Editor's Note: The canine MRI unit was obtained to detect soft tissue problems that cannot be located and diagnosed without an MRI unit. It costs GEB close to \$1,000 each time the vet staff goes to a "human" radiation facility to have an MRI completed on one of the GEB animals.

This unit is the only one available in the U.S. to perform the service needed for small animals and will enhance the GEB care of all its inhouse dogs as well as those in service.
