Commissioners:

As required by Nevada Administrative Code 281A.180(2), I hereby submit for your consideration this annual report of the fiscal, legislative, regulatory and other business undertaken by and on behalf of the Commission in the past fiscal year.

The Commission's success in the 2013 Legislature has rekindled hope for the agency's ability to meet its mandate reasonably. This legislative session, with the assistance and leadership of Senator David Parks, Senate Bill 228 passed both houses of the Legislature on the final day of the legislative session, bringing numerous much needed changes to NRS Chapter 281A. Additionally, Governor Sandoval and the Legislature funded several enhancements to the agency budget, importantly approving the creation of a sixth staff position - - Associate Counsel. Commissioner advocacy with Executive and Legislative decision makers, and continued involvement in problem solving and policy-making, enhanced the workings of the Commission and its staff, and therefore its service to the people of Nevada.

Our case volume has been reduced, yet the material is increasingly complex, and we have been able to forestall many potential challenges to the public trust through our outreach and education efforts. A wholesale overhaul of our performance indicators and data collection is expected to prove beneficial in the years to come. New alliances with public employees, professional associations and more and more public entities have expanded the Commission's "approachability factor", and it is more likely than ever to fulfill its informal preference to "teach rather than catch" public servants in our State. While these efforts may have increased the volume of First-Party requests for opinion, the number of public requests the agency receives has receded. This trend is encouraging.

As you review the information in this Annual Report, I hope you can feel as proud as I am about the path the Commission has taken in the past year and the direction in which the agency is headed. Comments and questions about the content of this report are invited and appreciated.

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Fiscal Matters

Commission Budget:

The Nevada Commission on Ethics' (the "Commission's") initial legislatively approved budget for fiscal year 2012-13 was \$662,327, but that sum was reduced by over \$50,000 due to a continuing decline in the overall State economy. In addition to the budget cuts, the Governor ordered all State employees to undertake mandatory unpaid furloughs and forced salary cuts, as well as a freeze on salary adjustments.

The Commission's budget for the past few years has not increased dramatically since 2007. However, looking to the future and implementing the Department of Administration's Priorities and Performance Based Budgeting (PPBB), the agency was able to reinstate funding for 2013-2015 at its 2012-13 level and to obtain a number of items for special consideration to help the agency meet its statutory mandate and serve the State more effectively in the coming biennium. See Appendix C - Commission on Ethics PPBB Report and Appendix D - Legislatively Approved Biennial Budget for Commission on Ethics.

For a number of years, the Commission has operated with a staff of 5 full-time employees. Fortunately, the 2013 Legislature approved a new staff position to streamline the Third-Party Request for Opinion (RFO) caseload and help to ensure due process. In addition to handling Third-Party RFOs, the new position will add greatly to the Commission's ability to catch up with digesting Commission opinions, processing information requests, and performing outreach and education services for the over 100,000 persons subject to Nevada's Ethics in Government Law.

The Commission derives its funding from the State General Fund and from financial participation by Nevada's Local Governments (cities and counties). The number of requests for opinion the Commission received in the prior two fiscal years forms the basis for the proportional distribution. For the 2010-12 biennium, the distribution of requests and funding was 24% State and 76% Local Governments. Going forward into the 2013-15 biennium, the agency's financial support will be derived 31% from the State General Fund and 69% from Local Government sources, based upon the information in the chart that follows.

A great deal of the work of the Commission on Ethics happens in the Commission office - - outside of the monthly public meetings of the Commission itself. In fact, the Commission and its staff act upon fewer than half of the requests for the Commission's opinion the agency receives. The remainder are rejected, either due to the body's lack of jurisdiction over the conduct complained of or based on a lack of evidence with the filing.

The Commission receives many Third-Party RFOs alleging conduct that falls outside of the Commission's jurisdiction (jurisdiction is limited to NRS Chapter 281A) or failing to include a minimal level of credible evidence to support the allegations therein. In those cases, the Commission responds with a letter explaining the basis for its rejection, and, when evidence is lacking, invites the requester to re-submit the RFO with additional support.

Over a 6-year period, the Commission received an annual average of 92 RFOs, and accepted jurisdiction over an average of 42 matters. Of those, the Commission held a confidential hearing regarding the past, present or contemplated conduct of approximately 20 public officers and public employees, while an additional average of 22 RFOs filed by members of the public were investigated, heard by an Investigatory Panel and adjudicated.

¹ The reduction in the volume of First-Party RFOs in FY13 may be attributable to the Commission having published a large number of opinions in FY12, providing access to its application of the law and guidance regarding conduct to public officers and employees. Another explanation may be a fall-off in the Commission's outreach programs due to budget restrictions on travel in FY12.

Sanctions Imposed:

In FY 2013, the Commission imposed \$1,500 in two civil penalties. Pursuant to State law, the Commission must deposit the entirety of any financial sanctions it collects into the State General Fund. The Commission deposited three sanctions totaling \$12,000 into the General Fund this fiscal year from civil penalties imposed in FY 2013 and in previous years. Despite several written reminders, the Commission did not receive payment of a \$1000 sanction imposed in February 2012 on former Lyon County Manager Dennis Stark, and, in early 2013, forwarded that debt to the State Controller for collection.

² Of the 20 RFOs filed with the Commission in FY 2013, 8 are under current investigations and have not yet progressed to Investigatory Panel review.

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Legislative Matters

The Commission submitted a comprehensive reform package to the Governor's Office for consideration as a Bill Draft Request for the 2013 Legislative Session. Unfortunately, with constraints on the number of measures available for that office to request, the Commission's bill was not among those endorsed by the Governor. However, as he had in 2011, Senator David Parks introduced the measure on behalf of the Commission in 2013. The measure was titled SB 228. Senator Parks and Commission Counsel worked closely with the Executive Director as SB 228 wound its way through the Senate and Assembly committees and floor sessions, and as it survived various challenges and amendments. Near the end of the legislative session, Senator Parks chaired a conference committee between the houses, and, on the final day of the legislative session at approximately 8:00 p.m., both houses accepted the Conference Committee report. In its third revision, the measure was passed.

S.B. 228 made the following substantive changes:

- Revised the definition of a "pecuniary interest" and required a significant personal or pecuniary interest for various types of ethical conflicts, so that a *de minimus* or insignificant personal or pecuniary interest does not create a conflict of interest, or require disclosure or abstention;
- Revised the definition of a "public officer" to include a president of a state university, college or community college, a superintendent of a county school district, and a county manager or city manager;
- Enacted provisions for computing periods of time;
- Authorized the Commission to apply for and accept grants, contributions, services and money to carry out the Ethics Law;
- Required the Commission, when disposing of a request for an opinion by stipulation, agreed settlement or consent order, to treat comparable situations in a comparable manner and ensure that the disposition of a request for an opinion bears a reasonable relationship to the severity of the violation or alleged violation;
- Required the Commission to consider various aggravating and mitigating factors
 when determining the willfulness of a violation of the Ethics Law and the amount of
 any civil penalty to be imposed, and required the Commission to treat comparable
 situations in a comparable manner and to ensure that the disposition of the matter
 bears a reasonable relationship to the severity of the violation;

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- Made various changes concerning the operation of the Commission and the duties of the Executive Director and the Commission Counsel;
- Directed public officers and employees who request the issuance of a subpoena in Commission proceedings to serve the subpoena and to pay the costs of such service;
- Changed provisions relating to conflicts of interests for public officers and employees, disclosures and abstentions, the rendering of opinions, conduct of Commission investigations and the duties of specialized and local ethics committees;
- Prohibited a member of a local legislative body from representing or counseling a
 private person for compensation before another local agency whose territorial
 jurisdiction includes any part of the same county in which the member serves, and
 allowed the Commission to offer relief from strict application of the prohibition on a
 showing of certain conditions;
- With certain exceptions, prohibited a public officer or employee from bidding on or entering into a contract between a governmental agency and any business entity in which the public officer or employee has a significant pecuniary interest, and allowed the Commission to provide relief from strict application of the prohibition if certain conditions are met:
- Moved, revised and removed certain provisions that regulate when a member of a local legislative body may sell goods or services to his or her local agency as the sole source of supply within the area served by the local agency, unless certain conditions are met, and allowed relief from strict application of the prohibition;
- Revised the "safe harbor" provisions such that a violation is not willful if: (1) the
 public officer or employee relied in good faith upon the advice of the legal counsel
 retained by his or her public body, agency or employer; and (2) his or her act or
 failure to act was not contrary to a prior published opinion issued by the
 Commission;
- Imposed requirements relating to informing, educating and instructing public officers and employees of the statutory ethical standards; and
- Made several other changes.

Governor Sandoval signed the bill on June 13, 2013, making certain provisions effective on that date. Other provisions become effective on January 1, 2014. The full text of SB 228 appears as Appendix A, and an "informal codification" showing the portion of the bill as it changes NRS 281A appears as Appendix B to this report.

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During the legislative session, various other measures were introduced and heard proposing changes to NRS Chapter 281A; however, none of those measures survived the process to become law.

Commission staff will publish a revised Manual for Public Officers and Public Employees in the next month, and hopes it will enlighten the over 104,000 public officers and employees in the State of the current status of the Ethics in Government Law as it relates to their conduct. With the able and generous distribution assistance of the Nevada League of Cities and Municipalities (NV League), Nevada Association of Counties (NACO), POOL PACT - the Nevada insurance pool, the Legislative Counsel Bureau, the Office of the Governor and the State Department of Human Resource Management, the Commission hopes that each of the public officers and public employees in the State will be offered access to the resources and information provided by the Commission on Ethics.

Regulatory Matters

The Commission proposed no changes to its regulations in 2013; however, modifications are likely to be proposed to the Nevada Administrative Code to guide implementation of the 2013 statutory changes to NRS Chapter 281A.

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Administrative Matters

Website:

The Commission's Investigator, Michael E. Lawrence, has designed and maintains the Commission's website in addition to his investigation duties. This powerful Internet resource allows the Commission's opinions and other information to be available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and 365 days a year. The website (www.ethics.nv.gov) offers information about the Commission and staff, allows the public to read and search Nevada's Ethics in Government Laws, the Commission's regulations, Commission opinions and other public materials such as forms, instructions and data regarding matters currently in process. Even Nevada residents without computers can gain access to the Commission's website via their local public libraries.

The website receives approximately 600 visitors each month, and only 76% of those visitors are in Nevada. The other main visitors come from California, New York and Washington D.C., though in 2012-13 each of the 50 states and over 40 countries hosted at least one visitor to the Commission's website. Of the Nevada visitors, 37% are in Las Vegas, 25% in Reno, 18% are in Carson City and the remainder reside throughout the State.

The website's visitors spent the most time viewing Commission Opinions and pending RFOs. They also read the Commissioner biographies and downloaded forms and instructions. Of course, many visitors checked monthly agendas and minutes posted on the website.

Nearly 25% of visitors typed the web address into a browser to get to the Commission's website directly, while 60% came through search engines such as Google or Yahoo and 15% came from referral sites such as the Nevada Secretary of State business portal, the State of Nevada's main website or Clark County's government website.

