THE BANE AND BLESSED

They turned back from Emmaus. (Luke 24) No one knows where Emmaus was, but everyone has visited there. Emmaus is where we go to get away from Jerusalem, away from disappointment, and sorrow, and fear. Emmaus is where we go when our hearts have been broken. But they turn back from Emmaus and return to Jerusalem. And they tell others what they have seen. They tell others about the One they have encountered.

Peter and John run to the tomb. Peter rushes in. John stands on the threshold and looks before entering. They look for the living among the dead. (John 20) They find God at the place that seems to be most godforsaken.



Mary Magdalen weeps with joy having found Him outside the tomb. (John 20) She wanted to cling to Him as she used to know Him. But she had to let go of the old in order to breathe in His Spirit and be in Him.

It is always difficult to distinguish a moment of dying from a moment of birth. This Easter let's join the blind men and cry out, "Lord, we are blind. We want to see." (Matthew 20)

DID YOU KNOW



The Paschal Candle is one of the most sacred elements in Christianity. Made of beeswax to represent the purity of Christ, it is adorned with many Christian symbols. The cross represents Jesus' redemptive sacrifice, the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet (Alpha and Omega) signify that Jesus is the beginning and the end, and five grains of incense represent the five wounds of Christ.


During the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night, a fire is kindled and blessed, and

from that blessed fire, we light the Paschal candle, which is then carried into the dark church. The "new" fire serves as an image of the Resurrection. The candle, which represents Christ himself, is placed on a special Paschal candle stand near the altar. The Paschal candle remains in the Sanctuary during the full 50 days of the Easter season and is lit for liturgical services during that time. After Pentecost, the candle is placed next to the baptismal font. The Paschal candle is lit during all baptisms, passing the light of Christ to each person baptized. The candle is also lit at funeral services as a reminder of Baptism and to testify to our Christian certainty in the resurrection of the dead and life with Christ in the world to come.

Alleluia! Jesus is risen! He is risen indeed!

May this declaration resound not only in these walls but touch the lives of all we meet and forever be the truth of which we speak.

ROSEBUD PROGRAM



As part of the Elizabeth Ministry program at SEAS, the Rosebud Program is a visual reminder of the power of prayer. At the front of the church in the sanctuary under our Blessed Mary, you will see a vase of roses, each representing a sacred life with each color representing a different prayer request.

A pink rosebud honors pregnancy and the unborn baby. A red rosebud celebrates birth or adoption. A white rosebud remembers a child lost through miscarriage, abortion, stillbirth, or infant or child death (whether recent or in the past). A yellow rosebud represents those waiting to conceive or adopt. A blue rosebud represents those families experiencing troubling times, and a purple rosebud represents grandparents' concerns.

We invite all parishioners when the occasion arises, to simply approach the altar, pick out the appropriate rosebud, and place it in the vase. A journal is available to fill out with your name or with an anonymous notation whatever details you would like the parish to hold in prayer. Prayer cards for the various situations are located next to the roses and can be taken home and kept for personal meditation. The roses will serve as reminders to all members of the parish to hold your intentions in prayer. 
