance abuse treatment services on March 31, 2015, and 2) outpatient clients who were seen at the facility for a substance abuse treatment or detoxification service at least once during the month of March 2015, and who were still enrolled in treatment on March 31, 2015.

Facility Operation and Type of Care

Table 5.1c. Facilities were asked to designate the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility.

- The proportions of clients in treatment on March 31, 2015, by facility operation were:
 - Private non-profit organizations 51 percent
 - Private for-profit organizations 36 percent
 - Local, county, or community governments 5 percent
 - Federal government¹⁸ 4 percent
 - State governments 2 percent
 - Tribal governments 1 percent

Tables 5.1a-c. Facilities were asked how many clients in treatment on March 31, 2015, received specified subcategories of type of care within three broad categories.

On March 31, 2015, the proportions of clients receiving different types of care were:

- Outpatient treatment 89 percent
 - Regular outpatient treatment 46 percent
 - Outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance or Extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol[®]) treatment 30 percent
 - Intensive outpatient treatment 10 percent
 - Outpatient day treatment/partial hospitalization 2 percent
 - Outpatient detoxification 1 percent
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment 9 percent
 - Long-term treatment (more than 30 days) 5 percent
 - Short-term treatment (30 days or fewer) 3 percent
 - Detoxification 1 percent

- Hospital inpatient treatment 2 percent
 - Inpatient treatment 1 percent
 - Inpatient detoxification 1 percent
- *Table 5.1c.* The majority of clients in each of the three types of care were in private non-profit facilities (74 percent in residential [non-hospital] treatment, and 49 percent each in outpatient and hospital inpatient treatment). However, the majority of clients in outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance or extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) treatment maintenance (59 percent) were in facilities operated by private for-profit organizations.

Substance Abuse Problem and Diagnosed Co-occurring Mental Disorders

Table 5.2. Facilities were asked to estimate the proportions of clients in treatment on March 31, 2015, by substance abuse problem treated (alcohol abuse only, drug abuse only, or both alcohol and drug abuse).

- On March 31, 2015, 42 percent each of clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse or in treatment for drug abuse only, and 16 percent were in treatment for alcohol abuse only.
- By facility operation, the highest proportion of clients in treatment for abuse of both alcohol and drugs was in tribal government-operated facilities (52 percent). For abuse of drugs only, the highest proportion of clients was in private for-profit facilities (55 percent); for abuse of alcohol only, the highest proportion was in federal government-operated facilities (31 percent).

Clients under Age 18 in Treatment

Table 5.3. Facilities were asked how many clients in treatment on March 31, 2015, were under age 18.

- There were 72,977 clients under age 18 in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2015—6 percent of the total 1,305,647 clients in treatment on that date.
- Out of 72,977 clients under age 18, the majority (63,493 clients or 87 percent) were in outpatient treatment, while 7,807 clients (11 percent) were in residential (non-hospital) treatment and 1,677 clients (2 percent) were in hospital inpatient treatment.

Medication-assisted Opioid Therapy

Tables 5.4a-b. Facilities were asked how many clients in treatment on March 31, 2015, received medication-assisted opioid therapy (MAT) drugs for detoxification or maintenance purposes. MAT includes the use of methadone and buprenorphine for the treatment of opioid addiction or dependence, and the use of the extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) (injectable naltrexone) for relapse prevention in opioid addiction. Methadone is available only at OTP facilities that are certified by SAMHSA’s Center for Substance Abuse Treatment. Buprenorphine may be prescribed by physicians who have received DATA 2000 specific training and received a waiver to prescribe the

medication for treatment of opioid addiction; some of these physicians are affiliated with facilities²⁶ (either OTPs or other). All physicians or approved medical personnel can prescribe extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®).²⁷

