No one can see the future; no one knows what changes lie ahead, but I have faith in Public Works that with every passing year, we together will make our communities a better place.


Let me close by saying "Thank You" once again for the privilege of letting me lead our Chapter again this year.



APWA Central PA Chapter Visits the FBI Academy

It all began after many months of planning. It was in the very early morning of Wednesday, the 24 of May 2017 when the Central PA Chapter of the American Public Works Association (for their Annual Membership Meeting / Field Trip) began their southbound trek. With 27 individuals registered (not including the coach operator), the R&J Motor Coach picked up APWA passengers at the Harrisburg Mall and then traveled to the Queen's Gate Mall in York, PA. Once at the Queen's Gate Mall and after the remaining APWA passengers boarded the coach, we all headed south, to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The FBI Academy located in Quantico, Virginia, that is. The plan for the day was to tour the Academy and, as time permits, the Marine Corps Base.

You Are Here

On the way to the FBI Academy, the traffic became a challenge shortly after leaving York, but to pass the time, many enjoyed refreshments on board which included hot coffee, donuts, sodas, lemonade, iced tea, barley pop, chips, pretzels and popcorn. Oh, did I forget to say donuts and donuts of all flavors.

When arriving at the Marine Corps Base in Quantico where the FBI academy is located, we attempted to clear the Base Entrance Check Point. After some confusion and being detained (the Officers were not able to find our names on the list which provides clearance and allows for entry), we were finally approved to proceed.

Once arriving at the front entrance of the FBI Academy, about an hour and a half late incidentally, we were joyfully greeted by Ms. Lori Kuna, Special Programs Coordinator, who would be our tour guide for the next 4.25-hour tour.

Briefly, the tour consisted of the Academy and Academy grounds with Ms. Kuna describing almost everything we viewed and providing answers to our many, many questions. Naming just a

few of the highlighted areas were the Firing Range, Gymnasium, Hogan's Alley, The Chapel, Memorial Grounds, The Blacksmith/Weapons Area and the wooded area where Agents train and learn about hidden bodies and decomposing corpses. We were even fortunate enough to witness helicopters in-training and performing scraping missions which are often used in terrorist and hostage situations. And for those who do not know, Hogan's Alley is the area where there is a mock town (store fronts) where the Agents train for bank robberies, hostage situations, burglaries, raids, terror threats, "take down" scenarios and other crimes. Incidentally, there was even an open "Subway Shop" in the heart of downtown Hogan's Alley where those who are in training have the opportunity to get a quick "bite to eat." We all took a break about mid-way in the tour to eat lunch in the Academy cafeteria, The FBI Café as it is called. After lunch, additional touring and a brief stop at the Bureau's Canteen (where we all purchased at least one souvenir) our tour concluded with Ms. Kuna boarding the motor coach and providing a fifteen-minute presentation about serial killer(s). Her presentation was interesting, to say the least, and definitely gave us some very interesting facts to think about on the way home.

Because we were late on arriving for the tour and with the tour lasting longer than expected and since we really did not have sufficient time, the group regretfully decided that we would pass on the tour of the Marine Corps Museum. With this, the next trek back to York and Harrisburg.

On the way back, I had the privilege to present to the Chapter President, Ms. Donna Jessup, a proclamation from the Pennsylvania Legislature that formally proclaimed the week of May 21st National Public Works Week.

There were also periods when everyone had to put up with an MC providing interesting facts about the FBI and asking trivia questions. Hopefully this made the trip down, and back, to good old PA seem just a bit briefer. We returned safely to our originating point, the Harrisburg Mall, at approximately 8:00 p.m.

8:00 – 11:00 a.m.: CURVES ON LOCAL ROADS: ISSUES AND SAFETY TOOLS (credit course)

This course will provide students with information on the application of horizontal alignment signs (for curves). Based on national and state standards, this course will cover:

- Curve Warning sign details & applications
- Curve Warning sign placement & installation criteria
- Curve study components

Further, the course will instruct students on the studies and application of curve warning signs and other safety features for curves. The course will also examine other features germane to curve safety, including pavement quality, super-elevation, shoulder edge drop-offs, clear zones and fixed object hazards. Students will be able to explore the application of curve warning signs through several real examples, including a field visit to nearby curves.

8:00 - 9:30 a.m.: GEOSYNTHETICS

This course identifies various types of geosynthetic materials used in road maintenance operations. Attendees will gain the knowledge and understanding of the common types of geosynthetic materials as well as their functions. Instructors will review the cost benefits in using geosynthetics in the preventive maintenance of roadway assets. The course will discuss such uses of geosynthetics as subsurface drainage, subgrade stabilization, erosion and sedimentation control and paving fabric.

9:45 - 11:00 a.m.: ADAPTIVE SIGNALS

Poor tragic signal timing contributes to traffic congestion and delay. Conventional signal systems use preprogrammed, daily signal timing schedules. Adaptive signal control technology adjusts the timing of red, yellow and green lights to accommodate changing traffic patterns and ease traffic congestion. The main benefits of adaptive signal control technology over conventional signal systems are that it can:

- Continuously distribute green light time equitably for all traffic movements
- Improve travel time reliability by progressively moving vehicles through green lights
- Reduce congestion by creating smoother flow
- Prolong the effectiveness of traffic signal timing
