# News from the Field

Arizona: "Flagstaff Combats Wildfire with 'Watershed Protection Project," a <u>news story</u> about thinning work in the **municipal watershed**, ran on *NAZ Today* last month. **California**: Currently **underway** in northern California is the final Prescribed Fire Training Exchange of the fall. **California**: More from the **Klamath River TREX**, including an <u>interview</u> on Jefferson Public Radio (from southern Oregon) with **Sophie Neuner** and **José Luis Duce**—a wonderful juxtaposition that captures a lot about TREX: one of them a **first-time burner** with long, strong **ties to the place**, the other a **25-year fire veteran** from **Spain**.

California-Colorado-New Mexico: The University of Oregon's Ecosystem Workforce Program has published the working paper "Local Capacity for Integrated Forest and Wildfire Management" by Heidi Huber-Stearns, Cassandra Moseley and Nick Goulette (<u>nickg@hayfork.net</u>). Four groups associated with the FAC Net and FLN—Coalition for the Upper South Platte, Forest Stewards Guild, City of Santa Fe Fire Department Wildland Fire Division and Trinity County Resource Conservation District—are featured as the case studies, from which lessons and keys to success are drawn.

New Mexico: Eytan Krasilovsky (eytan@forestguild.org) reports a busy few weeks for the Forest Stewards Guild staff: In the western part of the state, they worked with participants in the Spanish Language TREX and other partners to complete first-entry burns at Cottonwood Gulch. Then at a two-week cooperative burn in Black Lake, they completed units that have been a priority since the 2013 and 2014 TREX there, returning fire to more than 500 acres of meadows and ponderosa pine, aspen and mixed conifer forests. "We also had broadcast fire as close to homes as we've ever had. I learned a lot from that experience and it was especially important to reduce fuels across the fence from residences. This year was more than twice the acreage of previous seasons, with some of the best fire effects we've had." This was also the first year that New Mexico State Forestry was a partner in the burn operations, and people in their <u>Returning Heroes Wildland Firefighter Program</u> worked on their task books and helped out in a big way. Local fire departments and the City of Santa Fe Fire Department's wildland crew were also key players.

North Carolina: In late September the Southern Blue Ridge Escarpment Landscape team held a field trip at the Green River Game Lands, which are part of the Joint Fire Science Program's national Fire and Fire Surrogate Study. Twelve team members from six agencies toured research sites where management is focused on restoration for shortleaf, Table Mountain and pitch pine forests as well as shelterwood and oak regeneration. The gathering was a great chance to support the landscape's goals of learning from other fire professionals, building capacity and generating new ideas and partnerships. North Carolina: In the news article "Sharing Space: The Bears Are Back in Town," Adam Warwick (<u>awarwick@tnc.org</u>) noted the role of the Southern Blue Ridge FLN in getting fire on the ground so that bears can live well in healthy forests, rather than dumpster-diving in town. 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# Kansas Forest Service Mitigation Project

March 26-April 1, 2017

The 2017 Kansas Forest Service Mitigation Project has been scheduled for the week of March 26-April 1, 2017. Location is TBD at this time. Tentative schedule will be arrival at ICP on Sunday afternoon the 26<sup>th</sup>, with full operational periods Monday through Friday, and demob on Saturday morning April 1st. As it has, since its beginning in 2005, this year's Mitigation project has four main goals, all with the oversight of a Type 3 IMT organization. The first goal will be the project operations including; fuels reduction, line construction, pile burning, and, as conditions allow, prescribed fire during the course of the week. Secondly, our organization will be available for local Initial Attack support as needed and requested. The third goal is to provide a hands-on wildland fire internship experience for students in the Hutchinson Community College Fire Science program. And our f goal is to, thru mentoring and training opportunities, build the capacity for wildland and incident management qualifications and experience within the KFS, as well as our local, regional, and national partners.

To meet these goals, we are looking to staff a Type 3 IMT, up to two Type 2 hand crews, and up to six Type 4/5/6 engines, based on available staff and budget. For this 2017 project we will fill each and every position from FFT1 up thru ICT3 with fully qualified individuals. See table below for list of qualified and trainee positions that we are seeking. For those individual assisting us in a fully qualified role we will provide stipend reimbursement for hours worked. Each person will be paid at the rate for the role they are filling within the KFS Mitigation Project organization. NWCG AD rates for 2016 will be the document used to establish the pay rates for this incident. We will have three important exceptions to the standard national fire dispatch pay procedures. First, we will not be able to pay travel expenses or time for travel. All pay will begin at check-in and conclude at demob. Secondly, KFS will not authorize any reimbursement for back-fill. Third, current KFS permanent and temporary employees will be paid at the rate listed in their hiring appointment documentation. NOTE: Pay for this project is provided as a stipend or one-time contractual payment. Participants will receive a 1099 form, not a W2 from the State of Kansas for income tax purposes and no taxes will be withheld up front.

In addition to the fully qualified roles that will be needed to safely conduct the planned operations, we will accept trainees for the positions listed in the table below. Trainee positions will not receive a stipend payment and will be charged \$200 to cover food and lodging costs. While we look for experienced, knowledgeable, and professional personnel in all roles we also are seeking personnel with a strong desire to be a mentor and example of the wildland fire service/incident management community to all involved, especially to the HCC students.

The event is run as a Type 3 incident in a fire camp setting. This is a great opportunity for those wishing to gain experience with this type of incident, as well as an opportunity to work in grassland and hardwood timber fuels types. If you and/or your staff wish to participate, please submit a copy of the attached nomination form (pre-filled for your convenience). PLEASE include both full qualifications, and any trainee positions you/they would like to be considered for. We anticipate selecting and inviting overhead and trainees by mid-December for those who have to request leave by the end of the calendar year. Any requests or nominations after that time will be considered, but preferred positions may already be filled.