- Of the total 1,305,647 clients in treatment, 378,791 (29 percent) received MAT in OTP facilities.
- There were 356,843 clients receiving methadone in OTP facilities.
 - Of the clients receiving methadone, 213,421 clients (60 percent) were provided treatment at private for-profit OTPs and 121,499 clients (34 percent) were provided treatment at private non-profit OTPs.
- There were 21,236 clients receiving buprenorphine in OTP facilities and 54,488 clients receiving buprenorphine in non-OTP facilities.
 - Of the clients receiving buprenorphine in OTPs, 11,016 clients (52 percent) were provided treatment at private for-profit facilities and 6,850 clients (32 percent) were provided treatment at private non-profit OTPs.
 - Of the clients receiving buprenorphine in non-OTP facilities, 25,270 clients (46 percent) were provided treatment at private for-profit facilities and 22,299 clients (41 percent) were provided treatment at private non-profit organizations.
- There were 712 clients receiving extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) in OTP facilities and 6,323 clients receiving extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) in non-OTP facilities.
 - Of the clients receiving extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) in OTPs, 411 clients (58 percent) were provided treatment at private non-profit facilities and 82 clients (12 percent) were provided treatment at private for-profit OTPs.
 - Of the clients receiving extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) in non-OTP facilities, 2,935 clients (46 percent) were provided treatment at private non-profit facilities and 2,634 clients (42 percent) were provided treatment at private for-profit organizations.

CHAPTER 6

STATE DATA

This chapter breaks down data presented in earlier chapters by state and jurisdiction. The Chapter 6 tables correspond to many of the tables presented in Chapters 4 and 5. Note that facilities operated by federal agencies are included in the states in which the facilities are located, although these facilities may have clients from other states.

Table 6.1 details the 2015 N-SSATS response rate.

Tables 6.2a to 6.3b present data on treatment facility and client trends for 2005 to 2015.

Tables 6.4a to 6.25 and 6.33 to 6.39 present facility data for 2015.

Tables 6.26a to 6.31 present client data for 2015.

Table 6.32 presents the number of clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and over, according to substance abuse problem treated, by state or jurisdiction.

Survey Response

Table 6.1. The overall response rate for the survey was 92 percent. Thirty-four states or jurisdictions had response rates that equaled or surpassed the overall rate.

Trends

Tables 6.2a-b. California and New York had the largest numbers of both facilities and clients in treatment in every year from 2005 through 2015. On March 31, 2015, California had 10 percent of all facilities and 9 percent of all clients, and New York had 6 percent of all facilities and 9 percent of all clients.