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Outreach and Education:

In FY 2013, the Executive Director provided more than 33 training sessions throughout Nevada, touching over 1000 public officers, public employees and members of the public. Sixteen presentations were made spanning jurisdictions such as the Reno City Council, the South Truckee Meadows General Improvement District, Elko School Board and Humboldt County Council. The Commission has long participated in the training to Boards and Commissions offered annually by the Nevada Attorney General. Training also was provided at conferences such as Nevada Association of Counties and Nevada League of Cities and Municipalities POWER conference, POOL PACT, the Las Vegas Association of Internal Auditors, Nevada Association of Legal Secretaries, the Nevada Fiscal Officers Association and the National Attorneys General Training and Research Institute. The Commission continues to offer a portion of the coursework for the Certified Public Manager and Certified public Officer training programs in Nevada.

One of the more recent attempts at outreach and education has involved the training of State employees. In FY 2013, the Commission's training program reached nearly 500 employees throughout the State via a partnership with the Department of Employment, Training and Rehabilitation titled "The Ethics of Excellence." The Executive Director and the DETR Training Manager offered 17 sessions with approximately 25 participants each in Las Vegas, Carson City, Winnemucca, Elko and Ely. DETR Director Frank Woodbeck has made the class mandatory for all DETR employees at every level of employment, including both top-level managers and telephone call center personnel. This program has been extremely well received and is expected to continue into FY 2014 until all employees have participated. The Department contemplates repeating the training every four to five years.

Other than the Gaming Control Board and Department of Taxation's efforts to train their investigators in the Ethics in Government Law, no State agency has reached out in this manner to inform its employees of their obligations under NRS 281A.

Offices:

The Commission operates its office in Carson City, though its investigator works from a non-public workspace in Las Vegas. No other offices are contemplated or budgeted at this time.

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Documents Filed:

Pursuant to NRS 281A.500, public officers filed 423 Acknowledgment of Ethical Standards forms with the Commission in calendar year 2012. The Commission received 667 in 2011 and 725 in 2010. Most public officers must file these forms at the beginning of a term of office, so the number of forms filed from year to year does not indicate a rise or fall in overall compliance.

NRS 281A.410 requires certain public officers to disclose their paid representation or counseling of a private person before an Executive branch State agency. The Commission received 12 filings of Agency Representation Disclosures in calendar year 2012. In 2010, 14 such disclosures were filed, and in 2011, the Commission received 11.

Litigation:

The Commission was involved as a party in four cases this fiscal year, as follows:

Carrigan v. Comm'n on Ethics

This case was remanded to Nevada Supreme Court by the Supreme Court of the United States, and the Commission has been awaiting a decision from the Nevada Supreme Court since participating in oral argument on March 5, 2012 in Carson City.

Estate of Charles L. Williams v. Comm'n on Ethics

On November 20, 2012, the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, in Case No. 11-16952, affirmed the United States District Court, D. Nev., grant of a Motion to Dismiss the Commission and other State defendants from this litigation. The time for the Plaintiffs to appeal the decision passed on July 7, 2013. Despite the deadline, on July 8, 2013, the Plaintiff filed a Petition for Writ of Certiorari and Extraordinary Relief with the Supreme Court of the United States.

Stark v. Comm'n on Ethics

Dennis Stark petitioned for judicial review of the Commission's Opinion No. 10-48C - a Third-Party RFO. On May 9, 2013, the First Judicial District Court of the State of Nevada in and for Carson City denied Stark's Petition for Judicial Review and affirmed the final decision of the Commission. The time for Plaintiff to appeal the decision passed on June 18, 2013, and nothing is known to have been filed.

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Tobler v. Comm'n on Ethics

On May 15, 2012, Roger Tobler petitioned the Eighth Judicial District Court of the State of Nevada in and for Clark County for judicial review of the Commission's Opinion No. 11-51A - - a First-Party RFO. On May 16, 2012, Tobler requested a stay of the Commission's pending proceedings concerning Third-Party RFO No. 11-76C. The Court denied Tobler's Motion to Stay on October 4, 2012, and after significant resources were expended on legal motions and memoranda, Tobler and the Commission entered a settlement resulting in a voluntary dismissal of the Judicial Review petition on November 15, 2012.

At the time of this Annual Report, the only litigation pending is the <u>Carrigan</u> matter, which awaits resolution and/or further action upon receipt of an order from the Nevada Supreme Court.

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APPENDIX A

Full text of Senate Bill 228 of the 2013 Legislative Session, Chapter 551

Senate Bill No. 228–Senator Parks (by request) CHAPTER.551.

AN ACT relating to public servants; revising provisions relating to public officers and employees; revising provisions relating to ethics in government and the enforcement of such provisions; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

This bill makes various changes to provisions relating to public officers and employees and the administration of the Nevada Ethics in Government Law by the Commission on Ethics. (Chapter 281A of NRS)

Sections 18-24 and 30-32.5 of this bill enact and revise various definitions in the Ethics Law. **Section 19** revises and makes applicable throughout the Ethics Law the existing definition of "commitment in a private capacity to the interests of others" in NRS 281A.420.

Section 23 defines "pecuniary interest" for the Ethics Law, and **sections 40.3**, **41 and 42.5** of this bill require proof of a significant personal or pecuniary interest in defining various types of ethical conflicts, so that a de minimis or insignificant personal or pecuniary interest does not create a conflict of interest, require disqualification or abstention, or provide just or sufficient cause for an ethics investigation or violation. (NRS 281A.400, 281A.420, 281A.430)

Sections 24.5 and 32.3 of this bill establish that a president of a state university, college or community college, a superintendent of a county school district, and a county manager or city manager are designated as public officers for the purposes of the Ethics Law. (NRS 281A.160)

Section 25 of this bill enacts provisions for computing periods of time prescribed or allowed under the Ethics Law. **Section 27** of this bill authorizes the Commission to apply for and accept grants, contributions, services and money for the purposes of carrying out the Ethics Law.

Section 27.3 of this bill requires the Commission, when disposing of a request for an opinion by stipulation, agreed settlement or consent order, to treat comparable situations in a comparable manner and ensure that the disposition of a request for an opinion bears a reasonable relationship to the severity of the violation or alleged violation of the Ethics Law. **Section 27.5** of this bill requires the Commission to consider various aggravating and mitigating factors when determining whether a violation of the Ethics Law is a willful violation and, if so, the amount of any civil penalty to be imposed for such a willful violation of the Ethics Law. **Section 27.5** also requires the Commission, when applying these factors, to treat comparable situations in a comparable manner and to ensure that the disposition of the matter bears a reasonable relationship to the severity of the violation.

Sections 33-37 of this bill make various changes concerning the operation of the Commission and the duties of the Executive Director of the Commission and the Commission Counsel. Those changes include: (1) adjusting the eligibility requirements for certain members of the Commission; (2) requiring the Chair of the Commission to designate a qualified person to perform the duties of the Executive Director if the Executive Director is disqualified or unable to act on a particular matter; (3) revising the administration of the assessments paid by cities and counties in semiannual installments to the Commission; and (4) authorizing the Commission to adopt procedural regulations that are necessary and proper to carry

out the Ethics Law. (NRS 281A.200, 281A.240, 281A.260, 281A.270, 281A.290) **Section 38** of this bill directs public officers and employees who request the issuance of a subpoena on their behalf in ethics proceedings to serve the subpoena in the manner provided in the Nevada Rules of Civil Procedure and to pay the costs of such service. (NRS 281A.300)

Sections 40.3-44 of this bill make various changes to provisions in the Ethics Law, including provisions relating to conflicts of interests for public officers and employees, disclosures and abstentions, the rendering of opinions and conduct of investigations by the Commission and the duties of specialized and local ethics committees. (NRS 281A.400, 281A.410, 281A.420, 281A.430, 281A.440, 281A.470)

Section 40.5 prohibits a member of a local legislative body from representing or counseling a private person for compensation before another local agency whose territorial jurisdiction includes any part of the same county in which the member serves. However, **section 40.5** allows the Commission to provide the member with relief from strict application of the prohibition if certain conditions are met. (NRS 281A.410)

With certain exceptions, the Ethics Law prohibits a public officer or employee from bidding on or entering into a contract between a governmental agency and any business entity in which the public officer or employee has a significant pecuniary interest. **Section 42.5** allows the Commission to provide a public officer or employee with relief from strict application of the prohibition if certain conditions are met. (NRS 281A.430)

Sections 42.5 and 62 of this bill move, revise and remove certain provisions of the Ethics Law that regulate when a member of a local legislative body may sell goods or services to his or her local agency as the sole source of supply within the area served by the local agency. (NRS 281A.430, 281A.530) **Section 42.5** prohibits such a member from selling goods or services to his or her local agency unless certain conditions are met, but **section 42.5** also allows the Commission to provide the member with relief from strict application of the prohibition. **Section 62** repeals an existing provision of the Ethics Law regulating such "sole source" transactions because under this bill, "sole source" transactions are regulated by **section 42.5**. Sections 16.3, 16.5 and 57-61 of this bill make conforming changes to other provisions of existing law that restrict various public officers and employees from being personally interested in or benefiting from a contract with a governmental agency. (NRS 245.075, 268.384, 269.071, 269.072, 281.221, 281.230, 332.800) **Section 45** of this bill revises the "safe harbor" provision of the Ethics Law to provide that a public officer or employee does not commit a willful violation if: (1) the public officer or employee relied in good faith upon the advice of the legal counsel retained by his or her public body, agency or employer; and (2) his or her act or failure to act was not contrary to a prior published opinion issued by the Commission. (NRS 281A.480)

Section 46 of this bill provides new requirements relating to informing, educating and instructing public officers and employees concerning the statutory ethical standards and the duties of public officers and employees under the Ethics Law. (NRS 281A.500)

A full- or part-time faculty member in the Nevada System of Higher Education may bid on or enter into a contract with a governmental agency, or may benefit financially or otherwise from a contract between a governmental agency and a private entity, if the contract complies with the policies established by the Board of Regents of the University of Nevada pursuant to NRS 396.255.
- 4. A state officer, other than an officer described in subsection 2 or 3, may bid on or enter into a contract with a governmental agency if the contracting process is controlled by rules of open competitive bidding, the sources of supply are limited, the officer has not taken part in developing the contract plans or specifications and the officer will not be personally involved in opening, considering or accepting offers.
- 5. Any contract made in violation of this section may be declared void at the instance of the State or of any other person interested in the contract except an officer prohibited from making or being interested in the contract.

- (c) Officers and employees of quasi-municipal corporations.

Upon the request of the Executive Director or the public officer or [public] employee who is the subject of a request for an opinion, the Chair or, in the Chair's absence, the Vice Chair, may issue a subpoena to compel the attendance of a witness and the production of books and papers. A public officer or employee who requests the issuance of a subpoena pursuant to this subsection must serve the subpoena in the manner provided in the Nevada Rules of Civil Procedure for service of subpoenas in a civil action and must pay the costs of such service.

