

#### Green Rooms Memorable Moments from March

What have we been doing? March was a busy month in the Green Room! We finished our Pets Study and started our Insect Study! We have lots of fun things for the students to explore with in the class-room daily that relate to insects. Some examples of these things that your learner will get to explore with in the classroom include bug stamps, bug catchers and nets, books about bugs, plastic bugs, bug counters and much more! We will also sing songs about insects and learn how to identify if a bug is an insect or not. If it is an insect it will... 1. have three body parts (head, thorax, and abdomen) 2. have at least 6 legs and 3. have one or two sets of wings, practice identifying insects with your learner at home while playing outside! We will also learn some new songs about insects and non-insects including Herman the Worm by The Learning Station and Insects Body by Dr. Jean, have your learner sing them with you:) We will also identify insects that are safe and not safe to touch. In second step we practiced identifying the problem and coming up with solutions to our social problem. We learned the letters E, J, W and U along with the numbers 15 and 16. Our shape this month was diamond. Our color this month was green.

What will we be learning? In April we will be continuing our Insect Study. We will learn about the letters V, Q, X and Y. We will be learning about the color black. Our shape of the month will be oval. We will learn about the numbers 17 and 18. In Second Step we will be focusing on speaking up assertively and learning in school for next year.