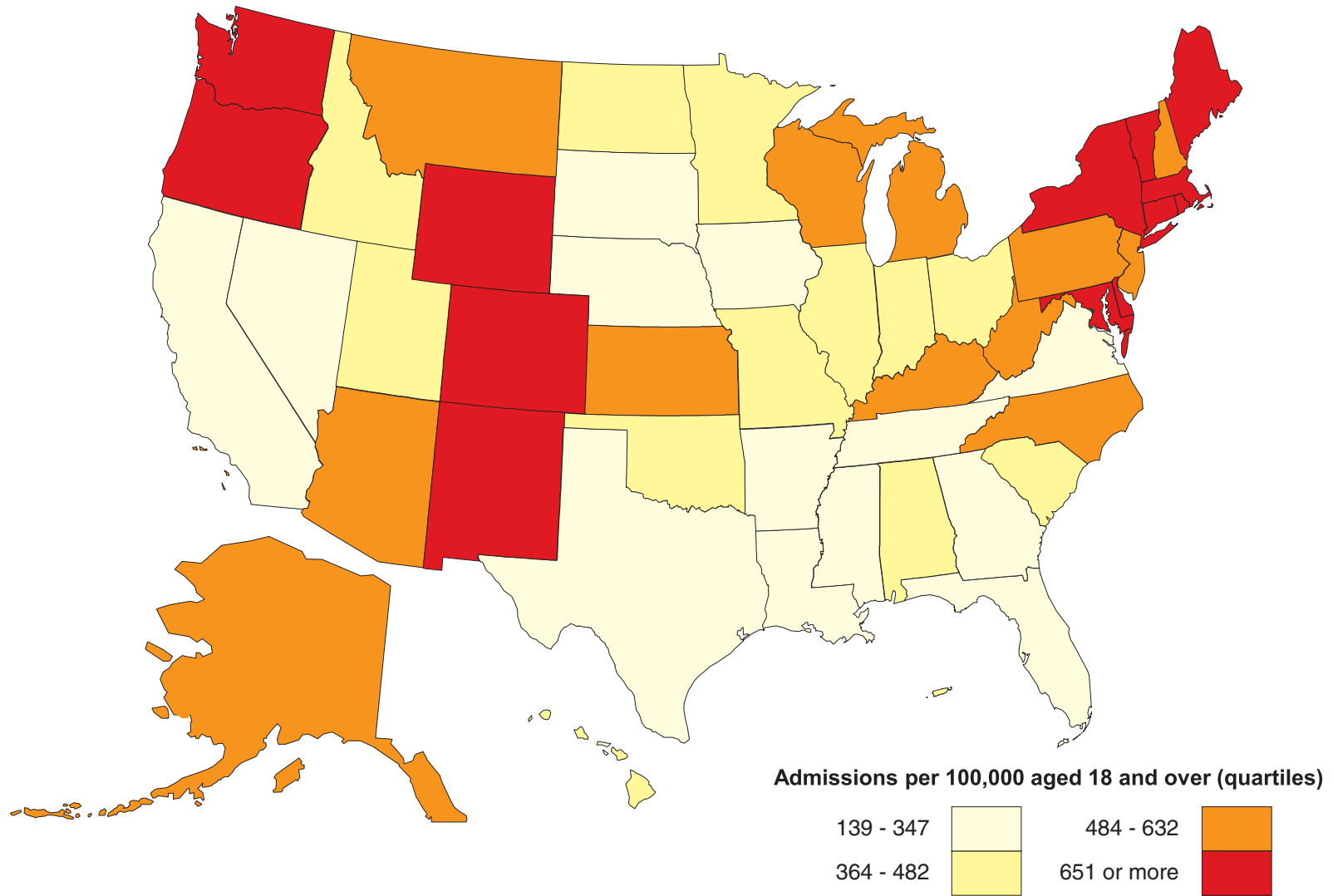
In terms of total numbers of facilities for every two years from 2005 through 2015, Illinois and Florida interchangeably ranked among third and fourth. Michigan and Texas ranked fifth and sixth, respectively, in 2005 and 2007. From 2009 to 2015, Pennsylvania and Michigan ranked fifth and sixth.

In terms of total numbers of clients for every two years from 2005 through 2015, Florida interchangeably ranked third or fourth.