- 3. A public officer or employee shall not participate as an agent of government in the negotiation or execution of a contract between the government and any business entity in which the public officer or employee has a significant pecuniary interest.
- 4. A public officer or employee shall not accept any salary, retainer, augmentation, expense allowance or other compensation from any private source for the performance of the public officer's or employee's duties as a public officer or employee.
- 5. If a public officer or employee acquires, through the public officer's or employee's public duties or relationships, any information which by law or practice is not at the time available to people generally, the public officer or employee shall not use the information to further [the] a significant pecuniary [interests] interest of the public officer or employee or any other person or business entity.
- 6. A public officer or employee shall not suppress any governmental report or other *official* document because it might tend to affect unfavorably [the public officer's or employee's] *a significant* pecuniary [interests.] *interest of the public officer or employee.*
- 7. Except for State Legislators who are subject to the restrictions set forth in subsection 8, a public officer or employee shall not use governmental time, property, equipment or other facility to benefit [the public officer's or employee's] a significant personal or [financial] pecuniary interest [.] of the public officer or employee. This subsection does not prohibit:
- (a) A limited use of governmental property, equipment or other facility for personal purposes if:
- (1) The public officer **or employee** who is responsible for and has authority to authorize the use of such property, equipment or other facility has established a policy allowing the use or the use is necessary as a result of emergency circumstances;
- (2) The use does not interfere with the performance of the public officer's or employee's public duties;
- (3) The cost or value related to the use is nominal; and
- (4) The use does not create the appearance of impropriety;
- (b) The use of mailing lists, computer data or other information lawfully obtained from a governmental agency which is available to members of the general public for nongovernmental purposes; or
- (c) The use of telephones or other means of communication if there is not a special charge for that use.
- ☐ If a governmental agency incurs a cost as a result of a use that is authorized pursuant to this subsection or would ordinarily charge a member of the general public for the use, the public officer or employee shall promptly reimburse the cost or pay the charge to the governmental agency.
- 8. A State Legislator shall not:

- (a) Use governmental time, property, equipment or other facility for a nongovernmental purpose or for the private benefit of the State Legislator or any other person. This paragraph does not prohibit:
- (1) A limited use of state property and resources for personal purposes if:
- (I) The use does not interfere with the performance of the State Legislator's public duties;
- (II) The cost or value related to the use is nominal; and
- (III) The use does not create the appearance of impropriety;
- (2) The use of mailing lists, computer data or other information lawfully obtained from a governmental agency which is available to members of the general public for nongovernmental purposes; or
- (3) The use of telephones or other means of communication if there is not a special charge for that use.
- (b) Require or authorize a legislative employee, while on duty, to perform personal services or assist in a private activity, except:
- (1) In unusual and infrequent situations where the employee's service is reasonably necessary to permit the State Legislator or legislative employee to perform that person's official duties; or
- (2) Where such service has otherwise been established as legislative policy.
- 9. A public officer or employee shall not attempt to benefit [the public officer's or employee's] a significant personal or [financial] pecuniary interest of the public officer or employee through the influence of a subordinate.
- 10. A public officer or employee shall not seek other employment or contracts through the use of the public officer's or employee's official position.
- **Sec. 40.5.** NRS 281A.410 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 281A.410 In addition to the requirements of the code of ethical standards [:] *and the other provisions of this chapter:*
- 1. If a public officer or employee serves in a state agency of the Executive Department or an agency of any county, city or other political subdivision, the public officer or employee:
- (a) Shall not accept compensation from any private person to represent or counsel the private person on any issue pending before the agency in which that public officer or employee serves, if the agency makes decisions; and
- (b) If the public officer or employee leaves the service of the agency, shall not, for 1 year after leaving the service of the agency, represent or counsel for compensation a private person upon any issue which was under consideration by the agency during the public officer's or employee's service. As used in this paragraph, "issue" includes a case, proceeding, application, contract or determination, but does not include the proposal or consideration of legislative measures or administrative regulations.

[A] Except as otherwise provided in subsection 3, a State Legislator or a member of a local legislative body, or a public officer or employee whose public service requires less than half of his or her time, may represent or counsel a private person before an agency in which he or she does not serve. [Any other]
- 3. A member of a local legislative body shall not represent or counsel a private person for compensation before another local agency if the territorial jurisdiction of the other local agency includes any part of the county in which the member serves. The Commission may relieve the member from the strict application of the provisions of this subsection if:
- (a) The member requests an opinion from the Commission pursuant to subsection 1 of NRS 281A.440; and
- (b) The Commission determines that such relief is not contrary to:
- (1) The best interests of the public;
- (2) The continued ethical integrity of each local agency affected by the matter; and
- (3) The provisions of this chapter.
- **4. Unless permitted by this section, a** public officer or employee shall not represent or counsel a private person for compensation before any state agency of the Executive or Legislative Department.
- [3.] 5. Not later than January 15 of each year, *if* any State Legislator, *member of a local legislative body* or other public officer [who] *permitted by this section* has, within the preceding year, represented or counseled a private person for compensation before a state agency of the Executive Department, *he or she* shall disclose for each such representation or counseling during the previous calendar year:
- (a) The name of the client;
- (b) The nature of the representation; and
- (c) The name of the state agency.
- [4.] 6. The disclosure required by subsection [3] 5 must be made in writing and filed with the Commission on a form prescribed by the Commission. For the purposes of this subsection, the disclosure is timely filed if, on or before the last day for filing, the disclosure is filed in one of the following ways:
- (a) Delivered in person to the principal office of the Commission in Carson City.
- (b) Mailed to the Commission by first-class mail, or other class of mail that is at least as expeditious, postage prepaid. Filing by mail is complete upon timely depositing the disclosure with the United States Postal Service.
- (c) Dispatched to a third-party commercial carrier for delivery to the Commission within 3 calendar days. Filing by third-party commercial carrier is complete upon timely depositing the disclosure with the third-party commercial carrier.
- (d) Transmitted to the Commission by facsimile machine or other electronic means authorized by the Commission. Filing by

facsimile machine or other electronic means is complete upon receipt of the transmission by the Commission.

- **Sec. 41.** NRS 281A.420 is hereby amended to read as follows: 281A.420 1. Except as otherwise provided in this section, a public officer or employee shall not approve, disapprove, vote, abstain from voting or otherwise act upon a matter:
- (a) Regarding which the public officer or employee has accepted a gift or loan;
- (b) In which the public officer or employee has a **significant** pecuniary interest; or
- (c) Which would reasonably be affected by the public officer's or employee's commitment in a private capacity to the [interest of others,] interests of another person,
- □ without disclosing [sufficient] information concerning the gift [,] or loan, significant pecuniary interest or commitment in a private capacity to the interests of the person that is sufficient to inform the public of the potential effect of the action or abstention upon the person who provided the gift or loan, upon the public officer's or employee's **significant** pecuniary interest, or upon the [persons] **person** to whom the public officer or employee has a commitment in a private capacity. Such a disclosure must be made at the time the matter is considered. If the public officer or employee is a member of a body which makes decisions, the public officer or employee shall make the disclosure in public to the chair and other members of the body. If the public officer or employee is not a member of such a body and holds an appointive office, the public officer or employee shall make the disclosure to the supervisory head of the public officer's or employee's organization or, if the public officer holds an elective office, to the general public in the area from which the public officer is elected.
- 2. The provisions of subsection 1 do not require a public officer to disclose:
- (a) Any campaign contributions that the public officer reported in a timely manner pursuant to NRS 294A.120 or 294A.125; or
- (b) Any contributions to a legal defense fund that the public officer reported in a timely manner pursuant to NRS 294A.286.
- 3. Except as otherwise provided in this section, in addition to the requirements of subsection 1, a public officer shall not vote upon or advocate the passage or failure of, but may otherwise participate in the consideration of, a matter with respect to which the independence of judgment of a reasonable person in the public officer's situation would be materially affected by:
- (a) The public officer's acceptance of a gift or loan;
- (b) The public officer's **significant** pecuniary interest; or
- (c) The public officer's commitment in a private capacity to the interests of others.] **another person.**
- 4. In interpreting and applying the provisions of subsection 3:

- (a) It must be presumed that the independence of judgment of a reasonable person in the public officer's situation would not be materially affected by the public officer's acceptance of a gift or *loan, significant* pecuniary interest or [the public officer's] commitment in a private capacity to the interests of [others] another **person** where the resulting benefit or detriment accruing to the public officer, or if the public officer has a commitment in a private capacity to the interests of others, another person, accruing to the other [persons,] **person**, is not greater than that accruing to any other member of [the] any general business, profession, occupation or group that is affected by the matter. The presumption set forth in this paragraph does not affect the applicability of the requirements set forth in subsection 1 relating to the disclosure of the acceptance of a gift or loan, significant pecuniary interest or commitment in a private capacity to the interests of others. another person. (b) The Commission must give appropriate weight and proper deference to the public policy of this State which favors the right of a public officer to perform the duties for which the public officer was elected or appointed and to vote or otherwise act upon a matter, provided the public officer has properly disclosed the public officer's acceptance of a gift or loan, [the public officer's] **significant** pecuniary interest or [the public officer's] commitment in a private capacity to the interests of [others] another person in the manner required by subsection 1. Because abstention by a public officer disrupts the normal course of representative government and deprives the public and the public officer's constituents of a voice in governmental affairs, the provisions of this section are intended to require abstention only in clear cases where the independence of judgment of a reasonable person in the public officer's situation would be materially affected by the public officer's acceptance of a gift or loan, [the public officer's] significant pecuniary interest or [the public officer's] commitment in a private capacity to the interests of others. another person.
- 5. Except as otherwise provided in NRS 241.0355, if a public officer declares to the body or committee in which the vote is to be taken that the public officer will abstain from voting because of the requirements of this section, the necessary quorum to act upon and the number of votes necessary to act upon the matter, as fixed by any statute, ordinance or rule, is reduced as though the member abstaining were not a member of the body or committee.
- 6. The provisions of this section do not, under any circumstances:
- (a) Prohibit a member of a local legislative body from requesting or introducing a legislative measure; or
- (b) Require a member of a local legislative body to take any particular action before or while requesting or introducing a legislative measure.
- 7. The provisions of this section do not, under any circumstances, apply to State Legislators or allow the Commission to exercise jurisdiction or authority over State Legislators. The

responsibility of a State Legislator to make disclosures concerning gifts, loans, interests or commitments and the responsibility of a State Legislator to abstain from voting upon or advocating the passage or failure of a matter are governed by the Standing Rules of the Legislative Department of State Government which are adopted, administered and enforced exclusively by the appropriate bodies of the Legislative Department of State Government pursuant to Section 6 of Article 4 of the Nevada Constitution.

