Jack Hadge accepts post in New Jersey

Niles Village Manager turns in resignation

Niles Village Manager Jack Hadge has submitted his resignation to Mayor Nick Blase to accept an \$85,000 per year post in a New Jersey community just outside New York City. The resignation becomes effective February 3.

In his December 20 resignation letter addressed to Mayor Nicholas Blase Hadge wrote, "I part with a sincere sense of personal loss for a government and community that I value so highly. There is no question in my mind

that the Niles Municipal Government is one of the finest in the State of Illinois."

Hadge has been the Village Administrator since October of 1983. When he was first hired, Blase heralded his arrival as bringing "an infusion of new ideas" to Village government. In an October 3, 1983 interview, Hadge told The Bugle he hoped to achieve "a streamlining and more efficient operation of the Village of Niles." At the time

Niles village manager, Jack Hadge, will be moving up and out next month. He'll become manager in Teaneck, New Jersey, a 40,000 populated suburb in the New York City metropolitan area.

The "up" side of the story is Jack will be moving up from his Niles salary of \$72,000 to his new pay of \$85,000.

Jack took a little umbrage when we asked if he gave Niles a chance to meet his new salary. He said that isn't the way it's done in the manager business. He told me you don't bargain for pay like ballplayers do. He emphasized the high degree of professionalism there is in the manager field and let us know playing one community against another was not the way it's done among his fellow professionals.

Jack waxed and oozed buckets of praise for Niles and its public officials and its residents. He said he "loved every minute" he lived and worked in Niles and heaped high praise on our community which he described as a cohesive and stable community.

Jack originally came from North Carolina, following Horace Greeley west, getting two Bachelors and a Masters degree from the University of California in Berkeley. He got a second Masters at the University of Hartford in Connecticut.

Controversy over PR complex development

The Park Ridge citizens association has submitted a formal request to the Park Ridge Planning and Zoning Commission to rescind the variances granted to a developer to construct an office complex on the site of the Methodist Publishing House along Northwest Highway. In a letter, dated Dec. 19, 1988, Dr. James Moses, spokesman for the association, demanded that the zoning commission reverse the variances and recommend that the city council withdraw its permission for the development.

Moses pointed out the recently announced "Des Plaines Office

Park" which is planned by the same developer for the corner of Dempster and Rand, a short distance from the proposed Park Ridge campus. "All the studies previously submitted by the developer, traffic and flooding studies specifically, are now invalid because they did not take into account the impact of an even larger complex across the street," said Moses.

Niles man collapses drug overdose

A 43 year old Niles man collapsed in his kitchen December 20 in the presence of his mother. Unable to revive her son, the woman summoned Niles paramedics to the scene who transported him to Lutheran General Hospital. The mother stated the son had taken 6 seconds shortly before collapsing. The man, who was severely depressed, had visited his doctor that afternoon. The subject has a history of drug related incidents according to the Niles police report.

Social security and financial planning

More than a few times, people have been counting on bigger Social Security checks when they retire. But when the time comes for those people to go to a Social Security office to apply for retirement benefits, they find to their dismay that their checks are much smaller than they thought they would be.

This happens because there are many people who still think Social Security will replace all of the earnings they have before retirement. They don't realize that Social Security was never designed to replace all the earnings people lose when they stop working. Social Security is intended to replace only a percentage of the earnings.

But now the opportunity to plan for the future on a realistic basis offered to people of all ages by the Social Security Administration. Workers will have enough time to increase their retirement income since they will have a better idea of the amount of benefits they will receive.

All people have to do is call and request an application for a personal earnings and benefit estimate statement. (Form SSA-7004PC-6/88). The form requires workers to provide their age of expected retirement, last year's and this year's earnings, and average yearly earnings to the time of retirement.

With these facts, Social Security will adjust these earnings based on expected average growth to the time of retirement. The estimates of benefits will be in today's dollars.

The statement will show estimated monthly benefits for retirement at 62, at 65, and at 70. Information will also be provided on survivors and disability benefits.

After completing the form and mailing it back to Social Security, the applicant will receive a statement with a year-by-year breakdown on earnings after 1950 that are subject to the Social Security tax, in addition to benefit estimates.

It is expected that 6 million workers will apply for the new statement this year. Remember, all you have to do is ask for the Form SSA-7004 "Request for Earnings and Benefit Estimates Statement." Call 1-800-234-SSA 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.



BLOOD PRESSURE SCREENING

"Salt" is what is thought of when the word "sodium" is spoken. But table salt and sodium are not the same thing. Table salt is a chemical combination of 40 percent sodium and 60 percent chlorine. It is the sodium in salt that should be reduced on a "low salt" or "low sodium" diet. People with high blood pressure and certain types of heart disease may be advised by their doctors to reduce the amount of sodium in their diets. Sodium is a necessary mineral for maintaining good health. About 1100-1300 milligrams (mg.) of sodium daily is considered a safe and adequate amount. But most people eat up to 7,000 mg a day. The Flickinger Senior Center invites Morton Grove residents for free blood pressure screenings from 9-10 a.m. on Tuesday, January 10.