Clients in Treatment per 100,000 Population Aged 18 and Older

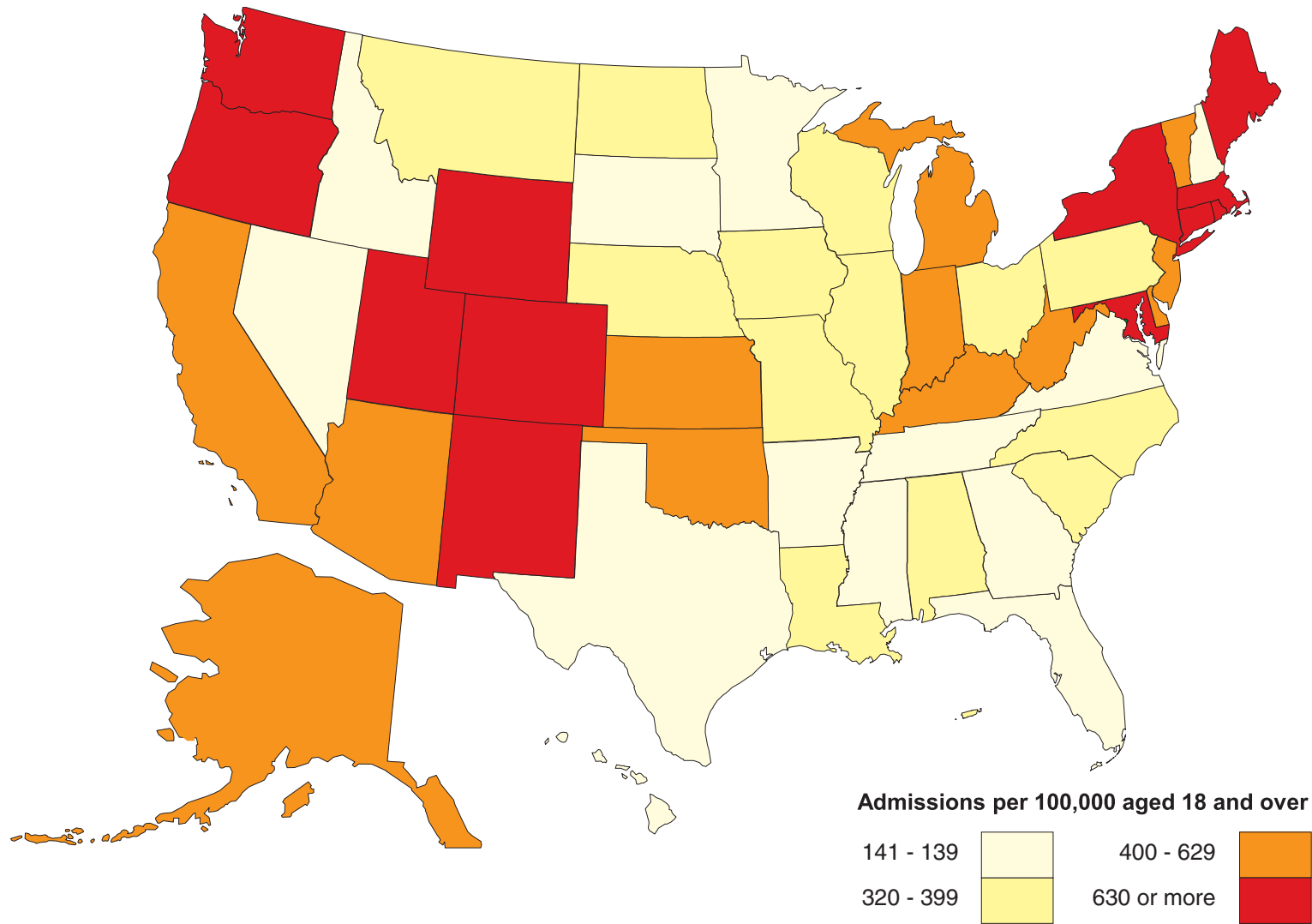
Table 6.32 and Figure 7-8. For the United States, there were 477 clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and over on March 31, 2015. The rate was highest for persons with drug abuse only (206 per 100,000 population), followed by both alcohol and drug abuse (195 per 100,000 population) and alcohol abuse only (76 per 100,000 population). *Figure 7* maps the rates of clients in treatment by state by quartile of rates in 2015—there are 13 states in each quartile. *Figure 8* maps the rates of clients in treatment by state by quartile of rates in 2005. It has been included in this section for comparison. Both figures include data for all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico.

APPENDIX A

N-SSATS BACKGROUND

Survey History

N-SSATS has evolved from national survey efforts begun in the 1970s by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) to measure the scope and use of drug abuse treatment services in the United States. The sixth of these surveys, conducted in 1976, introduced the data elements and format that have formed the core of subsequent surveys. These include organizational focus, service orientation, services available, clients in treatment by type of care, and hospital inpatient/residential capacity. The 1976 survey, called the National Drug Abuse Treatment Utilization Survey, was repeated in 1977 and 1978.

In 1979, the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) became a cosponsor of the survey, alcoholism treatment facilities were added, and the study was renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Utilization Survey. This survey was repeated in 1980 and 1982. In 1984, a one-page version called the National Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Program Inventory was used. In 1987, the full version of the survey was reinstated and renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Unit Survey (NDATUS). NDATUS was conducted annually from 1989 to 1993.