- (a) "Commitment in a private capacity to the interests of others" means a commitment to a person:
- (1) Who is a member of the public officer's or employee's household:
- (2) Who is related to the public officer or employee by blood, adoption or marriage within the third degree of consanguinity or affinity;
- (3) Who employs the public officer or employee or a member of the public officer's or employee's household;
- (4) With whom the public officer or employee has a substantial and continuing business relationship; or
- (5) Any other commitment or relationship that is substantially similar to a commitment or relationship described in subparagraphs (1) to (4), inclusive, of this paragraph.
- (b) "Public], "public officer" and "public employee" do not include a State Legislator.

281A.430 1. Except as otherwise provided in this section and NRS [281A.530] **218A.970** and 332.800, a public officer or employee shall not bid on or enter into a contract between [a governmental] **an** agency and any business entity in which the public officer or employee has a significant pecuniary interest.

- 2. A member of any board, commission or similar body who is engaged in the profession, occupation or business regulated by such board, commission or body may, in the ordinary course of his or her business, bid on or enter into a contract with [any governmental] an agency, except the board, commission or body on which he or she is a member, if the member has not taken part in developing the contract plans or specifications and the member will not be personally involved in opening, considering or accepting offers.
- 3. A full- or part-time faculty member or employee of the Nevada System of Higher Education may bid on or enter into a contract with [a governmental] an agency, or may benefit financially or otherwise from a contract between [a governmental] an agency and a private entity, if the contract complies with the policies established by the Board of Regents of the University of Nevada pursuant to NRS 396.255.
- 4. [A] Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, 3 or 5, a public officer or employee [, other than a public officer or employee

described in subsection 2 or 3,] may bid on or enter into a contract with [a governmental] **an** agency if:

- (a) The contracting process is controlled by the rules of open competitive bidding or the rules of open competitive bidding are not employed as a result of the applicability of NRS 332.112 or 332.148;
- (b) The sources of supply are limited;
- (c) The public officer or employee has not taken part in developing the contract plans or specifications; and
- (d) The public officer or employee will not be personally involved in opening, considering or accepting offers.
- ☐ If a public officer who is authorized to bid on or enter into a contract with [a governmental] an agency pursuant to this subsection is a member of the governing body of the agency, the public officer, pursuant to the requirements of NRS 281A.420, shall disclose the public officer's interest in the contract and shall not vote on or advocate the approval of the contract.
- 5. A member of a local legislative body shall not, either individually or through any business entity in which the member has a significant pecuniary interest, sell goods or services to the local agency governed by his or her local legislative body unless:
- (a) The member, or the business entity in which the member has a significant pecuniary interest, offers the sole source of supply of the goods or services within the territorial jurisdiction of the local agency governed by his or her local legislative body;
- (b) The local legislative body includes in the public notice and agenda for the meeting at which it will consider the purchase of such goods or services a clear and conspicuous statement that it is considering purchasing such goods or services from one of its members, or from a business entity in which the member has a significant pecuniary interest;
- (c) At the meeting, the member discloses his or her significant pecuniary interest in the purchase of such goods or services and does not vote upon or advocate the approval of the matter pursuant to the requirements of NRS 281A.420; and
- (d) The local legislative body approves the purchase of such goods or services in accordance with all other applicable provisions of law.

Sec. 43. NRS 281A.440 is hereby amended to read as follows: 281A.440 1. The Commission shall render an opinion

interpreting the statutory ethical standards and apply the standards to a given set of facts and circumstances within 45 days after receiving a request, on a form prescribed by the Commission, from a public officer or employee who is seeking guidance on questions which directly relate to the propriety of the requester's own past, present or future conduct as [an] *a public* officer or employee, unless the public officer or employee waives the time limit. The public officer or employee may also request the Commission to hold a public hearing regarding the requested opinion. If a requested opinion relates to the propriety of the requester's own present or future conduct, the opinion of the Commission is:

- (a) Binding upon the requester as to the requester's future conduct; and
- (b) Final and subject to judicial review pursuant to NRS 233B.130, except that a proceeding regarding this review must be held in closed court without admittance of persons other than those necessary to the proceeding, unless this right to confidential proceedings is waived by the requester.
- 2. The Commission may render an opinion interpreting the statutory ethical standards and apply the standards to a given set of facts and circumstances:
- (a) Upon request from a specialized or local ethics committee.
- (b) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, upon request from a person, if the requester submits:
- (1) The request on a form prescribed by the Commission; and
- (2) All related evidence deemed necessary by the Executive Director and the investigatory panel to make a determination of whether there is just and sufficient cause to render an opinion in the matter.
- (c) Upon the Commission's own motion regarding the propriety of conduct by a public officer or employee. The Commission shall not initiate proceedings pursuant to this paragraph based solely upon an anonymous complaint.
- \Box The Commission shall not render an opinion interpreting the statutory ethical standards or apply those standards to a given set of facts and circumstances if the request is submitted by a person who is incarcerated in a correctional facility in this State.
- 3. Upon receipt of a request for an opinion by the Commission or upon the motion of the Commission pursuant to subsection 2, the Executive Director shall investigate the facts and circumstances relating to the request to determine whether there is just and sufficient cause for the Commission to render an opinion in the matter. The Executive Director shall notify the public officer or employee who is the subject of the request and provide the public officer or employee an opportunity to submit to the Executive Director a response to the allegations against the public officer or employee within 30 days after the date on which the public officer or employee received the notice of the request. The purpose of the response is to provide the Executive Director with any information

relevant to the request which the public officer or employee believes may assist the Executive Director and the investigatory panel in conducting the investigation. The public officer or employee is not required in the response or in any proceeding before the investigatory panel to assert, claim or raise any objection or defense, in law or fact, to the allegations against the public officer or employee and no objection or defense, in law or fact, is waived, abandoned or barred by the failure to assert, claim or raise it in the response or in any proceeding before the investigatory panel. 4. The Executive Director shall complete the investigation and present a written recommendation relating to just and sufficient cause, including, without limitation, the specific evidence or **reasons that support the recommendation,** to the investigatory panel within 70 days after the receipt of or the motion of the Commission for the request, unless the public officer or employee waives this time limit. If, after the investigation, the Executive Director determines that there is just and sufficient cause for the Commission to render an opinion in the matter, the Executive Director shall state such a recommendation in writing, including, without limitation, the specific evidence that supports the Executive Director's recommendation. If, after the investigation, the Executive Director determines that there is not just and sufficient cause for the Commission to render an opinion in the matter, the Executive Director shall state such a recommendation in writing, including, without limitation, the specific reasons for the Executive Director's recommendation.

The investigatory panel shall not determine that there is just and sufficient cause for the Commission to render an opinion in the matter unless the Executive Director has provided the public officer or employee an opportunity to respond to the allegations against the public officer or employee as required by subsection 3. The investigatory panel shall cause a record of its proceedings in each matter to be kept. [, and such a record must remain confidential until the investigatory panel determines whether there is just and sufficient cause for the Commission to render an opinion in the matter.

- (a) Establish a code of ethical standards suitable for the particular ethical problems encountered in its sphere of activity. The standards may not be less restrictive than the statutory ethical standards.
- (b) Render an opinion upon the request of any public officer or employee of its own organization or level seeking an interpretation of its ethical standards on questions directly related to the propriety of the public officer's or employee's own future official conduct or refer the request to the Commission. Any public officer or employee subject to the jurisdiction of the committee shall direct the public officer's or employee's inquiry to that committee instead of the Commission.
- (c) Require the filing of statements of financial disclosure by public officers on forms prescribed by the committee or the city clerk if the form has been:
- (1) Submitted, at least 60 days before its anticipated distribution, to the Secretary of State for review; and
- (2) Upon review, approved by the Secretary of State. **The**Secretary of State shall not approve the form unless the form
 contains all the information required to be included in a statement
 of financial disclosure pursuant to NRS 281.571.
- 2. The Secretary of State is not responsible for the costs of producing or distributing a form for filing a statement of financial disclosure pursuant to the provisions of subsection 1.
- **3.** A specialized or local ethics committee shall not attempt to interpret or render an opinion regarding the statutory ethical standards.
- [3.] 4. Each request for an opinion submitted to a specialized or

local ethics committee, each hearing held to obtain information on which to base an opinion, all deliberations relating to an opinion, each opinion rendered by a committee and any motion relating to the opinion are confidential unless:

- (a) The public officer or employee acts in contravention of the opinion; or
- (b) The requester discloses the content of the opinion.

Sec. 45. NRS 281A.480 is hereby amended to read as follows: 281A.480 1. In addition to any other penalties provided by

law [,] and in accordance with the provisions of section 27.5 of this act, the Commission may impose on a public officer or employee or former public officer or employee civil penalties:

- (a) Not to exceed \$5,000 for a first willful violation of this chapter;
- (b) Not to exceed \$10,000 for a separate act or event that constitutes a second willful violation of this chapter; and
- (c) Not to exceed \$25,000 for a separate act or event that constitutes a third willful violation of this chapter.

If the Commission finds that a violation of a provision of this chapter by a public officer or employee or former public officer or employee has resulted in the realization of a financial benefit by the current or former public officer or employee or another person, the Commission may, in addition to any other penalties provided by law, require the current or former public officer or employee to pay a civil penalty of not more than twice the amount so realized.
- 4. In addition to any other penalties provided by law, if a proceeding results in an opinion that:
- (a) One or more willful violations of this chapter have been committed by a State Legislator removable from office only through expulsion by the State Legislator's own House pursuant to Section 6 of Article 4 of the Nevada Constitution, the Commission shall:
- (1) If the State Legislator is a member of the Senate, submit the opinion to the Majority Leader of the Senate or, if the Majority Leader of the Senate is the subject of the opinion or the person who requested the opinion, to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate; or
- (2) If the State Legislator is a member of the Assembly, submit the opinion to the Speaker of the Assembly or, if the Speaker of the Assembly is the subject of the opinion or the person who requested the opinion, to the Speaker Pro Tempore of the Assembly.
- (b) One or more willful violations of this chapter have been

committed by a state officer removable from office only through impeachment pursuant to Article 7 of the Nevada Constitution, the Commission shall submit the opinion to the Speaker of the Assembly and the Majority Leader of the Senate or, if the Speaker of the Assembly or the Majority Leader of the Senate is the person who requested the opinion, to the Speaker Pro Tempore of the Assembly or the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, as appropriate.

- (c) One or more willful violations of this chapter have been committed by a public officer other than a public officer described in paragraphs (a) and (b), the willful violations shall be deemed to be malfeasance in office for the purposes of NRS 283.440 and the Commission:
- (1) May file a complaint in the appropriate court for removal of the public officer pursuant to NRS 283.440 when the public officer is found in the opinion to have committed fewer than three willful violations of this chapter.
- (2) Shall file a complaint in the appropriate court for removal of the public officer pursuant to NRS 283.440 when the public officer is found in the opinion to have committed three or more willful violations of this chapter.
- ☐ This paragraph grants an exclusive right to the Commission, and no other person may file a complaint against the public officer pursuant to NRS 283.440 based on any violation found in the opinion.

