Dear Nativity Family,

Happy, Happy, Happy New Year and welcome to the season of Epiphany! While the weather outside might be cold, our faith is always on fire for the Lord here at Nativity and we get to ring in this New Year as a community of Christ here in Northborough welcoming in this season with renewed joy and hope. As we all try to keep our New Year's resolutions of saving money, losing weight, slowing down to enjoy the important things in life, and as we look forward to this time of new beginnings, some things don't change...God's promises to us. So, as we welcome in 2017 I will be preaching a six-part sermon series titled "New Year, Enduring Promises" in which we will go through the scripture and rediscover six promises God has made to us in His written word.

Week 1 which began on January 8th was *God's Promise of New Life*, and we examined how through the waters of baptism God promises us new life in Him.

Week 2 *God's Promise of Faithfulness* to us even when we don't always keep up our end of the relationship.

Week 5 *God's Promise of Guidance* and how we live in response to the gift of grace in our lives.

Week 6 God's Promise of Freedom and how choose to respond to this awesome gift.

In addition to this sermon series, I will begin leading Credo, a course that is all about what we believe as Christians and is an especially great introduction to what we believe as Christians in the Anglican tradition. This course covers,

COMMUNITY MEALS by Rachel Manley & Cathy Reilly



Community Meals take place every Wednesday evening at Trinity Church in Northboro. Each church denomination in town, Congregation B'Nai Shalom, Westboro and civic organizations (such as the Rotary Club, Northboro Junior Women's Club, and the Lyons Club) take a turn to host the meal each week. It is the responsibility of the host organization to provide all the food, set up and serve the meal, and then to clean up after it. This is truly a wonderful event and it is offered to the community each week at no cost!

Many regular dinner guests, who can include the elderly and people in need of a hot meal, come to eat dinner every Wednesday night. They get to know the spe-

cialty dinner of each host organization and look forward to the menu varieties each group will offer. It is such a rewarding experience when it is our turn to host and we see many of the same people. Nativity's specialty meal is American Chop Suey (Goulash) of many varieties and recipies, Italian bread, tossed salad, and lots of finger desserts!! We can usually serve anywhere from 45-70 people at a community meal. About a week before Nativity's scheduled date to host the meal, Rachel Manley will post volunteer sign ups through the SignUpGenius website. Volunteers sign up to help with buying and making the food items needed and/or to also help with serving the meal. There have been SO MANY dedicated people who have made Community meals a regular event to help with. Most are Nativity members, but some are also neighbors and friends outside of our church. This has also been a great way to gently introduce non-church goers to Nativity and show them the fellowship and blessings we share together.

The evening meal begins with offering a prayer of thanks. Our servers are then lined up with spoons in hand and ready to serve the varieties of American Chop Suey. We often need to help people carry their plates and cups to their table and walk around to offer more to eat or drink. It's always a fun night while we serve others and enjoy each other's company.

THE CASE FOR QUIET by Lisa Phelps



How are we to stand before the Lord? With loud explosions of wonder and praise? Or in humble awe and stillness? We see both in scripture:

-Isaiah's vision of the seraphim flying above God crying, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty; the whole earth is filled with his glory," so loudly that the doorposts and the thresholds shook. Isaiah 6:1-4

-When the night sky over the fields near Bethlehem was filled with a great company of angels singing "Glory to God in the highest and on earth, peace to men on whom his favor rests." Luke 2:13-14

-Volume was not just for heavenly beings. As Jesus entered Jerusalem to celebrate his final earthly Pesach, a crowd lining the road praised God, shouting "Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord!" so loudly that Jesus was asked to admonish them for the uproar. He refused, stating that even the rocks would cry out. Luke 19:37-40

Throughout scripture we are encouraged to sing, even shout our joy to the Lord, in a way that is unambiguously loud.

Yet God also calls us to silence. High volume is for our expressions <u>to him</u>. Silence allows us to receive his expressions <u>to us</u>. Jesus frequently sought solitude and quiet during his ministry, as he withdrew from excited crowds, and the needy and frustrating disciples. Following his baptism, he did not begin his ministry before spending weeks in isolation and fasting, communing with his father. There were many such occasions leading up to his final withdrawal to the garden in Gethsemane before his death.

In silence is the humility to put aside our own priorities to allow God an opening. In silence, we can gradually lose the inner "noise" and hear his voice. In silence, we create a sanctuary in which we can meet our True Selves. In silence, we can be transformed to his image.

We emerge from silence refreshed and inspired to do his will.

God invites us into silence so that we can attend to all that he has to tell us.

Listen to him in silence.