In 1992, with the creation of SAMHSA, responsibility for conducting the survey shifted to SAMHSA's Office of Applied Studies (now the Center for Behavioral Health Statistics and Quality). The survey was redesigned, and it was conducted annually as the Uniform Facility Data Set (UFDS) survey from 1995 to 1998. During these years, the survey was conducted by mail with telephone follow-up of non-respondents. The 1999 survey year was a transition year during which the survey was redesigned and an abbreviated telephone survey of treatment facilities was conducted. In 2000, a redesigned full mail survey was reinstated with telephone follow-up; it was renamed the National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS). The reference date for the annual survey had always been the end of September or beginning of October. After the 2000 survey, the reference date was changed to the end of March, and no survey was conducted during 2001.

In 2000, the use of an Internet-based questionnaire was tested; beginning in 2002, all facilities were offered the opportunity to respond via the Internet.

Beginning in 2013, the full N-SSATS questionnaire (with client counts) alternates with an alternate version of the questionnaire. The full questionnaire, fielded in odd-numbered years, collects data on programs and clients; in the alternate (even-numbered) years, an alternate N-SSATS questionnaire collects the program information needed to update the substance abuse section of the Behavioral Health Treatment Services Locator and collects information on other facility-related topics.

N-SSATS in the Context of the Behavioral Health Services Information System (BHSIS)

N-SSATS is one of the components of SAMHSA’s Behavioral Health Services Information System (BHSIS). The core of BHSIS is the Inventory of Behavioral Health Services (I-BHS), a continuously updated, comprehensive listing of all known substance abuse treatment facilities and mental health treatment facilities. The other substance abuse component of BHSIS is the Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS), a client-level database of admissions to and discharges from substance abuse treatment. Together, the components provide national- and state-level information on the numbers and characteristics of individuals admitted to alcohol and drug treatment programs and describe the facilities that deliver care to those individuals.

I-BHS is the list frame for N-SSATS. Facilities in I-BHS fall into two general categories and are distinguished by the relationship of the facility to its state substance abuse agency. These categories are described below.

Treatment facilities approved by state substance abuse agencies

The largest group of facilities (10,943 in 2015) includes facilities that are licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the state substance abuse agency to provide substance abuse treatment. State BHSIS representatives maintain this segment of I-BHS by reporting new facilities, closures, and address changes to SAMHSA. Some facilities are not licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the state agency. Some private for-profit facilities fall into this category. The approved facility group also includes programs operated by federal agencies—the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), the Department of Defense, the Indian Health Service—and Opioid Treatment Programs certified by SAMHSA. I-BHS records for federally-operated facilities are updated annually through lists provided by these agencies.

Treatment facilities not approved by state substance abuse agencies

This group of facilities (2,930 in 2015) represents the SAMHSA effort since the mid-1990s to make I-BHS as comprehensive as possible by including treatment facilities that state substance abuse agencies, for a variety of reasons, do not fund, license, or certify. Many of these facilities are private for-profit, small group practices, or hospital-based programs. Most of them are identified through periodic screening of alternative source databases. (See Special efforts to improve survey coverage below.) State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the state agency-approved list, if appropriate.

Survey Coverage

The use of I-BHS as the list frame for N-SSATS imposes certain constraints related to the unit of response and the scope of facilities included. In addition, the expansion of I-BHS in recent years to provide a more complete enumeration of substance abuse treatment facilities means that year- to-year comparisons of the numbers of facilities reporting to N-SSATS must be interpreted with caution.

Unit of response

N-SSATS is designed to collect data from each physical location where treatment services are provided. Accordingly, SAMHSA requests that state substance abuse agencies use the point of delivery of service (i.e., physical location) as the defining factor for a facility. Because of the

different state administrative systems, however, there are some inconsistencies in implementation. For example, in some states, multiple treatment programs (e.g., detoxification, residential, and outpatient) at the same address and under the same management have separate state licenses. These are treated as separate by the state substance abuse agency, and are given separate I-BHS ID numbers. In other states, multiple sites are included as a single entity under a parent or administrative unit. In many of these cases, individual sites can report services data in N-SSATS, but client data are available only at a higher administrative level. Beginning in 1995, efforts have been made to identify facility networks and to eliminate duplicate reporting by networks. For most facilities, reporting level remains consistent from year to year. However, beginning in 1998, an emphasis was placed on collecting minimum information from all physical locations, and this has resulted in an increase in the number of facilities.

