and thawing can cause pipe bursts.

It's also a good idea to think about what might be impacted by strong winds or flooding around the home and secure accordingly.

Thinking ahead and preparing for what the weather may bring this winter can make a real difference.

ACCESS TO HEALTH SERVICES

Aneurin Bevan University Health Board (ABHUB) is asking people to think very carefully before they attend the emergency department at the Grange University Hospital. For non-life threatening or severe conditions other sources of help and support are available.

The NHS III service can provide advice and direct callers to the appropriate support. For minor injuries, units in the Royal Gwent hospital or Ystrad Mynach are available. People are also advised to contact their GP practice - which have remained open throughout the pandemic and continue to provide care in accordance with national guidance.

LOOKING OUT FOR NEIGHBOURS

Offering to bring some shopping can be a real help during winter months, particularly during severe weather.

Simple things like ensuring they are keeping warm and protecting themselves against the risks the cold weather poses can really help.

RECOGNISING OUR ARMED FORCES

ROYAL BRITISH LEGION GIVEN FREEDOM OF CITY



A ceremony to award the Freedom of the City of Newport to the Royal British Legion (RBL) was held at the end of last month.

On this special day for the city, the national Poppy Appeal, the annual fundraising campaign in support of the armed forces community, was also launched.

In the presence of RBL members and dignitaries, including the leader of the council, the Lord Lieutenant of Gwent, the High Sheriff and MPs, the freedom

scroll was presented to the Lieutenant Colonel MI Harry, president of the Gwent RBL, by the Mayor of Newport.

In the words of the scroll, the Freedom of Entry was given in appreciation of the famous record and glorious traditions of loyal and devoted service to the country and in recognition of the long association between Newport and the RBL.

It bestowed the right, honour and distinction of marking through the city's streets "on all ceremonial occasions with drums beating, bands playing, colours flying and bayonets fixed".

Parade Commander Peter Colsey then requested permission to exercise the Royal British Legion's right to parade through the City of Newport and it was led by the Regimental Band and Corps of Drums of the Royal Welsh.

However, due to Brexit, the Royal Navy did not sell HMS Severn, but decided to keep and re-commission her – she has even had a new coat of paint!

NEWPORT REMEMBERS

Garden of remembrance opens

Organised by the Royal British Legion, a short service will take place on Monday 8 November to officially open Newport's garden of remembrance.

Remembrance **Sunday parade**

Newport's annual Remembrance parade and service will take place on Sunday 14 November in Newport city centre.

The Newport Stedfast Band will lead the parade which will leave High Street at 10.35am making its way to the Cenotaph at Clarence Place.

The City of Newport Male Choir will also be in attendance at the cenotaph along with the Newport Borough Brass Band.

The service will take place at the Newport Cenotaph at 10.58am with the guns sounding at I I am to mark the start of the two minute silence.

Following the wreath laying ceremony and service, the Lord Lieutenant, the Mayor of Newport, High Sheriff, the Leader of Newport City Council, CO of the 104 Regiment, together with the invited guests, will then take the salute as the parade walks past.

Those invited to take part in the parade will include standard bearers, ex-servicemen, members of the Royal British Legion, councillors, associations, Armed Forces, including representatives from the recently recommissioned HMS Severn, emergency services and youth groups.

Residents are advised that there will be road closures in place from 7am until Ipm. The roads affected will be; Upper Dock Street (from Skinner Street to Old Green roundabout), Old Green roundabout (including slip roads), Old Town Bridge, Clarence Place, Caerleon Road (from Clarence Place to Church Road), Chepstow

Road (from Clarence Place to Cedar Road), Corporation Road (from Clarence Place to St Vincent Road) and East Usk Road (from Clarence Place to Tregare Street).

Other services to mark Remembrance include the Caerleon Remembrance service and parade on Sunday 14 November at 10am and the Merchant Navy remembrance service, which will take place on Saturday 20 November at 10.45am, at Mariners Green.





DEVON PLACE BRIDGE UPDATE

Work has started on laying the foundations of the new bridge across the main railway line at Devon Place.

The bridge, which will link Devon Place with Queensway, is being built to replace the existing subway.

Pedestrians, wheelchair users and cyclists will all be able to use the bridge, which is being built to active travel standards.

During this phase of the work, we will occasionally need to close the following roads at night-time:

- the Mill Street end of Devon Place, to lift plant and equipment in and out of the station, and
- on Queensway to deliver the new bridge spans and crane to the site.

The footpath on the railway line side of Queensway will also be closed during these periods, between the front of the station to the Information Station building.

A pedestrian diversion is in place on the opposite side of the road, by the Admiral building.

The council will advertise well in advance when these closures will be required.

Diversion routes, as well as access for residents, will be maintained during these closures.

MARKET ARCADE UPDATE

The Newport Market **Arcade restoration project** has marked two special events over the summer as it nears completion.

Pupils from St Woolos Primary school delivered a time capsule to the project team which was later buried under the arcade new flooring.

The project team have been working with the school on a range of activities, the result of which was the production and burial of the capsule.

Items buried within the capsule included an old passport, smartphone, watch and postage stamps, a list of why each item was included, and a letter the pupils wrote to the future.

The project also took part in Cadw's Open Doors event in September, which saw a limited series of tours of the site made available to the public.

Relatives of former arcade workers and shop owners were among those on the tours and recalled fond memories of their time in the arcade.

The tours proved to be very popular, and the project team are looking at running more once the restoration work has finished.

PROTECTING PILL

A renewed Public Space **Protection Order (PSPO),** which seeks to improve the community, is now in force in Pillgwenlly.

The PSPO restricts certain anti-social behaviour in public spaces and deals with the types of behaviour that local people said concerned them.

