A 2005 Report on Progress

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The National MS Society brings us all together to meet the challenges of each person living with Multiple Sclerosis.

- Our programs and services are tailored to enable people to get the support and information about MS that they need – when they need it.
- Our research and our professional education programs drive global innovation unraveling the MS mystery and improving MS care and treatment.
- Our advocacy programs give a voice to everyone who wants to be an activist in the MS movement.

MS, or multiple sclerosis, is a chronic disease of the central nervous system (brain, optic nerves, and spinal cord). The symptoms are varied and often unpredictable; they include weakness, numbness, fatigue, loss of balance, vision, or mobility, cognitive changes, mood swings, and pain. MS is as unique as the individual who has it.

Research & Clinical Care

Groundbreaking progress was made in 2005

We fuel the relentless search for three cures for MS: a way to stop the disease cold; a way to repair what it has done; a way to prevent it from ever happening in the future.

Unraveling the mystery of MS genetics

- The Society helped establish a collaborative international MS Genetics Consortium. In 2005, researchers began using a new DNA chip that enables data processing at speeds never before possible. Scientists are now identifying genes that merit closer study and developing innovative research designed to reveal MS triggers and new treatment targets.

Speeding improvements in clinical care

- Clinicians at more than 85 sites in the United States and Canada now work together on ground-breaking initiatives. The Society-funded MS-CORE brings together knowledge and expertise of these collaborative clinical teams - shaping new approaches to care and therapies.

Preventing or repairing nerve damage done by MS

- Four international teams of investigators began work on innovative ways to reverse – or prevent– the damage caused by Multiple Sclerosis. The teams meet regularly to assess progress and have committed to be ready to launch clinical trials by 2010.

Caring for the youngest people with MS

- Six Pediatric MS Centers of Excellence launched in 2005 offer medical and psychosocial support to children with MS and their families. Care is available to all regardless of proximity to the centers or the family's ability to pay.

The best and the brightest

- The Society expanded its commitment to the future of MS research and care by funding 102 fellowships for post-doctoral scientists, physicians, and nurses. These bright young minds will help us achieve a world free of MS.

Programs & Services

Helping people with MS meet their needs every day

Throughout the Society, programs are designed to enable and empower everyone whose life is affected by MS.

- Education and training on wellness, symptom management, employment and career training, and more.
- Connection to others through chapter-affiliated self-help groups, peer support programs, volunteer opportunities, MSWorld chat groups and online forums.
- Opportunities for sharing and celebration at weekend retreats, family days, art and recreational programs, and special events.
- College scholarships for students in families hard pressed by MS expenses; the 2005 scholarship program supported 88 individuals and their educational dreams.
- Assistance and information in many forms: Referral programs at every chapter; award winning publications InsideMS and Keep S'myelin (for children) and the chapter-based MSConnection; national and chapter Web sites, live and archived Web casts, and our expanding national call center.

Society activists and our Public Policy Office in Washington, DC, focus action on state and federal policies that enhance life for people with MS.

- Activists laid the ground work for the fair hearing on the re-issue of Tysabri that took place in early 2006.
- Society took the lead in a movement to reform application standards for Social Security Disability Insurance.
- Activists urged approval of funds for the National Institutes of Health where vital MS research is conducted.
- Over 250 activists visited our nation's capital to successfully advocate on issues large and small during the March 2005 Public Policy Conference.
- During 2005, chapters worked on 235 state and local issues, with 123 successes. (a 52% success rate)

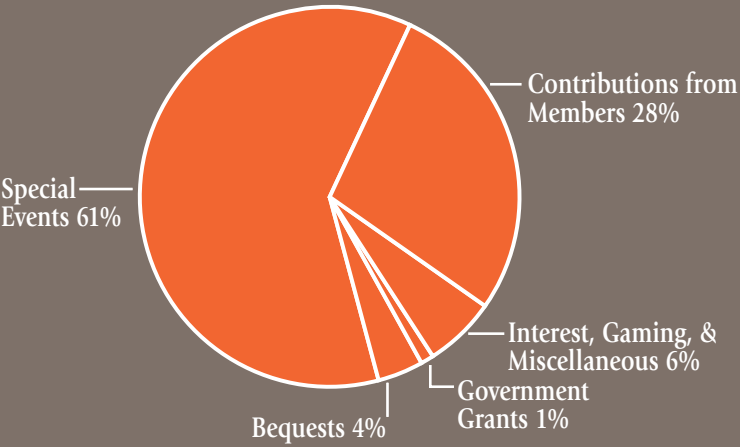

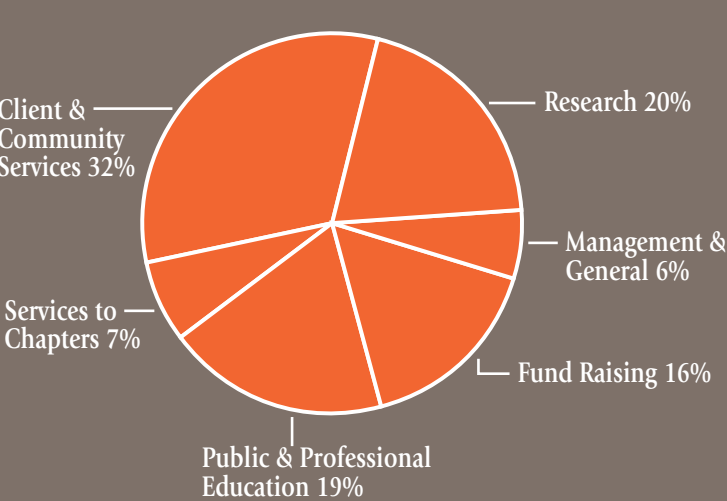