Special efforts to improve survey coverage

The great majority of treatment facilities in I-BHS are administratively monitored by state substance abuse agencies. Therefore, the scope of facilities included in I-BHS is affected by differences in state systems of licensure, certification, accreditation, and the disbursement of public funds. For example, some state substance abuse agencies regulate private facilities and individual practitioners while others do not. In some states, hospital-based substance abuse treatment facilities are not licensed through the state substance abuse agency.

To address these differences, SAMHSA conducted a large-scale effort during 1995 and 1996 to identify substance abuse treatment facilities that, for a variety of reasons, were not on the inventory. About 15 source lists were examined, and facilities not on the inventory were contacted to ascertain whether or not they provided substance abuse treatment. As expected, this yielded a number of hospital-based and small private facilities that were not on the inventory. (These facilities were surveyed in 1995 and 1996, but they were not included in the published results of the survey until 1997.) Analysis of the results of this effort led to similar but more targeted updates before subsequent surveys. Potential new facilities are identified using data from the American Business Index, the annual American Hospital Association survey, and SAMHSA's National Mental Health Services Survey, the source lists that yielded the most new facilities in 1995 and 1996. Survey participants, who are asked to report all of the treatment facilities in their administrative networks, also identify additional facilities during the survey itself. All newly identified facilities are initially included as not approved by the state substance abuse agency. State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the state agency-approved list, if appropriate.

Expansion of survey coverage to include all sites within networks at which treatment was provided yielded a net increase of about 2,600 facilities between 1997 and 1998. These additions were not necessarily new facilities, but were facilities not previously included in the survey as separate sites. Between 2002 and 2015, the number of facilities eligible for inclusion in this report varied between 13,339 and 14,152. The total number is deceptive, however. There was significant turnover as facilities closed and others opened. (See Table 2.1.)

Data collection

Until 1996, state substance abuse agencies distributed and collected the facility survey forms. Beginning in 1996, data collection was centralized; since that time, SAMHSA has mailed survey forms

directly to and collected forms directly from the facilities and has conducted follow-up telephone interviews with the facility director or his/her designee. In 2000, SAMHSA introduced an on-line trial web version of the questionnaire for a few facilities in addition to the hard-copy questionnaire. The web version of the questionnaire was fully implemented in 2002. The proportion of facilities using the web survey to respond to N-SSATS has increased steadily since its full inception in 2002.

Non-response

Beginning in 1992, SAMHSA expanded efforts to obtain information from non-responding facilities. A representative sample of non-respondents was contacted and administered an abbreviated version of the survey instrument via telephone. In 1993 and later years, this effort was extended to all non-responding facilities. In 1997, a series of measures was introduced to enhance the survey response rate. These included advance notification and improved methods for updating address and contact information. Between 2004 and 2015, use of these methods and intensive telephone follow-up resulted in an annual follow-up rate (i.e., facilities in the sample either completed the survey or were determined to be closed or otherwise ineligible) of 92 to 96 percent. In 2015, the final response rate, counting eligible facilities, was 92.6 percent.

Exclusions

In 1997, facilities offering only DUI/DWI programs were excluded; these facilities were reinstated in 1998.

Facilities operated by the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) were excluded from the 1997 survey and subsequent surveys because SAMHSA conducted a separate survey of correctional facilities.²⁷ During that survey, it was discovered that jails, prisons, and other organizations treating incarcerated persons only were poorly enumerated on the inventory. Beginning in 1999, these facilities were identified during the survey and excluded from analyses and public-use data files.

I-BHS and N-SSATS are designed to include specialty substance abuse treatment facilities rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed on I-BHS and surveyed in N-SSATS only if the state substance abuse agency explicitly requests that they be included.

Beginning in 2000, halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment were included on the inventory and in N-SSATS so that they could be listed in the *National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Programs* and on the Treatment Facility Locator (<http://findtreatment.samhsa.gov>). These facilities are excluded from analyses and public-use data files.

