# PRESIDENT'S TURN by George Raeder

I am honored as interim President to again represent NCWT until the end of 2005. I will, however, miss the August meeting because of travel to the Kansas City AAW convention.

A question was raised during the July NCWT meeting concerning the value of attending woodturning conventions and symposiums. I have attended three in the past, and am registered for the AAW and Cincinnati events this year. I cannot emphasize enough the value received for attending one of these multifaceted learning experiences.

Most events have registration fees of between \$200 - \$300 and are held over three days, organized in to multiple demonstration 'rotations' by 4 to 6 (or more) professional woodturners and numerous local or club woodturners. There are usually more rotations scheduled than any one attendee can observe, but since the demos cover a wide spectrum of interests and preconceived attendee abilities, you have the luxury of attending a session that interests you. Moreover, most professionals demonstrate the same thing more than once to reduce scheduling conflicts.

Typical demos might include sharpening, natural edge bowls, coloring and texturing, vessels, use of the skew or other tools, chucking, various spindle turning techniques, boxes, finishing, hat making, working wet wood, platters, design, etc., and I've only mentioned a few of the potential topics. Most rotations last 1 to 2 hours, with fifteen minute breaks to allow attendee movement between demonstration rooms and new demo set-ups.

Often, meals are provided and there is usually a banquet. Most events also include an 'instant gallery' or show and tell, and auction or raffle, and a trade show for the purchase of tools, equipment, and wood, wood, and more wood.

These events are always well organized, well attended by woodturners from all over the country (and often the world) and are invaluable to the serious woodturner. The instant gallery alone is worth seeing because of the incredible work people are doing relative to design, ideas, workmanship and execution.

I strongly recommend attendance to one or more of these symposiums to immediately improve your own work. The Cincinnati Symposium, October 21 - 23, 2005 may still have a few openings. See you there!

### July 2005: Show Us Your Tips!

July brings our annual Tips and Techniques sharing session. This is an informal meeting due to many people being on vacation, or are they?



There was no shortage of members at this year's **Show** Us **Your Tips** event.



**Jim Pugh** showed us his circle templates for cutting bowl and platter blanks. Note that he marked the patterns with the correct diameter in four or more places around the edge so that the label can be seen no matter how the blanks are laying. He also shared that he signs

his work with a fine point Sharpie, allowing him to sign his work after it has been completed, not having to stop for an intermediate step.



**Paul Kosmos** showed his home-made small captive ring tool. Paul made his tool from a nail. Bob Skinner recommends using an allen wrench as a starting point while King Heiple recommended a cement nail. All agreed that any would work well as long as they were formed properly.




Highly motivated by an unfortunate incident with a jointer, **Brian Becker** made this push block to allow pulling smaller objects through the machine rather than pushing toward the blade. The importance of adding this safety measure to your shop practices cannot be overestimated.



**King Heiple** discussed finishes and getting a nice matte finish by using a non-steel wool to 'wet-sand' with water and fine plastic wool.



**George Raeder** showed us his depth gauges for getting the proper setup with his Wolverine grinding jig.



George also showed us his tenon and dovetail sizing templates and described how the templates relate to the proper sizes for chucking bowls, platters, etc.



**Tom Wisnieski** dug into his bucket of goodies to come up with parts to show us how to make a nice, heavy tool handle. Tom donated the completed handle to the club for individuals to try and critique. Tom will use the info from the critiques to make improvements.

## **July Show & Tell**









Box elder bowls by King Heiple.

As part of the tip and techniques sharing session, several items were chosen from the Show and Tell table so the artist could explain how the piece was made.



**Bob Germond** made this textured spalted sycamore bowl. Bob used a Sorby texturing tool to get this unique texture on the contour of the bowl. He used Renaissance wax to get his nice luster. Jim Pugh seconded the recommendation to use Renaissance wax.



Bob also showed us his spectacular figured Sapele platter.



Wayne Jenkins showed his corrugata burl bowl. He mounted the burl on a faceplate, turned the bottom of the bowl with a recess, reversed the piece and mounted in a chuck and turned the top.



**Tom Knapp** explained his lidded box.



Dick Gray also created a lidded box.



**King Heiple** turned and carved this walnut crotch platter.



Bob Skinner with a segmented cottonwood and mahogany turning. The turning was made from 12 segments in each band. Each band is formed by placing the segments on tape, then applying glue and wrapping the tape into a circle. He then clamps the band with a radiator clamp. He mounts the base on a faceplate then glues each layer onto the previously turned base or layer. After removing the completed turning from the faceplate, Bob covers the holes with small felt pads.



Paul Kosmos' figured maple hollow form with ebony finial. Paul sanded the piece to 800 grit on the lathe, then hand sanded off the lathe to 2500 grit. He applied several coats of oil finish, waiting one to two weeks between coats to insure the oil had hardened.