- (a) The public officer or employee relied in good faith upon the advice of the legal counsel retained by [the] *his or her* public body [which the public officer represents or by the], *agency or* employer; [of the public employee or upon the manual published by the Commission pursuant to NRS 281A.290;
- (b) The public officer or employee was unable, through no fault of the public officer or employee, to obtain an opinion from the Commission before the action was taken; and
- [(c)] (b) The act or failure to act by the public officer or employee [took action that] was not contrary to a prior published opinion issued by the Commission.

In addition to any other penalties provided by law, a public employee who commits a willful violation of this chapter is subject to disciplinary proceedings by the employer of the public employee and must be referred for action in accordance to the applicable provisions governing the employment of the public employee.
- 7. The provisions of this chapter do not abrogate or decrease the effect of the provisions of the Nevada Revised Statutes which

- define crimes or prescribe punishments with respect to the conduct of public officers or employees. NRS 281A.020 Legislative findings and declarations.

- 1. It is hereby declared to be the public policy of this State that:
 - (a) A public office is a public trust and shall be held for the sole benefit of the people.
 - (b) A public officer or employee must commit himself or herself to avoid conflicts between the private interests of the public officer or employee and those of the general public whom the public officer or employee serves.
- 2. The Legislature finds and declares that:
 - (a) The increasing complexity of state and local government, more and more closely related to private life and enterprise, enlarges the potentiality for conflict of interests.
 - (b) To enhance the people's faith in the integrity and impartiality of public officers and employees, adequate guidelines are required to show the appropriate separation between the roles of persons who are both public servants and private citizens.
 - (c) In interpreting and applying the provisions of this chapter that are applicable to State Legislators, the Commission must give appropriate weight and proper deference to the public policy of this State under which State Legislators serve as "citizen Legislators" who have other occupations and business interests, who are expected to have particular philosophies and perspectives that are necessarily influenced by the life experiences of the Legislator, including, without limitation, professional, family and business experiences, and who are expected to contribute those philosophies and perspectives to the debate over issues with which the Legislature is confronted.
 - (d) The provisions of this chapter do not, under any circumstances, allow the Commission to exercise jurisdiction or authority over or inquire into, intrude upon or interfere with the functions of a State Legislator that are protected by legislative privilege and immunity pursuant to the Constitution of the State of Nevada or NRS 41.071.

Each county whose population is 10,000 or more and each city whose population is 15,000 or more and that is located within such a county shall pay an assessment for the costs incurred by the Commission each biennium in carrying out its functions pursuant to this chapter. The total amount of money to be derived from assessments paid pursuant to this subsection for a biennium must be determined by the Legislature in the legislatively approved budget of the Commission for that biennium. The assessments must be apportioned among each such city and county based on the proportion that the total population of the city or the total population of the unincorporated area of the county bears to the total population of all such cities and the unincorporated areas of all such counties in this State.
- 2. On or before July 1 of each odd-numbered year, the Executive Director shall, in consultation with the Budget Division of the Department of Administration and the Fiscal Analysis Division of the Legislative Counsel Bureau, determine for the next ensuing biennium the amount of the assessments due for each city and county that is required to pay an assessment pursuant to subsection 1. The assessments must be paid to the Commission in semiannual installments that are due on or before August 1 and February 1 of each year of the biennium. The Executive Director shall send out a billing statement to each such city or county which states the amount of the semiannual installment payment due from the city or county.
- 3. Any money that the Commission receives pursuant to subsection 2:
 - (a) Must be deposited in the State Treasury, accounted for separately in the State General Fund and credited to the budget account for the Commission;
 - (b) May only be used to carry out the provisions of this chapter and only to the extent authorized for expenditure by the Legislature;
 - (c) Does not revert to the State General Fund at the end of any fiscal year; and
 - (d) Does not revert to a city or county if:
 - (1) The actual expenditures by the Commission are less than the amount of the assessments approved by the Legislature pursuant to subsection 1 and the city or county has already remitted its semiannual installment to the Commission for the billing period; or

- (2) The budget of the Commission is modified after the amount of the assessments has been approved by the Legislature pursuant to subsection 1 and the city or county has already remitted its semiannual installment to the Commission for the billing period.
- 4. If any installment payment is not paid on or before the date on which it is due, the Executive Director shall make reasonable efforts to collect the delinquent payment. If the Executive Director is not able to collect the arrearage, the Executive Director shall submit a claim for the amount of the unpaid installment payment to the Department of Taxation. If the Department of Taxation receives such a claim, the Department shall deduct the amount of the claim from money that would otherwise be allocated from the Local Government Tax Distribution Account to the city or county that owes the installment payment and shall transfer that amount to the Commission.

 - (d) Does not revert to a city or county if:
 - (1) The actual expenditures by the Commission are less than the amount of the assessments approved by the Legislature pursuant to subsection 1 and the city or county has already remitted its semiannual installment to the Commission for the billing period; or

- (2) The budget of the Commission is modified after the amount of the assessments has been approved by the Legislature pursuant to subsection 1 and the city or county has already remitted its semiannual installment to the Commission for the billing period.

If the Department of Taxation receives such a claim, the Department shall deduct the amount of the claim from money that would otherwise be allocated from the Local Government Tax Distribution Account to the city or county that owes the installment payment and shall transfer that amount to the Commission.

NRS 281A.280 Jurisdiction; statute of limitations.

- 1. The Chair and Vice Chair of the Commission may administer oaths.
- 2. The Commission, upon majority vote, may issue a subpoena to compel the attendance of a witness and the production of books and papers. Upon the request of the Executive Director or the public officer or employee who is the subject of a request for an opinion, the Chair or, in the Chair's absence, the Vice Chair, may issue a subpoena to compel the attendance of a witness and the production of books and papers. A public officer or employee who requests the issuance of a subpoena pursuant to this subsection must serve the subpoena in the manner provided in the Nevada Rules of Civil Procedure for service of subpoenas in a civil action and must pay the costs of such service.
- 3. Before issuing a subpoena to a public officer or employee who is the subject of a request for an opinion to compel his or her attendance as a witness or his or her production of books or papers, the Executive Director shall submit a written request to the public officer or employee requesting:
 - (a) The appearance of the public officer or employee as a witness; or
 - (b) The production by the public officer or employee of any books and papers relating to the request for an opinion.
- 4. Each written request submitted by the Executive Director pursuant to subsection 3 must specify the time and place for the attendance of the public officer or employee or the production of any books and papers, and designate with certainty the books and papers requested, if any. If the public officer or employee fails or refuses to attend at the time and place specified or produce the books and papers requested by the Executive Director within 5 business days after receipt of the request, the Chair may issue the subpoena. Failure of the public officer or employee to comply with the written request of the Executive Director shall be deemed a waiver by the public officer or employee of the time set forth in subsections 4, 5 and 6 of NRS 281A.440.
- 5. If any witness refuses to attend, testify or produce any books and papers as required by the subpoena, the Chair of the Commission may report to the district court by petition, setting forth that:
 - (a) Due notice has been given of the time and place of attendance of the witness or the production of the books and papers;
 - (b) The witness has been subpoenaed by the Commission pursuant to this section; and
 - (c) The witness has failed or refused to attend or produce the books and papers required by the subpoena before the Commission, or has refused to answer questions propounded to the witness, and asking for an order of the court compelling the witness to attend and testify or produce the books and papers before the Commission.
- 6. Upon such a petition, the court shall enter an order directing the witness to appear before the court at a time and place to be fixed by the court in its order, the time to be not more than 10 days after the date of the order, and then and there show cause why the witness has not attended, testified or produced the books or papers before the Commission. A certified copy of the order must be served upon the witness.

If it appears to the court that the subpoena was regularly issued by the Commission, the court shall enter an order that the witness appear before the Commission, at the time and place fixed in the order, and testify or produce the required books and papers. If the public officer or [public] employee fails or refuses to attend at the time and place specified or produce the books and papers requested by the Executive Director within 5 business days after receipt of the request, the Chair may issue the subpoena. Failure of the public officer or [public] employee to comply with the written request of the Executive Director shall be deemed a waiver by the public officer or [public] employee of the time set forth in subsections 4, 5 and 6 of NRS 281A.440.
- 5. If any witness refuses to attend, testify or produce any books and papers as required by the subpoena, the Chair of the Commission may report to the district court by petition, setting forth that:
 - (a) Due notice has been given of the time and place of attendance of the witness or the production of the books and papers;
 - (b) The witness has been subpoenaed by the Commission pursuant to this section; and
 - (c) The witness has failed or refused to attend or produce the books and papers required by the subpoena before the Commission, or has refused to answer questions propounded to the witness, and asking for an order of the court compelling the witness to attend and testify or produce the books and papers before the Commission.
- 6. Upon such a petition, the court shall enter an order directing the witness to appear before the court at a time and place to be fixed by the court in its order, the time to be not more than 10 days after the date of the order, and then and there show cause why the witness has not attended, testified or produced the books or papers before the Commission. A certified copy of the order must be served upon the witness.
- 7. If it appears to the court that the subpoena was regularly issued by the Commission, the court shall enter an order that the witness appear before the Commission, at the time and place fixed in the order, and testify or produce the required books and papers. Upon failure to obey the order, the witness must be dealt with as for contempt of court.

CODE OF ETHICAL STANDARDS

NRS 281A.400 General requirements; exceptions. A code of ethical standards is hereby established to govern the conduct of public officers and employees:

- 1. A public officer or employee shall not seek or accept any gift, service, favor, employment, engagement, emolument or economic opportunity which would tend improperly to influence a reasonable person in the public officer's or employee's position to depart from the faithful and impartial discharge of the public officer's or employee's public duties.
- 2. A public officer or employee shall not use the public officer's or employee's position in government to secure or grant unwarranted privileges, preferences, exemptions or advantages for the public officer or employee, any business entity in which the public officer or employee has a significant pecuniary interest, or any person to whom the public officer or employee has a commitment in a private capacity to the interests of that person. As used in this subsection "unwarranted" means without justification or adequate reason.
- 3. A public officer or employee shall not participate as an agent of government in the negotiation or execution of a contract between the government and any business entity in which the public officer or employee has a significant pecuniary interest.
- 4. A public officer or employee shall not accept any salary, retainer, augmentation, expense allowance or other compensation from any private source for the performance of the public officer's or employee's duties as a public officer or employee.
- 5. If a public officer or employee acquires, through the public officer's or employee's public duties or relationships, any information which by law or practice is not at the time available to people generally, the public officer or employee shall not use the information to further a significant pecuniary interest of the public officer or employee or any other person or business entity.
- 6. A public officer or employee shall not suppress any governmental report or other official document because it might tend to affect unfavorably a significant pecuniary interest of the public officer or employee.