Changes in Survey Content

Table A.1 shows the major content areas for the survey from 1997 to 2015. Since 1992, SAMHSA has made adjustments each year to the survey design, both to minimize non-response and to include areas of emerging interest. For example, questions on the number of clients in treatment receiving specific medication-assisted opioid therapies have changed over the years: Levo-alpha-acetylmethadol (LAAM) was replaced by buprenorphine in 2004 and extended-release injectable naltrexone

(Vivitrol®) was added in 2013. Questions about clinical/therapeutic methods, standard practices, and Access to Recovery grants were added in 2007. Questions about facility smoking policy were added in 2011; questions about outpatient facility operating capacity and extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) as a pharmacotherapy were added in 2012; and questions about work activity and means to accomplish them (as well as the extended-release injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol®) client count question mentioned above) were added in 2013.

There have also been changes within content areas. For example, in response to concerns about over-reporting of programs or groups for specific client types, the survey question was revised in 2003 to distinguish between those facilities that accepted specific client types and those facilities that offered specially designed programs or groups for that client type. As a result, the number and proportion of facilities offering programs or groups for each of the specified client types decreased. Surveys from 2003 and later are believed to more accurately represent the number and proportions of facilities providing programs or groups for the specified client types. In addition, over time more categories have been added to the specific client types (e.g., persons who have experienced trauma, active duty military, members of military families, and veterans in 2012 and young adults, persons who have experienced sexual abuse, and persons who have experienced intimate partner violence, domestic violence in 2013). Because of the increase in client types, the question was split in 2013. The portion asking if specific client types were served was limited to adolescents, adult women, and adult men. In addition, programs or groups were described as “specifically tailored.” In 2014, the first part of the question was revised again to collect another level of detail (i.e., the age range of males and females served, if any). The client types of adolescents, adult women, and adult men were added back to the second part of the question.

Starting in 2013, the full questionnaire alternates with an alternate version of the questionnaire. The alternate questionnaire, first introduced in 2014, collects the facility, program, and services information that are needed to update the Behavioral Health Treatment Services Locator. It omits Section B, which includes the client counts. Other changes to the 2014 questionnaire:

- The primary focus question, which was dropped from the 2013 questionnaire, was reinstated.
- The question asking if a facility operates an Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) was revised. The informational bullets describing OTPs were reworded and the response categories are more explicit about whether the facility operates an OTP and whether or not methadone and/or buprenorphine are used.

APPENDIX C

ITEM RESPONSE AND IMPUTATION FOR 2015 N-SSATS

This Appendix contains Table C.1, a list of item response rates for questions from the N-SSATS 2015 questionnaire. Item non-response was minimized through careful editing and extensive follow-up.

The item response rate for the 2015 N-SSATS averaged 98 percent across 269 separate response categories.

Item non-response was 10 percent or more for only 7 of 269 separate response categories.

When available, client values and admissions values from up to five previous surveys were used to impute the missing counts. If historical data were not available, the average client value, stratified by state and facility operation, was used to impute the missing client counts. If a facility were unique in its state and facility operation category, values were imputed using average values for the state only. Missing client counts were imputed for each type of service (i.e., hospital inpatient detoxification, hospital inpatient treatment, residential [non-hospital] detoxification, etc.) and summed to the larger service type totals (total hospital inpatient clients, total residential [non-hospital] clients, and total outpatient clients), and finally to total clients. For 2015, 49 imputations were done involving 31 facilities.

Several facilities report client counts for themselves (parent) as well as for other facilities (children) within their family of substance abuse treatment facilities. Instead of reporting only the aggregate client count, we attempted to disaggregate and redistribute or unroll the parent facilities' total client count wherever possible to reflect the number of clients served by each facility within the family of facilities. Our procedure was to first calculate the mean client count per type of care received (hospital inpatient, outpatient, and residential) for the facilities in N-SSATS that reported only for themselves. We then used these means to determine how to distribute the clients reported by a parent facility to its children facilities based on the type of facilities and the types of clients indicated by the family of facilities. For hospital inpatients 26 facilities and 1,712 clients were unrolled. For outpatients 869 facilities and 76,776 clients were unrolled. For residential clients, 183 facilities and 5,819 clients were unrolled.