PSPO measures

No person in the restricted area shall:

Refuse to stop drinking alcohol or to hand over containers (sealed or unsealed) which are

believed to contain alcohol, when asked to do so by an authorised officer

- Behave in a manner that has caused or is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to a member of the public and then refuse to disperse from the area when asked to do so by an authorised officer.
- Beg in a manner which is aggressive or intimidating or is likely to cause someone to feel harassed, alarmed or distressed.
- Urinate or defecate in a public space or in view of the public.
- Sell, use or possess intoxicating substances

- this does not include alcohol, tobacco products or prescribed medicines. Persons who breach this prohibition must surrender any such substances to an authorised officer when asked to do so.
- Cyclists, or users of scooters, E-scooters, E-bikes, skateboards and hover boards, are to dismount when asked to do so by an authorised officer.

- Spit from their mouth.
- Attempt to buy sexual services from another person.

Any person who, without reasonable excuse, fails to comply with the PSPO commits an offence and could be liable on conviction to a fine of up to £1,000.

WE'RE BACKING NEWPORT

This autumn, the leader of the council launched its most generous package of support grants for new and existing small and medium sized enterprises.

To mark the occasion, Councillor lane Mudd visited Sero Waste, Newport's first zero waste shop which received a business grant from the council.

Applications for the new City of Newport business fund are now invited from those considering starting their own venture and those who want their business to grow.


This year's budget has been increased to £300,000 with the potential of helping even more businesses.

Highlights include:

Grants of up to £5,000 for the city centre or up to £2,500 across the rest of the city

- This will increase to up to £10,000 for the city centre and up to £5,000 across the wider city if a significant contribution to identified priorities is shown
- Grants can be used for fixed property costs such as rent and service charges; IT or digital costs or plant and equipment
- Previously applicants had to create at least one fulltime job but businesses that create part-time jobs can also apply
- **Businesses started at** home are also eligible for the first time

Councillor Mudd said: "I was pleased that we were able to include a significantly increased amount for business support in this year's budget, including £300,000 for our support grants. We know these have made a real difference to businesses we



have already helped and it's been my pleasure to meet some of the recipients and hear their stories.

"The increased budget means we can not only help more businesses but also offer an additional level of support to SMEs who demonstrate they are innovative in areas such as helping to tackle climate change, addressing poverty or reducing waste.

"This is still a time of uncertainty so we have acknowledged that flexibility. Should new priorities emerge as a result of the ongoing situation, the fund could also adapt to meet new needs. We want to do everything we can to support local entrepreneurs in a changing world.

"Our businesses are vital to the success and prosperity of Newport and we know they are resilient,

forward-thinking and innovative. We will continue to back them whenever we can, working as partners to fulfill the potential of our city and its residents."

RECYCLING *** AT CHRISTMAS

Christmas always generates a lot of waste that can be recycled - from cardboard packaging and wrapping paper to food leftovers. Here are a few handy hints on how to recycle these at home:

- Use the scrunch test Not sure if a piece of paper can be recycled? Try scrunching it up in your hand. If it doesn't spring back, then it can be recycled. It's a good test to use with wrapping paper. And if you're recycling birthday or Christmas cards, tear off any glittery bits first.
- Cut up your cardboard Cut up your cardboard so that it fits in the green box and/or bag. Wastesavers also accept a small amount put to the side of the box if, when folded, it's the same size as the green box. Larger amounts can be taken to the Household Waste Recycling Centre (HWRC) for recycling.
- Love food hate waste Did you know that one banana peel creates enough energy to power two smartphones. When clearing the dishes after eating, please put the food waste in the recycling caddy instead of the bin.

SEE, HEAR, LEARN, USE AND **LOVE THE WELSH LANGUAGE**



Newport City Council wants Welsh to become a part of everyone's lives in the city over the next 10 years as it sets forward ambitious proposals to encourage people to learn and speak the language.

Residents' views are now being sought on its 10-year vision for Welsh in education across the city.

A consultation on the draft Welsh in Education Strategic Plan closes on 22 November 2021.

Feedback from residents will be used to shape the final draft plan before it goes to the Welsh Government for its approval.

Councillor Jane Mudd, leader of Newport City Council, said: "We want our national language to be part of the fabric of the city, woven into every aspect of people's lives. The draft plan is the next step to making that ambition become a reality and we want to know what you think of it."

Councillor Jason Hughes, the council's Welsh language champion, said: "We want residents to be a part of this process as this will be a long-term strategy to bring Welsh into everyone's lives.

"Welsh is living, vibrant and vital and we want to ensure that all residents, whatever their age, have the opportunity to learn and speak their national tongue. Our message is to 'see, hear, learn, use and love' the language. Let us know if you think our draft plan will help us achieve that ambition."

COUNCIL WARD BOUNDARY REFORMS

Some of Newport City Council's ward boundaries will change after the **Welsh Government** decided to accept the recommendations of the Local **Democracy and Boundary** Commission for Wales.

It means that Newport's number of councillors will increase by one, taking the council from 50 to 51 members - an average of 2,156 electors per member.

The number of wards will also be increased from 20 to 21, with 18 wards electing more than one councillor.

Eleven of the current wards will remain the same. The changes come into force before the next council elections in May 2022.

RESIDENTIAL DISABLED PARKING BAYS

Applications for disabled parking bays near people's homes can be made from this month and until January.

Applications cannot be considered outside these dates. This means they can all be considered at the same time to ensure fairness and

best use of the resources available.

Following a successful application, the work will be carried out within 12 to 18 months.

Although they are provided to help those with a disability park near their home, they can be used by anyone who displays a blue badge and are not for picking up or dropping off passengers.

If an application meets the criteria, the next step is to confirm the location is suitable by considering

the effect of the proposed bay on road safety, traffic flow, and other highway related matters.