- 7. Except for State Legislators who are subject to the restrictions set forth in subsection 8, a public officer or employee shall not use governmental time, property, equipment or other facility to benefit a significant personal or pecuniary interest of the public officer or employee. This subsection does not prohibit:
 - (a) A limited use of governmental property, equipment or other facility for personal purposes if:
 - (1) The public officer or employee who is responsible for and has authority to authorize the use of such property, equipment or other facility has established a policy allowing the use or the use is necessary as a result of emergency circumstances;
 - (2) The use does not interfere with the performance of the public officer's or employee's public duties:
 - (3) The cost or value related to the use is nominal; and
 - (4) The use does not create the appearance of impropriety;
 - (b) The use of mailing lists, computer data or other information lawfully obtained from a governmental agency which is available to members of the general public for nongovernmental purposes; or
 - (c) The use of telephones or other means of communication if there is not a special charge for that use.
- →If a governmental agency incurs a cost as a result of a use that is authorized pursuant to this subsection or would ordinarily charge a member of the general public for the use, the public officer or employee shall promptly reimburse the cost or pay the charge to the governmental agency.
- 8. A State Legislator shall not:
 - (a) Use governmental time, property, equipment or other facility for a nongovernmental purpose or for the private benefit of the State Legislator or any other person. This paragraph does not prohibit:
 - (1) A limited use of state property and resources for personal purposes if:
 - (I) The use does not interfere with the performance of the State Legislator's public duties:
 - (II) The cost or value related to the use is nominal; and
 - (III) The use does not create the appearance of impropriety;
 - (2) The use of mailing lists, computer data or other information lawfully obtained from a governmental agency which is available to members of the general public for nongovernmental purposes; or
 - (3) The use of telephones or other means of communication if there is not a special charge for that use.
 - (b) Require or authorize a legislative employee, while on duty, to perform personal services or assist in a private activity, except:
 - (1) In unusual and infrequent situations where the employee's service is reasonably necessary to permit the State Legislator or legislative employee to perform that person's official duties; or
 - (2) Where such service has otherwise been established as legislative policy.
 - 9. A public officer or employee shall not attempt to benefit a significant personal or pecuniary interest of the public officer or employee through the influence of a subordinate.
 - 10. A public officer or employee shall not seek other employment or contracts through the use of the public officer's or employee's official position.

As used in this subsection [÷
- (a) "Commitment in a private capacity to the interests of that person" has the meaning ascribed to "commitment in a private capacity to the interests of others" in subsection 8 of NRS 281A.420.
 - (b) "Unwarranted"], "unwarranted" means without justification or adequate reason.
- 3. A public officer or employee shall not participate as an agent of government in the negotiation or execution of a contract between the government and any business entity in which the public officer or employee has a significant pecuniary interest.
- 4. A public officer or employee shall not accept any salary, retainer, augmentation, expense allowance or other compensation from any private source for the performance of the public officer's or employee's duties as a public officer or employee.
- 5. If a public officer or employee acquires, through the public officer's or employee's public duties or relationships, any information which by law or practice is not at the time available to people generally, the public officer or employee shall not use the information to further [the] a significant pecuniary [interests] *interest* of the public officer or employee or any other person or business entity.
- 6. A public officer or employee shall not suppress any governmental report or other official document because it might tend to affect unfavorably [the public officer's or employee's] a significant pecuniary [interests.] interest of the public officer or employee.
- 7. Except for State Legislators who are subject to the restrictions set forth in subsection 8, a public officer or employee shall not use governmental time, property, equipment or other facility to benefit [the public officer's or employee's] a significant personal or [financial] pecuniary interest [-] of the public officer or employee. This subsection does not prohibit:
 - (a) A limited use of governmental property, equipment or other facility for personal purposes if:
- (1) The public officer *or employee* who is responsible for and has authority to authorize the use of such property, equipment or other facility has established a policy allowing the use or the use is necessary as a result of emergency circumstances;
- (2) The use does not interfere with the performance of the public officer's or employee's public duties;
 - (3) The cost or value related to the use is nominal; and
 - (4) The use does not create the appearance of impropriety;
- (b) The use of mailing lists, computer data or other information lawfully obtained from a governmental agency which is available to members of the general public for nongovernmental purposes; or
 - (c) The use of telephones or other means of communication if there is not a special charge for that use.

- (3) The use of telephones or other means of communication if there is not a special charge for that use.
- (b) Require or authorize a legislative employee, while on duty, to perform personal services or assist in a private activity, except:
- (1) In unusual and infrequent situations where the employee's service is reasonably necessary to permit the State Legislator or legislative employee to perform that person's official duties; or
 - (2) Where such service has otherwise been established as legislative policy.
- 9. A public officer or employee shall not attempt to benefit [the public officer's or employee's] a significant personal or [financial] pecuniary interest of the public officer or employee through the influence of a subordinate.
- 10. A public officer or employee shall not seek other employment or contracts through the use of the public officer's or employee's official position.

NRS 281A.410 Limitations on representing or counseling private persons before public agencies; disclosure required by certain public officers. In addition to the requirements of the code of ethical standards and the other provisions of this chapter:

The Commission may relieve the member from the strict application of the provisions of this subsection if:
 - (a) The member requests an opinion from the Commission pursuant to subsection 1 of NRS 281A.440; and
 - (b) The Commission determines that such relief is not contrary to:
 - (1) The best interests of the public;
 - (2) The continued ethical integrity of each local agency affected by the matter; and

- (3) The provisions of this chapter.
- 4. Unless permitted by this section, a public officer or employee shall not represent or counsel a private person for compensation before any state agency of the Executive or Legislative Department.
- 5. Not later than January 15 of each year, if any State Legislator, member of a local legislative body or other public officer permitted by this section has, within the preceding year, represented or counseled a private person for compensation before a state agency of the Executive Department, he or she shall disclose for each such representation or counseling during the previous calendar year:
 - (a) The name of the client;
 - (b) The nature of the representation; and
 - (c) The name of the state agency.

NRS 281A.440 Rendering of opinions by Commission: Requests; determination of just and sufficient cause; notice and hearings; confidentiality.

The Commission shall render an opinion interpreting the statutory ethical standards and apply the standards to a given set of facts and circumstances within 45 days after receiving a request, on a form prescribed by the Commission, from a public officer or employee who is seeking guidance on questions which directly relate to the propriety of the requester's own past, present or future conduct as a public officer or employee, unless the public officer or employee waives the time limit. The public officer or employee may also request the Commission to hold a public hearing regarding the requested opinion. If a requested opinion relates to the propriety of the requester's own present or future conduct, the opinion of the Commission is:
 - (a) Binding upon the requester as to the requester's future conduct; and
 - (b) Final and subject to judicial review pursuant to NRS 233B.130, except that a proceeding regarding this review must be held in closed court without admittance of persons other than those necessary to the proceeding, unless this right to confidential proceedings is waived by the requester.
- 2. The Commission may render an opinion interpreting the statutory ethical standards and apply the standards to a given set of facts and circumstances:
 - (a) Upon request from a specialized or local ethics committee.
 - (b) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, upon request from a person, if the requester submits:
 - (1) The request on a form prescribed by the Commission; and
 - (2) All related evidence deemed necessary by the Executive Director and the investigatory panel to make a determination of whether there is just and sufficient cause to render an opinion in the matter.
 - (c) Upon the Commission's own motion regarding the propriety of conduct by a public officer or employee. The Commission shall not initiate proceedings pursuant to this paragraph based solely upon an anonymous complaint.
- → The Commission shall not render an opinion interpreting the statutory ethical standards or apply those standards to a given set of facts and circumstances if the request is submitted by a person who is incarcerated in a correctional facility in this State.
- 3. Upon receipt of a request for an opinion by the Commission or upon the motion of the Commission pursuant to subsection 2, the Executive Director shall investigate the facts and circumstances relating to the request to determine whether there is just and sufficient cause for the Commission to render an opinion in the matter. The Executive Director shall notify the public officer or employee who is the subject of the request and provide the public officer or employee an opportunity to submit to the Executive Director a response to the allegations against the public officer or employee within 30 days after the date on which the public officer or employee received the notice of the request. The purpose of the response is to provide the Executive Director with any information relevant to the request which the public officer or employee believes may assist the Executive Director and the investigatory panel in conducting the investigation. The public officer or employee is not required in the response or in any proceeding before the investigatory panel to assert, claim or raise any objection or defense, in law or fact, to the allegations against the public officer or employee and no objection or defense, in law or fact, is waived, abandoned or barred by the failure to assert, claim or raise it in the response or in any proceeding before the investigatory panel.

- 4. The Executive Director shall complete the investigation and present a written recommendation relating to just and sufficient cause, including, without limitation, the specific evidence or reasons that support the recommendation, to the investigatory panel within 70 days after the receipt of or the motion of the Commission for the request, unless the public officer or employee waives this time limit.
- 5. Within 15 days after the Executive Director has provided the written recommendation in the matter to the investigatory panel pursuant to subsection 4, the investigatory panel shall conclude the investigation and make a final determination regarding whether there is just and sufficient cause for the Commission to render an opinion in the matter, unless the public officer or employee waives this time limit. The investigatory panel shall not determine that there is just and sufficient cause for the Commission to render an opinion in the matter unless the Executive Director has provided the public officer or employee an opportunity to respond to the allegations against the public officer or employee as required by subsection 3. The investigatory panel shall cause a record of its proceedings in each matter to be kept.
- 6. If the investigatory panel determines that there is just and sufficient cause for the Commission to render an opinion in the matter, the Commission shall hold a hearing and render an opinion in the matter within 60 days after the determination of just and sufficient cause by the investigatory panel, unless the public officer or employee waives this time limit.
- 7. Each request for an opinion that a public officer or employee submits to the Commission pursuant to subsection 1, each opinion rendered by the Commission in response to such a request and any motion, determination, evidence or record of a hearing relating to such a request are confidential unless the public officer or employee who requested the opinion:
 - (a) Acts in contravention of the opinion, in which case the Commission may disclose the request for the opinion, the contents of the opinion and any motion, evidence or record of a hearing related thereto;
 - (b) Discloses the request for the opinion, the contents of the opinion, or any motion, evidence or record of a hearing related thereto; or
 - (c) Requests the Commission to disclose the request for the opinion, the contents of the opinion, or any motion, evidence or record of a hearing related thereto.

Except as otherwise provided in subsection 9, all information, communications, records, documents or other material in the possession of the Commission or its staff that is related to a request for an opinion regarding a public officer or employee submitted to or initiated by the Commission pursuant to subsection 2, including, without limitation, the record of the proceedings of the investigatory panel made pursuant to subsection 5, are confidential and not public records pursuant to chapter 239 of NRS until:
 - (a) The investigatory panel determines whether there is just and sufficient cause to render an opinion in the matter and serves written notice of such a determination on the public offer or employee who is the subject of the request for an opinion submitted or initiated pursuant to subsection 2; or
 - (b) The public officer or employee who is the subject of a request for an opinion submitted or initiated pursuant to subsection 2 authorizes the Commission in writing to make its information, communications, records, documents or other material which are related to the request publicly available,

 - (a) Submit all necessary information to the Commission; and
 - (b) Declare by oath or affirmation that the person will testify truthfully,
- → the Commission may decline to render an opinion.
- 13. For good cause shown, the Commission may take testimony from a person by telephone or video conference.
- 14. For the purposes of <u>NRS 41.032</u>, the members of the Commission and its employees shall be deemed to be exercising or performing a discretionary function or duty when taking an action related to the rendering of an opinion pursuant to this section.
- 15. A meeting or hearing that the Commission or the investigatory panel holds to receive information or evidence concerning the propriety of the conduct of a public officer or employee pursuant to this section and the deliberations of the Commission and the investigatory panel on such information or evidence are not subject to the provisions of chapter 241 of NRS.
- 16. For the purposes of this section, the investigative file of the Commission which relates to a request for an opinion regarding a public officer or employee includes, without limitation, any information obtained by the Commission through any form of communication during the course of an investigation and any records, documents or other material created or maintained during the course of an investigation which relate to the public officer or employee who is the subject of the request for an opinion, regardless of whether such information, records, documents or other material are obtained by a subpoena.