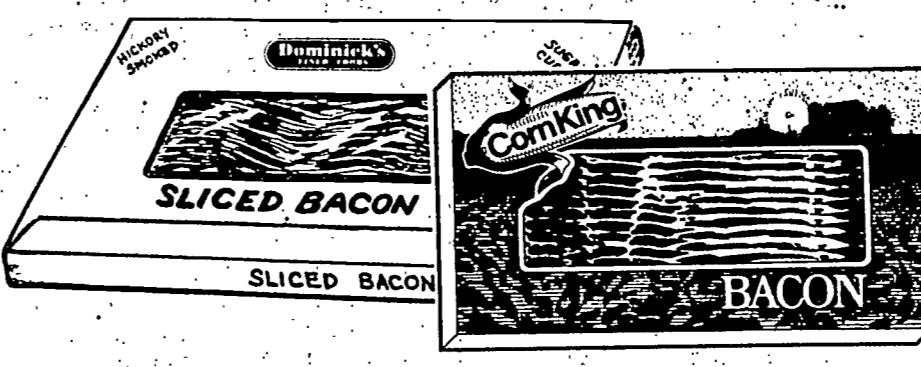

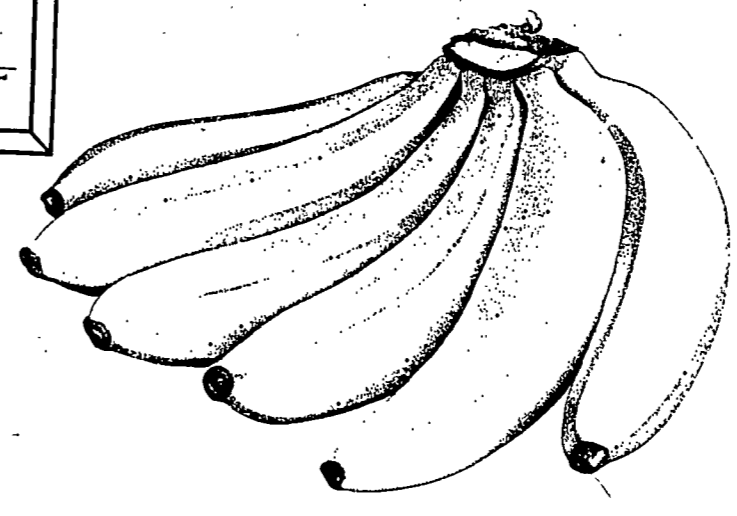

body heat. Nonperishable foods include instant coffee or tea, dry soup and bouillon cubes. Bandages, aspirin and essential prescription medicines should be included, as well as a compass, small flashlight with extra batteries, ski caps and gloves or mittens.

If you are stranded for more than a few hours, you can make drinking water by melting snow in the coffee can. Run string or wire through two small holes near the top of the can and hang it from the rear-view mirror. Melt the snow by lighting a small wide-base candle and placing it in a small pie tin on the dash. Take several books of matches and do not forget spoons and insulated cups for the soup, coffee or tea.

1989 Social Security earnings base to increase

The annual earnings base—the maximum amount of earnings that counts for Social Security—will increase to \$48,000 for 1989, up from \$45,000, the 1988 base, Thomas A. Curin, Social Security manager in Des Plaines said recently.

The increase is based on the change in average earnings levels from 1987 to 1988. The 1989 Social Security rate will be 7.51 percent, same as the rate for 1988.

Other Social Security figures are scheduled to increase in 1989 as well, Curin said. The annual exempt amount used in the annual earnings test will increase. The annual earnings test is the measure used to determine whether a person who works will receive benefits during the year. The 1989 annual exempt amount for people 65 or over will be \$5,880 up from 1988 amount of \$5,400. The 1989 exempt amount for people under 65 all of 1989 will be \$6,480, up from the 1988 amount of \$6,120.

A person whose earnings do not exceed the annual exempt amount will receive all benefits due for the year. A person's benefit is reduced \$1 for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount. The annual earnings test does not apply once a person reaches 70.

The amount of annual earnings needed to earn a quarter of coverage—the measure of Social Security work credit—will be \$500 for 1989, up from \$470 for 1988. In 1989, a worker will earn 4 quarters of coverage if his or her annual earnings are \$2,000 or more.

And the honoree didn't necessarily have to come to America through Ellis Island—this wall of honor is for all immigrants.

"Remember, it took a lot of guts for our forefathers to leave their home and come to a foreign land," said Eugenia Krzyzanski, president of the Polish Falcons of America, District II. "It wasn't easy once they got here—a foreign language, foreign customs, foreign culture. They were a proud people and as their descendants we should be just as proud of them."

For a \$100 tax-deductible donation the name of the person you're honoring will be permanently inscribed on the Immigrant Wall of Honor. An official certificate, suitable for framing, will be sent to you with the honoree's name and origin of country.

Lesser donations will be used for the maintenance of the
