REGULATIONS FOR LENT 2021

"The season of Lent is penitential in nature and during Lent penance should be not only internal and individual, but also external and social (Sacrosanctum Concilium, No. 5, 109). Pastors are obliged to avoid scheduling activities in the parishes which in any way could possibly detract from the external and social penance required by Lent." -Diocesan Statute No. 41

Ash Wednesday, February 17, 2021 marks the beginning of Lent. The following fast and abstinence regulations are observed:

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, April 2, 2021, are days of fast and abstinence. (One full meal, two partial meals that do not equal the one full meal)Fridays during Lent are days of abstinence. (No Meat)

All Catholics who have reached their 14th birthday are to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and on all Fridays during Lent. Children, though not obliged, may follow this rule also, provided their parents or guardians approve, and their health is not at risk.

All Catholics over 18 years of age to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to the obligation of fasting. Those bound by this rule may take only one full meal and two smaller meals unless dispensed or excused. Those not bound by this rule may certainly practice fasting. Children should act in obedience to their parents or guardians, and both children and adults over 60 should consider their particular health needs.

Persevere in your faithfulness to Christ and his holy Catholic Church. Livestream Mass is provided for your reflection, and is of some comfort to those at home during this dilemma.
- We at Nativity follow a system for scheduling who is going to be in the church for each Mass based on the seating capacity of our church. We are blessed that so many parishioners want to be here, but seating is currently limited. If you wish to return to Mass regularly, or for a particular Mass, please simply email or call the rectory.
- PLEASE NOTE: AS PARISHIONERS ARE VACCINATED, THEY MAY WISH TO RETURN TO CHURCH. WE ARE EXCITED TO WELCOME YOU HOME!!!! PLEASE REMEMBER TO CALL THE RECTORY TO LET US KNOW OF YOUR RETURN, AND WHAT MASS YOU EXPECT TO ATTEND.

Take your temperature before coming and stay home if it is elevated please follow all protocols with regard to masks, distancing, etc. upon leaving, please exit the driveway return to your vehicle directly, to avoid crowding.

+ ★ HOLY LENT BEGINS THIS WEEK -

Do not let the pandemic and current protocols stop you from the faithful observation of Lent. With safety and obedience to health recommendations, do what you can to make this a season of renewal and reconciliation. We will pass from this world to the next with or without Covid-19, but our souls are eternal...let us safeguard our spiritual health as well.

ASH WEDNESDAY, February 17, 2021 marks the beginning of Lent. Masses and services will be open to the public following COVID-19 safety protocols, including wearing face masks and physical distancing. The Mass will also be broadcast live on our Parish Facebook page. Due to the pandemic, Ash Wednesday will look different this year but the significance of the day will not change. Ashes can be distributed to the Catholic faithful as long as there is no direct contact.

From the two possible options for the distribution of ashes on February 17, we at Nativity of Our Lord will use the following method: Ashes will be sprinkled on top of the head. In much of the world (outside of English speaking countries), the normal way of distributing ashes is to sprinkle ashes on top of the head, with no contact, rather than imposing them on the forehead. Although this sprinkling may seem odd, consider where ashes usually fall each year, and think about the possible consequences of wiping ashes from your eye lashes, nose, or mask...

During distribution, both the minister and the recipient must be wearing masks. For this distribution method, the priest will say the prayer for blessing the ashes. He will sprinkle the ashes with holy water, without saying anything. Then he will address all those present and only once say the call to repentance ("Repent, and believe in the Gospel" or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return"). The minister will then take the ashes and sprinkle them on the head of each individual without saying anything.

Although not a Holy Day of Obligation, Ash Wednesday is traditionally a day of great importance to the faithful as they enter the Lenten season. The faithful are reminded that receiving ashes is not required. Each of us should recognize that our own internal disposition and intention to repent is the importance of Ash Wednesday and that the ashes are an external sign of that internal reality. Individuals who cannot receive ashes can still enter into Lent with a repentant heart.

A TIME OF SHARING - Operation Rice Bowl During Lent we are called upon to share our blessings with the poor and less fortunate in our midst and in the world. Set aside some of your blessings to help others--be it through the Church or other charitable agencies and organizations in our area. The customary RICE BOWL appeal is being made throughout our country during Lent. Rice Bowl containers and other information may be found on the tables at the doors of our churches. Local Food Pantries Don't forget to support local food pantries and care agencies during Lent if you are able. There are many in need who could use non-perishables, and your donation of food or monetary gifts can help those who would otherwise go without.

A TIME OF PRAYER and REFLECTION - DAILY REFLECTION BOOKS Prayer and reflection are essential for a successful season of Lent. You are encouraged to make the most of personal prayer time at home or even during lunch or breaks at work. Daily Books are available in church and at the Rectory. Donations are accepted to help with expenses.

DAILY SCHEDULE OF SERVICES AND OPPORTUNITIES

This schedule is provided for each household, each parishioner and visitor to our parish to review and take seriously. Lent is the Church's great retreat – and MORE is expected from each of us – our homes should be different, our habits should be adjusted. Beyond the bare minimum, our lives should reflect, internally and externally, the solemnity of the season – and reflection on our lives over all, our own Baptism – and how we are living up to our promises to reject Satan, sin, and live as people who truly believe in the words of the Faith we profess each week. Let us walk this road with Mary the Mother of God, in our prayer and good works. Let us walk this road with Christ, by taking up our cross daily, and following in His footsteps.

DAILY MASS: Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. No reservations needed at this time, masks are required. Mass will continue to be live streamed for your reflection and prayer.

Evening Prayer and Benediction

According to the desire of the Second Vatican Council, "Pastors of souls should see to it that the chief hours, especially Vespers (Evening Prayer), are celebrated in common in church on Sundays and the more solemn feasts. And the laity, too, are encouraged to recite the divine office, either with the priests, or among themselves, or even individually" (Sacrosanctum Concilium, 100). With that in mind, the Deacons of the Greater Pittston Deanery will continue gathering for evening prayer on the Sundays of Lent this year. Evening Prayer will take place at Our Lady of the Eucharist at 5:00pm. No reservations required, and vespers will be livestreamed on Facebook.