Sec. 43. NRS 281A.440 is hereby amended to read as follows:

281A.440 1. The Commission shall render an opinion interpreting the statutory ethical standards and apply the standards to a given set of facts and circumstances within 45 days after receiving a request, on a form prescribed by the Commission, from a public officer or employee who is seeking guidance on questions which directly relate to the propriety of the requester's own past, present or future conduct as [an] a public officer or employee, unless the public officer or employee waives the time limit. The public officer or employee may also request the Commission to hold a public hearing regarding the requested opinion. If a requested opinion relates to the propriety of the requester's own present or future conduct, the opinion of the Commission is:

 - (2) All related evidence deemed necessary by the Executive Director and the investigatory panel to make a determination of whether there is just and sufficient cause to render an opinion in the matter.
- (c) Upon the Commission's own motion regarding the propriety of conduct by a public officer or employee. The Commission shall not initiate proceedings pursuant to this paragraph based solely upon an anonymous complaint.
- The Commission shall not render an opinion interpreting the statutory ethical standards or apply those standards to a given set of facts and circumstances if the request is submitted by a person who is incarcerated in a correctional facility in this State.

Upon receipt of a request for an opinion by the Commission or upon the motion of the Commission pursuant to subsection 2, the Executive Director shall investigate the facts and circumstances relating to the request to determine whether there is just and sufficient cause for the Commission to render an opinion in the matter. The Executive Director shall notify the public officer or employee who is the subject of the request and provide the public officer or employee an opportunity to submit to the Executive Director a response to the allegations against the public officer or employee within 30 days after the date on which the public officer or employee received the notice of the request. The purpose of the response is to provide the Executive Director with any information relevant to the request which the public officer or employee believes may assist the Executive Director and the investigatory panel in conducting the investigation. The public officer or employee is not required in the response or in any proceeding before the investigatory panel to assert, claim or raise any objection or defense, in law or fact, to the allegations against the public officer or employee and no objection or defense, in law or fact, is waived, abandoned or barred by the failure to assert, claim or raise it in the response or in any proceeding before the investigatory panel.
- 4. The Executive Director shall complete the investigation and present a written recommendation relating to just and sufficient cause, including, without limitation, the specific evidence or reasons that support the recommendation, to the investigatory panel within 70 days after the receipt of or the motion of the Commission for the request, unless the public officer or employee waives this time limit. [If, after the investigation, the Executive Director determines that there is just and sufficient cause for the Commission to render an opinion in the matter, the Executive Director shall state such a recommendation in writing, including, without limitation, the specific evidence that supports the Executive Director's recommendation. NRS 281A.450 Legal defense of public officer or employee in proceedings relating to opinion requests.

If a request for an opinion is submitted to or initiated by the Commission concerning a present or former state officer or employee, unless the state officer or employee retains his or her legal counsel or the Attorney General tenders the defense of the state officer or employee to an insurer who, pursuant to a contract of insurance, is authorized to defend the state officer or employee, the Attorney General shall defend the state officer or employee or employ special counsel to defend the state officer or employee in any proceeding relating to the request for the opinion if:
- (a) The state officer or employee submits a written request for defense in the manner provided in <u>NRS</u> 41.0339; and
- (b) Based on the facts and allegations known to the Attorney General, the Attorney General determines that the act or omission on which the alleged violation is based:
 - (1) Appears to be within the course and scope of public duty or employment of the state officer or employee; and
 - (2) Appears to have been performed or omitted in good faith.

The Attorney General shall create a written record setting forth the basis for the Attorney General's determination of whether to defend the state officer or employee pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 1. - 4. The public officer or employee possesses special knowledge which is an indispensable asset of the public officer's or employee's public agency and is needed by it to reach a sound decision.

 - (a) The public officer or employee acts in contravention of the opinion; or
 - (b) The requester discloses the content of the opinion.

NRS 281A.480 Commission authorized to impose civil penalties; duties of Commission upon finding willful violation; circumstances in which violation not deemed willful; effect of chapter upon criminal law; judicial review; burden of proof.

- 1. In addition to any other penalties provided by law and in accordance with the provisions of NRS 281A.LLL, the Commission may impose on a public officer or employee or former public officer or employee civil penalties:
 - (a) Not to exceed \$5,000 for a first willful violation of this chapter;
 - (b) Not to exceed \$10,000 for a separate act or event that constitutes a second willful violation of this chapter; and
 - (c) Not to exceed \$25,000 for a separate act or event that constitutes a third willful violation of this chapter.
- 2. In addition to any other penalties provided by law, the Commission may, upon its own motion or upon the motion of the person about whom an opinion was requested pursuant to NRS 281A.440, impose a civil penalty not to exceed \$5,000 and assess an amount equal to the amount of attorney's fees and costs actually and reasonably incurred by the person about whom an opinion was requested pursuant to NRS 281A.440 against a person who prevents, interferes with or attempts to prevent or interfere with the discovery or investigation of a violation of this chapter.
- 3. If the Commission finds that a violation of a provision of this chapter by a public officer or employee or former public officer or employee has resulted in the realization of a financial benefit by the current or former public officer or employee or another person, the Commission may, in addition to any other penalties provided by law, require the current or former public officer or employee to pay a civil penalty of not more than twice the amount so realized.

- 4. In addition to any other penalties provided by law, if a proceeding results in an opinion that:
 - (a) One or more willful violations of this chapter have been committed by a State Legislator removable from office only through expulsion by the State Legislator's own House pursuant to Section 6 of Article 4 of the Nevada Constitution, the Commission shall:
 - (1) If the State Legislator is a member of the Senate, submit the opinion to the Majority Leader of the Senate or, if the Majority Leader of the Senate is the subject of the opinion or the person who requested the opinion, to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate; or
 - (2) If the State Legislator is a member of the Assembly, submit the opinion to the Speaker of the Assembly or, if the Speaker of the Assembly is the subject of the opinion or the person who requested the opinion, to the Speaker Pro Tempore of the Assembly.
 - (b) One or more willful violations of this chapter have been committed by a state officer removable from office only through impeachment pursuant to Article 7 of the Nevada Constitution, the Commission shall submit the opinion to the Speaker of the Assembly and the Majority Leader of the Senate or, if the Speaker of the Assembly or the Majority Leader of the Senate is the person who requested the opinion, to the Speaker Pro Tempore of the Assembly or the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, as appropriate.
 - (c) One or more willful violations of this chapter have been committed by a public officer other than a public officer described in paragraphs (a) and (b), the willful violations shall be deemed to be malfeasance in office for the purposes of NRS 283.440 and the Commission:
 - (1) May file a complaint in the appropriate court for removal of the public officer pursuant to NRS 283.440 when the public officer is found in the opinion to have committed fewer than three willful violations of this chapter.
 - (2) Shall file a complaint in the appropriate court for removal of the public officer pursuant to NRS 283.440 when the public officer is found in the opinion to have committed three or more willful violations of this chapter.
- This paragraph grants an exclusive right to the Commission, and no other person may file a complaint against the public officer pursuant to NRS 283.440 based on any violation found in the opinion.
- 5. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, any act or failure to act by a public officer or employee or former public officer or employee relating to this chapter is not a willful violation of this chapter if the public officer or employee establishes by sufficient evidence that:
 - (a) The public officer or employee relied in good faith upon the advice of the legal counsel retained by his or her public body, agency or employer; and
 - (b) The act or failure to act by the public officer or employee was not contrary to a prior published opinion issued by the Commission.
- 6. In addition to any other penalties provided by law, a public employee who commits a willful violation of this chapter is subject to disciplinary proceedings by the employer of the public employee and must be referred for action in accordance to the applicable provisions governing the employment of the public employee.
- 7. The provisions of this chapter do not abrogate or decrease the effect of the provisions of the Nevada Revised Statutes which define crimes or prescribe punishments with respect to the conduct of public officers or employees. If the Commission finds that a public officer or employee has committed a willful violation of this chapter which it believes may also constitute a criminal offense, the Commission shall refer the matter to the Attorney General or the district attorney, as appropriate, for a determination of whether a crime has been committed that warrants prosecution.

- 1. On or before the date on which a public officer swears or affirms the oath of office, the public officer must be informed of the statutory ethical standards and the duty to file an acknowledgment of the statutory ethical standards in accordance with this section by:
 - (a) For an appointed public officer, the appointing authority of the public officer; and
 - (b) For an elected public officer of:
 - (1) The county and other political subdivisions within the county except cities, the county clerk:
 - (2) The city, the city clerk;
 - (3) The Legislative Department of the State Government, the Director of the Legislative Counsel Bureau: and
 - (4) The Executive Department of the State Government, the Director of the Department of Administration, or his or her designee.
- 2. Within 30 days after a public employee begins employment:
 - (a) The Director of the Department of Administration, or his or her designee, shall provide each new public employee of a state agency with the information prepared by the Commission concerning the statutory ethical standards; and
 - (b) The manager of each local agency, or his or her designee, shall provide each new public employee of the local agency with the information prepared by the Commission concerning the statutory ethical standards.
- 3. Each public officer shall acknowledge that the public officer:
 - (a) Has received, read and understands the statutory ethical standards; and
 - (b) Has a responsibility to inform himself or herself of any amendments to the statutory ethical standards as soon as reasonably practicable after each session of the Legislature.
- 4. The acknowledgment must be executed on a form prescribed by the Commission and must be filed with the Commission:
 - (a) If the public officer is elected to office at the general election, on or before January 15 of the year following the public officer's election.
 - (b) If the public officer is elected to office at an election other than the general election or is appointed to office, on or before the 30th day following the date on which the public officer swears or affirms the oath of office.
- 5. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, a public officer shall execute and file the acknowledgment once for each term of office. If the public officer serves at the pleasure of the appointing authority and does not have a definite term of office, the public officer, in addition to executing and filing the acknowledgment after the public officer swears or affirms the oath of office in accordance with subsection 4, shall execute and file the acknowledgment on or before January 15 of each even-numbered year while the public officer holds that office.
- 6. For the purposes of this section, the acknowledgment is timely filed if, on or before the last day for filing, the acknowledgment is filed in one of the following ways:
 - (a) Delivered in person to the principal office of the Commission in Carson City.

- (c) Dispatched to a third-party commercial carrier for delivery to the Commission within 3 calendar days. Filing by third-party commercial carrier is complete upon timely depositing the acknowledgment with the third-party commercial carrier.
- (d) Transmitted to the Commission by facsimile machine or other electronic means authorized by the Commission. Filing by facsimile machine or other electronic means is complete upon receipt of the transmission by the Commission.

NRS 281A.510 Public officer or employee prohibited from accepting or receiving honorarium; penalty.

- 1. A public officer or public employee shall not accept or receive an honorarium.
- 2. An honorarium paid on behalf of a public officer or public employee to a charitable organization from which the officer or employee does not derive any financial benefit is deemed not to be accepted or received by the officer or employee for the purposes of this section.
- 3. This section does not prohibit:
 - (a) The receipt of payment for work performed outside the normal course of a person's public office or employment if the performance of that work is consistent with the applicable policies of the person's public employer regarding supplemental employment.
 - (b) The receipt of an honorarium by the spouse of a public officer or public employee if it is related to the spouse's profession or occupation.
- 4. As used in this section, "honorarium" means the payment of money or anything of value for an appearance or speech by the public officer or public employee in the officer's or employee's capacity as a public officer or public employee. The term does not include the payment of:
 - (a) The actual and necessary costs incurred by the public officer or public employee, the officer's or employee's spouse or the officer's or employee's aid for transportation and for lodging and meals while the public officer or public employee is away from the officer's or employee's residence.
 - (b) Compensation which would otherwise have been earned by the public officer or public employee in the normal course of the officer's or employee's public office or employment.
 - (c) A fee for a speech related to the officer's or employee's profession or occupation outside of the officer's or employee's public office or employment if:
 - (1) Other members of the profession or occupation are ordinarily compensated for such a speech; and
 - (2) The fee paid to the public officer or public employee is approximately the same as the fee that would be paid to a member of the private sector whose qualifications are similar to those of the officer or employee for a comparable speech.
 - (d) A fee for a speech delivered to an organization of legislatures, legislators or other elected officers.
- 5. In addition to any other penalty imposed pursuant to <u>NRS 281A.480</u>, a public officer or public employee who violates the provisions of this section shall forfeit the amount of the honorarium.

NRS 281A.520 Public officer or employee prohibited from requesting or otherwise causing governmental entity to incur expense or make expenditure to support or oppose ballot question or candidate in certain circumstances.

- 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsections 4 and 5, a public officer or employee shall not request or otherwise cause a governmental entity to incur an expense or make an expenditure to support or oppose:
 - (a) A ballot question.
 - (b) A candidate.
- 2. For the purposes of paragraph (b) of subsection 1, an expense incurred or an expenditure made by a governmental entity shall be considered an expense incurred or an expenditure made in support of a candidate if:
 - (a) The expense is incurred or the expenditure is made for the creation or dissemination of a pamphlet, brochure, publication, advertisement or television programming that prominently features the activities of a current public officer of the governmental entity who is a candidate for a state, local or federal elective office; and
 - (b) The pamphlet, brochure, publication, advertisement or television programming described in paragraph (a) is created or disseminated during the period specified in subsection 3.
- 3. The period during which the provisions of subsection 2 apply to a particular governmental entity begins when a current public officer of that governmental entity files a declaration of candidacy or acceptance of candidacy and ends on the date of the general election, general city election or special election for the office for which the current public officer of the governmental entity is a candidate.
- 4. The provisions of this section do not prohibit the creation or dissemination of, or the appearance of a candidate in or on, as applicable, a pamphlet, brochure, publication, advertisement or television programming that:
 - (a) Is made available to the public on a regular basis and merely describes the functions of:
 - (1) The public office held by the public officer who is the candidate; or
 - (2) The governmental entity by which the public officer who is the candidate is employed; or
 - (b) Is created or disseminated in the course of carrying out a duty of:
 - (1) The public officer who is the candidate; or
 - (2) The governmental entity by which the public officer who is the candidate is employed.
- 5. The provisions of this section do not prohibit an expense or an expenditure incurred to create or disseminate a television program that provides a forum for discussion or debate regarding a ballot question, if persons both in support of and in opposition to the ballot question participate in the television program.
- 6. As used in this section:
 - (a) "Governmental entity" means:
 - (1) The government of this State;
 - (2) An agency of the government of this State;
 - (3) A political subdivision of this State; and
 - (4) An agency of a political subdivision of this State.
 - (b) "Pamphlet, brochure, publication, advertisement or television programming" includes, without limitation, a publication, a public service announcement and any programming on a television station created to provide community access to cable television. The term does not include:
 - (1) A press release issued to the media by a governmental entity; or
 - (2) The official website of a governmental entity.

NRS 281A.530 Purchase of goods or services by local government from member of governing body not unlawful or unethical; conditions. The purchase of goods or services by a local government upon a two-thirds vote of its governing body from a member of the governing body who is the sole source of supply within the area served by the governing body is not unlawful or unethical if the public notice of the meeting specifically mentioned that such a purchase would be discussed.

NRS 281A.540 Governmental grant, contract or lease and certain actions taken in violation of chapter are voidable; prohibited contract is void; recovery of benefit received as result of violation.

- 1. In addition to any other penalties provided by law, a governmental grant, contract or lease entered into in violation of this chapter is voidable by the State, county, city or political subdivision. In a determination under this section of whether to void a grant, contract or lease, the interests of innocent third parties who could be damaged must be taken into account. The Attorney General, district attorney or city attorney must give notice of the intent to void a grant, contract or lease under this section no later than 30 days after the Commission has determined that there has been a related violation of this chapter.
- 2. In addition to any other penalties provided by law, a contract prohibited by NRS 281.230 which is knowingly entered into by a person designated in subsection 1 of NRS 281.230 is void.
- 3. Any action taken by the State in violation of this chapter is voidable, except that the interests of innocent third parties in the nature of the violation must be taken into account. The Attorney General may also pursue any other available legal or equitable remedies.
- 4. In addition to any other penalties provided by law, the Attorney General may recover any fee, compensation, gift or benefit received by a person as a result of a violation of this chapter by a public officer. An action to recover pursuant to this section must be brought within 2 years after the violation or reasonable discovery of the violation. NRS 281A.550 Employment of certain former public officers and employees by regulated businesses prohibited; certain former public officers and employees prohibited from soliciting or accepting employment from certain persons contracting with State or local government; determination by Commission.

- 1. A former member of the Public Utilities Commission of Nevada shall not:
 - (a) Be employed by a public utility or parent organization or subsidiary of a public utility; or
 - (b) Appear before the Public Utilities Commission of Nevada to testify on behalf of a public utility or parent organization or subsidiary of a public utility,
- → for 1 year after the termination of the member's service on the Public Utilities Commission of Nevada.
 - 2. A former member of the State Gaming Control Board or the Nevada Gaming Commission shall not:
 - (a) Appear before the State Gaming Control Board or the Nevada Gaming Commission on behalf of a person who holds a license issued pursuant to <u>chapter 463</u> or <u>464</u> of NRS or who is required to register with the Nevada Gaming Commission pursuant to <u>chapter 463</u> of NRS; or
 - (b) Be employed by such a person,

• for 1 year after the termination of the member's service on the State Gaming Control Board or the Nevada Gaming Commission.

- 3. In addition to the prohibitions set forth in subsections 1 and 2, and except as otherwise provided in subsections 4 and 6, a former public officer or employee of a board, commission, department, division or other agency of the Executive Department of State Government, except a clerical employee, shall not solicit or accept employment from a business or industry whose activities are governed by regulations adopted by the board, commission, department, division or other agency for 1 year after the termination of the former public officer's or employee's service or period of employment if:
 - (a) The former public officer's or employee's principal duties included the formulation of policy contained in the regulations governing the business or industry;
 - (b) During the immediately preceding year, the former public officer or employee directly performed activities, or controlled or influenced an audit, decision, investigation or other action, which significantly affected the business or industry which might, but for this section, employ the former public officer or employee; or
 - (c) As a result of the former public officer's or employee's governmental service or employment, the former public officer or employee possesses knowledge of the trade secrets of a direct business competitor.
- 4. The provisions of subsection 3 do not apply to a former public officer who was a member of a board, commission or similar body of the State if:
 - (a) The former public officer is engaged in the profession, occupation or business regulated by the board, commission or similar body;
 - (b) The former public officer holds a license issued by the board, commission or similar body; and
 - (c) Holding a license issued by the board, commission or similar body is a requirement for membership on the board, commission or similar body.
- 5. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 6, a former public officer or employee of the State or a political subdivision, except a clerical employee, shall not solicit or accept employment from a person to whom a contract for supplies, materials, equipment or services was awarded by the State or political subdivision, as applicable, for 1 year after the termination of the officer's or employee's service or period of employment, if:
 - (a) The amount of the contract exceeded \$25,000;

- (b) The contract was awarded within the 12-month period immediately preceding the termination of the officer's or employee's service or period of employment; and
- (c) The position held by the former public officer or employee at the time the contract was awarded allowed the former public officer or employee to affect or influence the awarding of the contract.
- 6. A current or former public officer or employee may request that the Commission apply the relevant facts in that person's case to the provisions of subsection 3 or 5, as applicable, and determine whether relief from the strict application of those provisions is proper. If the Commission determines that relief from the strict application of the provisions of subsection 3 or 5, as applicable, is not contrary to:
 - (a) The best interests of the public;
 - (b) The continued ethical integrity of the State Government or political subdivision, as applicable; and
 - (c) The provisions of this chapter,
- →it may issue an opinion to that effect and grant such relief. The opinion of the Commission in such a case is final and subject to judicial review pursuant to NRS 233B.130, except that a proceeding regarding this review must be held in closed court without admittance of persons other than those necessary to the proceeding, unless this right to confidential proceedings is waived by the current or former public officer or employee.
- 7. Each request for an opinion that a current or former public officer or employee submits to the Commission pursuant to subsection 6, each opinion rendered by the Commission in response to such a request and any motion, determination, evidence or record of a hearing relating to such a request are confidential unless the current or former public officer or employee who requested the opinion:
 - (a) Acts in contravention of the opinion, in which case the Commission may disclose the request for the opinion, the contents of the opinion and any motion, evidence or record of a hearing related thereto;
 - (b) Discloses the request for the opinion, the contents of the opinion or any motion, evidence or record of a hearing related thereto; or
 - (c) Requests the Commission to disclose the request for the opinion, the contents of the opinion, or any motion, evidence or record of a hearing related thereto.
- 8. A meeting or hearing that the Commission or an investigatory panel holds to receive information or evidence concerning the propriety of the conduct of a current or former public officer or employee pursuant to this section and the deliberations of the Commission and the investigatory panel on such information or evidence are not subject to the provisions of chapter 241 of NRS.
- 9. As used in this section, "regulation" has the meaning ascribed to it in <u>NRS 233B.038</u> and also includes regulations adopted by a board, commission, department, division or other agency of the Executive Department of State Government that is exempted from the requirements of <u>chapter 233B</u> of NRS.
